grim joke with his friend, Bob Leach. When Donell turns the ignition key in his cruiser, Leach steps back, plugs his ears and grimaces.

He looks as if he expects the car to explode. The macabre ritual was born of the fear that has gripped Donell and his family since last January, when he blew the whistle on county Prosecutor Robert Altomare and a score of gamblers who paid Altomare to escape prose-

The indictments made Donell an unpopular figure in Weirton, his home town of about 25,000 people. Many considered him a turncoat who had sold out his friends

Since the indictments and through the months of trials, rumors circulated that Donell would be killed, that his house would be firebombed. Rumors twice prompted police to send the family away and stake out the home.

The sheriff said he has heard a tape recording in which a local hoods tells friends the way to get Donell is with a high-powered rifle.

Guns are now part of the Donells' daily life. Alice Donell, the sheriff

wife, was taught how to shoot by a policewoman who sometimes stayed with the family. Nearly every room in the ranch-style house has a loaded weapon

"You're not going to catch me going out of the house without a pistol,"
Donell, 34, said as he carefully tucked a shiny silver revolver into his trousers.

Donell's daughters, Alison, 8, and Aimee, 6, have been escorted to school each day by state troopers. Metal plates were installed in the windows of the

girls' bedrooms. Donell consented to be interviewed only after the last of the trials was completed, that of Weirton attorney Emmanuel Loucas. Donell was the government's key witness in the trial.

Cancer Treatment Planned For Shah

NEW YORK (UPI) - The exiled Shah of Iran flew to New York today and was admitted to a local hospital for treatment of cancer, U.S. officials said.

In Washington, State Department officials said European and American doctors had examined the shah and reported the former ruler is suffering from a "malignant tumor," a form of cancer, and a blocked bile duct.

The two problems, the officials said, are unrelated to each other, but contributed to a significant deterioration of his

condition in the last several days. Earlier, authorities said the shah,

Paralyzed Girl Dies

DALLAS (AP) - Cindy Morris, 17, a Celena High School cheerleader who was paralyzed from the neck down when she fell during a workout last summer, died early today, Presbyterian Hospital officials said.

"She had been moved out of the intensive care unit and it was sort of sudden," said a nurse at the hospital who asked that her name not be used. She said the cause of death was not immedi-

Cindy, the daughter of Celina School Superintendent Perry Morris, died at granted permission by President Carter to seek medical help in the United States, entered New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center and will undergo 'extensive medical examinations' to determine the cause of his illness.

Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi, 59, looking ill and apparently having trouble walking, arrived at New York's LaGuardia Airport from Mexico about 10:30 p.m. aboard a small chartered jet.

An airport aide said he was accompanied by a woman believed to be his wife, Empress Farah, and by about a dozen

aides and two Doberman pinschers. The shah immediately got into a lim-

ousine that was part of a 12-car motorcade and sped off to Manhattan.

A hospital spokesman said the shah was admitted to the facility on Manhattan's East Side at 11 p.m. and was listed in serious condition.

Private security guards protected the three rooms occupied by the shah, his family and staff members.

A half dozen New York City police cars were stationed outside the hospital.

Robert F. Armao, senior adviser to the shah, said in a statement the shah "has come to the United States to undergo extensive medical examinations at New York Hospital.

"The shah and members of his family are optimistic that the outstanding medical care available in the United States will diagnose his ailment and provide a cure.

U.S. Files Claim gainst SE

HOUSTON (UPI) - The U.S. Justice Department today filed claims seeking \$6 million for cleanup plus "other subs-tantial damages" from a Texas oil drilling firm as a result of the world's worst

oil spill.

Filing of the claim shortly before a court deadline leaves the federal government with the option of also suing PE-MEX, the Mexican government's oil monopoly, and PEMARGO, a Mexican contractor that operated the Ixtoc I rig that spewed more than 100 million gallons of oil into the Gulf of Mexico.

Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti approved filing of the claims against SEDCO Inc., a firm founded by Texas Gov. William Clements and run by Clements' son, in time to meet a deadline this morning in federal court in Hous-

Texas Attorney General Mark White last week filed a state suit asking \$10 million from SEDCO for damages for the oil that stained Texas beaches during the peak of the tourist season.

Clements immediately branded the suit as politically motivated and charged that "Jimmy Carter has now been joined by Mark White, (State Demo Chairman) Billy Goldberg and (Texas AFL-CIO President) Harry Hubbard and all four are twirping the same song.

The Justice Department had planned as late as Monday to file claims for hundreds of millions of dollars against SEDCO as a result of the spill that occurred off Mexico's Yucatan coast June 3 and spread to the Gulf coast of Texas

Aug. 9.

But after discussions with several federal agencies involved, including the Coast Guard and the Commerce Department, it was decided to seek less than \$10 million in damages and "other substantial damages to the property of the United States," sources said.

Administration officials said the decision gives them the maximum flexibility to increase their claims as prolonged litigation continues and the long-term effects of the oil spill can be better assessed.

By filing such a claim in federal court in Texas, the United States would keep open its legal options also for suing two Mexican oil companies — and possibly the Mexican government.

SEDCO already faces other claims totaling \$350 million.

While damage to the Texas shoreline so far has been less than anticipated, cost of the environmental damage from the 18-week-old spill of the Mexican oil rig may not be fully known for years.
SEDCO supplied the Ixtoc I drilling platform that blew out in the Gulf of

Mexico 600 miles south of the Texas coast June 3, spouting more than 100 million gallons of oil unabated before it was brought under partial control last

Local Bank Deposits Up

Bank deposits held at more than \$1 billion in Lubbock through the traditionally slow quarter of the year, and good cotton weather this fall and a predicted profitable harvest are expected to offset the effects here of the current national

Deposits at the end of the third uarter were \$1,093,232,000, or 2.6 per-

cent more than a year ago. First National Bank President Howard Yandell said bankers have been "very concerned throughout the fall" about the cotton crop, but are feeling better now that unseasonably warm fall weather has brought the crop along well. "It's really been a weather crop," Yandell said, referring to the late planting that hampered it. "We feel real good about it now. We think it could be about as good a crop as we have had out here."

as good a crop as we have had out here in a while."

Yandell said dryland cotton in particular looks good because of the rainy spring and summer and hot fall.

He and other bankers see agriculture as more important than ever this year on the South Plains because of the recession and the tight money policies of the Federal Reserve System.

"More than the recession, I think we're seeing our economy impacted by the cost of funds," he said. "It will affect expansion plans, increased invento-ry, capital expansion, equipment . . . at least until we get into 1980.

"I think everyone is going to sit back and say, 'Maybe it will be cheaper if I do it at a later time.' It's something that we're just going to have to go through.

House Sends **Ration Plan**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House completed congressional action today of a standby gasoline rationing bill, sendin the measure to the White House on 301-112 vote.

The legislation, a compromise be-tween versions previously passed by the House and Senate, would give the presi-dent authority to ration gasoline during a severe fuel shortage.

Framers of the compromise stressed that the legislation was written in a way

to assure that rationing could be consi

dered only as a last resort. Under the compromise, the president could order rationing if gasoline or diesel fuel supplies dropped by 20 percent. However, either house of Congress could block the action during a 15-day review

The 20 percent trigger could be waived, but that would require the consent of both houses.

Although President Carter had sought more flexibility for imposing rasought more flexibility for imposing ra-tioning, he is expected to sign the bill.

The House shot down Carter's first standby rationing bill last May by a wide margin. The current version passed with broad bipartisan support, delivering an important victory to the president, who has made standby rationing authority a major part of his energy program.

"The legislation is an important step toward making the nation more prepared to deal with an energy emergency," said Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich.,



Kennedy Hints At Candidacy

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Sen. Edward Kennedy has again fueled speculation that he will seek the Democratic presidential nomination in an address to cheering Philadelphia crowds at a fundraiser for mayoral candidate William

"I'm not here because of the number of delegates, 168, that Pennsylvania will send to the Democratic convention," he insisted with a grin as 1,400 applauded at a \$100-a-plate dinner Monday night for the former congressman.

Green is favored in the four-man race to succeed Mayor Frank L. Rizzo, a former policeman barred by law from seeking a third term. Democrats have controlled City Hall since 1951.

"I'm not here because of Pennsylvania's 27 electoral votes. I'm here because I love Billy Green," Kennedy said.

Then he added: "But it won't be the last time I'll be here. I'll be back when Billy Green is mayor, and when I come who is a candidate for another job.'

After dinner, and the \$250-per-person cocktail reception that preceded it, the Massachusetts senator was driven to what was billed as an old-fashioned political rally in South Philadelphia where nearly 5,000 had congregated at a cater-

"You go out and ring doorbells, and do the work, and you know what will happen?" Kennedy shouted at the happy, excited crowd that was kept from crushing the podium by police and secret service agents.

A voice cried out, "You'll be president" and then a chant was started "we want Kennedy" and many began waving "Kennedy for President" signs.

Flushed by the warm night, sweat pouring down his face, he said, "In the next few months I might be knocking on

Meanwhile, the New York Daily

News reported in today's editions that Kennedy had launched a personal telephone blitz to garner support from about

200 high-ranking Democrats. The campaign began with a few calls early last week and resumed Monday with Kennedy and his brother-in-law, Stephen Smith, working the phones most of the day before Kennedy depart-

In his prepared speech at the dinner, Kennedy obliquely criticized President

Carter's leadership without mentioning his name, and hinted that he might step forward to make America No. 1 in the world again.

"I refuse to believe that America is ed for the Philadelphia appearance, the second best," he said.

Connally Discusses Middle East Views

NEW YORK (AP) - Former Texas sternation" in the West. Gov. John Connally has defended his call for a Palestinian state and a U.S. military presence in the Middle East by saying a cut-off of Middle East resources could lead to "absolute chaos and con-

At the same time, Connally, a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, reassured Israel and American Jewish leaders who have objected to his proposals that the "moral commitment to protect the borders of Israel

must continue under all presidents.' Connally discussed reaction to his Middle East policies during a questionand-answer period Monday night after a speech to the 66th annual convention of the National Foreign Trade Council.

His speech did not mention the Middle East controversy. It dealt with the future of foreign trade and accused the Carter administration of failing to follow through on gains in the foreign trade

The gains, Connally said, resulted from his policies as Secretary of the Treasury in the Nixon administration.

During the question-and-answer period Connally blamed the presence of Soviet troops in Cuba on what he called "a policy of appeasement and weakness this administration has been following since before it came into office."

Predicting "more revolution and more unrest" in Latin America, Connal-

"Somewhere the United States has to draw the line. I've seen nothing to indicate that this administration is going to

When the question of his Middle East policy was raised from the floor, Connally quipped, "I thought maybe I'd covered it fairly well.

"But let me say in all seriousness that the Middle East is the crucial vortex of danger in the world."

Saying the United States is "committed by a moral imperative, by a treaty, by a moral commitment" to Israel's security, he added:

"Israel must understand that the United States has other interests. Israel must undertand that the United States has a legitimate right to pursue the interests of America throughout the world, including the Middle East."

Jimmy Carter added another chapter in 1976, when his status as a "born-again Christian" took on a visible role as his successful campaign unfolded.

The Christian Voice, begun early this year in Pacific Grove, Calif., claims a membership of 126,000, including 3,000 clergymen, and hopes to raise \$3 million for political and lobbying activities next

"We're not going to be engaging in just single-issue politics. We will be engaging in what we call 'moral issue' politics," says Gary Jaminal

Jarmin says the group plans to set up a political action committee later this

year or early next. This will allow the group to solicit contributions and spend

them on political activities, Another group, the Washington-based Moral Majority, also plans to set up a political action committee in the coming months, says its executive director, the Rev. Robert Billings.



18 Murders Admitted By Bishop

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) - Police say it's possible. His family calls it a hoax. But the truth about 18 alleged murders was locked - perhap forever behind Jesse Bishop's half smile as he sat down in the Nevada gas chamber

Bishop, executed early Monday for killing a man in a Las Vegas casino in 1977, concocted a bizarre story about 18 other murders as part of an elaborate escape plot, a family spokesman says.

The spokesman - Bishop's older brother who declined to be named said Bishop "just wanted an opportunity to get outside and try to escape. Authorities never gave the tough-talk-

ing convict a chance to lead them to any graves. Instead, they agreed to Bishop's demand that the information not be released until after his death.

After sentencing him to death, Judge Paul Goldman of Clark County District Court said he visited Bishop in prison, where the condemned man told him "about having committed a number of homicides.

Goldman then sent Las Vegas Homicide Detective Charles Lee to speak with Bishop. The judge said Lee "came back with figures about 18 other homicides...12 in California and six in other places.'

Lee, who conducted the Death Row interview last August, said Bishop didn't want the information released until his execution because he "didn't want to violate his own criminal code, he didn't want to go out as a snitch.'

He said Bishop's recollections of the slayings were "so vague it would be virtually impossible to pin it down." Lee added that Bishop said he was paid for about 80 percent of the slavings.

"I don't quite frankly know whether it's true," said Lee. "But on the other hand, he certainly had nothing to lose. My opinion is that he was truthful."

Bishop's brother said the hard-bitten convict, who spent more than 20 of his 46 years in prison for robbery and drug crimes, wouldn't offer that sort of help to police, adding that "his background has not been full of cooperation with the authorities." He said Bishop once told him about "being a hit man for the mob," but he doubted his brother was telling the truth.

The former Army paratrooper, heroin addict and longtime robber refused to file an appeal that could have kept him alive. He said he would not mix with the shiveling cowards" who sought appeals and would not accept responsibility for their capital crimes.

Bishop sneered at the futile attempts to keep him from becoming the second man executed in the United States this year - the third in the past 12 years.

John A. Spenkelink was electrocuted in Florida on May 25. Gary Gilmore died in front of a firing squad in Utah on Jan.

Bishop entered the two-seat gas chamber, last used in 1961, shortly after midnight Monday and was strapped into a freshly painted seat. He smiled at a reporter through a glass window and then took several deep breaths of the lethal cyanide fumes. He was pronounced dead

rie Snodgress says her ex-boyfriend terrorized and sexually molested her with a gun barrel but did not rape her - a disclosure that prompted a judge to dismiss a controversial "rape by instrumentation" charge filed earlier.

However, musician-composer Jack Nitzsche was ordered on Monday to stand trial on assault and false imprisonment charges stemming from an alleged night of violence at Miss Snodgress' home last June 29. Arraignment was set for Nov. 5.

The actress, near tears, said Nitzche at one point placed a loaded gun between her legs "and talked about how he wanted to destroy that part of me."

After hearing the testimony, Municipal Judge George Trammel granted a motion by the prosection to dismiss the "rape by instrumentation" charge and one count of burglary, earlier filed by authorities.

Miss Snodgress, 33, nominated for an Academy Award in 1972 for her role in 'Diary of a Mad Housewife," told of awakening at 2 a.m. to see Nitzsche, 42, in her bathroom off the master bed-

She said Nitzsche, who had been her lover for three years, entered the house through an unlocked door and found her in bed with actor-director Paul Williams, no relation to the songwriter of the same name.

first saw Nitzsche's form in silhouette.

Williams, who also testified, said he 'He was shaking," Williams recalled. He had two hands on the gun. He said,

'Get out of here or I'll kill you,' and he cocked the gun.

Williams said he headed for the door but Nitzsche insisted he get dressed. "He said, 'Get your clothes or I'll kill you,' so I danced over to the bed and got my shirt," Williams said. Then he fled.

After that, Miss Snodgress said Nitzsche beat her about the head with the gun butt, severing a nerve in her face and tearing open her thumb as she tried to shield her face from blows.

She said he dragged her around the room by the hair, then forced her at gunpoint into the room where her son, Zeke, 7, was asleep.

After that, she said, she followed Nitzsche's orders out of fear for her

Then she said, "something came over me that angered me. I said I would not stand for this.

She grappled with Nitzsche and when he fell against a wall she fled into the garden and hid behind some bushes by the pool. She said Nitzsche searched for her, shouting threats and threw piles of her possessions in the pool before he

After he was gone, she said a servant drove her to a hospital where she was treated for bruises and cuts, had 18 stitches taken in her thumb and reported the incident to police.



Man Turns Down Reward For Finding Lost Boy

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) The man who found 2-year-old Jamie Mokshefski, the Colorado Springs boy who vanished with his babysitter last month, has refused a \$1,000 reward and said the money should be turned over to the boy's family

'I'm glad to see that he's home OK. I saw on television when his father went in to see the boy. That was reward enough to see them back together again," said David Abernathy, 35, of Anahuac in a telephone interview Monday.

"A gentleman offering the reward called me today. He asked me how he could go about getting it to me. I told him it would be better for it to go to the family," said Abernathy, who operates a meat market in Baytown.

Jamie vanished from a store near the Mokshefski home on Sept. 25 with his babysitter, Letha Rose Kingsbury, 15.

A nationwide hunt was launched for the pair. Federal and El Paso County kidnap warrants are out for the girl who still is missing.

On Oct. 12, Abernathy gave a young woman with a little boy a ride near Liberty. When the woman offered to sell the child to him, Abernathy called authorities and the young woman and boy were taken into custody.

The woman escaped during a break in questioning and the boy was placed in a foster home. It wasn't until last Friday night that authorities determined the boy was Jamie.



Bianchi Assessed Six Life Prison Sentences

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Quietly repeating, "Yes, I did," Kenneth Bianchi admitted taking the lives of five women in the "Hillside Strangler" slayings that terrorized Los Angeles and was sentenced to six life prison terms.

"I wish I had the power to run the sentences consecutively, but in this state they must be merged as a matter of law," Superior Court Judge William B. Keene told Bianchi as he imposed the terms Monday.

Bianchi's pleas were part of a bargain struck with authorities, allowing him to escape the death penalty for strangulations here and in Washington state in exchange for his testimony against his cousin, Angelo Buono.

Buono had been scheduled to be arraigned in connection with 10 of the slayings after Bianchi was sentenced Monday, but his attorney won a two-week delay. Attorney Ronald Bain later said he may ask to have the case removed from Southern California, where the killings occurred between October 1977 and February 1978.

The killings were called the "Hillside Strangler" slayings because the victims were found dumped on slopes around Los Angeles and Glendale. All the victims were young women.

Bianchi, a former security guard, also pleaded guilty to a charge of conspiracy to commit murder and kidnap - which brought another life sentence - and to one count of sodomy, for which he received a five-year term.

Each count stated Bianchi committed the crimes "in conjunction with" Buono, a Glendale upholsterer.

"I am satisfied with what's been done," Deputy District Attorney Roger Kelly said after Bianchi was sentenced. Now we will be able to prosecute Mister Buono, and that gives me a great deal of satisfaction."

Bianchi was ordered to the California Men's Institution at Chino to begin serving his prison term. Under state law, he will be eligible for parole in seven years.

Meanwhile, a Rochester, N.Y., newspaper reported Bianchi's mother and stepfather had moved from their home there to an undisclosed location in an effort to escape reporters and the notoriety of Bianchi's confessions

'She's gone through hell," a neighbor, who was not identified, told the Times-Union. Said another: "Everybody was asking questions about her son, saying tactless things that hurt her deeply

On Friday, Bianchi told a Bellingham, Wash., court he strangled two West-

After Bianchi's plea and sentencing in Superior Court, Buono made a brief appearance in Municipal Court, where his arraignment on 24 felony charges

entered during the appearance.

Because "special circumstances" are alleged in Buono's case that could result in a death sentence if he is convicted, Buono was held without bail in county

Bundy Given Choice Of Trial Location

LAKE CITY, Fla. (AP) — A judge has given Death Row inmate Theodore Bundy five days to decide whether he wants to be tried here or in a neighboring county on charges that he kidnapped and killed a 12-year-old girl.

Judge Wallace M. Jopling issued the ruling Monday after a defense witness testified that possibly 93 percent of the potential jurors in Lake City and surrounding Columbia County could be considered prejudiced.

Jopling acknowledged "extensive and pervasive pretrial publicity" in the case. But he said he would not consider moving the trial elsewhere until a "searching" effort was made to seat an impartial jury in one of the two northern Florida communities.

Motive Sought In Shootings

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - After a day of investigation, Oklahoma City police said they don't know why someone opened fire as a man and woman loaded groceries into a car, killing both as the woman's children sat inside.

Investigators said Monday they will look into the backgrounds of Jesse Eugene Taylor, 42, and Marion Vira Bresette, 31, who had lived at the same Oklahoma City address for about two

The couple had left a supermarket Sunday when someone opened fire from across the street.

"They worked at a nursing home together, they had no criminal records to speak of," said Sgt. Mike Heath, homicide detective supervisor.

Heath said the shooting apparently was planned because the killer "had ample opportunity to kill or injure other people," Heath said.

being tried Nov. 5 in adjacent Suwannee County, where Kimberly Leach's body was found under a hog shed in March 1978, six weeks after she was abducted from her Lake City school.

Sociologist Susan Hesselbart testified a survey she conducted shows that up to 80 percent of the potential jurors in the case are familiar with Bundy's record, including his August conviction on charges of first-degree murder in the slayings of two Florida State University

sorority women.

Mrs. Hesselbart said her poll of 111
registered voters in Columbia County showed between 65 percent to 93 per-cent probably would be excused from the case if called as jurors. The Florida State University researcher said 30 percent of those polled knew Miss Leach or her family.

Bundy, 32, was sentenced in Miami to death for the FSU slayings. That case was moved when it proved impossible to find an impartial jury in Tallahassee, where the killings took place. Before his Miami convictions, Bundy

was convicted of kidnaping in Utah. He is charged in Colorado in the death of a Michigan nurse.

The former law student is charged with first-degree murder and kidnapping in the death of Miss Leach.

WASHINGTON-Rosalynn Carter's White House Task Force for the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) is faced with a highly explosive moral/political problem.

What should be done about one of its associated lobbying groups' campaign to "blackmail" state lawmakers into supporting ratification of the controversial amendment to the Constitution.

Calling it a "kiss and tell" campaign, the Coyotes, a national feminist organization of prostitutes and supporters-and part of the pro-ERA movement-have declared the legislators of four states (Florida, Illinois, Oklahoma and Georgia) to be the targets.

Hookers in those states are being asked to turn in the names of any legislator clients to pro-ERA groups to strengthen lobbying efforts for ERA.

The campaign was designed to convince any anti-ERA legislators who frequent prostitutes to support ratification or risk being publicly identi-

THE "BLACKMAIL" CAMPAIGN appears to be backfiring rather than helping the pro-ERA drive and if continued could become particularly embarrassing for the White House.

The reason: members of the Coyotes have been actively associated with the lobbying activities of the White House Task Force in several of the contested states.

After learning of the Coyotes campaign in a campaign trip to Illinois, the First Lady asked members of the White House Task Force for advice on what to say in public if asked about the women's questionable activities in support of

Several members of the White House Task Force took the position that the activities of the Coyotes should be publicly denounced while others told the First Lady that nothing should be done because it would split the pro-ERA move-The split advice resulted in both the White

House Task Force and Mrs. Carter remaining silent. How long they can keep this silence is debatable. The White House is being pressed for

SOMETIMES IN death new light is shed on individuals and groups and their roles in important

This is the case of Dr. Sidney L. Jackson, senior professor of library sciences at Kent State University who died last summer at age 65, and his role in the anti-Vietnam war demonstration at Kent State.

All stories and investigations of the Kent State protests, that took the lives of three students, ignored any Communist influence in the planning or participation.

In St. Rose's Hospice

WASHINGTON-At the corner of Front and Jackson Sts. on Manhattan's lower East Side stands a simple, unadorned six-story red brick building identified on one side only as "St. Rose's Nowhere does the title "Hospice" ap-

In its own literature, St. Rose's describes itself simply as a "home established by the Hawthorne Dominicans for the care of incurable cancer patients without discrimination as to race, creed or

But St. Rose's is a Hospice in the truest sense of the word, no matter what the legal red tape which limits use of the name.

Its work is supported by the contributions of the public. No remuneration is accepted from the patients or their families, even though they may be able to contribute something.

A FASCINATING SIDELIGHT of this hospice is that its foundress was Rose Hawthorne Lathrop, convert daughter of Nathaniel Hawthorne, who in 1896 left the luxury and ease of the intellectual society into which she had been born to live in the slums of New York City and to devote her life to poverty-stricken cancer sufferers.

I spent many hours at St. Rose's in early August to see and listen to patients in this type of

I make no secret of the fact that I approached this part of my research for this five-part series on the exploding hospice movement with pro-So reluctant was I to re-awaken the horrible

memories of death in my closest family in recent years that I pleaded with Jim, my husband, to go with me and make sure that I left if I showed igns of breaking.

WHAT HAPPENED INSTEAD I still find hard to believe. For in contrast to the depressingly steunit, St. Rose's is delightfully airy, light, cheerfully furnished, filled with smiling nuns, obviously happy volunteer workers and patients you would not guess were terminal cases.

The patients lie in beds, read, sleep, knit, whatever-or sit up. Each of the patients to whom I was introduced by Sister Mary David, director of social services and consultant on hospice to St. Rose's, smiled, happily explained what work he or she was doing, said "welcome" in a spirit that could not fool a skeptic as familiar

AMONG THE PATIENTS I recall most vividly was the contractor who was spending all his waking hours building dollhouses for exhibition and the amusement of other patients; a young man with a brain tumor who was in a coma but who looked as if he was merely sleeping comfortably; a middle-aged, fairly plump woman intent on her needlework and apparently concentrating just on

From my experience at St. Rose's, these questions arose Q. Is religion a necessary part of hospice care?

A. It may or may not be. The patient and the

family decide on that Q. What medication is used for relief of pain? A. Anything necessary to control agony and give comfort to the patient. Patients may get the so-called "Bromptom's Cocktail" (cocaine, alcohol, chloroform water, morphine, or some other mixture dissolved in cherry syrup or a similar

sweet). Or they may get other pain relievers (not so

controversial) Q. Who volunteers for a hospice, why, and with what value?

A. The same kind of people who volunteer for other activities that help their fellow man-with the single major exception that a growing number of volunteers come from the ranks of people who have had a family member or friend who was helped by a hospice.

THE VOLUNTEER IS essential to the hospice program, is extremely loyal-and here, the religious motivation is extraordinarily powerful. Of 53 operating hospices in a government study, 14 had an all-volunteer staff. Of another 39, paid staff totaled 340, volunteers 2,251.

P.S. As of this writing, all my patient-friends at St. Rose's are still living, except Jack, the dollhouse builder

He died two weeks after our visit.

Al Ullman Introduces Value Added Tax Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chair man of the House Ways and Means Committee is proposing creation of a new tax - the value added tax - that would serve as a partial substitute for current levies.

Under legislation proposed by Rep. Al Ullman late Monday, the tax, called VAT, would be levied on the value that producers add to goods and would be paid at various stages of manufacturing.

The Oregon Democrat disputed predictions from some economists that the tax would raise retail prices by more than 10 percent.

Ullman's proposal would shift the emphasis of the U.S. tax structure toward consumption rather than income. It also would ease taxation on savings and investment, he said.

Ullman contends the shift is needed to rejuvenate the economy.

In detailing the measure, which he had outlined earlier, Ullman said the VAT could bring in \$130 billion in revenue and help cut Social Security, individual and business taxes. He said it could be instituted in two years.

Under Ullman's proposal, the VAT would be offset by cuts of \$52 billion in Social Security taxes, about \$47 billion in individual income taxes and \$22 billion in business taxes. Also included in the plan is \$9 billion in tax incentives for

He rejected the idea that VAT amounts to a federal sales tax, saying, "It is not a sales tax ... (It) is a consumption tax ... at every stage of the production cycle," offset each time by a credit. Asked whether the VAT has the same

Miller Opposes Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (AP) - Treasury Secretary G. William Miller says the Carter administration probably will recommend tax incentives to promote business investments - but not until more progress is made in balancing the feder-

To do otherwise, Miller says, would take some of the clout out of the admin-

istration's battle against inflation. More than half of the House and onethird of the Senate is sponsoring a business tax cut that would cost \$35 billion a year when fully effective. The aim is to improve the ability of American companies to replace obsolete facilities. Supporters say jobs would be created in the process and more products made for each dollar spent, leading to lower consumer prices.

Those goals are admirable, Miller told the Senate Finance subcommittee on taxation, but nothing is more important to the Carter administration's antiinflation policy than to strictly limit federal spending and the budget deficit. The tax bill would greatly widen the deficit, he said.

"At the present time, the action of steady budget pressure to slow the rate of inflation offers the strongest promise of restoring the health of our economy," Milled added Monday.

While President Carter has made no decision on whether to propose business tax cuts, Miller said, "the probability is quite high that the administration will present its own program along these lines in due course.

The subcommittee is considering a bill that would give businesses a faster tax write-off for major purchases. This would allow companies to recover more quickly the money invested for plant and equipment, and presumably to invest it

Congress May Not Back Arms Sale To Morocco

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's decision to arm Morocco with potent helicopters and powerful reconnaissance planes could run into stiff resistance in Congress.

"Friendship does not obligate us to support a war that cannot be won nor a cause that is not just," Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., said Monday after the announcement.

Solarz, chairman of the House North African subcommittee, said the decision is incompatible with U.S. principles and

But at the State Department, a high official told reporters the arms will make King Hassan strong enough to negotiate a settlement over the phosphaterich, and potentially oil-rich, former Spanish Sahara.

The official, who asked not to be identified, said the arms were insufficient for Hassan to gain a victory.

The king, considered a moderate by U.S. policy makers, claims the territory for Morocco. His troops held two-thirds until Mauritania, an ally, withdrew last

Renegades Not To Oppose Rule

By The Associated Press Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini warned renegades in Iran's ruling council they are "splitting up" the revolutionary regime by opposing his supreme power. The uprising for self-rule in Kur-distan continued, further eroding his au-

Tehran Radio said Khomeini told the enemies of his Islamic republic their writings and speeches against him were "more damaging to Islam than the guns" of the Kurdish rebels. "You cannot stand against the nation.

The broadcast said the 80-year-old Khomeini, who ousted Shan Monammed Reza Pahlavi's government in February, declared: "Our nation must wake up."

Khomeini, speaking to Moslem cler-gymen Monday, warned them "those on the side of wrong are organizing ... They are opposing Islam in various guises."

The broadcast was monitored in London, and the Financial Times said, "The indications ... are that rivalries around Ayatollah Khomeini may well be devel-

oping into a full-scale power struggle."
Tehran Radio did not elaborate on Khomeini's statements or identify his opponents. But his reference to a split in his stern Islamic regime followed reports in British newspapers from Tehran that factions in the clergy-dominated ruling Revolutionary Council are ignoring Khomeini's directives.

Spy Base Agreement Could Be Delayed

for \$2.5 billion in military aid and Tur-key's new political crisis threaten to delay an agreement insuring the continuance of U.S. spy bases in the Soviet Union's southwestern neighbor.

There is no threat to close the bases again, but an official of the Turkish Foreign Ministry said the United States wouldn't be allowed to use them indefinitely unless a formal agreement is con-

Four installations that monitor Soviet space centers, nuclear tests and Black Sea fleet movements reopened a year ago following the repeal of a ban on American arms sales to Turkey. A onepermit for their operation expired Oct. 9, but the Turkish government ex-tended it for three months. Negotiations resume Nov. 5.

Premier Bulent Ecevit resigned last week following heavy losses in a mid-term election Oct. 14. His chief opponent, former Premier Suleyman Demi-rel, probably won't be able to put to-gether a majority, and a general election may be necessary. This period of politi-cal uncertainty could delay the conclusion of a treaty after other issues are re-

The accord, known as the Defense Cooperation Agreement, appeared close to conclusion a month ago. But Turkey added a list of multary hardware it wants over the next five years to modernize its 500,000-man armed forces, which anchor the southeastern flank of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Turkish officials say relations with the U.S. government have been improving since the lifting of the embargo. But they say the embargo left suspicions about U.S. willingness to support a NA-

The loss of U.S. surveillance stations northern Iran because of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's revolution has increased the importance of the installations in Turkey to the United States. Because of the loss of the Iranian bases, the United States would also like to fly its U-2 spy planes over Turkish territory along the Soviet border to monitor compliance with the SALT II treaty. Preier Ecevit indicated he would authorize such flights only if Moscow did not object, but the United States apparently has never received an encouraging re-

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP) - President Kenneth Kaunda charged that 1,000 South African and Rhodesian troops have invaded Zambia in an effort to destroy the copper-rich country's economy.

No comment was immediately available from the government in South Africa. However, a Zimbabwe Rhodesian military spokesman called the charge

Ixtoc I Cone Almost Fully **Operational**

MEXICO CITY (UPI) -A steel cone designed to catch most of the crude oil emerging from a belching runaway well will be fully operational by Thursday and officials hope to bring the gusher under control within two weeks.

'We still have to make a series of tests and adjustments," a spokesman for the state oil monopoly, Petroleos Mexicanos, said Monday. "But the cone will be working at full capacity on Thursday at the latest

The 310-ton inverted funnel is designed to trap 80 to 90 per cent of the "intermittent burps" gushing from the cripped Ixtoc 1 oil well, which has poured 2.5 million barrels of crude into the Gulf of Mexico in less than five

PEMEX officials said work on the relief wells was at an advanced stage, which makes us believe that Ixtoc will be brought under control within two weeks.

They said one of the wells known as Ixtoc 1-B should reach the 12,000-foot depth of Ixtoc in 12 days - barring unforeseen problems. Once it does, cement and chemicals will be pumped through to rupture the walls of the runaway well and then cap it.

Ten days ago, the well was du 10,000 barrels of crude oil into the Guif per day, but due to the injection of steel and lead balls into Ixtoc's mouth the stream was cut down to "intermittent

Kaunda, who made the accusation late Monday night during remarks to a visiting delegation from Iraq, did not say when or where the alleged invasion took

But he said Zambia's forces "are containing the situation despite inadequate

"There are 600 South African troops and 400 Rhodesian troops on Zambian soil as I speak to you," Kaunda told a member of the visiting delegation at the state house for dinner.

Zimbabwe Rhodesian forces regularly cross into Zambia, on the ground and through the air, in pursuit of guerrillas

Kaunda said the South African troops are occupying the Western Province, which borders the Caprivi Strip. He did not say where the Rhodesians were.

The Caprivi Strip is part of South-West Africa, or Namibia, which is being guarded against incursions by South African defense forces.

Zambia is one of the five frontline states supporting Joshua Nkomo and Robert Mugabe in their guerrilla war against Zimbabwe Rhodesian Prime Minister Abel Muzorewa

Nkomo is leader of the Zimbabwe African People's Union based in Zambia. Mugabe heads the Zimbabwe African National Union from Mozambique.

During the weekend, Kaunda warned that Zambia would be attacked from all fronts by South Africa and Zimbabwe Rhodesia for its support of the Patriotic Front guerrilla alliance

The Front and Muzorewa's Zimbabwe Rhodesian government are currently trying to negotiate an end to the fighting. The parties are attending a peace conference in London being run by Lord Carrington, the British foreign secretary



Health Practitioners Mistreat Women, NOW President Tells Subcommittee

Are women the sickly sex? Not really. It just seems that way due to male domination of the medical establishment: Hospitals, health care de-

livery, research. That's the earful the United States Senate Subcommttee on Health and Scientific Research got when it asked Eleanor Cutri Smeal to testify at a re-

Petite and peppery, Mrs. Smeal is president of the National Organization for Women. She also is a Mt. Lebanon, Pa., housewife and mother, and holder of two college degrees.

This day she was speaking out on the state of women's health treatment in America — speaking the way she does on any woman's issue, from the Equal Rights Amendment to battered wives. The words roll out as smoothly as a

computer printout. Her intense manner rarely cracks and it didn't this day she took the stand be-fore the subcommittee attached to the U. S. Senate Committee on Labor and

Human Resources. The president of NOW, representing tens of thousands of feminists, told the

'Male domination of the medical establishment where over 90 percent of physicians and health administrators are

men, has had a devastating effect on women's health... It starts, she says, in medical schools. Mrs. Smeal said teachers joke about female anatomy. The disrespectful attitude toward women continues in re-

search where, among other things, the female reproductive tract is treated as a guinea pig. she told the senators. The low regard for women's rights in health care, Mrs. Smeal continued, goes

on to the practice of medicine where male doctors over-medicate, over-operate, over-treat the females - compared to the treatment male doctors give men. In medical school, according to Mrs.

Smeal, professors intersperse textbooks and lectures with sexy pictures and comments and she says that in hospitals, interns and residents do hysterectomies for the experience.

Mrs. Smeal claims male domination the reason women are "abused" by the health care establishment. "Sex-stereotyped thinking about

women accounts for many of the scandals in abuse of health care delivery and technology," she said. She cited some, including strokes as-

sociated with the birth control pill, the unanswered questions about the pill, the DES scandals, the Thalidomide tragedies, and the Dalkon Shield - an intra uterine device. All, according to Mrs. Smeal are ex-

imples of "testing on women" with tragic side effects.

DES, a drug give to prevent miscarriages, has resulted in genital tract troubles in male and female children born to DES mothers. Pregnant women who took Thalidomide gave birth to babies missing limbs.
"Little medical indication or necessi-

ty frequently has guided doctors in the performance of hysterectomies, caesarean sections and mastectomies." Mrs. Smeal said.

Caesareans have gone from 5 percent of all deliveries in 1968 to 11.6 percent in 1976. But there has not been a correlating improvement in infant or maternal mortality.

Of the caesarean, the hysterectomy, and the mastectomy, Mrs. Smeal said:

"All are unique to women and all are traumatic. Too often they are unneces-sary and abusive."

The charge isn't original. Studies by health care critics in the federal government and at universities claim many of the 774,000 hysterectomies performed in the United States annually are not neces-

Ditto for a large proportion of caesarean sections. As for mastectomies, the medical communities - via a national advisory committee - recently said a simple removal of the breast probably is as effective as a radical operation taking more muscle and tissue.

Some doctors claim just taking out a lump is as effective as anything. And others say maybe x-ray treatment of breast cancer is as good as anything. They found out when using that on women who refused surgery.

Mrs. Smeal says that changes in breast cancer treatment are due to a woman-initiated revolution.

"The...research into radical mastec tomies showed little supporting medical evidence for such reliance on the treatment — no improved survival or cure rate over less radical procedures.

"In fact, the survival rate following mastectomy has not improved since

'Thus, more and more doctors are turning to lumpentomies or partial mastectomies as preferred treatment.

"This is the treatment that the welleducated or better informed woman can insist on, but what about poor women are they still experiencing unnecessarily harsh treatment because it is the standard medical procedure?

A woman recovering from mastecto-

my frequently faces a second blow. Medicaid and private health insurance usually won't pay for reconstructive surgery following mastectomy considering it cosmetic surgery.
"This," Mrs. Smeal said, "is a grot-

esque example of the insensitivity of the male dominated medical establishment to women's health needs.

The NOW argument that there is sex bias in health care also included these

-Preliminary studies reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association show doctors tend to assume many of a woman's physical symptoms are emotional in origin. The male doc-tors also provide far more complete medical diagnosis and treatment for men who express the same physical symptoms.

-32 million women have used tranquilizers prescribed by doctors as com-pared with 19 million men. About 80 percent of amphetamines, 67 percent of tranquilizers, and 60 percent of barbiturate-sedative prescriptions are for wom-

-Two-thirds of psychiatric out-pa-tients are women and 60 percent of admissions to private mental hospitals are

-Women in medical research, services and administration are severely un derrepreented in policy making and decision making.

"Women are so few among the ranks of doctors in research and services that it constitutes a national disgrace.
"The medical establishment's atti-

tudes about nursing is another facet of sex-biased thinking," Mrs. Smeal said.

This is evident in the salaries paid the lack of authority and participation in decision-making and the reluctance of the medical establishment to expand the roles of nurses in medical treatment and

Dehydration Methods Prove Economical

You read a lot these days about drying food as an alternative to canning or freezing.

How safe and economical is it? Very safe, if done correctly, say coop-

erative extension experts. Economical, too, because properly dried foods don't require extra energy for storage as frozen foods do. That's their major advantage, says Katherine J.T. Humphrey, co-author with Prof. Ruth N. Klippstein of a Cornell University extension bulletin, Home Drying of Foods.

In telephone interviews, both talked about renewed interest in the world's oldest method of food preservation.

In the beginning, food was sun-dried on trays or racks or held together with strings that could hung indoors or out. Trays were left outdoors by day and brought indoors at night and in rainy weather. This method still works but it is not recommended except in climates where daytime temperatures are 98-100 degrees. That automatically eliminates most of the 50 states.

Today's options include homemade portable electric dehydrators, a nonelectric unit designed for use outdoors or in gas or electric ovens, tabletop electric units in varying sizes and convection ovens. The latter are particularly effective because air circulation is steady, thanks to a fan inside the oven.

One manufacturer of a 1,500 watt portable convection oven says the unit uses only one hour's worth of electricity during 12 hours of dehydrating at 140 degrees. Total fuel cost for that period would be 15 cents, based on a local utility rate of 10 cents per kilowatt hour, said Mrs. Kathy Cripps, director of product information for the company.

A 140-degree setting yields the best quality, Prof. Klippstein said. She said vitamin loss may be slightly higher at 140 than at the 120 degrees recommended by a California manufacturer of a non-electric, indoor-outdoor dehydrator. "Lower temperatures for some thin-

ner, tender foods are not a bad idea." she said, adding that "125 degrees is much more satisfactory than 110.

But food dried too slowly may start to ferment and can mold and spoil, she said. Food dried too fast crusts over and is hard to rehydrate.

Drying is a good alternative to canning for home cooks afraid that botulism may develop in low acid foods. Unlike molds, botulin toxin is invisible, colorless and odorless.

'There's no way you would have botulism in dried foods," Mrs. Humphrey

Mold, of course, is both visible and smelly. One food dryer manufacturer recommends removing surface mold by wiping it with a solution of sodium metabisulfite and water, then re-sterilizing and re-packing the food. Not safe, Prof. Klippstein said.

Only laboratory testing can determine which molds are a public health hazard and which are not, she said. Removing visible mold is no guarantee of safety because these plants have octopus-like tentacles that can reach down

fresh summer fruits good candidates for drying, especially with prices very high now on commercially dried fruit. They disagree on one point: Sulfur-ing, a process widely used by commer-

cial packers to preserve fruit quality and color. Fumes created by burning powdered sulfur do the job.

Mrs. Klippstein sees sulfuring as a

"I don't like the flavor, texture, odor and color of unsulfured fruit," she said. Besides, sulfur fumes protect against loss of vitamins C and A although they destroy some thiamine, a B vitamin, she said. But since most people get their B vitamins largely from meat and cereal products, she's not concerned about the loss in dried fruit.

Sulfur fumes also destroy any insect larvae in the fruit, she said.

Fruit can also be sulfured by dipping it in a solution of sodium metabisulfite and water, a better choice for apartment dwellers, since treating with sulfur fumes must be done outdoors.

Purists consider both forms of the chemical an additive. Yet, sulfur occurs naturally in many foods, including eggs and all meats, the professor said. Fruit treated with it smells sulphurous when first dried, she added, but the odor quickly dissipates.

Mrs. Humphrey prefers other pretreatments such as steaming, blanching or dipping in an ascorbic acid (vitamin



Stock Mart **Unable To Hold Gains**

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market headed lower today, giv-ing up some early gains as the bank prime lending rate climbed to a record 15 percent.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up more than 3 points in early trading, was off 2.90 at 806.23 by noontime.

Losers took a 3-2 lead over gainers in the mid-day tally of New York Stock Exchange-listed

Analysts said some early buying was encouraged by the market's showing Monday, when the Dow Jones industrial average rebounded after slipping briefly be-low the 800 level for the first time

since last December. The average, off about 15 points at its lowest level of the day, closed with only a 5.55 loss.

But the upswing had already begun to fade when New York's Morgan Guaranty Trust and several other large banks increased their prime rates from 141/2 to 15 percent today.

Interest rates have been surging for more than two weeks since the Federal Reserve announced new plans to clamp down on credit in its effort to get inflation under control.

The biggest loser on the active list was Exxon,off 11/8 at 553/8 The 118 percent quarterly earnings gain posted by the company on Monday was expected to intensify controversy over oil-industry earn-

The NYSE's composite common-stock index dropped .26 to 56.64. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index lost .91 to 197.63.

Volume on the Big Board totaled 15.62 million shares at noontime, down from 21.04 million at the same point Monday.

Prime Rate Rises To 15 Percent

NEW YORK (AP) - Morgan Guaranty Trust Co. raised its prime lending rate today to a record 15 percent, and the move was quickly joined by several other banks.

Only two weeks ago, the nation's biggest banks raised the rate they charge for loans to their most credit-worthy corporate borrowers by an unprecedented full percentage point, to 14.5 percent.

Morgan Guaranty, the fifth-largest U.S. bank ranked by deposits, said the 15 percent prime was effective immediately A bank official. ately. A bank offficial declined to comment on reasons for the boost, except to say the bank bases its prime rate on several factors, primarily the cost of acquiring funds and the demand for business

Banks use the prime rate as the basis for setting interest rates on almost all commercial-industrial loans. Although the prime has no direct effect on consumer loan interest rates, it is viewed as an indicator of trends in interest rates generally.

Many banks in several areas of the nation, faced with high costs of acquiring funds, have cut back lending or raised interest rates for consumer credit such as installment loans or home mortgages.

Several other banks, including No. 6 Chemical, No. 8 Bankers Trust, and No. 20 Bank of New York, immediately joined Morgan in the move to a 15 percent prime. Among other major banks posting the half-point increase were Harris Bank of Chicago and First Pennsyl-

vania of Philadelphia.

The Federal Reserve Board on Oct. 6 announced a new plan to make it more expensive to extend credit. The Fed imposed higher marginal reserve requirements on certain types of liabilities generally known as "purchased funds" and raised the discount rate, the fee it charges on loans to member banks.

Blacks Assault White Youths In Boston

BOSTON (AP) - Three white high school students on their way to school in the city's Roxbury section were beaten by blacks today as tensions remained high after a week of racial trouble, officials said.

The three suffered cuts and bruises but were not seriously hurt, said Betty Cooke of the Boston School Department. They were on their way to Madison Park High School when they were set upon by a group of blacks outside the Dudley Street subway station.

Meanwhile, police waited outside other high schools that were disrupted by walkouts and other racial incidents last week. However, those other schools were reported calm today.

Investigators now say that they think adults were involved in last week's trou-

Dianne Feinstein said late Monday after meeting with negotiators who had been bargaining nonstop since Sunday evening. "The important thing is that harmony and peace get restored in the schools. The striking teachers and paraprofes-

sionals were to vote on the agreement today. Mrs. Feinstein said she could not disclose the details. Negotiators met in a hotel as 100 stu-

dents carried picket signs reading, "Don't Wait - Negotiate." Many students have complained they weren't learning enough from substitute teach-The strike by teachers began Sept. 11 as the city's schools were preparing to

open for the fall, delaying classes for 58,752 pupils.

Cincinnati Schools To Be Shut Down

CINCINNATI (AP) - The Cincinnati Board of Education has voted to shut down the city's school system for four weeks rather than accept the state's conditions for an emergency loan. The 56,000-pupil system faces a \$7.7

million deficit after two levies were voted down this year. Superintendent James Jacobs said





Conoco, Gulf Reveal Jump In Quarterly Profits

NEW YORK (AP) - Conoco Inc. and Gulf Oil Corp. today joined the list of big oil companies announcing huge third-quarter profits, with Conoco saying its income rose 133 percent and Gulf posting a 97 percent gain from the comparable quarter of 1978.

Like the other oil companies to announce big third-quarter earnings gains, both companies attributed most of the jump to increased profits from overseas operations and said little came from U.S. refining and marketing divisions.

Conoco, ranked ninth among U.S. oil companies, said its third-quarter profit was \$247.1 million, or \$2.30 a share, compared with \$105.8 million, or 98 cents a share, in 1978's third quarter. This year's period included a one-time gain of \$32.6 million, or 30 cents a share, from a change in British tax law.

Conoco, based in Stamford, Conn. said sales in the quarter rose 41 percent to \$3.5 billion from \$2.4 billion in the July-September period a year ago.

Fifth-ranked Gulf, based in Pittsburgh, said profits in the quarter were \$416 million, or \$2.13 a share, compared with \$211 million, or \$1.08 a share, a year ago. Revenues in the quarter rose 33 percent to 6.74 billion from \$5.05 bil-earnings this week.

The profits announced by Conoco and Gulf, coming on the heels of large increases announced earlier by Exxon, Atlantic Richfield and Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, renewed debate about the size of oil company earnings.

President Carter made yet another pitch Monday for his tax on oil company windfall profits, saying that while oil concerns already generate large amounts of money, "they want more. But it's not fair to the American people for them to have more.

Carter was particularly piqued at Exxon Corp., the world's largest oil company, which said Monday its profits had risen 118 percent in the July-September quarter. White House press secretary Jody Powell called the Exxon profits "rather enormous."

Also announcing a big rise in thirdquarter earnings Monday was seventh-ranked Atlantic Richfield Co., which said its profits rose 45 percent. Standard Oil Co. of Indiana announced a 49 percent profit gain last Friday, and other major oil companies are expected to weigh in with similarly large increases in

James G. Archuleta, a spokesman for the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union. He said Exxon and other oil companies "certainly cannot plead poverty" when the union and the industry begin negotiating later this year on a new wage increase for 60,000 energy workers.

The profits probably will also seem high to Americans who began the third quarter in gas lines and ended it wondering whether they'd have enough heat-

But both Exxon and Arco said profits from domestic refining and marketing units were hampered by price regulations which limited the amount of cost increases that could be passed on to consumers. They said increased earnings from other areas of business were primarily responsible for the big profits.

"The big story is still overseas, Ulyesse J. LaGrange, Exxon's comptroller, said in a telephone interview. "The governments there are recognizing this

Western reporters, supporters of the defendants and their relatives were being followed and photographed by plainclothes police. Uniformed police were stationed inside the court building today to check those entering, and out-

Dissidents claimed 37 supporters had been detained in and around the building Monday. Twenty-seven were said to have been released by Monday night, but there was no word today on the 10 others thought still in custody the night

Three of the six defendants admitted Monday they were members of a group called illegal by the communist government, sources said.

Area Youth Freezes To Death

CARLSBAD, N.M. (Special) + Dennis Wayne Ables, 19, of Seminole, froze to death Monday morning after he fell asleep in the back of his pickup truck and breathed in butane gas leaking from a tank in the truck. Ables was pronounced dead at the

scene by a deputy medical investigator and his body was taken to Albuquerque for an autopsy. The incident occurred at an oil rig site about 25 miles east of Eddy County sheriff's deputies saidthe vouth's father, C.E. Ables, discov-

ered his son's body lying in the pickup truck bed about 4:24 a.m. MST. The young man's body was covered with ice and frozen butane.

The father attempted to pull the

body from the truck, but was unsuccessful. He then turned off the overflow valve from which butane was flowing, suffering frostbite to both hands in the process. He was taken to Guadalupe Medical Center in Carlsbad, where he was treated and later released.

Eddy County Deputy Richard Martinez said the youth was filling the butane tank in his truck from a large butane tank on the ground when he apparently fell asleep. As the truck tank filled up with liquid butane, a relief valve allowed air inside the tank plus the icy cold liquid gas to leak out, freezing Ables "inside and out." Icicles, 3 to 5 inches long, where the gas crystallized were found in the rear of the camper, the deputy add-

"It froze him stiff; I've never seen anything like it," said Eddy County Sheriff Tom Granger.

Magical Link Formed In Paper Clip Trick





ew Executives Run Studios

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - The old Hollywood moguls doubtless are spinning in their graves over the men who are now running their studios - lawyers, businessmen and agents who don't pretend

to be moviemakers.

The colorful old glovemakers, junkmen and nickelodion nabobs who built the studios have long since been re-placed by a new breed of efficient, unpublicized corporate executives, two of

whom are Rhodes scholars. Frank Wells, president of Warner Bros. and a Rhodes scholar, runs the studio built by Jack and Harry Warner, a pair of eccentric martinets who ruled

their celluloid empire with iron hands. Dennis Stanfill, the other Oxfordian, is chairman of the board at 20th Century-Fox where dynamic Darryl Zanuck once held sway.

Kirk Kerkorian, a quietly efficient tycoon who owns MGM, sits in the seat of power once occupied by Louis B. Mayer who gave birth to the term "movie mogul." MGMs income relies on hotel and gambling interests more than movies.

Lew Wasserman, the powerful head of MCA and a former agent, controls Universal and its vast entertainment complex. Hard-headed Carl Laemmle, who built the studio's reputation on "B" movies, was a flamboyant dynamo.

Paramount Studios, Cecil B. De-Mille's creation, is a minor arm of the enormous Gulf and Western conglomerate headed by corporate genius Charles

Another corporate whiz, Francis Vincent, is the top hand at Columbia which was built from the ground by fire-eating Harry Cohn.

These men represent the power and authority of the six major studios. For two decades stars, producers, directors and others have tried to bury the studios, calling them obsolete hangovers from the golden era of movies.

Yet each of the "majors" is booming with production, reaping greater profits than ever before and, often, making better - if fewer - films than of old.

Perhaps the most typical of the new tycoons is Stanfill, a gracious, soft-spoken man in his early 50s who, like his counterparts, hires the creative execu-

studio's movies.

When Stanfill took over Fox, it was near bankruptcy. Today the studio is in better financial condition than ever, no small thanks to "Star Wars" which was produced under Stanfill's aegis.

In his office, formerly Zanuck's, Stanfill - one-time Lehman Brothers corporate finance specialist and Times Mirror

He says the major studios will be

around for a long time to come. The studios no longer stand or fall on the financial returns of their films.

"The majors represent the perma-nent fabric of the motion picture indus-try," he said. "Some executives (produc-







"I'm innocent, I didn't do this crime," Stafford said before the sentencing by District Judge Charles Owens. The judge had the choice of either accepting the jury's recommendation that Stafford be executed or of ordering a

Before signing Stafford's death warrant, Owens dismissed a motion by Stafford's attorneys for a new trial.

"I am merely the instrument of the law and I must do what the law commands that I do," Owens told Stafford as the 27-year-old Alabama drifter stood about six feet away.

A jury found Stafford guilty of six first-degree murder charges last Wednesday and sentenced him to death. Owens ordered Stafford transferred to the state Corrections Department's prison reception center at Lexington.

and educators, alarmed at the precipitous drop in the number of young Americans who register to vote, are mounting a drive to sign up this year's high school senior class at school. They are enlisting high school princi-

pals to serve as voting registrars in the 20-odd states that allow principals to play that role. Elsewhere, they are hoping to bring the local registrar or a deputy into the school to register students after their 18th birthdays.

Scott Thomson, director of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, told a news conference today that the decline in youth voter registration was as much cause for alarm as declines in students' scores on reading and math tests.

Some 58 percent of the nation's 18-to-20-year-olds registered to vote in the presidential election of 1972, a year after the 26th Amendment enfranchised them in all federal, state and local elections.

But only 47 percent of the young adults registered to cast a ballot in 1976 in the presidential race between Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter, and only 35 percent were registered to vote in the congressional elections last fall

By comparison, 72 percent of all adults registered to vote in 1972, 67 percent in 1976 and 63 percent in 1978.

Tech Production Of 'Harvey' Filled With Too Many Flaws

There is absolutely no denying that Richard Privitt gives an outstanding performance as Elwood P. Dowd in the Texas Tech University Lab Theater production of Mary Chase's popular comedy "Harvey." Unfortunately, just as undeniable is the fact that "Harvey" is not a one-character play - and the Lab Theater's "Harvey" lacks solid characterization, insightful direction and talent in many of the technical categories.

Privitt shines all the more brightly because of these shortcomings, but the fact remains this "Harvey" is a distinct disappointment. The mistakes made on opening night, many of which have hopefully been corrected by now, were even more

The play centers on Elwood P. Dowd, a pleasant gentleman who enjoys leisurely nights out drinking and entertaining with his best friend: a 6-foot-1 invisible rabbit (actually a pooks) called Harvey. Naturally, his actions cause havoc in the household, with the result being his sister and niece ating to have him committed to an institution for the insane Identities are mistaken, wrong people are committed and many a laugh is supposed to arrive via this indication that reality is not at all more beneficial than pookas.

But most of those laughs get waylaid via roadblocks set up by director Patrick C. Donnelly. What he has evidently requested from his cast is an emphasis on accents and inflections, perhaps to designate age or attitude; the problem lies in this emphasis becoming too apparent. Practically every member of the cast overacts to excruciating extents, the most notable being William C. Durham as Judge Gaffney, Terre Finley as Myrtle Mae and Ann Alford as Veta Louise. The sheer volume of ineffective performances would seem to point an accusatory finger not at the actors, though, but at the director who evidently tried to create a certain atmosphere through them.

Opening night was a fiasco on more than one note. Audience members were not aware of when intermission was to take place, as the program was evidently misprinted and the break was actually placed between what was labeled scenes one and two in Act Two. G.W. Frazier, as Dr. Chumley, was given a makeup addition which, one would presume, was supposed to make his nose look larger. It may have been appropriate in a larger theater, but not in the intimate confines of the Lab. Instead, it merely made the end of his nose look white, as though he was attempting to avoid sunburning that particular part of his anatomy.

The confusion regarding intermission also affected the backstage crew, as Act Two began with the set transformation not yet completed. Most viewers had a clear view of the people walking about backstage, and an unobstructed look at a technician banging a board for sound effects. More care could have been taken with props, just as the makeup for most characters was inappropriate.

Again, one must hope these technical flaws have since been

The pacing is oftentimes slow, but this doesn't seem to matter when Privitt is on stage. Privitt is nothing short of wonderful as Dowd; his sense of timing is remarkably effective, as his leisurely walk through life fits his character perfectly. His conversations with this invisible pooka are handled well, the cock of his head or the movement of his eyes emphasizing the reality (at least in his mind) of Harvey. He has, in short, captured so many nuances of the playwright's creation as to actually become that character. We see Privitt as Dowd, and we accept him fully.

Sadly, it is not as easy to accept this production. Unlike Harvey, the flaws are all too visible for all to see.



Begin Government **Faces Crucial Test**

ter Menachem Begin faces the first of a series of no-confidence votes in the Israeli Parliament today, but is expected to survive them with the help of resigned Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan and despite an adverse Supreme Court ruling.

Dayan, speaking within an hour after formally leaving office today, said he

decision on the future status of the occupied Arab territories.

He said his concept of relations with Palestinians in the occupied West Bank of Jordan and the Gaza Strip differed substantially from the majority of Begin's government.

But Dayan, who still retains his Par-

Begin government in votes of confidence scheduled for later today. "I will vote for confidence in the government I served until an hour ago," he said. Dayan submitted his resignation Sun-

day. It took effect 48 hours later, just 45 minutes before he began a nationally broadcast news conference. He said today he resigned primarily

because he disagrees with Israel's policy on Palestinian autonomy and didn't like being left with secondary matters while Interior Minister Yosef Burg negotiated with Egypt and the United States.

Dayan said some of the policies on autonomy were still secret "and I won't publish them in detail here.

He was referring to a cabinet decision last May approving guidelines for Israel's negotiators. Sources said the unpublished guidelines included Israel's demands on the permanent status of the West Bank and Gaza after five years of Palestinian self-rule. Under the Camp David accords, this question must be negotiated with Jordan and the Palestini-

The guidelines also said the source of authority for the Palestinian self-rule administration would be Israel's military government, even after it's withdrawal from the West Bank and Gaza. Dayan was understood to believe this is unacceptable to the Arabs.

The question I had (was) how we visualize the final status... Will it become a part of the sovereignty of Israel or will it not? Is this what we are after? Would we allow any partition or shall we not give one inch?" Dayan said.

"In this respect about the concept of the permanent status and the permanent relationships with the Palestinians ... and the question of the sovereignty and living together and all that, in these questions about this concept, my concept is not identical with the concept of the Likud and the religious party."

Dayan said later in a television interview with Barbara Walters of ABC he does "not insist (the West Bank and Gaza) become part of Israel. They should not be allowed to become part of a Palestinian state or under foreign rule. But they should not become part of a sovereign Israel

New England Swelters; Snow Falls In Midwest

Northeasterners, who less than two weeks ago were sent scurrying for their winter gear by a surprise snowstorm, now are broiling in an Indian Summer

Meanwhile, more than 5 inches of snow fell on parts of the upper Midwest

Snow buffeted by blusterly winds fell over a wide stretch of the northern tier of states, dumping a record 5.4 inches of snow in the southeastern Minnesota city of Rochester.

The snowfall began Monday afternoon in Rochester and quit shortly before sunrise today, producing a total snowfall of 5.4 inches, a new record 24hour total for the month of October, the National Weather Service reported. The previous record was 4 inches in 1930.

More than an inch of snow was reported at Cumberland, Wis. Snow also was reported in the Wisconsin communities of Eau Claire, La Crosse, Madison and Wausau.

In New York and New England, record high temperatures in the mid-80s were set in several areas Monday, with 86 in Warwick, R.I., New York City and Albany, N.Y., the highest reading re-

Only 12 days ago a storm dumped several inches of snow in the Northeast, and New York City recorded its earliest

Elsewhere, a tornado that overturned mobile home in Lake Village, Ark., just before a line of severe storms left the state killed a pregnant woman and her unborn child.



Lubbock residents have proposed more city improvement projects for 1980-81 than there are federal Community Development funds available, and local CD officials said Monday night they must decide which projects will have to be eliminated.

Members of the Community Development Advisory Committee reviewed for more than two hours citizen-recommended uses for \$3.3 million allocated to the city for the sixth year of the federal Community Development Block Grant

Projects requested more than a year ago by Lubbock residents already surpass the \$3.3 million allocation by more than \$200,000. Public hearings on spending of CD funds since Oct. 11 have added to the growing list of recommended pro-

Although numerous requests were presented to the advisory committee Monday, the strongest outcries came from Arnett-Benson residents living in the north section of the city.

The Arnett-Benson area tentatively is scheduled for CD funding for construction of a new day care center, purchase of a new triple pumper fire truck and replacement of a traffic signal light along

But when Gloria Ynguanzo, an Ar-

nett Benson resident, told the committee that the neighborhood's "main priority" was housing, the crowd filling the council chambers applauded.

"It's very rare that poor people get a chance to repair their homes," she said, "so why use money on things that already are working when this money is for helping poor people in the first

Another resident from the neighborhood, which is expected to receive about \$900,000 of the total federal funds allocated to Lubbock, said, "We want this money to go into housing. Other resources are available for a day care center and traffic lights."

Arnett-Benson residents cited general revenue sharing funds and bond money as sources for funding both projects, but Rex Fuller, president of the Lubbock Day Care Association, said, "We have looked into other sources and we have not found them."

The committee was told that of the \$3.3 million allocated to Lubbock, about \$1.82 million was set aside for rehabilitation. City Urban Renewal figures indicated that between 88 and 94 families would be affected by the money budgeted for allocation. However, Jim Bertram, city planning director, said the number would more than double if the entire sum of the CD grant were used

Panel, Brookwood Argue Over Management Fee

Lengthy negotiations Monday afternoon between county hospital district officials and Brookwood Management Services did not produce a contract, but did generate some basic differences to be ironed out.

Recessing to study the proposed contract, hospital district officials seem most concerned about the amount of money Brookwood is asking to run Health Sciences Center Hospital for two years - \$300,000 the first year and \$250,-000 the second.

Lubbock County Hospital District board members questioned the proposed fee, saying the interim contract signed both parties restricts Brookwood from demanding a fee any higher than was paid Hyati Medical Management Services, Inc., which previously ran the hospital, unless mutually agreed upon.

The hospital district paid Hyatt a base fee of \$305,000 for its two years'

But LCHD officials paid Hyatt an additional fee for extra consultants brought in to straighten out Health Sciences' troubled billing department. And coupled with a rising consumer price index, Brookwood representatives claim the additional consultant fee adds to the total amount paid Hyatt.

Brookwood justifies the larger fee in the first year of the contract by saying 1980 will be a year of intense work for the management firm. Though things have improved for the hospital, representatives say the hard times are not over yet.

Board members also were disturbed by Brookwood's request that the hospital's top three personnel — the administrator, chief financial officer and director of nursing - be Brookwood employees. They worry that the three will not feel responsible to the hospital, but to the management firm.

Robert Berryman, Brookwood's present administrator, will leave the position (under term of the proposed contract) to serve as project coordinator. Brookwood would start recruiting efforts to replace him as soon as the contract went into effect.

Board members questioned the hospital's ability to pay the steep fee, saying the amount was not included in next year's budget.

Brookwood representatives claimed that line items in the budget could be shuffled to produce the revenue but many board members question the budget's accuracy since it was drawn up in such a short amount of time, when Brookwood was just beginning its term at Health Sciences.

Finance committee chairman Wayne Smith said he wants to see Brookwood's advance projections on the hospital's financial situation before he signs anything.

days," Smith charged. He said after the meeting that board members haven't really seen an income statement and balance sheet since Brookwood got to work in early August.

"I'm not going to want to vote on the contract until I've seen the financial statements for the last three months,"

Brookwood has agreed to present an in-depth financial projection by mid-November, which will coincide with a similar report by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Smith said he doubted the board would be willing to sign a contract until that information is in.

Board member Dub Rushing and others at the meeting requested that the contract include some kind of "bail out clause" for the hospital district should it decide it no longer needs Brookwood or is not happy with Brookwood's service. Several board members seemed con-cerned that the contract contained no service by Brookwood.

"We're not going to go into this thing if they've hid some bills," Rushing said, referring to earlier discussion on the hospital's accounts payable. Several board members reported they had received complaints from people claiming the hospital is not paying its bills to ven-

However, Brookwood representatives, said most of the reported incidents should either have been taken care or were in reference to accounts in dispute such as, disputes over whether mer-

Brookwood officials told the board a few weeks ago that all accounts were current to within 60 days — an extended payment period agreed to in light of the cash flow problems at the hospital.

LCHD board members will meet for a work session later this week to discuss the terms of the proposed contract.

County Votes Extra **Funds For Dirt Work**

Reversing themselves on two m jor construction projects, Lubbock County commissioners Monday approved an extra \$45,000 in dirt work at the new county reform school and voted to advertise for bids on a third wing, currently being left unfinished, of the new county jail.

The commissioners Monday morning refused to approve the dirt work, saying they had not authorized it and were not aware it was needed. But after receiving more information from architect Joe Evans of Austin, the commissioners changed their minds and narrowly authorized the work on a 3-2 vote Monday afternoon.

Commissioner Edgar Chance, who earlier refused to second a motion by Commissioner Jim Lancaster to approve the work, voted with Lancaster and County Judge Rodrick Shaw Monday afternoon to okay it.

Commissioners Coy Biggs of Slaton and Alton Brazell voted against the

Commissioners had been asked to approve an extra \$64,400 in site elevatio work, but they okayed only \$45,000 for the work already completed. They indicated other possible alternatives for parking lot drainage, other than addi-tional elevation, will be considered.

Contractor Jack Wirtz said, however, that work for the foundation of the 22,-000-square-foot Lubbock County Regional Youth Center has been completed and construction will proceed.

In other action, the commissioners uthorized county engineer Arnold Maeker to advertise for bids on a third wing of the new \$3.5 million jail.

Commissioners began considering adding a wing after County Sheriff C. H. ago that the September average jail population was 225. The new jail, as planned with a capacity of 245, would barely have enough space for all the inmates unless a third wing was added, commis-

sioners decided. The commissioners opted to build only two of three 90-inmate wings to save \$700,000 when bids were let for the new ail 16 months ago. Maeker reported early this month that it would cost \$990,000 with current contractors because of in-

Architect Evans was asked to return to commissioners court Monday after-noon after approval for the dirt work was denied during the morning session. He came from Austin Monday to attend the meeting at the request of the com-missioners, and he said, after consulting with his firm, that the architect's fee, would be waived for the extra work.

Evans had explained that the \$1,137,-900 project near University Avenue and North Loop 289 was delayed for several weeks while his firm, Barnes, Landes, Goodman, Youngblood architects of Austin, and Page & Wirtz Construction Co. of Lubbock sought a city building

The city engineering department and further site evaluation eventually dictat-ed 21 inches of site elevation, Evans ex-

Coping With Menopause

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am 54 years of age and my menopause symptoms are frequent hot flashes, bloating and being overweight. I am 4 feet 11 and presently weigh 134 pounds. My family doctor and I agree that I can cope with these discomforts and pass up the aid extrogens. forts and pass up the aid estrogens. My question is, do certain foods and beverages aggravate these symptoms? I'd appreciate any advice you can offer to help me offset the discomforts of this period of life. The only medication I take is asprin and

meprobamate (Equanil).

DEAR READER - Of all the different symptoms attributed to meno-pause, hot flashes have definitely been related to decreased hormone levels and they can be relieved by esfrogen replacement. Sometimes the amount required is relatively small. Whether a woman should use estrogens is an individual decision and should be made with the aid of her doctor who is familiar with her spe-

Hot flashes really are temporary lases of activating the heat loss echanism of the body. We all have

we need to lose body heat, the ther-mostat causes changes in the body. Most of our heat loss is through the skin so hot flashes increase the blood flow through the skin and may in-

Just exactly why this mechanism functions improperly during the menopuase is not known but there's no question that it does. The change in function may be related to changes in the pituitary gland underneath the brain and various endocrine organs including the ovaries.

Regardless of the reason, there are many different mechanisms that can cause the thermostat in your brain to kick off your body cooling mechanisms. One of these is spicy foods. You would be well advised to avoid or eliminate all hot and spicy foods. You will also learn that drinking any hot beverage can cause you to feel more uncomfortable, whereas cool drinks tend to cool you even though there may not be that much change in total calories required ei-ther to cool hot liquids or to warm

You might also feel better if you could lose weight. I know it's hard to do so during the menopause. A sensible diet and exercise program could

be useful

Many women do begin to gain weight and get overweight at the menopause phase which has something to do with the term middleaged spread. This may be associated with loss of body muscles which with loss of body muscles which seems to occur at this age. You can help prevent this by improving your

exercise and fitness program.

Number one on the list should be walking but you could certainly add light calisthenics to that. And if you have the time and inclination, as you gradually build up and improve your physical condition, you could add other forms of exercise, including strength training exercises as in weight lifting. Working your muscles helps to maintain their size. That helps prevent obesity.

Plant Eyed As Source Of Rubber

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) - The nation's dependence on foreign rubber supplies could be reduced and farmers could gain a new cash crop if a state research pro-

ject pays off.

Using guayule, a hardy desert plant native to Mexico and the southwestern United States, researchers are trying to lay the groundwork for a native rubber

By 1990, natural rubber supplies will be almost 22 percent below demand, a recent United Nations' study estimated. There is also concern that rubber-exporting countries will form a price-setting cartel similar to OPEC.

Scientists hope to fill the shortfall and prevent price gouging by increasing the desert plant's rubber production through selective breeding and use of yield-boosting chemicals, said Dr. Isi Siddiqui of the state Agriculture Depart-

Guayule's rubber content was discovered when Indians were found chewing the plant so they could play with the resultant rubber balls. But it was bypassed in favor of more conventional sources because the yield is small and the rubber contains a great deal of resin, Siddi-

were thumped 43-7 by Oakland. 'That's the Steeler team I know, said Pittsburgh coach Chuck Noll. "We were better in all departments. We got after it much better than we did last week. I think to a man we had everyone functioning the way we have to for us to win in this league.







onal basketballer, Huston is both confident of sticking and accepting of his role on the team.

A two-year, no-cut contract insured his presence for all of this year and the next; his willingness to give up the ball and let his teammates do the scoring keeps him in playing time.

But, after signing only a routine rookie contract last summer, Huston reported to camp, made the grade and then received the no-cut contract just before the season began. He declined to talk about the money aspect, except to say, "I'm satisfied with my contract.

"My desire was a factor," Huston related last week, concerning his reasons for making the team. "I worked as hard as I could. But, it was desire - and (Tech aide) Coach (George) Davidson's defense.

"I played about 17 minutes (last week) against Houston, but I have played as many as 27 or 30 minutes before," Huston said. "Some games I don't get in. It just depends on the

followed with the 14-point effort against the Pistons. In last Saturday's 136-111 loss to the Philadelphia 76ers, Huston

"I never looked at it (making the club) in a negative way," the 6-1 guard observed. "I just looked at it as they had given me a chance, so I wanted to give it my best shot. They opened the door, and it was up to me to make it."

The professional game is about what Huston expected. "I don't need to score; we've got the people who can. Our team has changed a lot (under Holzman). Everybody is looking for Bill (Cartwright, the 7-foot center) inside. But, Bill, he's unselfish. If we're open, he'll pass it off.

"Everybody is looking to win, not just to score. If we stay in the same frame of mind, we have a team that will be hard

Huston said the Knicks are playing closer to the collegetype game than the one-on-one style which is more prevalent the other team. We try not to go one-on-one, unless that's what we have to do.

Currently, Huston is playing behind high-scoring Ray Williams, out of Minnesota, and second-year man Michael Ray

Richardson of Montana. "Sometimes Ray plays the point, but when I come in, he plays the shooting guard.

Huston is back in his home town, as he played high school ball at Brooklyn's Canarsie High School. And playing in Madison Square Garden is nothing unusual; he played there as a prep.

"But, the pros. . . sometimes I think it is easier than I thought," Huston said last week, as he waited for the Piston game. "Yeah," he laughed, "the towns are bigger than Fayetteville and College Station.



A. Well, following on the heels of kid star Gary Coleman's role as San Diego manager in a TV movie, sportswriters in California are saying the Padres

Jerry Coleman, who San Diego writers claim will make the world forget Danny Ozark, brought off the following gems this season: On Drug Abuse Night, "Hats off to drug abusers everywhere;" on Randy Jones' permanentfrizz hairdo, "He has a Karl Marx haircut;" on Ron Guidry, "He has an arm like a lion." He also said a San Diego outfielder "ran under the warning track." Stay tuned.

Q. Randy Love and Emmett King each gained over 1,000 yards rushing last season for the Houston Cougas. I suppose this has happened before. Can you tell me where, and who were the runners? -Kenneth Graham, Houston.

A. This has happened nine times in NCAA Division I history. The last pair were Mike Smith and Gwain Durden at Tennessee-Chattanooga in 1977. Before that there was Rob Lytle and Gordon Bell at Michigan. Durden, by the way, is still going strong, leading the nation in average yards per carry this season (9.4).

Q. Sidney Moncrief, Arkansas' All-America guard, scored 2,066 points and got 1,014 rebounds in his collegiate career. Has any other collegiate guard done this?

-S.L., Garden Grove, Calif.

-Scott Gardlage, Louisville, Ky.

A. The NCAA doesn't keep career records on rebounds below 1,500, so there's no way to cross-check the national figures. The college statisticians point out, however, that with so many players having four-year careers these days, those totals are not likely to be that unusual.

Q. I've heard several comparisons of pitching greats Sandy Koulax and Nolan Ryan. I would like to know their complete stats, aside from their four nohitters each, and also how they stand with one-hitters.

A. Nolan Ryan now has six one-hit games; he trails Bob Feller by five. Koufax isn't among the one-hit career leaders in the National league, where Steve Carlton is now tied with three others with five. Koufax's significant career totals include: 165 wins and 87 losses, a 2.76 ERA for 397 games, 2,396 strikeouts and 817 walks. That's over 12 years. Ryan's figures, through this season: 85 wins and 84 losses, a 3.04 ERA for 219 games, 1,428 strikeouts and 777 walks. That's over 8 years.



Until this season, the Expos had never finished over .500 in their previous 10 years in the league.

This is Williams' third year in Montreal. His previous experience as a manager was all in the American League, where he managed the Boston Red Sox, Oakland and the California Angels over a span of nine seasons

Williams managed Oakland to World Series victories in 1972 and 1973, becom ing the first non-New York Yankee field boss to win consecutive world chan onships since Connie Mack. He also guided the Red Sox to the AL pennant in 1967 in his first year as a major league

manager. He has 941 major league victo ries thus far.

Williams managed Toronto in the In-ternational League before surfacing in

As a player, the California-born Williams spent 14 years in the majors as an outfielder and utility infielder with Brooklyn, Baltimore, Cleveland, Kansas.

Panel To Stress Importance Of Nuclear Safety

But the commission, wrapping up a ix-month investigation of the accident at the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant in Pennsylvania, stopped short of calling for a halt in future construction ensing of plants or interfering with the operation of existing reactors.

The final touches on the panel's report were completed Monday after three days of closed meetings. During the sescommission members remained sions, commission members remained deeply divided over whether to call for a moratorium on future plant licensing until their safety recommendations could

The commission, whose 12 members were appointed in April by President

Carter to investigate the March accident, will present its findings and recommendations to the White House Oct. 30.

The recommendations will only be

advisory. But Carter has called the panel's task "one of the most important ever undertaken," and its suggestions are expected to strongly influence the nucle-

None of the commission members or more than 50 professional staff members would comment publicly on the draft report. But according to several sources who asked not to be named, the panel's recommendations and findings will in-

—A reorganization of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, abandoning the current five-member regulatory panel and putting in its place a single adminis trator along the lines of, for instance, the Environmental Protection Agency. The presidential investigators, during seven public hearings and in private

comments, have strongly criticized the NRC, saying the agency has trouble with internal communications and has not given safety a high enough priority. The NRC makes all its decisions by a majority vote, a procedure the agency's own staff says is cumbersome during an emergency.

-Require the federal government to renew nuclear power plant licenses at regular intervals. A plant is currently licensed only once, although the certificate can be revoked.

-Require future power plants to be located in "low-population zones," which would mean reactors could not be placed close to major cities. Currently, there are power plants north of Chicago and New York City.
