U.S. Airliner Crashes In Mexico; 55 Killed

Airlines DC-10 jetliner bound from Los Angeles with 88 persons reported aboard crashed while landing in fog and smog at the Mexico City airport today, plowing into two buildings, and Red Cross officials at the scene said they had re-covered 55 bodies from the wreckage.

Nineteen persons were reported to have survived. The fate of the others was not immediately known.

A Mexican aviation official said the plane touched down on a runway that was closed for repairs and that it struck a parked truck and killed its driver.

A witness said the crash sounded like clap of thunder and "there was a big flash of light." The plane was demolished

Pedro Jose, a surviving passenger,

"It was a normal flight all the way from Los Angeles up to Mexico City airport. Around three or four minutes before we were landing there was a lot of fog around the place and the airplane sort of rattled up a bit and about a half a minute later it just went flat, just

"The plane popped right open and I was around two or three behind the wing so I could get out. Inside the plane there was a lot of fire and a lot of dead people. Right after the accident the seats were right on top of one another and the plane was cracked open.'

In New York, experts said it was too soon to tell whether the crash of the DC-10 would cause additional problems for the manufacturer of the aircraft, McDonnell Douglas Corp. The company has been in the process of recovering from a 37-day grounding of its DC-10s after an American Airlines plane crashed last May 25th at Chicago's O'Hare Airport, killing 273 persons, the

Some of the dead appeared to be children, witnesses said. In Los Angeles, the airline said the plane had 88 persons aboard, 77 passengers, 11 crew. It said earlier reports of a couple of more aboard total stemmed from the fact two

light attendants were listed both ways.

An immigration official who declined to give his name said the plane was on fire before it landed, that it hit the run-

cement block building about a quarter of a mile from the terminal. Other witnesses said the plane then crashed against a building under construction and its roof

A spokesman for the Mexican Civil Aeronautics Administration, who asked anonymity, said the plane first touched down on a runway that had been closed to traffic for repairs. Western officials the plane's movements had been re-trived intact.

The U.S. Federal Aviation Administration and the U.S. National Transportation Safety Board sent representatives to Mexico City to observe the investigation of the crash.

Parts of the plane were hurled hundreds of yards and struck a slum housing area beyond ther airport.

Texas Cities Will Seek Increase In Sales Tax

islature approves, the state's municipalities will be asking their residents to agree to a one-or two-penny increase in the 1-cent sales tax.

The city sales tax resolution was one of nine passed by the Texas Municipal League Tuesday as it wound up its four-day, 67th annual conference here.

The general assembly rejected an attempt by the Clear Lake City Freedom Coalition to have the league approve a resolution in which it agreed to stay out of the city's fight to be disannexed from Houston.

All nine resolutions passed with little opposition. The only significant discussion came on the sales tax resolution, which proposed that the Legislature be asked to authorize any city council, with approval of local voters, to increase the present 1-cent tax.

According to the resolution, the extra money would be used to "provide property tax relief for city residents."

Lila Cockrell of San Antonio proposd an amenment allowing cities to use the money for capital improvements.

'This will be very important to the cities in the face of the possibility that the general revenue sharing may not continue in the future," she said.

The amendment easily won approval from the assembly, as did the resolution. The league representatives quickly moved through the rest of the proposals, passing each by

an overwhelming majority.

Seabrook Mayor Joe M. Pirtle then asked the assemble to suspend its rules to consider a 10th resolution designed to "neutralize the Municipal League to get it out of a purely local matter between Clear Lake and Houston.

The race for payor of Houston was injected into the discussion at this point as Mayor Jim McConn and Councilman Louis Macey, a candidate for the position, took opposing sides.

Macey told the assembly the City Council was warned when the annexation question came up that Clear Lake City might be double-taxed if taken into Houston because the larger city wouldn't be able to provide all necessary serv-

"The council was told by legal counsel that this would not be a problem," Macey said. "It was only after the council annexed that legal counsel told us about the double

Vance Discloses Cuban Changes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance indicated today the Soviets have taken steps in Cuba to reduce U.S. concerns about Russian troops there.

Vance, speaking at a news conference, was unwilling to provide details. But he said "some factors are different from what they were."

He added that while there is no basis yet for great optimism, the developments in Cuba, which are monitored closely by U.S. intelligence, are "not un-

The United States had accused the Soviet Union of placing a combat brigade of 2,000 to 3,000 men in Cuba, possibly leading up to an unacceptable Russian force in the Western Hemisphere.

Protracted negotiations did not ap-

President Carter announced a series of countermeasures.

While suggesting the Soviets may have changed the nature of the brigade, Vance also took a low-key approach to construction by the Russians of a new pier at the Cienfuegos naval base.

He said "there is no indication the pier is for anything other than Cuban

The construction does not violate the 1962 U.S. Soviet understanding that ended the "missile crisis," he said.

In general, Vance said, "we are trying to keep everything in its proper . proportions.'

Witch To Make 15th Appearance At Town's Halloween Festival

Halloween darkness shrouds this small Kansas town, an old crone roars through the streets atop a fire engine, cackling "come to me, come to the witch.

By the hundreds, wide-eyed children pour out of their houses and run to the courthouse square to see the Witch of the West. Parents follow to partake of the special home brew and participate in a festival that began as a neighborhood spoof and turned into a yearly institution for the whole town.

For the 15th year, the bright red chariot of Reva O'Neill, alias The Witch, will be escorted tonight by town leaders to the square, an annual mecca for 2,000 local youngsters.

There the Good Fairy, grocer Don Lumpkin, will be waiting in his ballet tutu, red tights and combat boots to assist the witch in doling out shiny new apples and pennies sprinkled with gold dust.

'It's quite a sight," said Mrs. O'Neill, an ash-blond grandmother who is coowner of Phillipsburg's only disco supper club. "Kids are scared to death but entranced too. Some are bawling, some wet their pants. But all of them want to see the witch and get their penny. It's the greatest kick in the world for me.

Mrs. O'Neill conceived her Hallow een role in 1965, and in the years since her costume has grown from a simple black sheet into an elaborate outfit accented by pointy-toed black boots, a high peaked hat and dozens of rings and necklaces that jingle as she cavorts through her portrayal of a good witch who is slightly bonkers.

"I asked the witch to come to Phillipsburg because these children were so sweet and innocent," she said in a recent interview. "It had become a jaded event, a knock on the door, an apathetic 'Trick or Treat,' a handful of candy and they were gone. I asked one kid to do a trick before he got his treat and he thought I was crazy. I decided to put a little pizzazz back into the occasion.

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Spiritualists Hoping To Contact Houdini

NEW YORK (UPI) - Every Halloween, spiritualists try to call up the ghost of the Great Houdini, who died 53 Halloweens ago. Houdini hasn't answered yet but they'll try again today.

'He believed all mediums were fakes," recalled author Walter Gibson, who knew the famous magician well. He was particularly strong against people who got messages.

Houdini, who died of peritonitis at 1:26 p.m. in Detroit on Oct. 31, 1926, left aled messages and codes with friends. If it were possible to communicate from the beyond, Houdini told them, he'd relay the secret codes.

"He had a great friend - Joseph Rinn - who offered \$10,000 to any medium who got Houdini's code message,' Gibson said. "Nobody ever won that \$10,000

The annual Halloween seance at the Magic Towne House in Manhattan has never produced a verifiable contact with Houdini, said Dick Brooks, who will be taking part in the rite today.

"On the 50th anniversary of his death, just as the seance began, the picture of his last escape fell from the wall." Brooks added. "It wasn't considered definite, but there's still a mystery

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for most of the great American magicians of this century, along with the old "Shadow" radio programs, says Houdini was one of the least mystical of magi-

"He was really a circus man," says Gibson, 82. "He thought his future would be putting on escapes for medicine shows. When he hit vaudeville, he was a success overnight. But the sawdust was still in his blood."

When Houdini died, Gibson was given a trunk full of notes on how the magician performed his famous tricks. None of them, Gibson says, involved the supernatural. For instance, the trick in which Hou-

dini was tied into - and escaped from - a straitjacket in full audience view, was based on the magician's "terrific chest expansion," Gibson said Houdini would expand his chest

when being tied in, and then relax, letting the jacket get slack. Then Houdini worked his hands over his head and wriggled free. 'He'd have himself hung upside

down, which looked more spectacular, but actually made it easier to slide his hand over his head," Gibson added. The secret to the handcuff escape tricks, Gibson added cryptically, is that

'all handcuffs have duplicate keys. The

trick is where you conceal them. After serving as ghost writer for many of the great magicians and mind readers. Gibson said, he's never seen a magic trick that baffled him.

'I don't necessarily believe in the supernatural," he added, "although I'm strong on extrasensory perception.





Dr. C's New Snake Oil

AS WE ENTER the second year of President Carter's wage/price guidelines program, it's obvious that the first year was less than a success. Inflation is climbing annually at a 13-plus percentage rate.

The administration claims that were it not for energy, food, housing and hospital costs, inflation would be right around a, ahem, comfortable 7 percent.

But if you remove energy, food, housing and health care costs, what's left to inflate?

As for the guidelines themselves, it is illusory to promise Americans that by holding down wages and prices we can slow inflation. Wages and prices are symptoms, not causes, of inflation.

THE CLASSIC definition of inflation ("Too many dollars chasing too few goods")

To find the cause of inflation, then, one has to find out how all the money is getting into the market and what is keeping the goods out of it.

Plan No Como On

SANTA FE-Perry Como missed by only a few minutes his chance to have been able to tell his grandchildren "I was there" when Lubbock's Goals for the '80s were born.

Como was here to record his Christmas Special at the same time a cross-section of about 75 Lubbockites retreated to this New Mexico capital to plan Lubbock's advance for the next decade.

Their suggestions will be ready to go to the public for reactions, revisions, deletions, additions and prioritizing at about the same time Come's Christmas carols are riding through the

Committee 80 Chairman Harold Harriger et al waited around the singer's outdoor stage Sunday to give him an opportunity to be a part of the Lubbock programming.

When he was delayed beyond the departure time for Lubbock, though, they decided to let him read about it in the newspaper.

ACTUALLY, THE preliminary goals that were presented to the full committee after months of study by subcommittees will, if adopted by the community, provide a blueprint for making Lubbock a city that Como or anyone else would like better to live in or visit by 1990.

The proposals would build on existing strengths, conquer the community's most pressing challenges, expand economic opportunities for all citizens and improve their quality of life.

But before the goals can be worth the paper Association of Manufacturers recently when they're written on, they'll have to capture the enthusiastic support of the city as a whole, just as

did the Goals for the '70s after a series of public hearings 10 years ago.

ONE MAN'S OPINION

The Chamber of Commerce-sponsored planning effort for the '80s will be ready for citywide participation in January, Harriger said.

WATER FOR domestic, agricultural and industrial use emerged as the most likely top priority goal for the decade ahead, as it did in the adopted Goals for the '70s.

While importation of amounts necessary for farm irrigation isn't expected to be accomplished before 1990, accelerated progress toward achieving that goal can be reasonably expected, the weekend conferees agreed.

Of more immediate concern is the need to develop a third water supply for Lubbock by building a reservoir near Justiceburg

The cost would require tripling water rates in the city, an unappealing thought to committee members, but they unhesitatingly recommended it as a goal because the alternative of exhausting existing underground supplies and facing the prospect of shortages in the 1990s was deemed unthinkable.

A FEET-ON-THE-GROUND attitude by the conference participants also was reflected in other goals they will recommend for adoption.

The extension of Interstate 27 across the city, for example, already has been authorized but will require nursing to fruition.

Highway improvements to the east, west and south aren't a new idea by any means but will receive renewed impetus by inclusion in the Goals program.

A center where cultural organizations, including both the visual and performing arts, can meet and practice was envisioned at one time for inclusion in the Civic Center but remains at this point a dream to be accomplished during the decade

Despite all of the educational and vocational programs offered by Texas Tech, Lubbock Christian College and South Plains College, the subcommittee on education said there's still an unmet gap in the needs of some young people and employers.

ONE THEME WHICH kept running through the comments at Santa Fe was that Lubbock already is a great place to live.

Participants recognized, though, that it's only a short step between such pride and the apathy and self-satisfaction that could block further progress.

They agreed that much needs to be done to communicate the Lubbock story within and without the city, to undergird its economy with planned, quality growth, to solve the crime situation, make visitors feel more welcome, clean up disgraceful environmental conditions and make better use of existing assets.

On the way back to Lubbock, Dr. Harold Luce, chairman of music at Texas Tech, said he's lived in a lot of places but has never seen anything to match the civic pride and spirit of Lubbock.

The Goals for the '80s will be a continuation, not a beginning, of the harnessing of that phenomenon.

Fed Policies Wash Out Savings For Rainy Day



WASHINGTON-For the first time, you who have had no first-hand experience with the Great Depression of the 1930s, are a majority of our nation's voting age population.

More than five out of 10 of you (56 percent) 18 years or older were born after 1935. For you, the economic catastrophes which directly affected us. your parents—the stock market crash, bank failures, skyrocketing joblessness-are tales out of a distant past.

You never will fully appreciate why we fought so hard for laws to protect our nation from ever again undergoing this traumatic event, why we so deeply approved of the so-called work ethic, why we tried so hard to build at least an emergency savings pestegg.

INSTEAD, YOUR DAILY lives and habits have been shaped in an era of sharply rising taxes and prices-forces pushing you to spend rather than save. And as an average U.S. worker, you do pay 25 to 35 percent of your income in taxes to government.

Social Security taxes rather than income taxes take the biggest bite out of your incomes, if yours is a family earning less than \$11,000 a year-or even if your family earns above this level.

With so large a percentage of your earnings going out in taxes and to pay for ever more expensive goods and services, your incentive to save is steadily shrinking.

At latest report, you were saving only slightly more than 4 percent of your after-tax income, lowest rate in decades, against a Japanese savings rate of 25 percent and a German rate of about 18 percent.

IF THE U.S. economy is to return to a healthy rate of growth and "real" wages and incomes are to resume rising, these trends toward undersaving and overspending must be reversed.

'If we don't increase our growth rate to the point where taxpavers see their standards of living improve, they'll start to turn on the less fortunate in our economy," predicts Michael Bos-kin, Stanford economics professor.

Boskin, 33, is among the younger economists who believe the answers to our sluggish growth and persistent inflation lie in stimulating savings and investment, while reducing taxes and government spending. The chronic inflations of recent decades can't

and services, the younger economists insist. THESE TECHNIQUES ARE simply not geared to today's problems, even though many economists over 40-including some who hold inf-

luential government posts-still advocate them. The younger group argues that the key to higher productivity, improved "real" wages and longterm economic prosperity rests with the supply, not the demand, side of the economy.

The single, most important move the U.S. government could make now to spur savings and investment, spokesmen for the group told my associate. Brooke Shearer, would be to eliminate the taxes individuals must now pay on their savings accounts.

Eliminating taxes on savings accounts of all sorts would hike the average saver's return by 40 percent and result in a \$30-\$40 billion rise in personal savings a year.

The larger supply of savings would drive down interest rates over a period, make long-term capital investment more appealing. A larger stock of capital-more tractors, say, per farmer-would in turn make workers more productive and help increase wages. After 10 years or so, tax revenues would rise along with higher wages.

THE ARGUMENTS OF this younger school of 'incentive' economists are getting an ever more serious and sympathetic hearing in Washington.

The Joint Economic Committee of Congress issued a report recently supporting the general view that the economy faces major supply prob-

More and more senators and congressmen are backing measures to encourage savings and investments—including tax-free savings.

It may be a sleeper now. But it's increasingly realistic to expect a big drive for tax exemption on at least part of your savings-and it's not unrealistic to expect the drive to succeed.

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

BOSTON (AP) — Mental patients ment itself was sound have the right to reject drugs and seclusion ordered by their doctors, except when the patients present a danger to themselves or others, a federal judge has

U.S. District Judge Joseph L. Tauro's erated on any claims of malpractice. class action suit brought by patients at Boston State Hospital, found that those committed to a mental hospital have a constitutional right to a say in their

But Tauro said the hospital staff could use forced seclusion and medication "where there is a substantial likelihood of ... extreme violence, personal injury or attempted suicide."

Tauro said patients realize the need for treatment in emergency situations.

Although committed mental patients do suffer at least some impairment of their relationship to reality, most are able to appreciate the benefits, risks and discomfort that may reasonably be expected from receiving psychotropic medication," Tauro said.

Tauro's decision came in a suit brought by seven patients at the Boston State Hospital, a state facility for the

The complaint, filed in 1975, named Dr. Robert Okin, commissioner of the Department of Mental Health, and 14 doctors and psychologists as defendants, alleging they ordered the use of drugs

and seclusion on unwilling patients. Attorneys for the patients said their clients had the right to reject medication, such as Thorazine and Haldol, used to calm manic and violent behavior, because of potential side effects.

Attorneys for the hospital staff had argued that patients committed to a state institution are incompetent to make decisions about their treatment. The hospital staff, the defense argued, has the obligation and right to provide treatment, even if opposed by patients.

Although the defendants contended the hospital staff never used force in administering drugs, Tauro said the evidence showed that force was used in giving drugs to at least three of the plain-

Tauro rejected the patients' request for \$400,000 in damages, noting that although the forced treatment violated the patients' constitutional rights, the treat-

Carter Rebels Axed

Carter's campaign manager says he hopes the administration will fire any political appointee found to be flirting with the campaign of Sen. Edward M

After watching two Carter administration officials defect to the Kennedy camp, Tim Kraft said he thinks loyalty should count in politics.

A White House official who asked not to be named said it would be no surprise if some others now on the administration roster switched to the camp of the president's challenger. But he said, "We have had and will have our share of support and endorsements.

Asked whether he thinks the administration should dismiss likely defectors before they publicly break with the president in favor of Kennedy, Kraft replied:

'As campaign manager, I'm not an official member of the administration. But as a political person who respects loyalty, I hope they do.

Kraft commented in an interview Tuesday after former Iowa Sen. Dick Clark said he is leaving the Carter administration to work for Kennedy and J. William Heckman Jr., resigned as deputy assistant attorney for legislation to join the Kennedy committee.

In related developments Tuesday, the 70,000-member National Treasury Employees Union announced its support of Kennedy and Chicago Mayor Jane Byrne made a formal announcement reaffirming her weekend endorsement of Kenne-

There was a particular sting to the defections by Clark, who was given a \$57,500-a-year job as U.S. coordinator

for refugee affairs after being defeated for re-election last year, and by Heckman, a personal friend of Carter campaign lawyer Tim Smith.

In accepting Clark's resignation, Carter noted that he had understood Clark would remain neutral in the 1980 campaign and devote his attention to refugee problems. However, Clark said in an interview

the refugee programs have been overhauled and "it seems as appropriate as any time to make the change. A Clark spokesman, Bob Miller, said Clark had pledged to remain politically neutral while in the administration, but





Smith Playing Key Role In Kennedy's Campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) - Steve Smith, the quiet Kennedy in-law, is running another campaign.

The attempt by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., to wrest the Democratic presidential nomination from President Carter marks the sixth time since 1958 that Smith has played a key role in a bid by a Kennedy for high public office.

With the exception of the 1968 cam-paign, which ended with the assassination of Sen. Robert Kennedy, D-N.Y., all have resulted in victory.

Stephen Edward Smith, 51, political operative and financial manager, has shared the Kennedy family's moments of high triumph and deep tragedy for more than two decades.

He was office manager of John F. Kennedy's campaign for re-election to the Senate in 1958, raised millions of dollars for the Kennedy-Johnson presidential ticket in 1960 and was considered a sure bet to head up the president's re-election bid in 1964,

Smith managed Edward Kennedy's campaign to succeed his brother John in the Senate in 1962. He was already organizing for JFK in key industrial states when the president was assassinated in

In 1964, Attorney General Robert Kennedy left the Johnson administration, moved to New York, ran for the Senate, and won. His manager was Steve

This week, Smith stood among reporters in the showroom of a former new car dealership in downtown Wash-

Staff Picked To Assist Kennedy

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sen. Edward Kennedy went to his own people not to the family or the campaigns of his older brothers - for the staff of his campaign for the White House.

Only Stephen Smith, chairman of the campaign committee, is linked to the Kennedy family and the presidential campaigns of John F. and Robert Kennedy. Here's a rundown on the other initial appointments:

-Caroline Reed: campaign treasurer; counsel to the House Administration Committee that writes election law leg-

-Morris Dees: finance director; worked for Jimmy Carter's 1976 campaign, but earlier was allied with liberal causes. He was chief fund-raiser for Sen. George McGovern's presidential cam-

-Martin Katz: also a finance director; is on the staff of Sen. Daniel Moynihan, D-N.Y., and is considered something of a financial expert.

-Elaine Shocas: congressional liaison; a counsel on the Senate Judiciary Committee chaired by Kennedy.

-Rick Stearns: delegate considered a master of the delegate selection process. He ran McGovern's highly successful delegate hunt during the 1972 primaries.

-Phil Bakes: deputy campaign manager; general counsel to the Civil Aeronautics Board.

-Dick Drayne: special campaign assistant; longtime Kennedy aide and former press secretary.

-Tom Southwick: current press secretary; will assume the same role for the

campaign

-Paul Kirk: political adviser; formerly the senator's administrative assistant in Congress, now a Washington at-

-Carl Wagner: political adviser; succeeded Kirk as Kennedy's top aide. He will be charged with setting up official - as opposed to draft - Kennedy com-

-Chris Burch: political adviser; a counsel on Kennedy's Senate subcommittee on health.

Gallows May Be Sold To Pay State Debts

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP) - Delaware's 78-year-old gallows could be sold at public auction if the state Department of Corrections does not come up with \$21,650 soon.

A federal judge determined the state owes that much in legal fees to the Community Legal Aid Society, which successfully sued the state because of overcrowded conditions at a state prison. When the state said it could not pay, the society called upon the U.S. marshal to seize the gallows, the hanging rope, furniture and 10 cars from the department and sell them at an auction by mid-De-

State Prison Commissioner John Sullivan Jr. said the state is negotiating with the society and hopes "to avoid the seizure of the items." The present wooden gallows, built in 1901, is disassembled and stored in a barn. It has been used to hang 25 people, the last in May 1946. But officials say if any more hangings take place a new gallows would have to be

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
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P&Z To Examine Overton South Land Use Plan

The Planning and Zoning Commission will scrutinize a 1975 land use plan for Overton South Thursday to determine whether that plan should be changed to allow more commercial de-

The examination of the land use plan came at the request of the City Council when the American State Bank requested a zone change to permit a drive-in bank in the 1500 block of Avenue R.

The only commercial area in the land use plan is in a strip around the neighborhood on Avenue Q, 19th Street, University Avenue and Broadway.

However, the council asked the comission to determine whether that strip ought not be extended into the neighborod which is predominantly zoned for apartments and duplexes.

Zoning Administrator Jerrel Northcutt said the commission would be asked

should be extended. If that answer is yes, Northcutt said commissioners will have to decide under what conditions additional commercial zoning will be

Although the commission will not be asked to rule on the zone change request of American State Bank again (it was denied by the commission originally), Northcutt said any decision on the land use plan could be interpreted as a decision on the drive-in bank zoning. ministration might try to extend the protocol restrictions as a good faith gesture in future arms talks, or that the limitations might be considered a precedent for a SALT III accord. To defuse those arguments, Sens. Frank Church, D-Idaho, the committee's

chairman and Jacob Javits, R-N.Y., the ranking GOP member, drafted an "un-derstanding" to insure that the Senate would play a role in future action on the protocol's restrictions.

WASHINGTON (AP) - With interest rates shooting up and at least 250,000 more college students getting govern-ment-subsidized loans this year than last, federal officials are afraid costs of the various programs are getting out of The volume of Guaranteed Student

Loans jumped 35 percent during the first 10 months of fiscal 1979 over the comparable period in 1978, according to the U.S. Office of Education. In raw figures, the increase was from 711,387 loans last year to 961,451 this

On top of that, students are borrowing more than ever and the amount of interest the government is having to pay

is higher than ever. The total amount of the loans shot from \$1.2 billion last year to \$1.8 billion this year, a 48 percent increase. Undergraduates can borrow up to \$2,500 annually and graduate students up to \$5,-

000 annually The loans, which students obtain through banks and state guaranty agencies, cost the students nothing while they remain in college or vocational school. They pay only 7 percent interest afterwards

The government picks up the rest of the interest, which was running at 13.5 percent at the end of the summer, but has now climbed to more than 16 percent, according to Edward Fox, president of the Student Loan Marketing As-

Even before the interest rates took off recently, the government's cost of insuring the loans mushroomed 70 percent, from \$264 million in fiscal 1978 to \$449 million through July of this year, according to the Office of Education. Figures for the full fiscal year 1979. which ended Sept. 30, are not yet availa-

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



DACCA, Bangladesh (UPI) - President Ziaur Rahman has declared war on the cataclysmic problems that led Henry Kissinger to dub Bangladesh an "international basket case.'

Zia, as he is known in South Asia, has warned his cabinet of a "revolution to better the lot of the common man" in Bangladesh.

This month Zia called on his Bangladesh National Party to enact legislation that would change Bangladesh's "colonial system of administration ... radically ... to a people-oriented one." Earlier he told his cabinet to "be prepared to make sacrifices.

Although Zia did not detail his plans for change, his impressive track record in tackling Bangladesh problems indicates he means business.

Widely regarded as a man of quiet integrity, the 44-year-old president has taken first steps - self-help reform pro-

grams — to break Bangladesh's begging

Although a record \$1.3 billion in foreign aid is expected to pour into South Asia's poorest nation in 1979, government projects in food for work, education, collective farms, family planning

and women's rights have begun to erode what one foreign economist called the "psychology of dependence."

Zia accomplished this year what most thought impossible: he kept the nation's 90 million people from famine in a drought year.

Exactly five years ago, nearly 50,000 Bangladeshis died in a drought not nearly as severe. Political observers now marvel that the same combination of political neglect, poverty, bad water and

land management and general lack of foresight did not produce a similar disaster in 1979.

"Quite frankly we are mighty impressed," said one Western diplomat.

Zia did much of the overseas shopping himself for 2.2 million tons of food grain (200,000 tons from the United States) imported to meet the food production shortfall.

Defying skeptics among international donors who thought he would never be able to get the food into the stomachs of the nation's poor, Zia worked 20 hours a day to double the capacity of Bangladesh's two ports to move 16,000 tons of food per day

Unhappy Auto Buyers Get Forum For Complaints

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The government and the automobile industry today announced new steps designed to help consumers complain about cars that turn out to be lemons.

The arrangement involves an upgrading of voluntary complaint-handling panels currently in operation at 44 locations across the country. Under the change, the panels must have more consumer representation, will be open to press coverage, must publicize their services,

and must make their decisions binding on the car dealer involved.

The Automotive Consumer Action Programs, called AUTOCAPS, began operating in 1973. They are designed to provide a hearing for the consumer who has reached a dead end with a dealer.

Ideally, the hearing would be by a panel made up of consumer representatives and industry members. But the programs have varied widely in their makeup and effectiveness. Some consist

panel. Some were open to press coverage and public scrutiny, while others were not.

The National Automobile Dealers Association, which runs the program, said 44 AUTOCAPS, some local and others statewide, are operating. The dealers association said two new ones in Denver and Los Angeles will be added, and a half dozen others are being formed.

The embassy and its grounds occupy an entire block surrounded by a high wall and metal fences. The troops and armored cars responded immediately

Witnesses said they heard four shots fird during the 15-minute confrontation and Dambrava said there was some gunshot damage to the embassy. Some of the leftists tried to climb the wall but were driven off, and a gasoline bomb was thrown into an embassy garden but caused no damage, officials said.

Afterward. the troops and armored cars surrounded the compound to guard against other leftists staging an anti-government march on a street nearby.

In Washington, U.S. officials said the Carter Administration was prepared to offer "significant" assistance including gas and other non-lethal weapons to the two-week-old junta to help it overcome extremist violence. The officials said the aid was being offered even though the junta had not asked for it.

The two colonels who head the junta ousted El Salvador's military president, Gen. Carlos Humberto Romero, in a bloodless coup on Oct. 15. Moderate political groups gave them their support after they added three civilians to the junta and promised democratic reforms.

Vance said only that "we hope political growth will be commensurate with. economic and social progress." He stressed an American hope that "future developments will take place in an or-

Vance also had praise for Park. "He was an able leader, a staunch ally and a key force behind the remarkable ecodevelopment Korea has achieved," he said.

Vance's statements reiterated the position the Carter administration has taken since Park was assassinated late last week in Seoul.

As Hodding Carter, the State Department spokesman, put it Monday: "Security is paramount." He left no doubt he meant paramount to other U.S. interests, including human rights.

The clear purpose of the message was to signal the Communist regime in North Korea not to try to take advantage of any power vacuum in the south.

To underline the point, the Pentagon quickly announced a series of military moves. The 38,000 American ground troops in South Korea were put on lowlevel alert.

On Monday, the Blue Ridge, an amphibious 7th Fleet command ship, made a port call.

On Tuesday, Thomas Ross, the Defense Department spokesman, announced that the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk and 10 other ships had moved closer to South Korea. And he said the American ground troops had been kept in the higher than usual state of readi-

"The situation has stabilized very quickly," he said. "It's a combination of the way South Korea responded coolly and efficiently to President Park's death and our quick response.'

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





They said two of the rescued were seriously burned and four had less serious burns. None was immediately identi-

The Danish naval command said the 9,243-ton Antarctic expedition ship Olenek and the 22.632-ton tanker General Shkodunovich collided in rough seas in the Great Belt, between Zealand and Fyn. Denmark's two biggest islands. The strait connects the Baltic and

North Seas. The Olenek, which was bound for the Antarctic, caught fire, and the captain at first reported 16 of his crew missing but police later said 11 of them were res-

We must find the means to bluff our way in there with the food and the doctors and the supplies," said Miss Baez, who toured several refugee camps in Southeast Asia earlier this month. She reports today on what she found to Kennedy's subcommittee on refugees.

"We're ready," said Chip Carter of his father's administration pledge to finance a third of he world's efforts to ease the lot of the starving and homeless. "We're getting a little radical about this," added Carter. "We need you to keep pushing.' More than 300 guests paid \$125 each

to hear Miss Baez sing and Kennedy speak, and to mingle with members of Congress, socialites and composer-conducter Leonard Bernstein. The total take was some \$40,000.

At an 18th century residence in Washington's historic Georgetown neigh-borhood, Miss Baez sang "Michael Row the Boat Ashore," and "Swing Low Sweet Chariot." With Bernstein's encouragement, she led the audience in singing "Amazing Grace."

Out in the crowd, Lincoln Bloomfield, charged with coordinating U.S. relief efforts for the White House, said if necessary a mountain of food will be piled on the Cambodian border to increase pressure on the Cambodian and Vietnamese governments to accept emergency aid.

"There's going to be a blizzard of food and money," Bloomfield said.







tee this week that the Carter administration wants "cheaper, less capable" submarines. He said the cheaper subs couldn't keep up with most Soviet attack submarines, couldn't attack high-speed surface ships and couldn't escort highspeed U.S. surface ships.

Chinese Cite Success With Folk Medicines

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chinese scientists say they are discovering the ways many ancient folk medicines work and are using the best of these herbal, root and plant remedies to treat patients.

Chinese drug specialists told their American counterparts this week that they have isolated hundreds of chemical ingredients from more than 80 kinds of plants and are using some of them to successfully treat everything from high blood pressure to cancer.

"In our country, increasing emphasis has been laid in recent years on researches on natural products for medicinal use," Zhang Juntien told a meeting at the National Academy of Sciences.

Zhang, deputy director of the Institute of Materia Medica in Shanghai, said there are 5,000 species of medicinal plants in China, including 1,000 that remain in common use after hundreds of years.

The scientist said the Chinese consider traditional drugs and medical practice "a great treasure house" to be explored and exploited, an important foundation on which the country can build an extensive and independent drug industry.

The meeting was the first hilateral

The meeting was the first bilateral scientific symposium between the United States and the People's Republic of China. It was co-sponsored by the academy's Institute of Medicine and the Chinese Academy of Medical Sciences. The 10 Chinese scientists in the delegation presented technical pharmacology reports as did some of the 40 Americans

attending.

Zhang said a chemical isolated from the bark of a cephalotoxus tree native to China has been very promising against certain forms of leukemia.

The drug, called harringtonine, is one of thousands of herbal preparations screened for anticancer activity and was found effective against a number of animal tumors, including some resistant to other treatments.

In clinical trials with 72 leukemia patients getting no other treatment, 24 achieved complete disease remission, 38 had partial remission and 10 failed to respond, Zhang said.

Ding Guangsheng, chairman of pharmacology at the Shanghai institute, reported on several plant chemicals tested by his group.

The root of the corydalis ambigua plant has been used for more than 1,000 years to relieve pain. Scientists found the active ingredient to be a chemical called dl-tetrahydropalmatine (THP), shown to produce a sedative and pain-killing effect in animals, Ding said.

THP was found to be a non-narcotic and there were no signs of addiction in monkeys.

County Precinct Changes Sought

have filed class action lawsuits in Lubbock's U.S. District Court seeking federal court orders requiring officials of Cochran and Crosby Counties to reapportion county election precincts, which now allegedly dilute the voting strength of minorities in those counties.

Additionally, the suits prepared by representatives of the Southwest Voter Registration Education Project (SVREP) and the Mexican-American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) in San Antonio, accuse the officials of the two counties of not complying with the "preclearance provision" the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

According to the petition filed by SVREP attorney Rolando L. Rios on behalf of Crosby County voters Alejandro Ybarra and Teodoso Riojas, county officials have conducted elections in that county even though the U.S. Attorney General's Office has not approved precinct changes made there March 1, 1977.

Under the Voting Rights Act of 1965, and extended to Texas elections in 1975,

dures after November 1972 must be reviewed by federal officials to ensure the changes don't abridge any voter's rights on the basis of the voter's "race, o or membership in an applicable language minority group."

Ybarra's and Riojas' lawsuit contends that Crosby County officials who initiated precinct changes two years ago have not received such federal approval but have continued to conduct elections in violation of the Voting Rights Act.

But even if a federal approval stamp is given the precinct reapportionments of March 1977, Ybarra and Riojas say in their petition they will challenge the precinct divisions on the basis they minimize Crosby County's Mexican-American community votes.

The suit's "voter strength dilution" contention is based on the U.S. Supreme Court's "one person-one vote" ruling that requires county commissioner precincts to have approximately the same number of inhabitants within each pre-

The one person-one vote determination is reached by dividing a county's total population at the latest complete



I know of some players who take advantage of this thirst for blood by what I call "round-robin" bidding-they bid a number of suits they do not have in an effort to induce opponents to double all contracts, including the final landing spot, which they expect to make. On this hand, our side fell

into this trap. My partner made a distributional open ing bid of one club, an action I heartily endorse. Since two suited hands are awkward to handle with a takeout double, South chose to "pussyfoot" with a simple overcall of one spade. The trouble started when I

elected to double one spade. I am convinced that this was bad strategy on my part. When you make a low-level penalty double with nothing but length and strength in the adversely bid suit, more often than not the opponents will maneuver themselves into a superior spot. Partner may then double, relying on you to take tricks which do not materialize in the play.

East's double of two hearts was natural, and South removed to two no trump with the diamond suit as backbone. I passed, as did North, and my partner made an impulsive double. If he had given the hand more thought, he would have known that I couldn't have any values in diamonds. After all, he was known to

have strength in clubs and hearts and I had made a penalty double of spades. With diamond values as well, I would have doubled two no trump myself and not passed the decision back to him. The contract was fulfilled with an overtrick.

We had gotten caught in the swing!





is shaded by a large pecan tree, and inside a rocking chair sits near a fireplace. But visitors suspect there is something unusual about this place from the moment they ring the doorbell.

It plays "The Star Spangled Banner." Visitors are sure when they enter and find Addie Barlow Frazier, 73, a greatgrandmother, wearing a Ku Klux Klan robe and hood, KKK earrings and a Klan medallion.

She has a KKK altar and sacred sword in her bedroom and keeps a loaded pistol by her bed.

We risk our lives to wear these robes and hoods," says Mrs. Frazier, who holds the Klan post of "Kleagle of the Realm." She says she spends her time "promoting God's word through

Mrs. Frazier has stirred a local controversy by obtaining a parade permit for a Klan march in downtown Dallas next Saturday morning. The Klan hasn't marched in Dallas since the 1920s. Anti-Klan groups have merged for a counterdemonstration half an hour later along the same parade route.

We're getting up the white Christian army to fight these Communist devils," she said. "We'll fight them with ballots and boycotts. We don't use bullets unless we have to — for self defense.'

Mrs. Frazier says Saturday's Klan march, billed "The March of the Christian Soldiers," is being held "to save an endangered species — the white race."

'Freedom of assembly is one of the freedoms white people are losing," said Mrs. Frazier, a widow who became active in the Klan in the mid-1950s. She calls herself a "dedicated fanatic" and says her behavior carries certain risks. "I was looking at television one night

"I'm totally confused about the action of the board," Brookwood administrator Robert Berryman said after the meeting. He distributed copies of a position paper issued by his company, outlining their protest against the board's decision not to retain Brookwood.

When asked if the company intended legal action against the Lubbock County Hospital District, Berryman replied, "I

The department managers confirmed earlier reports that the hospital's accounts payable is higher than it sould be and that venders were being treated rudely by Brookwood representatives.

'We're finding out there's a lot of unpaid bills we didn't realize they were holding," he added.

Reflecting concern that Brookwood personnel might fire hospital employees before they left, the board passed a resolution declaring that "no hiring or firing be done in the next 48 hours. The board also voted to change check-signing authority immediately from Berryman to newly-appointed Roberts.

Berryman asked for time to address the board before the end of the meeting, but Stanley refused, saying, "It would be a waste of your time and the board's to carry this thing any further.

Board member Dub Rushing asked Berryman if he felt he was in an awkward position, staying on at the hospital for the last day of the contract.

"Mr. Rushing, I think that's the least we could say regarding our position,' Berryman said tersely.

Roberts assumes the interim job as one of the last remaining administrators actually employed by the Lubbock County Hospital District. All other key administrative positions were being filled by Brookwood employees.

Roberts said his duties as interim executive director probably will be more limited than those of whoever assumes the position permanently. His job, he said, would be to continue the day-today operation of the hospital.

Roberts has been with the county hospital district for three years, serving as assistant administrator since last year. He worked with hospital administration in the Air Force as well as the Bexar County Hospital District, which also maintains a teaching hospital.

Pro-tem chairman Stanley indicated the board is already considering several applicants for the permanent executive director's job, but added that Roberts can stabilize the operation of the hospital now because he has been a long-term part of the operation.

Board members apparently will wait to hire a new chief finance officer until after the executive director is named, to allow him or her a hand in the choosing However, Stanley indicated several people formerly employed in the hospital's financial offices may be returning to their old jobs since Brookwood is leav-

No discharge to surface waters is permitted under the permit except into a playa lake on company-owned property.



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

Adjust Lifestyle

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - My son

DEAR DR. LAMB — My son is now 36 years old. He's had an ulcer ever since he was 19 and has suffered all these years.

The ulcer is in the esophagus. The doctor said that it was in the mouth of the stomach where the food goes into the stomach. Certain times of the year he is bothered with it more — usually January, February and March.

A few years ago my son had a hemorrhage of the bowels and was put in the hospital and was given blood. He can't take most kinds of medicine, especially aspirin, since it upsets the ulcer. So when he gets a cold or headache or is sick, he can't take anything for it. He does not drink or smoke.

Now I've heard of a medicine that is supposed to heal ulcers. It's called Tagamet. The person I read about had an ulcer of the stomach, but it's not in the same place as my son's ulcer so I want to know if you think this medicine will be all right for him to take.

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DEAR READER — Ulcers in the lower part of the esophagus or at the

opening into the stomach are usually related to an increased amount of acid in the stomach. The reason the stomach doesn't have more ulcers that it does is that the stomach itself is lined with a mucous that protects it from the acid digestive juices. The duodenum just outside the stomach and the lower esophagus just before you get to the stomach are not covered with protective mucous. That's why most ulcers are located in the duodenum and some can occur in the

lower esophagus.

It's absolutely true that people who have ulcers should not use aspirin nor should they use any of the different medicines that contain aspirin commonly available to the public for colds and pains. There's a list of these. I am sending you The Health Letter number 8-8, Aspirin And Related Medicines, which will include a number of these medicines that your son should avoid.

Tagamet works by decreasing the production of acid digestive juice and it is certainly helpful and an important medicine in many cases. It may well be useful for your son. He should discuss it with his doctor. It's less effective in patients who have

bleeding and it certainly won't stop an acute hemorrhage. Recurrences of the ulcer can occur if the medicine is stopped entirely, although there are some reports that if it's continued at lower doses this may help prevent recurrences of ulcers.

In the final analysis, in addition to medicine, people need to do things to help adjust their life. Not drinking and not smoking are steps in the right direction.

Happily, there seems to be a decrease in the frequency of ulcers. For a while about three out of five men would develop an ulcer. We don't know why the rate has decreased, but it may be from a decrease in smoking in men and perhaps people are learning to live with less stress. I hope so.

Mild Flu Outbreaks Seen For Winter

COLLEGE STATION (UPI) — The world is overdue for a new type of influenza more virulent than anything in recent times, a medical researcher reports, but adds that flu outbreaks this winter should be mild.

Dr. John Quarles of the Texas A&M University College of Medicine said flu outbreaks this winter should be of the common Hong Kong and Russian varieties.

But Quarles said the A-virus strains of flu usually evolve into a worse form every three to five years.



Slight Increase Reported In Black Officials

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The number of black elected officials in the United States rose by 2 percent last year smallest increase of the decade, the Joint Center for Political Studies said re-

The increase, recorded between July 1978 and July 1979, included the election of 23 officials in the U.S. Virgin Islands, which had previously been excluded

from the survey. Not counting the Virgin Islands, the gain would have been 81 - or only 1.9

The survey showed that there are 4,-607 black elected officials in 43 states,

the District of Columbia and the Virgin Louisiana leads all states with 334

blacks holding elected office. Mississippi is second with 327 and Illinois third with Idaho, Montana, North Dakota,

South Dakota, Utah, Vermont and Wyoming have no blacks in public office.

Despite an increase of 314 percent in the number of blacks elected since the survey was begun in 1970, black officials still represent less than 1.0 percent of America's 490,265 elected officials.

Blacks, with 11 percent of the U.S. population, have only 18 black elected officials for each 100,000 people.

The center said one reason for the smaller increase may be political and economic barriers that make it difficult for blacks to register to vote and run for public office.

It also suggested that blacks are "discouraged by the national disenchantment with politicians.

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
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

Lo and behold, there appeared a story by my editor-to-be, Norval Pollard, and it featured an athlete named James Hadnot.

Hmmm. Who is this guy Hadnot, I wondered to myself with little sense of anticipation, and resisted the assault of the half-eaten turkey contraption long enough to bury my fork in a mass of too-sweet banana cream pie

He must be a linebacker or team captain. That's it, I figured, as I surveyed the photo of Hadnot muscling what looked like 10,000 pounds of raw metal above his strained brow.

Or else he missed all of 1978 with an injury and this story must detail his rehabilitation, the countless hours needed to repair damaged athletic depart-

It took four paragraphs before I was bludgeoned by the news of my error. This guy Hadnot is an All-American? The top ground-gainer in the Southwest Conference a year ago? Collector of over 1,300 yards rushing after his conversion from tight end to fullback two weeks prior to the season-opener? Probably the nation's finest collegiate power back?

Hold on. Time out. Let's back track, I thought. There must be some mistake. Who's kidding whom? James Hadnot ... gained over 1,300 yards last year? He must have done so for the Texas Tech junior varsity. I'd never heard

Worse yet, I spent last football season in Springfield, Mo., right on the fringe of SWC territory. How did the name and exploits escape me?

Why, I am a storehouse of vital and, in some cases, not-so-vital informa

Ask me to name the major and minor characters of John Updike's novels and (the true test) short stories. I'm prepared.

Quiz me on the names and fates of "Our Gang" players. I know my stuff. Let's discuss the authors and themes of "Thus Spake Zarathustra," "The World As Will and Idea." and "Myth of Sisyphus." (Yes. I. too, have a middle

But James Hadnot? It didn't seem possible. Alias King Kong? I know my share of film history; Kong lugs around Fay Wray, not a football.

It occurred to me that nine hours of almost continuous driving had numbed my brain. I began to shake my head to clear it of Hadnot (and the

memory of the insidious turkey sandwich).

I struggled to maintain my equilibrium, my neutrality.

Common sense prevailed. I decided that this Hadnot must not be a football player at all. He's probably one of Buddy Holly's original Crickets or a Texas Tech security cop.

I don't like to be teased. I know my business. I'll be happy to recite the capitals of each of the 50 states, or the starting lineup for every University of Wisconsin basketball team since 1967.

I'm on top of the news, be it sports, entertainment, politics (I defy you to distinguish between the latter two) or the grand opening of a brand new area

Hah. But now I've had three months in which to adapt to the scenario. Fair is fair. Give me another chance

Who? Gerald Myers, you ask? Sure, now there's a name I recognize. He tends bar at Cold Water Country.







Avalanche-Journal Sports Staff Curtis Dean caught his own pass. The Chaparrals forced Tarleton into a third-and-40 situation and Tarleton made it ... They watched as Trinity stopped the clock twice in the final minute to run up the score to 35-8...

Coach Jerry Don Sanders watched as his troops forced a punt only to see the ball dribble back to the punter, who picked it up and ran for a first down...He even came to work one day to find about half a dozen game jerseys stolen.

It has been that kind of year for Lubbock Christian College as it set out to jump into the world of college

And the effort produced more times for tears than

Sanders, who stepped back into the coaching business after serving as a church educational director and proceeded to get an education. He was starting from the very beginning when he arrived on campus last spring. He had no equipment, no players, no playing field, no assistants, no schedule.

But he stepped in, started trying to round up players and and held a month's spring training — without pads. And the work was under way. But, when fall arrived the challenges surfaced again.

He was competing in a league without scholarships, but he was handicapped by having to play without expe-

rience. Sometimes that was as important as grants. But when the season wound up last Saturday with a loss to Tarleton, the Chaparrals had won but once — against a team from Monterrey, Mexico. Only once against Panhandle State - did the Chaparrals score more than one touchdown against a U.S. team, and the final record was one win, eight defeats. The point differential was 336-81.

Several times during the year, Sanders indicated he generally was pleased with his team, its effort and its play against older, more experienced teams.

Sanders sought a competitive team. Realizing the record could not be good, late in the year, against Trinity and against Panhandle, the Chaparrals reached this

collegiate Athletic Association - and Sul Ross were basically young teams. Tarleton, for instance, had 13 seniors on the roster, another 11 juniors.

Around the league, McMurry had 14 seniors, Austin College 13, Trinity 8 and Sul Ross 4.

All the other schools in the non-scholarship league have been playing football for many years, and this breeds tradition and alumni in the coaching profession who can be called on for recruiting needs.

Sanders was called upon to try to recruit for a school which had no background for football, no players and no facilities to showcase

Yet, as he looked back, Sanders was not displeased or despondent.

"I think this year has been a big asset for the school. It has brought unity to our student body, and I have seen our players mature.

"We know we're not overloaded with talent, but the players have given all they had. Now, we have to go out and try to recruit some more."

Sanders will have a nucleus of about 50 players for next season.

And before Sanders goes about trying to meet coaches and prospective athletes, it will be to his advantage if LCC nails down a definite spot to play its games. The back-and-forth procedure of using Lowrey Field, Coronado High School Stadium and pitifully small Stephens Field, on the LCC campus created a feeling of indecibasis of choosing personnel.

This year, Sanders had to go with what reported last fall. Now, he will be able to recruit and pick and choose a bit more, between this year's holdovers and recruiting prospects. Since he has no scholarships, Sanders must try to vie for players with college teams which give grants - and this is a definite challenge.

To the school's credits, its crowds were definitely larger than its foes', with the exception of Tarleton last Saturday which had 4,500 on hand for homecoming.

LCC, its attendance at 4,958 for the year, an average of 2,991, and going into the Tarleton game, the Chaparrals' roadtrips to Alpine (Sul Ross), Sherman (Austin College), and San Antonio (Trinity) had brought out only a total of 3,322 fans. The Chaps drew 5,923 for their opener. Then had 2,268 and 2,148 for their games at Coronado and 2,106 at Stephens Field before finishing the home slate before 2,513 homecoming fans at Lowrey.

If the school can continue to muster fan support, that will be a selling point, as well as help pay bills. And any athletic director knows football programs cost money.

But, the challenge remains to cut its point deficits (the season average was 37.3-9.0).

As a team weekly looking at growing deficits, the Chaparrals seldom found the breaks going in their direction. Sanders — and LCC officials — hope next year will bring changes in a stack of areas, from talent to pass

Johnson's 249 Yards Earn A-J AAAA

Johnson was able to hit the 1,000yard plateau last week by shaking for 249 yards in MHS' 26-0 win over Lubbock High. He entered the game with 923 yards and topped 1,000-yard mark early in the second quarter.

For that performance Johonson is this week's Avalanche-Journal's Class AAAA Player of the Week

'That was one of my goals (to gain a 1.000 yards)," said Johnson, following the game. "I knew I had a good chance at it, but I never thought it'd come this early.

Not only did Johnson become the first high schooler to top the 1,000-yard obstacle since Estacado's Kenzey Burrell in 1977, but the 249 yards was the fifth best on the Lubbock prep all-time list. Greg West of Estacado owns the city single-game rushing mark after running for 261 yards three seasons ago.

After learning he'd gained 249 yards Johnson was almost breathless: "You sure about that," he asked? "You really sure about that? I just can't believe it." Despite carring the ball 35 times, Johnson didn't even appear to be winded, much less out-and-out tuckered.

Johnson admitted after the game he really didn't feel like playing. It seems his right knee was giving him a little trouble, hindering his cutting ability. (He did manage to cut the Westerners into little pieces, though.)

"When I'd make a cut sometimes it'd feel like my knee wasn't going to stay under me," noted Johnson. "I wasn't able to cut that well at all when I went to the right. But the line blocked really well, they opened up some good holes...they did a good job.

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Reeves Not Type To Make Excuses

Executive Sports Editor Too bad they don't give a Southwest Conference award at the end of each football season for the classiest guy in the conference. My vote would surely go to Texas Tech quarterback Ron Reeves.

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Reeves, the Southwest Conference's newcomer in 1978 after he guided the Red Raiders to a 7-4 Cinderella season, hasn't received the same kind of reception in his hometown of Lubbock this

You see, Reeves and Tech haven't had a Cinderella season after seven games in 1979. The Red Raiders are currently 3-3-1, not bad, but not what many fans expected.

Football fans expect improvement. If a team goes 7-4 one year, those fans naturally believe the same team will go 8-3 or 9-2 the following year. Sometimes, football fans just don't understand the

But Reeves, just 19 years old and a sophomore does. He won't make any excuses. He has too much class for that there's that word again.

"I know that a lot of fans feel bad because we haven't moved the football at times this year," the handsome Monterey graduate said Tuesday. "But no one in the stadium feels worse when we don't move the ball than our offensive unit. And believe me, I feel as bad as

Naturally, when a team is not moving, not scoring and not winning, the quarterback is always the first target of disillusioned fans. Reeves hasn't escaped

he's been called inconsistent, slow, a bad passer and a poor leader. One letter to Tech's daily newspaper, the University Daily, tagged him "No Wheels Ron Reeves." Nothing could be farther from

the truth What many people don't realize or haven't taken the time to find out, is Reeves has played a great deal of the season with intense pain. Many players couldn't function with the injuries Reeves came up with three weeks in a row. But Reeves functioned and won two of those three games.

Reeves had his thigh badly bruised in a 27-17 loss to Baylor, but played most of the game. He injured his shoulder in the Texas A&M game, an injury that is bound to affect a passer. The Red Raiders won the contest 21-20, thanks to Reeves' running ability and obvious leadership in the fourth quarter.

The following week Tech lost a 20-6 decision to Arkansas. In that contest, Reeves went down in the first half with a hip-pointer, a painful hurt. Three plays later, he was in the game and didn't

In Tech's 30-7 victory over Rice, Reeves was sore and stiff, yet he had his best running performance (84 yards) and best passing day (eight of 12 for 102 yards and two touchdowns).

Reeves didn't offer the information concerning his injuries, but his teammates know his body has been taken a beating and so do the Tech coaches.

Injuries have hurt Reeves physically, but he's shaken them off. He has also been hurt emotionally by some of the

"I've learned a lot this year about people," Reeves said. "Some people are behind you all the way when things are going good, but they'll turn in a hurry if you mess up.

"You can't help but think about the thinks people say, but you can't let it affect what you're trying to do. You could worry yourself sick

Although Reeves is not having the statistical year he did in 1978, Tech head coach Rex Dockery feels his starting signal caller is much improved from a year

"I think Ron is a better quarterback now than he was at the end of last season,"Dockery revealed. "Ron is a very intelligent quarterback and he has tremendous mental discipline. He's played hurt this season and he's performed well. I think he's run the option well the last three weeks and he's thrown the ball well the last three weeks.

"The thing that people forget is that Ron is only a sophomore. He's going to be around here for a few more years and when he leaves, he's going to have had a tremendous career.

Reeves has improved a great deal over the past three contests. He had 10 interceptions in his first four games, but has not thrown one since the Baylor game. During that same time, he has completed 23 of 42 passes ((55 percent) for 237 yards and three touchdowns. He has also rushed for over 80 yards in two of those games.

The 6-2, 210-pounder is feeling much better this week following Tech's week off and with the improved physical conAustin to face the tough Texas Longhorns. Reeves is looking forward to the

"I can hardly wait for Saturday," Reeves admitted. "I feel almost 100 percent this week and feel better throwing the ball than I had been. I am really looking forward to playing Texas. We

na attorney general probably will issue an opinion that Arieona State University's removal of head football coach Frank Kush did not comply with Board of Regent rules, the Arizona Republic said today in a story quoting informed

Attorney General Bob Corbin, asked for comment, said research is proceeding and a conclusion isn't due until later in the week

"The research process is still under way," Corbin said. "What was seen was a preliminary study, which may or may not reflect the final opinion.

Rep. Burton Barr, R-Phoenix, the House majority leader, had sought the opinion after Kush's removal by Athletic Director Fred Miller on Oct. 13. Miller cover-up of an incident in which the coach allegedly struck Kevin Rutledge. former ASU punter who is suing the school and Kush for \$1.1 million.

Kush denied striking Rutledge or attempting a cover-up.

Barr said he felt the regents' rules provide that any complaint damaging to a university faculty member must be resolved by filing charges with a university trial board. If the rules apply to Kush, the univer-

sity will have to bring new proceedures if it wants the coach out, Barr said, adding: "They're back to ground zero."

In a related development, the Pacific 10 Council scheduled a hearing for

zona State University football players.

"It's possible that the charges may be resolved and penalties, if any, handed out on Thursday," said Jim Muldoon, Pac-10 public relations director. "Or it may carry over until Friday.

Robert Knox, Arizona State faculty representative for athletics, requested the Pac-10 ruling on eligibiliy. An internal investigation revealed credits transferred from other schools that may not be acceptable a Arizona Stae, he said.

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Kuhn's Decision Leaves Baseball Fans Confused

Associated Press Sportswriter Willie Mays' dark eyes widened in that naive, little boy way of his and he said he didn't understand why he couldn't work for an Atlantic City resort hotel and still wear his New York Mets uniform.

'They say it's because the hotel has a gambling casino, he said. "That has nothing to do with me. I don't know

Besides, look at all the owners in baseball who have race horses. That's gambling, too. If you gamble, what difference does it make how you do it?"

anything about gambling.

Mays' question was being echoed all around the country today - by pinstriped executives having lunch at the athletic club, guys tossing a few beers in the neighborhood pub, kids, taxi drivers and housewives.

Why? Really, why? Commissioner Bowie Kuhn gave his explanation — a forthright dictum that fit nicely the straight-laced corset of baseball - but a majority of people were left confused.

After all, little old ladies fly out to Las Vegas to feed nickels into the slot machines. Secretaries enter office pools at Kentucky Derby time. Kids pitch pennies at a crack in the sidewalk. Churches hold bingo games and preachers are not averse to engaging in a two-buck Nassau on the golf course. Millions play the football cards.

Where does the sin of gambling actually lie? Can you be half pregnant? Kuhn says this is largely immaterial. The key factor, he

insists, is that the one thing baseball has going for it is integrity, which should never be jeopardized.

"The commissioner's main job," he says, "is to protect this integrity at all costs.'

Baseball, he reasons, must avoid not only evil but the appearance of evil. It must guard against the slightest intrusion - even if it's a tiny germ - that could ultimately contaminate the whole sport.

Gambling, in his view, is a dire threat. He always, he contends, has opposed legalized as well as illegal gambling and will combat it at every gate. Acceptability of baseball involvement in horse racing was deeply entrenched when he took office in 1969 and there's little he can do to change

He can only try to prevent the spread of the infection, which he did 10 years ago by persuading Charlie Finley of the A's and three Braves directors to divest themselves of stock in a company with casino holdings. The Willie Mays affair is the first such case since then.

You can't fault the commissioner's idealism. Baseball still is the great American pastime, a sport that has not sold its soul to the money changers and has remained within reach of the common man.

Nevertheless, it is ludicrous to believe baseball can be insulated from the rest of the imperfect outside world. It is populated by people of wide varieties. It isn't a Boy Scout troop. It is a big money enterprise with pimples and warts. It is grown up. It must face reality. Baseball can't fight the

treatment of Willie Mays' \$1 million-plus contract with the Park Plaza Hotel and the subsequent edict that the "Hey Say" legend must hang up his Mets suit.

The commissioner advised principals months ago that he held the position that - following precedent - it was against baseball's best interests for Willie to work for a ca-

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sino while in baseball employ. "I told Willie that he had done nothing wrong," Kuhn said. "I felt I must make my stand public lest something happen later that might taint both Willie and the game."

There was overreaction all around. Kuhn had hoped to handle the matter discreetly, but journalists and headline writers pounced on the story with vigor that it produced sensational headlines such as: "Mays Banned From Baseball.

Mays has been one of baseball's most talented and exemplary players. It is tragic for him to be made to look like another Shoeless Joe Jackson of the 1919 Black Sox scan-

Baltimore Ace Flanagan Cops Cy Young Award

gan picked up an effective changeup delivery, learned how to deal with the news media and wound up as the American League's Cy Young Award winner for the 1979 season.

The 27-year-old left-hander, who posted a 23-9 record for Baltimore's league champions, was a runaway winner in the balloting conducted by the Baseball Writers Association of Ameri-

Flanagan received 26 of 28 first-place votes, with New York Yankees pitchers Tommy John and Ron Guidry, the 1978 winner, sharing the other two.

"I'll always look at the award as a team thing," said Flanagan, the fifth Orioles' pitcher in 11 years years to win or share the prestigious award.

Maybe I was the best pitcher, Flanagan said while noting the Orioles won 108 games in regular and postseason play, "but I was also on the best

Flanagan, a native of Manchester, N.H., who was Baltimore's seventh choice in the June, 1973 draft, credited teammate Scott McGregor with turning his season around by teaching him a changeup.

"It came natural from the first time he showed me how to throw it," Flanagan said. "In the first half of the season, if I didn't have a good curveball, I got beat. But after I learned the changeup and threw my slider more, I became a four-pitch pitcher. The change set up my whole game plan and put me over the

From July 9 on, Flanagan won 13 of his last 16 regular season decisions, turning in a 2.23 earned run average over 18 starts. He finished fourth in the AL with a 3.08 ERA

In addition to leading the major leagues in victories, he shared the league lead with five shutouts, was second with 38 starts, and third with 190 strikeouts and 265 2/3 innings pitched.

As the season neared an end and Flanagan was deluged with questions about the Cy Young Award, he sought advice from teammate Jim Palmer, a Cy Young winner in 1973-75-76

"I was afraid to talk about it because I thought I'd jinx myself," Flanagan said. "I didn't even want to say anything to Palmer, so I just hinted around about what procedure to follow. He told me not to worry. "Jimmy leads by example. I've had

good pitching coaches in George Bamberger and Ray Miller, and the experience of Palmer on the field.


Flanagan also came under the calming influence of his father, Edward Flanagan, a former right-hander in the Boston Red Sox organization.


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

NEW YORK (AP) — Joseph Cooper, ciate too. I told him I was in sales with a 52-year-old marshmallow salesman from Illinois, had kept quiet for a week. He said he didn't want the man, whom he later accused of sucker-punching him,

Hostages Freed By Gunman

ARLINGTON (UPI) — A marked gusuman took five persons hostage — including a bank president and chairman of its board — but released them unharmed today while escaping with an undetermined amount of money from the vault of the Arlington Bank of Commerce, a bank spokesman reported.

William P. Dunaway, senior vice-president of the bank, said the saga began at 8 p.m. Tuesday when "an unidentified black male" entered the Arlington residence of Danny R. Smith, president of the bank.

"Mr. Smith and his family were held

"Mr. Smith and his family were held hostage by the subject until this morn-

ing," said Dunaway.

The bank's chairman of the board, H. Richard Poynter, was also taken hostage today when he arrived at Smith's home

"Mr. Smith was released while his family and Mr. Poynter were kept hostage for the purpose of going to the bank to obtain funds demanded by the subject," said Dunaway. When Mr. Smith returned to his res-

idence he was forced to leave his residence with the subject. Mr. Smith's family and Mr. Poynter were left unharmed Mr. Smith was subsequently released unharmed," Dunaway said in his

Bank authorities said they did not know how much money was taken by the suspect, who sped away in a brown 1977 Ford Grenada, according to author-

The FBI and Arlington police were involved in the investigation and attempt to arrest the suspect.

Extra Security Given In Trial

BROWNSVILLE (AP) - Threats of violence prompted unusual security measures for jury selection in the attempted murder trial of a Pasadena physician and another man.

Police sharpshooters marched along the roof of the courthouse and State District Judge Darrell Hester restricted access to the courtroom as the case against Dr. Archie Burkhalter and Scott David Minnick got under way

The two are accused of conspiring to arrange the murder of John Hensley at South Padre Island last February. Hensley survived a rifle attack but the wound blinded him.

At the time of the shooting, Hensley was scheduled to testify against Burkhalter in a kidnapping case. Burkhalter allegedly had abducted his former wife and taken her to Houston. The woman is currently married to Hensley.

Another defendant in the attempted capital murder case, Minnick's uncle S.J. Wilburn, has been convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment for shooting Hensley.

Burkhalter is accused of hiring Minnick and Wilburn to kill Hensley. Shortly after the shooting, Minnick

was arrested while driving a speciallyoutfitted Cadillac registered to a hospital owned by Burkhalter. The car's back seat had been re-

moved. Plush carpeting and cushions lined the trunk, according to testimony at Wilburn's trial. The trunk had two "gun ports" which allowed someone to lie prone and shoot from the trunk.


















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Firm Finds Strong Competition Between Pay, Commercial

By PETER J. BOYER

ILL HINDS GOING

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LOS ANGELES (AP) - The A.C. lielsen Co., whose famous numbers figare so largely in the tube-watching opions of a nation, has entered the pay-TV market. I wondered why.

The purpose of the Nielsen ratings, as I had understood it, was to determine now many people watched a certain show on commercial television, the numbers being used to set advertising

Pay television, as I had understood it, featured uncut and uncensored programs without commercials (with that latter aspect being pay-TV's brightest feature). Since ratings are used to set advertising rates, and since there is no advertising on the major pay-TV services, then what is the need for ratings on pay-

Dave Harkness, Nielsen's marketing manager, has many reasons. I figured he might. Advertising agencies, pay-TV companies, ABC, NBC and CBS, he says, all bought Nielsen's first report on pay-

Harkness says that pay-TV networks, such as Home Box Office, want the report to determine which of their programs were best-liked, and for schedul-

Advertising agencies, he said, wanted the Nielsen report to see how extensively pay-TV has diminished the clout of the biggest national advertising medium, commercial TV. The networks, he said, were interested for the same reasons

Yet, I can't think of Nielsen ratings without thinking of commercials, even though Home Box Office, Showtime and other pay-TV services insist they are not even thinking about selling advertis-

'We are very seriously committed to not having commercials," says HBO's Robin Ahrold. He says that HBO has its own expert research staff, and that the company bought the Nielsen report solely to confirm the findings of the HBO re-

Still, it's hard to imagine those Nielsen numbers just sitting around on a research desk, generating no money. The Nielsen pay-TV report, compiled last February and released in the late-summer, showed that pay-TV was competing strongly with the commercial networks. was as close in the ratings to NBC as NBC was to the leader, ABC. The ratings also showed that television sets were used more in homes with pay-

This suggests commercials. Ron Kaatz, of the J. Walter Thompson advertising firm, agrees. His agency was among the firms that bought the Nielsen pay-TV report, because pay-TV is "definitely seen as a potential advertising me-

But what of the promises that there will never be ads on pay-TV?

"They say that now because that's how they got started (featuring pro-grams without commercial interrup-tion)," Kaatz responds. "But I'll bet you that you'll see commercials on pay-TV."

If so, uncut, uncensored programming will be the only major feature sepget into the game?
And if advertising

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Television May Cultivate 'Sexist Orientations'

NEW YORK (AP) - Television has a tendency to spotlight white males and viewers may be cultivating a "sexist orientation," according to a study of television drama over the past decade.

In the world of television, the white man is king, women are cast in traditional roles and children and old people are "grossly under-represented," says the study, "Women and Minorities in Television Drama, 1969-1978. The study was prepared at the Uni-

versity of Pennsylvania's Annenberg School of Communications by Dr. George Gerbner, dean of the school, and Dr. Nancy Signorielli, a research coordi-

The report traced women and minorities in 1,365 network dramas over 10 years and studied 16,888 characters. It did not cite individual programs.

According to the report, men out-

numbered women three to one; 68 percent of all prime-time characters were white males in 1969, and 62 percent were white males nearly 10 years later; children and the elderly are "grossly under-represented, with more than half the prime time characters are between ages 25 and 45," and the gains blacks and Hispanics made in the mid-1970s have not been sustained.

According to the report, "television viewing seems to cultivate a cerain level of sexist orientation.

"There is a positive relationship between television viewing and responding that women should stay at home, that a woman should not work if her husband can support her, that men are better suited emotionally for politics, and that people would not vote for a qualified woman nominated for president by their party," the report concluded.

When Betty Jenkins escorts her class to a small Army Quonset hut with thickscreened windows behind the school, students in nearby classrooms jeer, "Hey jailbirds."

As soon as the last student is inside, the door is shut. Anyone contemplating Larry Ivey, Bertie school superintendbreaks, snoozing in class or an early out can forget it.

Other than a brief lunch break in an otherwise empty cafeteria and perhaps a chaperoned trip to the bathroom, the 'jailbirds' remain confined from 8:30 a.m. until school lets out at 3 p.m.


"Jailer" Jenkins is watching over Bertie Junior High's problem students. Most have been caught more than once cutting class or smoking.

After consultation with parents, who are allowed to choose between the hut and suspension, students are sent for a minimum three-day stay in her "Alternate Adjustment Lab," where they must complete homework assignments sent by teachers each day. Through good conduct and participation in group projects, they earn points that assure their re-

'I've been called a jailer," said Mrs. Jenkins, a former home economics teacher. "But it doesn't bother me. No, I don't think it does. I'm more concerned about my students."




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
