## **Long Range Extension Program Announced**

The 1991-1994 Long Range Extension Program for Eastland County was announced at a luncheon hosted by the Eastland County Extension Program Council on December 10th at the First Christian Church Fellowship Bible Class. This long-range plan will serve as the cornerstone for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service programming efforts in Eastland County during the next four years. Ronald Pope, chairman of the Eastland County Extension Program Council, presided over the luncheon.

The initial steps for the long-range Extension program began in January with the identification of leading citizens in Eastland County by the Council Executive Board to help identify critical issues facing the county. They were divided into four task forces, agriculture and natural resources, home economics, youth and community development based on their area of interest.

On April 26th, 41 Eastland County citizens met to identify critical issues facing the county. An introduction on the economic, environmental, and social status of the county was presented by Joe Taylor, vice president of the Eastland National Bank; Don Shepard, manager of the Cisco Cham-

ber of Commerce; and Mrs. Nannette Keith, social worker for the Texas Department of Human Services, respectively.

The group then divided into their respective task forces to identify critical issues. The task forces also classified each identified critical issue as an economic, environmental or social issue.

Identified as the 16 most critical issues facing Eastland County residents were:

**ECONOMIC:** Financial Planning and Money Mangement, Agricultural Profitability, Job Training and Education, Economic Development, Revitalization of Rural Communities, Marketing, Agricultural Diversification. ENVIRONMENTAL:

Water Quality and Conservation, Chemical and Waste Management, Lack of Weather Information.

SOCIAL: Strengthening Families, Nutrition and Health, Rural-Urban Relationship, Leadership Development, Positive Youth Behavior, Rural Crime Preven-







Service horticulturist, said that insects and drought are the major problems that limit quality, but disease and inferior varieties are also culprits.

Often a small one-eighthinch diameter hole appears in the shell of the pecan. These holes are caused by "redheads," creamy white worms with red heads that are the larvae of the pecan weevil. The weevil larva eats the nutmeat, then bores an exit hole in the shell to escape to overwinter in the ground.

Pecan weevils can be one of the worst pest problems for pecan producers in this area. Many unsprayed trees have had heavy damage this year.

Pecan shucks that don't open or have trouble opening usually signal an infection of hickory shuckworms.

These small white worms are about three-eighths inches long; they tunnel into the shucks and cause extensive damage to the shuck tissue. This damage can cause the shuck to remain tightly closed, or to open partially if the damage is only at the base of the shuck.

Shuck damage results in poorly developed nutmeats. Properly timed insecticide sprays are essential for control, and infested shucks should be destroyed or plowed under to reduce the population or overwintering shuck-

Shuckworms aren't the only cause of shuck damage. Sticktight shucks gradually blacken as the nuts approach maturity in August and September. Affected shucks don't open, and the nuts are very difficult

to shake from the tree.

"Tree stress, both drought and heat, are associated with sticktight," Lipe said.

Insect damage also causes the kernel not to fully develop. Aphids sucking sap from pecan leaves during the summer and fall rob the pecans of nutrition. The black mold that grows on the "honeydew" secreted by the aphids blocks sunlight and thus photosyn-

Vivipary, another problem limiting the quality of pecans, refers to nuts sprouting in the shuck. This is usually caused by drought stress as nuts develop in the fall. Certain varieties such as Burkett and Wichita have particularly bad sprouting problems.

Black spots or streaks on the nutmeats usually are associated with stink bugs and related sucking insects that feed on the nuts.

Insect feeding before the nutmeats gel caused the nuts to drop, but nuts fed on after the nuts reach the dough state (late August) remain on the tree and develop the black spots on the kernels.

These blackened spots sometimes have a bitter taste, but the recommended spray schedule for hickory shuckworm and pecan weevil will usually keep this problem at a minimum.

Moldy kernels, dark kernels and rancidity are problems that are caused by excess water. These problems can be easily cured by allowing the pecan to air dry in a well ventilated place for a couple of weeks.

### **Outreach Effort Looks** For Older Women

Despite advances in the economic status of most retirees, older women, especially women over age 85, remain one of the most economically vulnerable groups in our society, Glyn Hammons, Social Security Manager in Abilene, said today. Social Security hopes that its current Supplemental Security Income (SSI) outreach effort will assist some of these older women.

Because of differences in life expectancies, 70 percent of Social Security beneficiaries age 85 and older are women. 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

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
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## Marketed Gas Production Increased In August

Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas marketed gas production in August totaled 360,052,901 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas, compared to the July production total of 350,905,354 Mcf. The August marketed gas production reflected a decrease of 0.06 percent compared to the August 1989 production of 360,278,677 Mcf.

In the first eight months of 1990 Texas marketed gas production totaled 2,917,129,135 Mcf, a three percent decrease from the 3,007,472,997 Mcf total during the same period of 1989.

Total gas production in Texas in August was 448,134,281 Mcf, compared to the July production total of 447,945,688. August 1989's total gas production was 461,397,148 Mcf.

Marketed gas production is the gas left after liquid hydrocarbons have been separated on the lease from the "wet" gas that is usually produced at the wellhead. It also does not include gas that is used to fuel production-related equipment on the lease site, or gas that is

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otherwise not marketed.

Exports of Texas-produced gas in August totaled 144,902,597 Mcf compared to 133,613,016 Mcf in July. The August exports of Texas-produced gas reflected a 12 percent increase when compared to the August 1989 exports total of 129,602,836 Mcf.



Corp., 14,461,046 Mcf; Transwestern Gas Pipeline Company, 11,306,090 Mcf; Northern Natural Gas Company, 7,419,986 Mcf; El Paso Natural Gas Company, 7,282,754 Mcf; Trunkline Gas Company, 6,774,878 Mcf; Florida Gas Transmission Company, 6,147,300 Mcf; and Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Company, 4,186,694

Operators reported a total of 343,681,007 Mcf of gas in

Texas storage facilities in August, compared to the July total of 350,428,919 Mcf. August's total of stored gas reflected a four percent decrease compared to August 1989's volume of 355,713,863 Mcf.

Hance said the state's top ten storage operations in August were: Natural Gas Pipeline Company, Harrison County, 138,740,515 Mcf; Exxon Company, U.S.A., Harris County, 62,918,663 Mcf; Houston Pipeline Company, Harris County, 35,555,034 Mcf; Lone Star Gas Company, Henderson County, 26,023,962 Mcf; Delhi Gas Pipeline Corp., Hopkins and Franklin Counties, 11,965,854 Mcf; Texas Utilities Fuel Company, Jack County, 9,898,618 Mcf; Lone Star Gas Company, Eastland County, 9,405,555 Mcf; American Gas Storage Corp., Gaines County, 7,366,092 Mcf; Lone Star Gas Company, Clay County, 7,199,759 Mcf; and Texas Utilities Fuel Company, Jack County, 6,400,504 Mcf.



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## Holiday Turkey Requires Safe Cooking Rules

According to health officials, improper thawing of turkeys and careless food storage are two of the most dangerous mistakes cooks can make during the holiday sea-

During the recent Thanksgiving holidays, several food poisoning outbreaks occurred in Texas, particularly in Austin and El Paso.

Barbara Keir, director of the Public Health Nutrition program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), said that turkey should be thawed in the refrigerator, or under running water (at 70 degrees or below).

"Some people make the mistake of thawing the turkey at room temperature, allowing the surface to warm before the inside meat can thaw. That allows dangerous bacteria to reproduce and cause food poisoning," Keir

She added that thawing in a

microwave oven is safe only when the food will be immediately cooked. When thawed, the turkey should be rinsed thoroughly and dried, inside and out.

Leftover meat should be cut off the bone and refrigerated. A safety rule is to freeze any portions to be kept beyond two days of refrigeration.

Keir suggested the following hints for ensuring against salmonella poisoning, perhaps the most common form of food poisoning in the home.

\*Prepare turkey stuffing immediately before cooking. Dry ingredients can be mixed in advance, but eggs, oysters, butter or other moist ingredients should be added at cooking time.

\*Cook the stuffing separately. Stuffing cooked in the turkey cavity may prevent thorough cooking.

\*When fully cooked, dense portions of the turkey, such as the thighs, should have

#### Southwestern Bell Customers To Share

\$87.5 Million Credit

More than five million Southwestern Bell customers in Texas will share an \$87.5 million one-time credit as part of an agreement approved November 28, 1990, by the Texas Public Utility Commis-

Beginning with bills mailed December 7, residential customers will see a credit on their bills ranging from \$9.53 to \$10.11. This range includes \$8.72 in credit for Southwestern Bell service, and a credit for all applicable federal, state and local fees and taxes. This will appear on the "Other Charges for Southwestern Bell" page of customers' monthly telephone bill.

Depending upon the type of service and rate structure, business customers will receive credits ranging from \$2.91 per access line to more than \$40 per access line in some instances.

However, most business customers (those with single-line, flat-rate service) will see a credit in the range of \$9.80 to \$10.38 per access line. These amounts also include the credit for federal, state and local fees and taxes.

Customers should receive their credits on bills received in December or early January. These credits are part of a settlement agreement that includes the largest telephone rate reduction and most ambitious modernization of telecommunications equipment ever ordered by the PUC.

The three-member commission approved the \$1.2 billion consumer benefit package after months of negotiations among the PUC General Counsel, Southwestern Bell and 23 other parties.

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

Dear Editor, When one considers the devastating effort of a closed hospital upon a community, a 50 cents tax rate to maintain the hospital is not unreasonable. If a town's hospital is in jeopardy, the very survival of the town is in jeopardy. Yet there are those among us who place more value upon dollars and cents than on the welfare of their fellow man or the future of their hometown.

No reasonable person can deny the need for E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. In the town of Cisco there are some 4500 residents. In the outlying districts south, west and north of Cisco, there are approximately that many more people. Residents over 65 years of age comprise the largest segment of these numbers, and they are the ones who have the greatest need for a local hospital. A sizeable portion of them have no one to care for them and no means of transportation. A number of them live in Canterbury Villa Nursing Home. Another group are still able to enjoy low-cost meals and other taxpayer supported gratuities at the Senior Citizen Center. And surprisingly, it is some joined the opposition to the hospital. WHY??? when they are protected against financial hardship from paying the hospital tax by a \$12,000 deduction on the value of their the tax rollback! property before any tax is levied. A homeowner whose residence is valued at \$12,000 or less pays no tax. Renters pay no direct tax.

On the brighter side, there are those seniors among us who sacrificed to build E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital and are now doing their part to subsidize the hospital until it can be reopened. The second largest segment

of the population includes the hundreds of public school and college students of the area. They, too, have a pressing need for a local hospital. It is the parents of these school children who have chosen to stay and work in their hometown who will make the greatest sacrifice in paying the 50 cents hospital tax. Yet their support of the hospital is almost unanimous because they want their children to have the same security afforded them by having a hospital nearby when they

were growing up here. The residents of Cisco are just as worthy of adequate health care as are the residents of other areas. We are our brother's keeper, and those who are most able to pay the tax which will help to provide doctors and hospital for the town surely can not begrudge their contribution to a worthy cause upon which rests the very future of our community.

Together, we can reopen the hospital, bring in doctors, and restore E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital to its former status as a fine hospital which served a widespread of these latter ones, who have area of North Central Texas. 
"Why don't you let be done my head in the picture a warning? He's dead, what about me? In your mind am I next? Let's get in on friend!
