CHS Principal Phil Warren To Submit Resignation To School Board Dec. 10

Phil Warren, principal at Cisco High School for the past two years, is expected to submit his resignation to the Cisco School Board at its next meeting on Dec. 10.

Mr. Warren has been offered the position of Superintendent of Schools in the Luzbuddie School District. Luzbuddie is located in the Texas panhandle, near Muleshoe.

Warren said he will accept the position subject to the approval of his resignation by the school board here. He will begin his new job at the end of this semester in January.

A native of the Panhandle area, he grew up in Crosbyton and graduated from high school there. He attended Abilene Christian University and finished at Lubbock Christian University. He began his studies again at Texas Tech University in Lubbock and received his master's at West Texas University in Canyon.

He had served as principal in Whitharral before coming

to Cisco. He had also been principal at Stratford and Wilson.

While at Cisco High School, Mr. Warren started several new programs, including the "Loboes With Class" program. CLASS stands for Character, Leadership, Attendance, Scholarship and Sportsmanship. He also began the educational satellite program, Ti-In.

Mr. Warren and his wife, Gwen, have two children, Joshua, and Roxanne. Mrs.

Warren is also an employee of CISD.

In announcing his plans to resign, Mr. Warren said, "I am excited about being offered this chance to be superintendent. This is an excellent opportunity for me, but I hate to leave Cisco and the school."

He said the last superintendent at Luzbuddie held the position for 26 years. Officials of the Luzbuddie School District were in Cisco recently interviewing Mr. Warren for the job.

City Council Meets

The Cisco City Council met in regular session Tuesday and agreed to an interlocal contract with the Eastland County Commissioners Court and the Cisco Hospital District to help fund and provide ambulance service in Cisco.

The county commissioners budgeted \$30,000 for ambulance service in Cisco this year. The city and hospital district are providing \$25,000 each.

The council voted to have City Manager Mike Moore prepare an ordinance allowing a 5.08 percent increase in rates charged by Lone Star Gas Co., rather than the 6.02 percent Lone Star Gas had requested. Council members

will vote on the ordinance at the next meeting Dec. 11.

The council also approved the purchase of another drug detection dog. Brown County reimbursed the city \$4,875 for the loss of Snake, the previous drug detection dog, which was poisoned after assisting with a drug search in Brown County last Oct. 13. It is expected that a replacement dog and training will cost over \$4,000.

In other action, the council reviewed this year's budget of \$105,000 for the Cisco Emergency Medical Service which was submitted by Kerry Craig of the Cisco EMS.

Jail Escapee Recaptured

Harlan Dale Stanley, who overpowered the jailer and escaped from the Eastland County Jail very early Monday morning, was back in the Eastland County Jail Wednesday morning after being arrested in a lake house on Amon Carter Lake south of Bowie.

Stanley was arraigned on attempted capital murder charges Wednesday morning and Justice of the Peace Vardie Huff of Gorman set his bond at \$250,000, on the charge.

Since Stanley and his 18 year old girlfriend were both from Loving in Young County north of Graham, officers were looking for Stanley in that part of the state. Learning that the girlfriend's relatives had a house on Amon Carter Lake, Eastland County Sheriff Dee Hogan asked officers in that area to check the house and offered assistance if needed. A call to Crimestoppers informed officers that the couple might meet at the lake house.

According to the report received from the Montague County Sheriff's Office, five Montague County Deputies, a Jack County Deputy, a D.P.S. Trooper, and a Game Warden approached the lake house which was in Montague County. The officers heard noises in the house but no one answered their knock at the front door Tuesday evening. Two officers entered the house

through an unlocked rear window, and finding no one on the ground floor, unlocked the door. With additional officers entering the house, three officers went upstairs where they found the escapee's girlfriend lying on a bed. She reportedly refused to move from the bed. Officers then found the escapee hiding between the mattresses on the bed. He was handcuffed and both were arrested.

After reportedly being read their rights and booked into the Montague County jail, Stanley was turned over to Eastland officers. His girlfriend was being held in the Montague County Jail on charges of aiding and abetting a fugitive. Her two year old son was placed in the custody of the woman's mother.

The Eastland County Grand Jury indicted Harlan Dale Stanley on two escape from a penal institution charges and one attempted capital murder charge, reported District Attorney Emory Walton.

The escapee was recaptured and indicted within 48 hours. Being held for burglary, first offense, he now faces three additional felony charges.

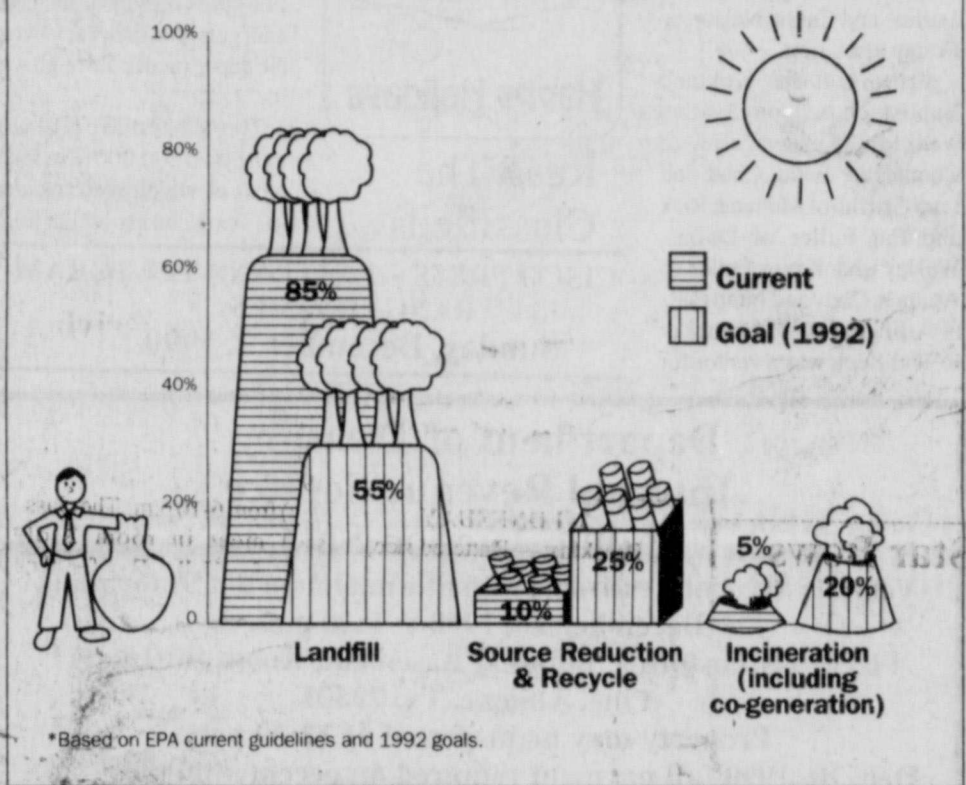

Q. What are Identity Achievers like?
A. Identity Achievers are a more diverse group than Foreclosurees. Many factors and circumstances cause the formation of a self-made identity.

Psychological growth involves increasing autonomy from the parents and increased individuation from the pre-adolescent self. The adolescent has internalized the parents values. Further growth involves re-working the internal self. This is the process of individuation.

Although the adolescent gains in autonomy and freedom, some security and protection as a child is relinquished. Individuation is painful because it involves giving up trusted aspects that feel like the self. There is a sense of uncertainty and rootlessness. In return the adolescent gains possibilities, but freedom can be terrifying. They feel relativity and risk in life decisions. They are free but vulnerable.

Identity Achievement women have gone through this process during adolescence. They have forged identities on their own terms. They have reworked the identities assigned to them as children. They are not necessarily achievers in the work world. They are women who choose lives after silthrough options and have a life plan they can claim as their own.

Fishing Outdoors

FISHING OUTDOORS Lunker Program Kicks Off Dec. 1, 1990

December, cold water temperatures tend to place the slow to take a bait largemouths deep as a rule. But the area and type of cover in which you can increase your chances become easier to pinpoint. The north shore will be holding the warmest waters. Especially the northeast bank of a pocket with a deep change and rocks to absorb and hold heat.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Departments Operation share a Lone Star Lunker program begins its fifth year on Dec. 1 with high hopes of continuing its string of monster bass, including possibly a state record.

The program, which began in November 1986 when Mark Stevenson caught the present state record largemouth weighing 17 pounds 10.72 ounces, has 68 official entries during the first four years and 47 of the entries have been released back into the lake where they were caught, said David Campbell superintendent of the Tyler Fish Hatchery. The lunker program accepts 13-pound plus bass loaned by the angler. In return, the Angler receives a fiberglass replica of his catch and gets the fish back when the department is through with it.

The 68 bass have produced more than 300,000 fingerlings, most of which were stocked in Texas lakes while some

others were kept at the hatchery for genetic studies and future spawning. Lost years 28 entries caught from 11 lakes were the highest on record, Campbell said. Seven of the fish spawned.

During this years program which concludes April 30, biologists are urging anglers with possible entries to refrain from taking pictures until TPWD personnel get there to help them handle the fish. They're less likely to have problems when brought back to the lake.

Biologists also will make an extra effort to report quicker this year.

There will be several hatcheries to help pick them up so the fish will be taken care of quicker.

Campbell doesn't know if the program will approach the 28 bass caught last year, but its obvious to him from the dead fish they have seen and the number of big bass caught last summer, that the state record could fall this year.

"It's obvious the potential for a new state record is there," he said. It may take 10 years or it may not ever happen, but from what I've seen, the signs make it right.

Campbell said it may not even be from Lake Fork, the lake most anglers expect the new record to come from - Fork produced 17 of last years 28 entries. Any lake more than eight to 10 years old could have it, especially since much of the state has been stocked with Florida-strain largemouths, beginning in 1972.

The program is sponsored by Lone Star Brewery, Jungle Labs, Irving Marine and H.E.B. Food Stores.

If you are someone you know catches a 13 pound plus largemouth bass please contact your local Texas Parks and Wildlife Game manager and invest in the future of "Fishing Outdoors" for your kids.

Plaques and ribbons are courtesy of the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association and the Texas Pecan Grower's Association.

You'll also want to get out your favorite recipe using pecans and prepare it for the Pecan Bake Show on Thursday, Dec. 6. Entries must be made by 11:00 a.m. in the Courthouse Lobby. Pecan Bake Show Rules are available at the County Extension Office.

Also, don't forget to enter the Pecan Centerpiece arrangement contest. The centerpieces or arrangements must be made from pecans and/or parts of the pecan plant. There are divisions for youth and adults.

The pecan show is being organized by the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association, Eastland Chamber of Commerce and Eastland County Extension Program Council Pecan Committee.

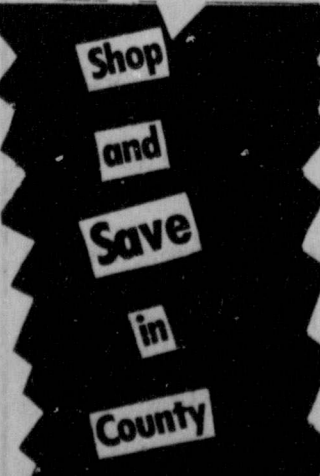

High School Sophomores May Apply To Serve As Congressional Pages

High school sophomores interested in serving as Congressional Pages for the 1991-92 school year can now apply to Congressman Charles Stenholm's office.

Eligible students must reside in the 17th Congressional District, be 16 years of age by September 1, 1991, have a "B" average in four major courses, excluding electives, and be juniors by September 1991.

"The Congressional Page program offers young people a unique opportunity to see how Congress works," said Stenholm.

The pages perform a variety of duties, including delivering correspondence or small packages to offices within the Capitol complex, answering telephones in the Members' Cloakrooms and the Page Phone Banks, and taking messages to Members. The pages work on a rotation system so they all have an opportunity to experience all aspects of the job. The work does include a monthly salary, which covers basic living expenses.

School remains a part of the page's life because they will study junior level curriculum at the U. S. Capitol Page School in the Library of Congress. Students are expected to maintain at least a "B" average while serving as a page.

Dormitories are located on the Capitol grounds. Pages are supervised while in their quarters, which are graded by the Capitol Police, 24-hours-a-day.

Congressman Stenholm will not be the page's answer directly to the Director of Page Services.

The deadline to apply for a page position is January, 23, 1991. Applications will be forwarded to a Selection Committee who will notify finalists by February 28, 1991. Interviews will be conducted in Abilene on March 23, 1991, and pages will be selected on that date.

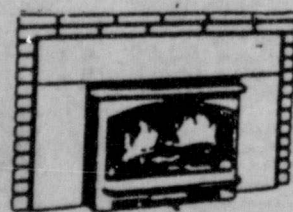

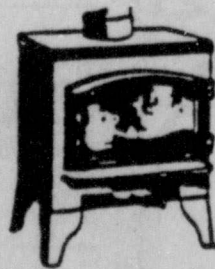

It was pointed out that many of the people range in age from 18 to the forties, and they often lack adequate education. Some lack discipline and are unmotivated, it was said, and most TDC prisoners are school dropouts as well, implying that uneducated and

unemployed people are more likely to turn to crime.

The attitude of the group seemed to be that we should provide every opportunity for the unemployed people in the county to improve their lives by becoming employed. And if additional training or education is necessary, those willing to try should be helped by making such schooling available to them.

It was suggested that people should be encouraged to obtain more education on vocational training, and to stay in school until graduation.

After discussing the possibility of a school locally for high school dropouts, it was pointed out that Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges offer classes of such a nature.

It was decided that the best thing that the committee could do in the near future is to organize a job fair. Counselors could be at the fair to advise people about opportunities for

furthering their education and increasing their job skills as well as informing them of job possibilities. Those attending could also be informed about available financial aid.

A job fair is being planned for late February to be held in Eastland. The Texas Employment Commission, the Council of Governments, the Dept. of Human Services, and the local public schools and colleges are joining the Eastland County R. C. and D.

Committee in promoting and organizing the job fair. A time and place will be announced in the near future.

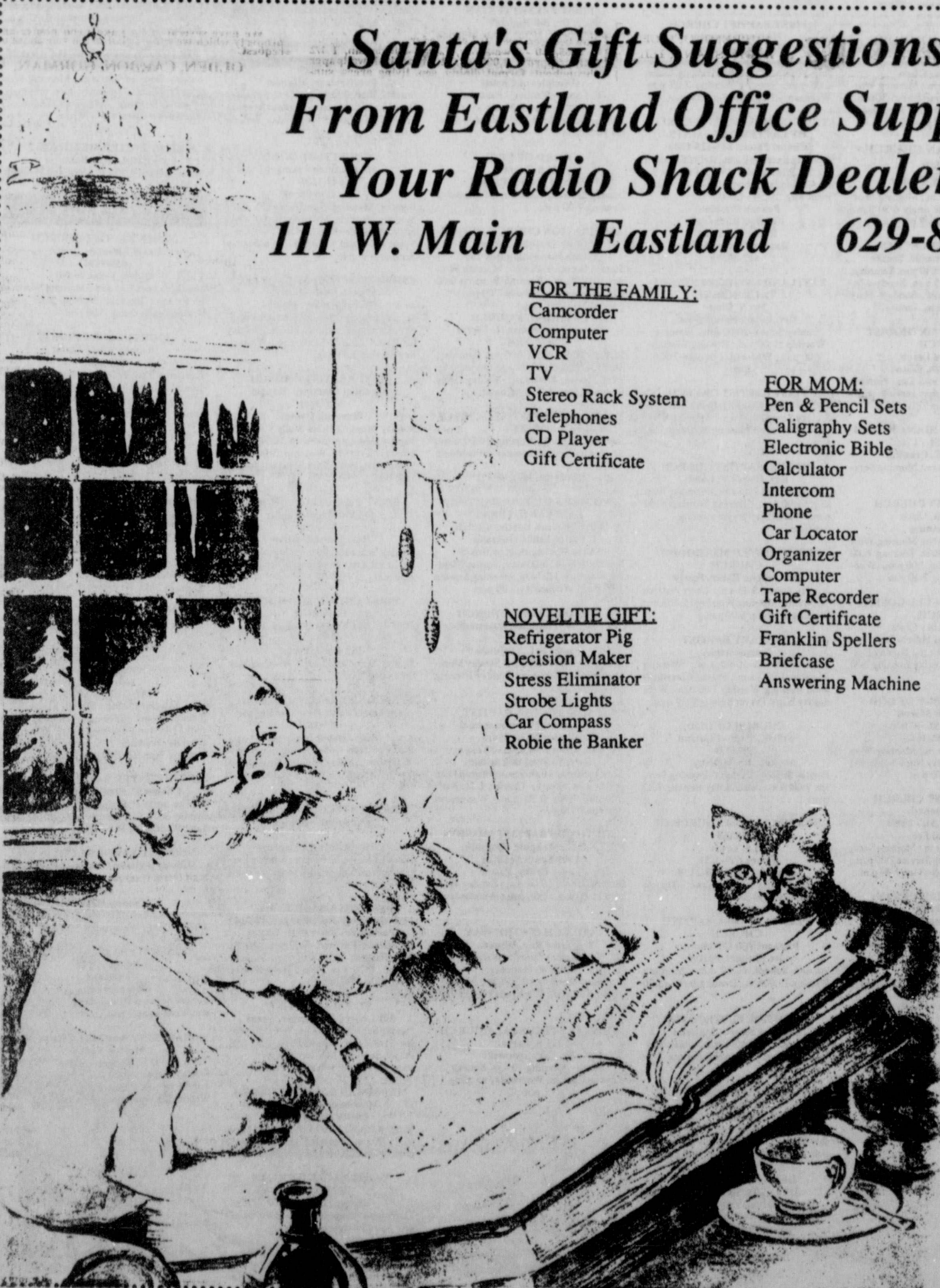

Letter To The Editor

To The Editor:

The group of citizens who have worked so diligently to close our community's hospital are symbolic of the Scriptural reference to those who gag at gnats while swallowing camels. They gag at a local tax increase needed to keep our medical facility functioning but swallow huge state and federal tax increases needed to keep the political and bureaucratic hog trough filled without so much as a burp in protest. Why?

This anti-hospital group protest paying additional taxes to maintain medical services for our children but are willing to pay lower taxes over an extended period of time for a vacant building's indebtedness and the repayment of a portion of the Hill-Burton tab, made necessary by the hospital's untimely closure. Why?

This group argues that our community no longer needs a hospital as Eastland has a hospital and it is only ten miles away. Ten miles from where, for whom, and how many? One individual in a letter to the editor referred to our former medical facility as a "bed and breakfast" hospital. What is the Eastland hospital? A Regional Medical Facility with a staff of specialists? With this line of reasoning, we could save local school taxes by closing our schools and transferring all students to Eastland. Eastland has schools and they are only ten miles away.

Thanks to federal bureaucracy and its one-size-fits-all regulations and rules as evidenced by Medicare, rural healthcare, via rural hospitals and rural physicians, has become an endangered species. Inequities in medicare re-embursements to rural health care suppliers have compounded the problems. This is the cause of our hospital's indebtedness for which the tax increase was needed. This problem is faced by small rural communities throughout the country. Some communities band together and with concerted effort, keep

their medical facilities contributing to the communities' well being. Not Cisco. Running true to form, a group of disgruntled citizens decide to choose up sides, blame the local hospital board, hospital administrator, doctors, bankers and anyone else against whom they have a grudge and shoot our community in the foot by closing the hospital — under the guise of saving money. How many members of this disgruntled group are receiving farm subsidies, courtesy of tax-payers? How many members of this group enjoy low cost meals and other freebies at the Senior Citizens Center, also courtesy of the American tax-payers? What is their motto? It is O.K. for me to take but don't ask me to give?

Having spent nearly forty years as a Registered Nurse, most of those years in Emergency rooms and surgical units, in hospitals large and small, from the Red River to the Rio Grande and from the Panhandle to the coast of our state, let me assure the pooh-pooers of miles making a difference in critical situations, that miles equate minutes, even seconds. In critical medical or accidental situations, minutes, even seconds, determine survival or death at worst, vegetation at best. Fortunately, these situations are minimal, but are you willing to assume moral responsibility for the loss of even one life as the result of your determination to close our hospital in lieu of paying extra taxes? Before you become humpshouldered from patting yourself on the back for your success in saving tax dollars by closing our hospital and practically inviting our one physician to leave town if he doesn't like it, remember, what goes around. Or, as The Good Book tells us, we will reap what we sow.

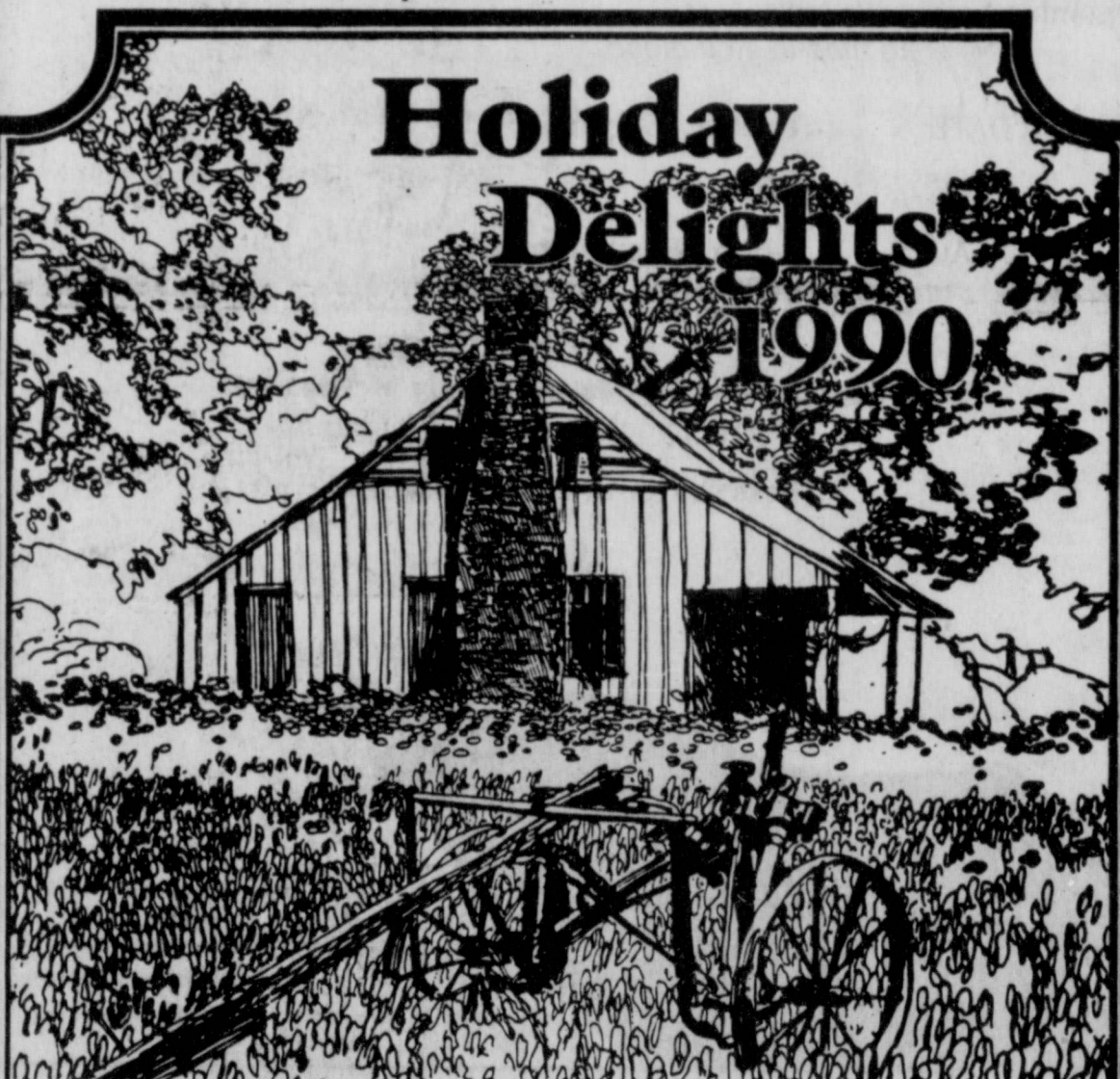
