Eastland County had a very good election turnout with 5,880 people voting. In the local contests, Democrat Bill Miears had 3177 votes to 1930 for Republican Marie Rabel for District Clerk. Monty Jones received 441 votes to 113 for Gary Rabel in the Justice of the Peace, Prec. 3, race. Billy Bacon, Jr. received 211 write-in votes to lose the County Commissioner, Prec. 4, office to Reggie Pittman, who had 1204 votes.

The Constitutional Amendment passed in every Eastland County box expect Desdemona and Carbon. It was a 43 to 43 tie in Desdemona ad it lost 45 to 55 in Carbon. The county vote was 2182 for and 1587 against.

A. Throughout the years, people have used an unusual variety of abrasives as toothpastes. About 4000 years ago the Egyptians used a substance made of incense, green lead, and verdigis (the green crust that forms on metal when exposed to water or air) as a dentifrice. The Chinese experimented with ground fish bones to as a dentifrice. The Chinese experimented with ground fish bones to clean their teeth. During the Middle Ages, the Arabs were the first to recognize the danger highly abrasive materials could have on teeth, especially the sand and pumics contained in some products. In Europe, acids were used to remove stains, and similar agents continued to be used until the early part of this century. It wasn't until 1934 that the American Dental Association began rating tooth pastes as "accepted" or "unaccepted."





From Ouistreham To Sainte-Mere-Eglise

It was along this stretch of coast that the greatest armada ever assembled, over 4,600 landing craft and countless naval vessels, landed forces from the allied nations to begin the push to defeat Germany and end World War II 46 years ago. The approximately 80 km from Ouistreham to Sainte-Mere-Eglise was the scene of some of the bloodiest fighting of the war.

We traveled generally from east to west through the seven zones of responsibility, beginning with the areas of what is now called Pegasus Bridge which protected the left flank and provided an eventual route to Caen and the north. British and Canadian paratroops and glider troops were landed in this zone in the cover of darkness of the night of June 5. The first house liberated from Nazis control, still stands on the banks of the Orne River at the bridge.

From Pegasus Bridge we went along the Orne to the coast at Ouistreham where Sword Beach, a British landing zone began. At Hermanville we saw the memorial to the Sword Beach landing which overlooks the beach. The beach here is relatively flat and the terrain beyond the

beach is not as imposing as the terrain beyond the other

St. Aubin in the British zone known as Juno Beach was next on the route. Here the memorial is located atop a gutted German bunker. Beyond the beach we could see some of the hedgerows that were such an impediment to

of the British sector was our next stop. Arromanches, located on Gold Beach, and the site of the artificial harbor built by the British to supply the invasion, was most impressive. The museum at Arromanches contained a scale model of the Mulberry harbor, one of most amazing engineering feats of the war. The harbor was built in England in sections and towed across the channel and anchored off-shore. Many of the concrete and steel sections are still visible from shore. A diorama of the entire landing and invasion effort was a feature in the museum which I will never forget.

As we entered the American sector I was surprised at how sparsely populated and how much like the original state of the area it remained. The sunken roads, the walls, and the hedgerows which so drastically hampered the advance are still there.

Near the village of Colleville began Amaha Beach. This stretch of beach was more exposed to fire from the higher ground beyond the beach. The American forces had great difficulty in neutralizing the German resistance along Omaha Beach and casualties were heavy. It was in this area that the Americans built an artificial harbor for landing troops and materials. This artificial harbor was destroyed in the violent strom that hit during the second week of the invasion but concrete anchors on the beach remain as evi-

High above Omaha Beach in the vicinity of Colleville -St. Laurents is the American cemetery. In one of the most beautiful settings I have ever seen is the final resting place

in the landerige and the bitter fighting in the weeks that followed. Originally the cemetery held the bodies of over 23,000 of our war dead, but 14,000 were later sent home at the request of fami-

The reverence inspired by the countless rows of white marble crosses, arranged in sections within the 172 acres, with a huge memorial at one end and a chapel at the other was overwhelming. It is gratifying to see how beautifully landscaped and maintained this hallowed bit of American soil remains 46 years after its consecration.

We proceeded from the cemetery to Pont Du Hoc. This much publicized point is high on a bluff above Omaha Beach and the site of a huge German bunker. It was this bunker that the Rangers under Colonel Earl Rudder were ordered to knock out.

Some 400 Americans died or were wounded in scaling the cliffs to get at the bunker which the Allies thought contained large guns which could be used on the entire landing area. It turned out that the big guns had not been installed and the Rangers suffered needless casualties. The movie "The Longest Day" features this assault.

The memorial to the landing on Omaha Beach is located atop this bunker. The entire area around the bunker and memorial has never been restored and grassed-over craters from bombs and shells are everywhere. We walked among these craters and the ruins and tried to imagine the noise and activity of that June day in 1944.

We walked about in the rooms below the ground and saw where the Germans lived and later died. On one concrete wall is a memorial plaque presented by Texas Governor Bill Clements in Further west up the coast

we came to the final landing zone, Utah Beach. This landing zone is in a flatter area of the beach but still an area heavily fortified by the Germans. This landing zone was of 9368 Americans who died essential to open a route to

Cherbourg on the Atlantic coast and the rest of the Cotentin Peninsula. The museum of the memorial to Utah Beach are just a few kilometers from the town of Sainte-Mere-Eglise.

Sainte-Mere-Eglise is in the midst of the area where the U.S. 104th and 82nd paratroops and glider troops were dropped on the night before the landing to protect the west and northwest flank of the invasion area.

The church steeple in

Sainte-Mere-Eglise still has a replica of the paratrooper, John Steel, hanging from the south side. Many other evidences of the French appreciation for the liberation from four years of German occupation are displayed throughout the town.

As we headed east again toward Pegasus Bridge and on to our base at Cabourg I had time to reflect on the tremendous costs in lives, materials, and emotions, required to land a force on the continent of Europe and begin the drive eastward to Berlin and the final defeat of the Nazis in 1945. My respect and admiration for the Americans who came ashore along this hostile stretch of coast grew as 1 reflected on the effort required and the hardships endured.

To Jim Eidson and the many others, I can only say "Thank you, well done."



DAV Outraged By COLA Denial

"We're disgusted and outraged by the treatment that disabled American veterans have received from the Congress this year. While our elected representatives have been able to find the money and time to pass out their traditional pork-barrel projects, bail out savings and loan institutions and raise their own salaries, they haven't been able to adequately take care of veterans who become disabled through their service to

National Commander of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) to Capitol Hill's denial of a 5.4 percent cost-ofliving adjustment (COLA) for service-connected veterans and survivors of veterans who die from service-connected causes. Andry noted that while all other federal beneficiaries received a cost-of-living increase under the Fiscal Year 1991 federal budget, including Social Security recipients, federal employees and retired military personnel, disabled veterans did not.

"Why are disabled veter-

ans being singled out?" Andry asked. "Why are the needs of disabled veterans, their families and survivors being ignored?"

Andry noted that the loss of this years's COLA is particularly painful for disabled veterans and their families at a time when veteran's programs under the Department of Veterans Affairs are being cut by \$3.7 billion over the next five years. He added that many of the disabled veterans who will be affected are elderly and on fixed incomes. While they may likely see the costs of food, housing, and health care go up, they will see no COLA to counter those increases.

"It's inconceivable, at a

Andry pointed out that while Congress could not find in its heart a COLA for disabled veterans, it was able to:

- give its members a 25 percent pay rais that will increase their pay from \$98,000 to \$125,000 a year.

- provide \$2.5 billion in tax breaks for the oil and gas industry;

- provide \$10 billion more for the "Savings and Loan" scandal

- boost NASA funding by almost 14 percent; and provide a \$500,000 grant

to the town of Strasburg, North Dakota, to build a museum honoring band leader Lawrence Welk.

"This is what we're dealing with in Washington, a total disregard for the real, human needs in this country," concluded Andry. "All veterans should be as outraged as we are. And all veterans should let their Senators and Congressman know before November 6th just what they







Wet And Cold Weather Again; **Peanut Harvest Delayed**

Another cold front brought a drop in temperatures and general rains to Eastland County at mid-week. Skies were clearing by late Thursday, however.

This wet spell had the same general pattern as the one last weekend, Nov. 3-4. Cold air

from the north met warm winds from the gulf. Rainfall totals for Wednesday night were an inch in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Rising Star, and other places around the county. Showers on Thursday brought the totals up to around 1.5 inches.

No damage was reported, although rural roads were muddy and slippery from the slow rains. Even the median on I-20 was boggy, with several cars stuck along the way. There were also some accidents on the Interstate.

By Thursday morning the temperature was 38 degrees in Cisco, and 42 degrees at the Eastland County Water District Plant near Lake Leon. The thermometer rose to about 44 degrees during the day, but the air felt colder because of

Randy Johnson at the Pump Station at Lake Cisco reported that the Lake had caught about

4 inches of water since the rain last weekend. He said 2.25 fell during the previous rain, and Wednesday nights and Thursday's total brought it on up.

"The Lake is still in good shape," Johnson said.

Near Lake Leon Water Plant operator Jesse White reports that the Lake continues at a high level. Lake Leon caught about an inch from recent rains, he said, and is now more than 63 ft. deep at

These last rains have been beneficial to about everything except the peanut crop, says David Tunmire, Eastland County Extension Agent.

"Abou t 35 percent of the peanut c rop is still, in the fields," he says. "The g. round was already wet, and the latest rain will delay the har rvest by as much ras 10 days at lea ast."

The County Agent says that so far the peanuts have I rad little frost damage. A hea vy freeze could really hurt ther. u, with a losis of poundage as well as grade.

It doesn't look like this will har pen here, however, although snow is in the Panharidle, and flurries reported as far down as Lubbook. 1 Drier conditions are expected in Ea stland County for the weeken d, with temperatures clin nbin g up.


