WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter today decried the 'mob violence" and "international terrorism" of the holding of American hostages in Iran, and said nations must honor the 'integrity of diplomatic immunity."

"The harming of innocent people is condemned by every law of mankind and God," the president told six foreign ambassadors who had just presented their diplomatic credentials in Carter's White House Oval Office.

The president said he was "determined to work as peacefully as possible to achieve the release of the hostages as early as

we possibly can.

He was expected to insist anew that the United States will not yield to blackmail in gaining the release of the 49 Americans held captive at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran since Nov. 4.

A White House spokesman said that in a campaign to arouse public displays of support for the hostages, the president is urging that church bells be rung daily at noon until the American captives are released. Carter also is urging Americans to write to the Iranian mission to the United Nations demanding that the captives be

freed. The White House said both moves were being encouraged to demonstrate to Iran's revolutionary leaders that American public opinion supports Carter's handling of the crisis. Carter said Tuesday that the honor of America is at stake in

the embassy seizure, and said the hostages have been threatened at gunpoint and forced to make statements in which they

Speaking to a group of Democrats working for his re-election, he said, "this is a reprehensible thing, a disgrace to every person who believes in civilization and decency.

"I will protect the honor of our country and will not under any circumstances yield to blackmail," Carter said. His remarks were recorded by radio station WGIR in Manchester,

The official said Carter hoped to dispel that impression at his news conference.

The president chose his most stately setting, the East Room of the White House, and set the time to get the largest possible audience. Ordinarily, Carter holds news conferences in the afternoon in an auditorium of the Executive Office Building.

The State Department meanwhile said dependents and non-essential personnel at U.S. embassies in 11 Islamic nations were being allowed to leave at government expense. And department spokesman Hodding Carter said that as a "prudent and preeautionary step," Americans should avoid traveling to those coun-

The 11 countries are Libya, North Yemen, Qatar, Syria, Lebanon, Iraq, Bangladesh, Kuwait, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Oman.

U.S. officials said Tuesday it is possible some useful discus-sions could take place this weekend if Iran's foreign minister, Abolhassan Bani Sadr, shows up for the U.N. debate on the embassy siege.

"If we see him walk through the door in New York, it will be more hopeful than if we do not see him walk through the door," State Department spokesman Carter said.

He said if Bani Sadr's presence has the "side effect of allowing some kind of contact between leading representatives of that government and ours, that might be useful under certain

That was something of a shift in the U.S. position, which had previously ruled out any negotiations unless Iran agreed to release the hostages unconditionally.

Iran's leaders initially demanded that the president return the shah for trial on charges of murder and plundering the national treasury. Bani Sadr has said subsequently it would "improve the climate" if the United States would agree in advance to allow some sort of international tribunal hear the revolutionaries' charges against the deposed ruler.

But while the administration seemed to be moving quietly toward private talks with Bani Sadr, the president himself appeared to be escalating the war of words between himself and

ry's worst air disasters. U.S. Navy search planes spotted the wreckage on the slopes of smoldering Mount Erebus, near the U.S. research station at McMurdo Sound, Antarctica, some 2,000 miles south of New Zealand.

"It looks as though it burned. No survivors have been sighted. They ... are ex-Officer Mike Hatcher of the U.S. Navy Support Group Headquarters in Christchurch, New Zealand.

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP) — 12 Americans, 24 Japanese, 7 Australi-An Air New Zealand DC-10 carrying 257 ans, 2 Britons and a Canadian. The rest were New Zealanders. They paid \$359 for what was supposed to be an 11-hour flight from Auckland to the coast of Antarctica and back.

The cause of the crash could not be determined immediately. The McDonnell Douglas DC-10 has had structural problems, including one that caused the Chicago last May that took 273 lives.

Air New Zealand said it understood the jetliner had completed its sightseeing run and was on its way back north to New Zealand when radio contact with the plane was lost at 2 p.m. (7 p.m. CST Tuesday). It was then still over Antarctica, about 30 or 40 miles from McMurdo.

The loss of radio contact was blamed on sunspot activity and did not cause immediate concern. But at 8 p.m. the airline announced the plane was an hour overdue for a refueling stop at Christchurch, on New Zealand's South Island.

The airline announced at 10 p.m. (3 a.m. CST) that the plane was lost. It said its fuel would have been used up half an hour before.

Officers Thwart KennedyAttack

WASHINGTON (UPI) - An "incoherent" woman with a knife entered Sen. Edward Kennedy's office today and scuffled with Secret Service agents guarding the presidential candidate. One agent was cut slightly before the woman was arrested.

The Massachusetts Democrat, whose two brothers were killed by assassins, was in his inner office at the time of the incident, which took place in an outer reception area.

The woman was arrested by Capitol Police shortly after the incident at 9 a.m. CST. The agent was cut slightly on the hand in the scuffle. 'She didn't get anywhere near the

senator," said Melody Miller, a spokeswoman for the Kennedy campaign. "We have no idea what she wanted to see the 'She was loud when she walked in the

door. No one could understand what she was saying. She was incoherent and the agent tried to take care of the situation. The Secret Service asked her to leave," said Miss Miller.

"It was then she pulled the knife," which Capitol Police Inspector Gilbert Abernathy described as a 6-inch hunting knife.

The agent, a regular member of the Kennedy protection detail -one is assigned to each presidential candidate was not immediately identified.

The Secret Service described the injury to the agent as "a nick on the hand."

Kennedy only recently decided to run for the Democratic nomination against President Carter in 1980. He made the decision after getting the go-ahead from his family, who feared for his life because of the fate of his two brothers.

President John Kennedy was killed by an assassin's bullets in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1962, and Robert Kennedy died on June 6, 1968, one day after he was shot in Los Angeles. Robert Kennedy was seeking the Democratic presidential nomination at the time.

The senator was due to leave on an extended campaign trip later today. Kennedy's offices are located on the second floor of the Dirksen Office Build-

ing, near the Capitol. A Secret Service spokesman said the quick arrest of the woman demonstrated the effectiveness of their protection. He said the woman was stopped at "the perimeter of our protection.

The Secret Service protects individuals under the theory of "rings of protection," with the thinnest protection at the outer edge and the thickest cluster near the individual.

The woman was stopped at the outermost line of defense, the spokesman

anything," said Mrs. Mikulich. "She just gave a vell.

FACES CHARGES HERE

Woman Hopes For New Life

A Lubbock woman, presently on six months probation and now facing two more criminal charges, once thought that at this stage of her life, "I would be a nurse and be married to some wonderful man and have three children and a

perfect life

'That was my fantasy." But as the attractive 27-year-old, who does not want to be identified, knows,

things don't always turn out the way you want them to. After leaving a successful husband and a young son in California 21/2 years ago to be with an old high school sweetheart in Lubbock, she has been convicted of unlawful carrying of a weapon and faces charges of possession of a controlled substance and car theft.

The slender brunette said she was briefly addicted to narcotics, but has escaped their hold. In a recent interview, she readily admitted running among the criminal element in Lubbock.

"I know people who have killed people.

The woman does not blame bad luck or past hardships for her present predicament. "I was doing something illegal - we all were. And there's a cause and effect. We got busted."

She's convincing when she says she wants to change. To leave Lubbock, go back to school in California and learn to be a medical assistant. And possibly get back with her husband and son. Those are the things she hopes to accomplish after making restitution for the wrongs she has committed in the past. And, with the possible exception of

her family and old friends, she has hurt no one but herself. In her most recent scrapes with the law, she and a friend were arrested in July when four Lubbock policemen rushed through the door of their small

apartment and found a quantity of amphetamines - better known as "speed." Both had injected themselves with the illegal drug when they were surprised by the officers armed with a search warrant. "All I know is that they kicked the door in and there I was; it was over," she said.

The woman's only problem before the officers broke in was finding a vein to place the needle. "He was a lot higher than I was," she said of her companion. 'I was glad because I didn't want to go to jail high. I don't care if they (police) know about it. It's just hard to handle. It intensifies everything." She said that even straight it's no joy getting arrested. "It's awful, It's the

worst experience I ever had in my life. You become unhuman, you become an Like a Bonnie and Clyde episode, the woman did not start running afoul of the law until she joined an old boyfriend, whom she first met in a ninth grade math class. He recently was jailed after being convicted of a criminal offense.

Her social life began to fill with criminal types and fugitives from justice. "There were people in the upper society and all the way down. We knew the pimps and the whores and the dealers — there was the whole group. Asked if they were dangerous, she answered, "All criminals are dangerous if

She adds, "Most people I know that are doing drugs and illegal things,

Council Warns Of Cancer Risk From Long-Time Estrogen Use

trogen as a fountain of youth for women has been greatly overstated, the American Council on Science and Health said in a report that also warned of the risks of uterine cancer among longterm users.

The report, released this week, stated flatly, "The drug cannot slow the aging process or restore youth, vitality, or sensuality" when used during or after men-

The Council also added its voice to those in the scientific community warning that uterine cancer is a risk with

LUBBOCK AVALANCHE-JOURNAL (USP\$ 311-380)

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'Epidemiological studies demonstrate that women who use estrogens on a long-term basis - five years or more - increase their risk of developing cancer of the uterus by up to 14-fold," said ASCH Executive Director D. Elizabeth

The report, "Postmenopausal Estrogen Therapy," reviews studies showing risks and benefits of estrogen replacement therapy. Dr. Whelan, an epidemiologist, said evidence is that longterm use should be more strictly limit-

"There is, however, no conclusive evidence to suggest that a woman's chances of developing cancer of the uterus is increased by using estrogens for a short period, that is, any length of time up to two years," she said.

The report also made the folloing

-There is no scientific evidence to justify use of estrogen therapy for menopausal psychological and emotional problems.

-The woman must carefully assess the severity of her true menopausal symptoms and understand that estrogen therapy cannot provide the many 'youth-oriented and psychological benefits that it was presumed to have given for so many years.

-Women should not take estrogen therapy if they have irregular bleeding; cancer of the uterus, breast or kidney; liver disease; a history of heart disease, gall bladder disease or stroke; or a history of heavy smoking.

-Long-term users of estrogen therapy for menopause also have an increased rate of gallstones, require more gallbladder surgery, incur an increased risk of hypertension, and experience abnormal changes in blood-clotting.

The Council report is the most comprehensive of recent ones to caution against long-term use of estrogen, which has been available for 45 years as a therapy and touted by some doctors and women's magazines as a way to retard

In 1975, the peak year of use, doctors had eight million women on estrogen therapy, but use dropped after a report linking the drug with greater incidence of uterine cancer.

Of almost 40 million American women in the postmenopausal stage, about two million are now using estrogen therapy, the report said.

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

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

playing according to the usual script in such situations. Assassination of their strongman has not been followed by civil war, seizure of power by a vengeful opposition or a military takeover.

Instead, the country is moving toward something it has had little experience with to date, i.e., democratic rule, in a more or less cooperative effort of all South Korea's major power centers.

Opposition politicians and the inheritors of the late Park Chung Hee's ruling party have agreed on a basic plan for revising a constitution that Park had tailor-made to his own authoritarian specifications and choosing a new government in national elections next year.

BOTH POLITICAL sides are on record publicly as opposing the strongarm system under which Park held unquestioned power for 18 years.

And in this they are reported to be supported where it really counts-in the armed forces

These developments come as particularly welcome news to the United States, which almost accidently became deeply involved in Korean affairs.

A backwater of the Japanese Empire little known to the outside world, Korea could

SOUTH KOREANS certainly are not have been swiftly overrun by Soviet land forces upon Japan's sudden collapse.

A token American contingent hastily moved into the southern provinces to effect the partition agreement.

Forty years, one war and numerous political crises later, the Korean connection is among the most complex the United States has developed in the post-World War II

SOME 38,000 American troops remain as a deterrent to a new Communist invasion. U.S. investment in the Korean economy comes to more than \$300 million.

The influence is mutual, with Korea increasingly a factor in the American domestic economy, culture and politics. So while Democracy may be beginning to bloom in Ko-

rea, it remains an exceedingly fragile flower. There will be many opportunities for disaster before elections actually are held and a popular government takes power. But at the moment the future looks promising.



Vance Mum On Matters Of State



WASHINGTON-Secretary Cyrus Vance was holding a State Department news conference where the following dialogue ensued:

Question: "...On the situation of the Soviet brigade, you held out the possibility (of) some change in the nature of that brigade... Have you detected any?"

Vance: "I do not want to get into intelligence matters in an open session. Question: "Can you go to this extent-Is it a

pleasant or an unpleasant development from the U.S. viewpoint?"

Vance: "It is not unpleasant, (but) I don't want you to leap to any optimistic conclusions...I just say the factors have changed, and that it is not unpleasant.

THIS EXAMPLE IS sufficiently typical of the artful dodging double-talk which even the most forthright Carter administration spokesman dishes out. If correspondents are to learn anything worth passing along to the public, they must sometimes go elsewhere than the State Department for interpretation of the Delphian riddles.

For instance, earlier at this same news conference, the upright Secretary of State mentioned "the construction of Cienfuegos," a Cuban port not far across saltwater from the Key West Naval Base, just reactivated as an All Service invasion

Vance was rattling on about a new pier being that "it is for anything other than Soviet use. Had the Secretary revealed something not intended to be spoken?

EVIDENTLY SO, FOR when an alert reporter interjected, "You said Soviet use?" Vance corrected himself, "Cuban use...Cuban use."

But we are aware that Soviet submarines have been in and out of Cuban ports, and the Cuban military role as a Soviet surrogate is an acknowledged fact. I got my fuller explanation from Dr. Mose L. Harvey, 69, a long-time Soviet analyst presently associated in Washington with the Advanced International Studies Institute

In a current monograph on the subjects touched by Vance, Dr. Harvey made these points:

(1) Cuba not only sends its foreign legions to do Soviet work in Africa, but since July, 1972, Castroland has been a de facto member of the Warsaw Pact, the all-communist alliance of East Europe in confrontation of NATO. It is not a message that the State Department willingly di-

(2) Cienfuegos harbor, just south of Havana, is getting new piers for what the Secretary called "Cuban use." This is true enough since the USSR is mounting a program to make its island satellite a submarine power.

(3) Communist Cuba, now definitely within the Soviet Socialist Empire, could not revolt any more successfully than did Hungary and Czecho-



Do Homework Carefully On Vocational Schools



(First Of Two Columns)

WASHINGTON-You see them advertised on TV, in the newspapers, on billboards, even on matchbook covers-private vocational schools, also known as proprietary schools.

Make no mistake about it, these schools are in the education business. They sell job training programs to the ever-mounting number of youngsters and adults who feel they must have practical training to prepare them more adequately to enter or re-enter today's tight employment market.

More than 10,000 vocational, trade and correspondence schools across the country offer training in subjects ranging from computer technology and cosmetology to secretarial skills.

COSTS MAY RANGE from as low as a few hundred dollars a semester to as high as \$9,000 a year (far above the tuition-fees charges of many of our most prestigious colleges and universities).

These schools operate to make a profit-and are supported entirely by student tuition and But, there are widespread abuses and many pit-

falls in the vocational education field, all consumer protection studies have emphasized repeatedly. Thus, if you or your child want to apply to a proprietary school, it is essential that you do your homework first! To illustrate the top abuses: (1) Exaggerated or misleading claims that jobs

are plentiful in a school's training field prevail among many vocational schools, reports the Federal Trade Commission.

SOME SCHOOLS ADVERTISE with such blatant generalizations-as "Computer technicians are in big demand,"-but they may fail to add important details such as "employers prefer applicants with college degrees and two years working experience.

(2) Many of the more aggressive vocational schools have made a recruiting racket out of the federal financial aid programs, audits by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare

They lure students into their schools with the promise of financial aid. The students get the aid -but they may not get the adequate training promised and they certainly are not assured the jobs they expect when they finish.

(3) MANY VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS have questionable refund policies, consumer protection

After only two or three sessions, students dissatisfied with the training they are getting often cannot get even a partial refund.

Let this be abundantly clear! Not all proprietary schools use these tactics. Many reputable schools have been turning out successful gradu-

(4) Before you even start to select a school,

make sure you can answer this vital question: What do I want out of this program? (5) If you decide that vocational training is

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Nicaraguan Policy Criticized

AUSTIN (AP) - A former ambassador to Nicaragua says the Carter administration left violence as the only avenue open to opponents of the Somoza regime for changing the government.

Mauricio Solaun, ambassador from July 1977 to April 1979, said this week the administration should have taken stronger measures than it did to pressure Anastasio Somoza to resign as pres-

Sandinista guerrillas defeated Somoza's troops in July 1979, and Somoza fled the country

"Our policy was a non-viable policy because we would alienate both the government and the opposition. It was a nowin policy," said Solaun, now a sociology professor at the University of Illinois.

He spoke at the University of Texas. Solaun said the Carter administration first attempted neutrality in the struggle between Somoza and his opponents, which ranged from businessmen and the Roman Catholic hierarchy to "Marxist-

Leninist groups. As violence increased in 1978, the administration encouraged mediation under the auspices of the Organization of

American States, he said. When Somoza refused to go along with a nationwide election proposed by the mediators, the administration then

chose to apply pressures against him. But the sanctions consisted only of suspending \$12 million in loans, withdrawal of a four-man military mission and a threat to pull out the U.S. ambassador, Solaun said.

The sanctions, he said, "simply evidenced that we had no policy at all.

With the failure of United States efforts, it was clear to the Nicaraguans that if they were going to change governments, it would have to be through violence," he said.

Solaun said the Carter administration did a lot of "preaching" but was "unwilling to intervene and give the coup de grace to this dictator.

We were not telling the people to go and throw bombs or telling Somoza to kill the demonstrators. We were saying, Find a peaceful solution.' ... But if you encourage change in the absence of peaceful avenues for change, you are en-

couraging violence.

He said he resigned as ambassador because he saw the coming violence and "I was a diplomat, not a military com-

mander." Besides, he said, the Somoza government wanted him to leave be-cause of his role in U.S. policy up to that




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
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

For decades the residents of the tiny Outer Banks village have used the Atlantic Ocean shore as their road north to Norfolk, Va., the nearest place for work and supplies.

The 20-mile drive passes in just four minutes when the tide is low and the wide, wet sands are packed hard, they say. But when the tide rushes in, one must plow through the looser sands near the dunes, doubling the excursion time and making travel in anything but a jeep or truck foolhardy.

Driving with an eye on the tide chart is commonplace in this village of 120 on the 23-mile-long Currituck Banks. It is one of the East Coast's most secluded spots, a 2,000-foot-wide strand with all the stark, fragile beauty for which North

private road snaking up from the south was paved a few years ago, but a guard blocks it at the start, turning away all but Corolla residents, their invited guests and the few people who have

Tough as it is for Corolla's residents to reach their home now, it might soon become even more difficult.

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

After surgery, a VA doctor ordered that a solution of the antibiotic neomycin be used to irrigate the wound.

About a month after his release from House Approves the hospital, Kubrick began to notice a loss of hearing and a growing ringing in

After reviewing VA hospital records, a Philadelphia ear specialist told Kubrick that neomycin can impair hearing and that its application probably caused his deafness. According to court documents, the specialist never said or implied that Kubrick's treatment had been negligent.

After applying unsuccessfully for increased disability payments because of his hearing loss, Kubrick was told in 1971 that the neomycin that caused his deafness should not have been administered. Kubrick sued the government in 1972 under the Federal Tort Claims Act, charging medical malpractice.

The government based its defense on the ground that Kubrick filed his suit too late - beyond the two-year limit imposed by the law.

The 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals had ruled that the time limit did not begin until Kubrick was told in 1971 about possible negligence, but today's decision reversed the circuit court's interpretation of the law.

Soviet Union Reduces 1980 Economic Goals

ment met today to approve reduced economic targets for next year after President Leonid Brezhnev reported that this year's grain harvest - the worst since 1975 - is 48 million tons short of the goal and oil output is off 10 million tons.

Because of the low harvest, Western specialists expect the Soviet government may buy all 25 million tons of corn and wheat the U.S. Department of Agriculture will allow to be sold to the Soviet Union in the 1979-80 fiscal year.

The scaled-down economic plan, which is expected to be routinely approved by the 1.500 members of the Parliament, or Supreme Soviet, calls for industrial output to rise by 4.5 percent in 1980 over this year's level.

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The growth target for this year had been 5.7 percent over 1978. But Soviet economists have estimated the growth actually achieved at about 4.2 percent.

Nikolai Baibakov, chief of the state economic planning organization, presented to parliament members a series of production targets for 1980, many of them lower than those envisaged in late 1975 when the Soviet Union announced its 1976-80 economic plan.

Baibakov said oil production is targeted at 606 million tons for next year, against an original goal of 620-640 million 13 per cent in per capita income.

The first quake struck 12 hours earlier and was followed by several other quakes throughout the day. The tremors struck near the site of a massive earthquake that killed 600 people two weeks ago.

Pars said the tremors cut a wide swath of damage across the rolling agricultural area of Khorassan province in northeastern Iran, around the cities of

A strong tremor hit the area in mid-November and killed an estimated 600 people in their sleep.

Estimates of the number of casualties in Tuesday's earthquake were still incomplete as rescue teams tried to reach remote villages, but at least 16 people were reported dead and 16 others in-

Schools in the stricken area were closed today and authorities warned residents to take precautions against new aftershocks. Pars said the underground irrigation canals in the area were destroyed or badly damaged.







Valton Donnell Lewis, who was photographed by a "Crime Eye" hidden camera during a September aggravated robbery of a convenience store, was sentenced to life in prison Tuesday afternoon by a Lubbock County jury.

Lewis' two-day trial was the first in which the hidden camera photographs were used. Jurors were able to study the pictures before deciding that the defendant took \$160 cash from a 7-Eleven Store Sept. 3 after threatening the store manager with a knife.

The 11-picture sequence shows Lewis. holding a knife, and a female companion standing near a cash register at the 802 Ave. Q store's counter.

Defense attorney George Thompson, however, denounced the prosecutors' use



of the photographs as "dangerously close

One of the things that is frightening to me is that it (the black-and-white picture spread) is dangerously close to Orw-

ellian in nature," Thompson said, referring to George Orwell's futuristic novel,

Pointing to the Crime Eye photos, Thompson told the 99th District Court jury that "in an attempt to tell you this man is guilty, (law enforcement officers and prosecutors) have almost tried to take the human element out of the court-

And Thompson also attempted to shift blame for the robbery to 7-Eleven owner Southland Corporation and store employees.

Southland Corp. is the real victim in this case if there is a victim," Thompson argued. "Southland Corp. made the choice to stay open all night, to provide no self-defense training, no training on dealing with customers to its employ-

Georgia Hospital May Be Closed

ATLANTA (AP) - Time and the Salk vaccine have not been kind to Warm Springs Hospital, and the state of Georgia is considering closing the facility where Franklin Roosevelt sought relief from crippling polio.

The springs themselves are capped, and the three pools where thousands of polio victims once bathed are cracked and empty.

Only 20 percent of the hospital still is in use, draining about \$1.5 million a year from the state budget, according to Tom Perdue, executive assistant to Gov. George Busbee.

The hospital and its surrounding 10,-000-acre complex in southwest Georgia are the subject of a special state task force study to decide what to do with the property, which was given to the state in 1974 by the Warm Springs Foundation.

Under an agreement signed by then-Gov. Jimmy Carter, the property must be operated as a hospital through 1984.

But the Georgia Office of Planning and Budget recommended to the task force Tuesday that the hospital and its 260 employees be "consolidated" with its companion rehabilitation center. The task force is to make its own recommendations to Busbee on Dec. 15.

Such a consolidation would have to be approved by the Warm Springs Founda-

by Brad Anderson Economy Enters Perilous Times

NEW YORK (AP) - With Ayotollah Ruhollah Khomeini seeking to turn East against West, with terrorism rising, and with poor nations sinking further into debt, these are perilous days for the world economy.

When you consider also that the world's industrial nations subsist on imports, not just of oil and gas but of various basic commodities such as bauxite, chrome and platinum, the peril is underscored.

No nation is self-sufficient. The United States is often said to be the nearest

thing to it, but "said" isn't always so. Americans need foreign good will for many other reasons also. Foreign markets represent an outlet for American goods, a source of support for the dollar an an opportunity for profitable invesments.

Since 1969, those foreign investments have risen from \$68 billion to more than \$165 billion, or four times the level of foreign direct investment in the United States.

Impressive as the figures are, they represent also the degree of U.S. vulnerability to foreign seizure. The United States can freeze foreign assets, but foreigners in the aggregate can freeze more

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While it is true that most American direct investments - direct in the sense that they represent ownership of facilities rather than stocks or bonds - are in friendly, stable nations, some of them

American banks also have lent billions of dollars abroad, with many of the

loans going to underdeveloped nations that are now being driven deeper into poverty by rising oil prices. Can they repay those debts?

The big banks assure us that the loans will be repaid, but the Bankers Magazine, not given to exaggeration, recently carried an article that suggests at least \$37.7 billion of those loans won't be

collected. What can the banks do? Very little, says the author, William J. Quirk, law professor at the University of South Carolina. It isn't easy to get money from a bankrupt country. "In fact, it is impossible," he says.

Terrorism presents a different problem, but one that leaves American companies just as defenseless. Business is a

primary target, according to a new Conference Board report.

Risks International, Inc., a consulting firm which monitors terrorism, reports that worldwide incidents have risen steadily from 572 in 1975 to 1,511 in 1978. And reports so far indicate 1979 will be still worse.

Between 1970 and 1978, says Risks, 55 percent of Americans kidnapped overseas were business executives. But kidnappings are only part of the story; assassinations, bombings and assaults make up the list.

So far, American companies have chosen to fight it out, but the toll has been tremendous. Companies have been forced to hire security forces, buy kid-

nap insurance, restrict employee mobility and secure their plants.

The Conference Board-Risk International report shows some firms also make hotel, airline and restaurant reservations under pseudonyms, that they remove company identification from vehicles and that they shred business documents when no longer needed.



stretched our income too far.' Susan and her husband Jeffrey don't want their real names used, but they are real people. They live in a relatively small Midwestern town and have two children. Both of them work in white

Together they earn more than \$45,000 a year. Together, they owe almost \$45,-000 in installment debt.

"We weren't actually being dunned, but we were getting all these letters in the mail all the time," Susan said. She read a newspaper article about non-profit credit counseling centers and decided to ask for help. "It was almost exactly a year ago, just before Christmas," she

Today, Susan and Jeffrey are on the road to recovery. It will take them more than three years. Each month, they set aside \$800 and give it to a counselor who divides it among the couple's creditors.

Jeffrey agreed: "It wouldn't have made any difference if we made \$45,000 or \$145,000 a year ... You can't take on the world."

The couple's troubles began when they were building a new house — a house that they should have been able to afford. "Nothing that was bid came out the way it was supposed to," Susan said. 'It was only supposed to cost \$70,000. It ended up costing us \$80,000."

Then came the lost scholarship. Another sister got into trouble with drugs and Susan and Jeffrey took on new loans to help pay the cost. Susan's mother died and her father couldn't support the six children left at home. "I don't want it to sound like I'm using other people as excuses," Susan said, but "we ended up supporting two or three families."

Creditors included "retailers and banks, the finance companies, the whole bit," said Jeffrey. "You'd run and do this, that and the other. We didn't stop to think about which way we should

Susan and Jeffrey never got turned down for credit. "People will assume that because you're doing what you're doing, you've got a good job, you should be able to handle it," Susan said.

Managing money at work was different from managing money at home, Susan said. "At work ... I know exactly what I can do and what I cannot do At home, there were family members constantly saying, 'Well, look, you've made it. It's up to you to help some of the others make it.

Often when a hearing person encounters a deaf person he never realizes it, according to Miss Harmon. "Many times the deaf hide their deafness and simply point to an item in a store or on a menu because it's easier," she said.

According to estimates, there are some 175 deaf persons - those who communicate mainly through sign language in Lubbock. Byrd Execution Delayed Again

BEAUMONT (AP) - Condemned killer Alton Byrd once again will miss his

date with the executioner. U.S. District Judge Robert Parker granted a stay of execution Tuesday pending a hearing that could come as early as next week. The judge said he could not set a specific date because of a heavy court docket.

Byrd would have become the first condemned prisoner to die by lethal injection if he had been forced to keep his date with death Friday

The stay marked the second time Byrd had been reprieved from a scheduled rendezvous with the executioner Last year. Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell granted a stay. However, the high court later rejected Byrd's request for a

new trial. Court-appointed defense attorney John Mitchell of San Augustine said Byrd's state court remedies were exhausted when the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals rejected a request for a stay of execution Monday.

In the federal appeal, Mitchell contends Byrd's constitutional rights were violated during the punishment phase of his trial when testimony was admitted from a state-hired psychiatrist who said Byrd would pose a continuing threat to



A Lubbock City Council decision on whether to rename Quirt Avenue in honor of Martin Luther King Jr. is expected Thursday.

The Human Relations Commission requested the street name change to honor the slain civil rights leader and indicate city responsiveness to the wishes of

the minority community. However, many others have been applying behind-the-scenes pressure on council members to convince them not to alter the street name

An informal poll of council members two weeks ago showed two members for the change, two against and one who re-

fused to give his position. Councilman Bill McAlister has said he would like the council to approve an alternative memorial to King, and that also is expected to be discussed at the 9:30

a.m. meeting in council chambers. The council also will be asked to set in motion the mechanics for the March 1 sale of \$6.45 million in general obligation bonds.

Anticipating legal challenges by city hall critic Jimmy Marshall, the council will be asked to authorize a district court suit to validate the bonds. That procedure was used successfully a year ago when \$9.5 million in bonds were validat-

Of the total \$6.45 million bond sale, more than \$5 million would be used for water projects, including initial work on the Justiceburg reservoir project and the construction of a 500-million-gallon storage and treatment facility for water from the Canadian River Municipal Water Au-

Bank, will ask the council to remove a for improvements and extensions to the portion of the median on University Avecity's sanitary sewer system and \$568,000 would be earmarked for street improveeastward onto 20th Street.

Voters approved a \$26.4 million bond issue in May 1977, but only \$11.2 million of that amount has been sold because of litigation.

Council members also are expected to discuss launching a tax-exempt mortgage bond program which would generate \$25 million for low-interest loans to low and moderate income home buyers.

Local lenders indicated their opposition to such a program at a meeting with the council in August, but council members decided to seek the lenders' views again in light of skyrocketing mortgage interest rates and the almost total lack of conventional money for home loans in

Additionally, the U.S. House is pondering restrictions on the popular bond programs because of the drain on the Treasury, and it is still uncertain what form those regulations will take or whether Lubbock would be permitted to start a tax-exempt bond program.

The council will be asked to approve a resolution which would authorize the start of acquisition of land for a halfblock wide park in Overton South near Carroll Thompson Junior High School.

Three parcels of land would be purchased this year with federal Community Development funds to begin the park land acquisition at a cost of \$54,500 if the council approves the resolution.

The entire cost of acquiring the land and developing the 2.5-acre park is ex-

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Record High Mortgage Rates Reflect Harder Times Ahead

housing costs rose last month at the steepest rate since 1947, many economists are saying record-high mortgage rates mean the worst is yet to come.

"If housing increases were high in October, the November increase will be whopping," said Commerce Department economist Theodore Torda.

And Robert Russell, director of President Carter's anti-inflation council, said mortgage rates will affect inflation with a "vengeance.

The Labor Department reported Tuesday that consumer prices rose 1 percent overall last month, fueled primarily by a 1.5 percent boost in housing costs.

By contrast, food prices were up a relatively modest 0.7 percent, fuel oil prices up 1.3 percent - compared to an average increase of 5 percent a month over the prior nine months - and gasoline increased 1.8 percent, the smallest rise since last December.

In a separate report, the Labor Department said the average price across the country for gasoline topped \$1 a gallon for the first time in October. The \$1.006 a gallon October figure compared to 99.8 cents in September.

Torda said last month's price survey does not reflect the unprecedented jump in interest rates that occurred after the Federal Reserve Board's Oct. 6 moves to tighten the supply of money and credit.

Steel Mill Shutdown Shakes Youngstown

Steel said it was cold hard economics. but the news of another mill shutdown was a blow to the heart of beleaguered Youngstown.

"We feel clobbered" said Bob Vasquez, union leader of the 3,500 workers who will lose their jobs when the company's Ohio and McDonald Works here are phased out.

In all, 13,000 U.S. Steel employees in 16 plants in eight states will be thrown out of work as part of the cutback announced Tuesday

But the cutback may be hardest on Youngstown, which was devastated two years ago when Youngstown Sheet & Tube closed its plant here and 4,000 workers were suddenly on the street.

Community groups tried unsucessfully to take over that plant and save the jobs. The economic ripple reached almost every business in the Mahoning Valley Social workers said the town might never recover.

The day of the Youngstown announcement in September 1977 became known as "Black Monday." Now there's a "Black Tuesday" to go with it.

In the other steel towns affected, there was bitterness. Bill Morris, mayor of Waukegan, Ill., said, "We think U.S. Steel milked our community and then

Postmaster General William F. Bolger announced a surplus of nearly \$470 million for fiscal 1979 Tuesday and said that means there will be no increase in postal rates until 1981.

'I can say with no exaggeration that the Postal Service today is in the vanguard of good government and that America enjoys the best postal service of any nation in the world," Bolger said.

"Our postage rates - which are the lowest of any industrialized nation - will remain unchanged for at least the next 13

The Postal Service has been predicting a surplus for fiscal 1979, which ended that a postal increase is unlikely before 1981. The last hike, from 13 cents to 15 cents for first-class mail, was in 1978. However, more red ink is expected in





WASHINGTON (UPI) - The basic decision to admit the deposed shah of Iran to the United States was Secretary of State Cyrus Vance's - a decision not particularly controversial or agonizing at the time it was made in early October.

The controversy came later, when it became clear the Iranian government had either lied to the American government or was too weak to stand by its own promise of protection for Americans in

U.S. officials say the documents released by the student militants in the Tehran embassy are genuine, although they only give a small slice of the routine bureaucratic process that ended with the shah's arrival in New York for medical treatment.

One of the documents is a telegram signed "Vance," urging the State Department and Tehran embassy to agree on a means of admitting shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi to the United States before the end of October.

The officials said the decision to admit the shah was made only after the government of then-Prime Minister Mehdi Bazargan assured the United States twice that it would protect U.S. citizens and property in Iran from street

Despite Bazargan's assurances, there were still doubts among some State Department and Embassy officials. The ranking American diplomat in Tehran, Bruce Laingen, warned that anti-Ameri-

alien, non-immigrant Iranians.

of Iran was doing well after the removal of a last gallstone and could have his doctors' blessing to travel in the next few days, doctors and officials at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center say.

The shah underwent a special nonsurgical procedure Monday night to remove the gallstone, which was the last medical obstacle to his departure from the United States.

But his doctors said Tuesday they wanted to keep him under observation for several days to make sure he doesn't get an infection and to be certain no further stones appear.

In Mexico, a member of the shah's public relations staff said the shah is expected to return to his Cuernavaca home within 10 days, if the shah's treatment is complete. The spokesman, Mark Morse, said, "It will all depend on when his medical treatment ends, but we believe he will be here in eight to 10 days."

One source familiar with the case said Tuesday night there were no early signs of infection and the shah was "doing

The shah underwent one cholangiogram - an X-ray test to see whether any more gallstones were left - Tuesday and was scheduled for another cholangiogram today. The results of the first test were not known. But if both tests proved negative and there was no infection, he apparently could leave at his discretion.

A spokesman for Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi said he hoped to return to Mexico when his doctors said he could

The shah entered the United States Oct. 22 from his Mexican exile for treatment for gallstones and lymph cancer. Two weeks later, militant Iranians seized American hostages in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran and demanded his extradition.

The shah's chief spokesman, Robert Armao, said the former monarch was "very, very uneasy" about events in Iran and "regrets the entire situation that his coming has brought.

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Civiletti Urges Citizen Restraint WASHINGTON (AP) - Attorney General Benjamin R. Civiletti is urging Americans not to vent their frustration over the U.S. Embassy seizure on Iranians living in this country, and warns that the Justice Department can "do no less" than prevent and remedy illegal discrimi-

While Civiletti acknowledged Americans' "instifiable anger" over the stalemate in Tehran, he advocated restraint in a statement issued Tuesday.

Citing news reports that some Iranians have been fired from their jobs. expelled from universities and denied publaccommodations. Civiletti warned, This conduct is not proper.

Anti-discrimination laws "forbid treating people differently in such areas as employment, public education, housing, credit and public accommodations like restaurants and hotels," he said, reminding Americans that those laws protect non-citizens as well as citizens.

"It is the role of the Justice Department to go to court, when necessary, to prevent and to remedy illegal discrimination. In the current situation, we must do no less." Civiletti said.

Those wishing to express their concern about the situation in Tehran should send letters and telegrams to the Iranian mission at the United Nations, he said.

Residents Denounce Zoning Amendment

A Planning and Zoning subcommittee's attempts to deal with the proliferation of illegal accessory apartments in neighborhoods zoned for single family homes or duplexes received almost no support at a public hearing on the issue Tuesday.

The suggested amendment would require owners of apartments detached from main housing units to register the existence of the apartments with the city within a specified period of time.

Those registered apartments could continue to be used during an amortization period designed to permit property owners to recoup their initial investments in the properties.

However, any unregistered apartments immediately would become illegal at the end of the registration period and could be ordered closed by city officials.

Owners who register their apartments could seek Zoning Board of Adjustment approval to continue to use the structures based on whether the apartments are appropriate for the neighborhood.

Without ZBA approval, owners would have to close the apartments at the end of the amortization period.

their opposition to any regulation of existing garage apartments.

Richard Carlson, representing the newly formed Concerned Citizens of Lubbock, said the amortization of illegal accessory apartments would trigger an immediate drop in values of properties including rear apartments.

Based on an estimate of 1,500 and 2,-500 such apartments existing in Lubbock. Carlson said the city could reduce the market value of one type of property by \$7.5 million and \$12.5 million.

In addition, Carlson said such a phaseout of garage apartments would cause property owners to lose the incentive to repair and improve the structures.

'What otherwise might be well-kept apartments would become rotting shacks on the back of lots," he said.

Current occupants of rear apartments would be "forced into larger apartment buildings or into ghetto areas," by the proposed amortization Carlson said, and some students may even be forced to drop out of college because of higher rentals and difficulties in transporta-

Also, Carlson predicted the phase-out would prompt an increase in rental rates rage apartments "would be as wasteful as setting fire to these apartments," he

Although Carlson suggested no alternative solution to the garage apartment dilemma, he presented a petition bearing 130 signatures asking the subcommittee to postpone any action for three months while the citizens' organization studies the problem.

Bob Sykes, who is one of two garage apartment owners being sued by the city, said he favors "a complete grandfathering of all units out there.

The zoning amendment is an attempt to "legislate the quality of a certain neighborhood," he said.

Sykes asked those attending the hearing to urge the City Council to stop legal proceedings against garage apartment owners until the subcommittee and full planning commission make a recommendation to the council on how to deal with all illegal garage apartments.

Terry Echols, a garage apartment owner, said "the city needs to bear some of the responsibility for the can of worms this is" because city officials ignored the problem of garage apartments for so

He suggested requiring apartment owners to register their units then forcing owners to make their apartments meet parking and housing code standards because there are some real rat holes in

Some people are going to lose some units" because of the cost to bring the apartments up to code standards, he said, but "it's better than we've got

Vernon Proctor, a member of the UNIT Neighborhood Association which brought the garage apartment problem to the attention of city officials, was the only person at the hearing to solidly support the proposed zoning ordinance amendment.

Proctor, also the owner of two garage apartments, said a greater waste than closing the apartments would be to allow the neighborhood south of Texas Tech University to become another "Tech Ghetto. Those who rent garage apartments

are not as concerned about neighborhood conditions as those who own their homes, Proctor said. Also, cars parked in alleys by the apartments make it difficult for fire trucks to get down the alleys.

Neale Pearson, chairman of the UNIT Neighborhood Association, said amorti-

zation of the apartments seemed an unworkable solution and suggested instead imposing fines for zoning violations, requiring adequate off-street parking for the accessory apartments and ensuring the apartments meet the building code.

Patrolmen Jerry Wayne Webster and Marvin Robertson said they were two blocks from the store when they received a radio call of an assault in progress about 6:10 a.m. Sept 3.

Webster, who identified Lewis as the male suspect, said he saw Lewis closing a folding hunting knife as the couple left the store, and that he yelled at the suspects to stop. The officer said Lewis dropped the weapon and Webster grabbed his arm, but the woman began running toward the alley behind the busi-

Webster said he knew Robertson, driving a separate patrol car, also had pulled into the store parking lot so he ran after the woman, thinking Robertson would detain Lewis.

However, Robertson also followed the fleeing woman and Lewis was able to

Both officers admitted the procedure was incorrect, but said they were unsure of exactly what had happened at the store and both thought the other officer would remain with the male suspect.

Lewis later was arrested at a 10th Street residence after police received an anonymous tip from a Crime Line Inc. caller alerting them to the robbery suspect's whereabouts.

The staff realizes this was a mistake." said Tony Mattox, mental retardation coordinator. "But no attempt was made to provide false information to the board of directors.

"We had thought that the need for trained laundry workers in Lubbock had been established," said program committee chairman Jim Clopton. "We also thought that it had been established that there was an abundance of laundry to be

washed in Lubbock. Mattox explained that two large laundries that were not among those protesting had been contacted, along with several smaller laundries. He said these laundries expressed a need for trained work- gram. ers, and that local institutions, such as Health Sciences Center Hospital, indicat-

ed a need for laundries to wash linens. "It's apparent we did contact too few laundries," said Clopton. "But the response we did get was overwhelmingly positive. We were left with the impression of a tremendous need for laundry work, so that we felt we wouldn't be taking any business away from you (private

"There is a fine balance between providing realistic training and becoming competitive business," said Director S.M. Kennedy

Sheriff C.H. "Choc" Blanchard earlier reported to the commissioners that daily inmate occupancy in the jail now has reached an average of 225. Capacity in the new jail with only two of the wings completed would be only 245.

The cost of the third wing, however, has risen by 50 percent since bids were originally let in July 1978, contractors told commissioners. The additional work would have cost

about \$660,000 under original contract options, but contractors estimated the same work will now run about \$990,000 because of inflation.



The other problem is that some people with disorders of the stomach, particularly gastric ulcers, don't tolerate increased bulk so well. Bulk appears to be good for the colon and not so good for the stomach. However, the bulk in the diet will delay emptying of the stomach which is important to some people, such as those who tend to have low blood sugar an hour or two after eating. The delayed emptying of the stomach seems to smooth things out and prevent such

reactions.

Finally, it should be mentioned that particularly in the first three or four weeks of increasing the amount of bran in the diet a person may experience enormous amounts of gas. This is very uncomfortable, particularly to people who are already having colon problems. Usually this phase will pass and the colon will adjust to the increased amounts of bulk. Another approach is to very gradually increase the bran in the di-et, thereby avoiding having the colon to have to make such a big adjustment all at once. There are other important aspects

to managing the bowel besides just increasing the bulk in the diet. To give you information on this, I am sending you The Health Letter number 2-1, Irritable Or Spastic Colon And Constipation. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y. 16019. Improved colon function is good enough reason to include at least a modest amount of bran in the diet. You can get a lot of that from using whole wheat products such as real whole wheat bread and whole grain cereals.

There is also some evidence that the improved colon fuction may help prevent colon cancer - the second most common cause of cancer deaths in both men and women in the United States. This point is debated by different researchers, but there is enough evidence to suggest that the prudent person will lean toward improving the amount of bulk in the diet as long as it is well tolerated.



### srael Worried About U.S. Aid

JERUSALEM (UPI) - Indications the United States will not increase its aid to Israel in the fiscal year 1980-81 are causing concern in Jerusalem.

Israel has requested \$3.45 billion in U.S. assistance, partly to help it shoulder the extra military costs stemming from its peace treaty with Egypt.

But despite heavy lobbying in Washington, there are growing indications Israel will have to settle for no more than \$2 billion - about the current level of U.S. assistance to the Jewish state.

#### Khadafy Angry

TRIPOLI, Libya (UPI) - All is not roses between Lbyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy and Palestine Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat - at least according to Palestinian informants. And Iran is to blame.

Palestinian insiders say Khadafy recently confiscated \$15 million in donations collected in Tripoli for Arafat's Al Fatah guerrilla group: Khadafy also diverted another \$16

million meant for Arafat's Al Fatah guerrillas to the radical Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine.

Khadafy apparently is angry about Arafat's reported behind-the-scenes efforts to mediate the release of American hostages from the U.S. Embassy in Teh-

#### 'Arab Dream' Buried

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Syria and Iraq maintain a working relationship, but the two countries have silently ouried plans to merge.

The Arab world's rival Baathist-ruled countries made peace a year ago and vowed to become "one state, with one cry and one constitution." Syrian and Iraqi heads of state exchanged visits and special committees were formed to "realize this Arab dream.

There was smooth sailing until discussions got down to the issue of merging the two wings of the Baath Party. The Syrians insisted their Iraqi colleagues purge their ranks of anti-Syrian elements, including party theoretician Michel Aflaq, a Syrian living in Baghdad. The Iraqis said no.

#### Sinai Prayer Surprise

MOUNT SINAI, Egypt (UPI) - Traditionally the sexes are segregated for Moslem prayers in mosques. But when President Anwar Sadat came to Mount Sinai Nov. 19 to raise Egypt's flag on the area just evacuated by Israel - where the Bible and the Koran say God spoke to Moses - men and women prayed together

Soon after landing on the mountain Sadat and senior officials said a thanksgiving prayer in a makeshift, open-air mosque consisting of straw mats spread on the sand and cordoned off by a chain.

To the amazement of Moslem onlookers, Sadat's wife Jihan and youngest daughter and Social Affairs Minister Dr. Amal Osman, the only woman member of the cabinet, joined in the prayer just one yard behind the two-row, all-male congregation. It was the latest in a series of firsts

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI) - Opponents of the Marxist government in South Yemen warn that the recent treaty of friendship and cooperation between it and Moscow could threaten Middle East oil routes.

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
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

Eric Gale Heathcote's Encore

THE MAN DID not ask to be taken seriously. Jud Heathcote advanced to the podium without the greatest of ease. It was a Sunday afternoon late in November, 1976, the Big Terr's annual basketball luncheon and media day in Chicago.

He had been preceded to the dais by two other first-year head coaches: Dapper Bill Cofield of the University of Wisconsin and Ohio State's unassuming Eldon Miller. Cofield, all spit-and-polish as a public speaker, and Miller, polite and plain-talking, introduced themselves and their respective teams with businesslike

They expected to be taken seriously, and were.

Now it was Heathcote's turn. Although a recent success at the University of Montana. Heathcote had been hired by Michigan State to win by means of recruiting the big city black.

His previous place of employment, where the idea of a metropolis is Cheyenne, Wyo. - not to mention the name "Jud" - did not inspire confidence in his quest. proach was a hackneyed "I don't get no respect," which might've been subtitled I don't get no laughs, either.

Unable to believe in his material, he proceeded to tell bad jokes with a straight face, a deadly combination. Ol' Jud would unload a thudder, then watch 70 faces stare back as blankly as if the view were an empty movie screen. I sent Vern Payne, my assistant coach, to scout a player in the Virgin Is-

lands." Heathcote said, paddling against the current of his own ineptitude. "We wanted this kid pretty bad, so Vern spent two weeks there trying to get him. Well, we lost the young man, anyway, but I can tell you one thing. After Vern spent two weeks on those Islands, it's a wonder they didn't have to give them a This example of Heathcote's routine should get the point across. His other

jokes were worse. You could almost hear Michigan coach Johnny Orr and Indiana's Bob Knight say to themselves: "Well, Michigan State could've done worse. They could've hired Pinky Lee.

THE AMIABLE GUS Ganakas, Heathcote's predecessor, had spent seven years turning Michigan State's basketball program into a broken-down bus characterized by the coach's decision to start Gary Ganakas, his son, at guard for two years. Gary stood only 5-4.

Now Jud Heathcote had arrived on the scene, seemingly to continue the tradition. Michigan State, no doubt, would remain soft tissue paper in the shredder of

The Spartans were a modest 10-17 in Heathcote's first season. Heads did not turn. No one applauded. But at least there had not been the mass walkout of 10 players - all black - that forced Ganakas, in his final year, to use intramural performers as last-minute replacements in the game against would-be national champion Indiana.

And, in the spring of '77, when Heathcote successfully recruited Earvin Johnson, it was the first prize cager that Michigan State had wrested from rival Michi-

The shock was delivered two years ago when the Spartans, to the surprise of everyone, became the biggest of the Big Ten with a 15-3 record, 25-5 overall. Then, last season, to the surprise of almost no one, they converted the magic of Johnson and Gregory Kelser into an NCAA championship.

Those two players have since left Michigan State for the NBA, and Heathcote will be fortunate to maneuver his Spartans beyond an eighth-place conference finish in 1980. But no one in East Lansing has any doubts about the state of basketball in Spartan-land.





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

### Paterno Not Displeased By Trio Of Defeats

It has been an unusual year at Penn State. Oh, the Nittany Lions are going to a bowl game, as usual, but they have lost as many as three regular-season games for only the fourth time in Joe Paterno's 14 seasons as head coach.

'We've had more problems and injuries than any squad I've ever been around," says Paterno, whose 7-3 team winds up the regular season against Pitt on Saturday and then heads for a Liberty Bowl meeting with Tulane.

'It's been one of those years. It's the first time we started off with academic problems (two starters in the secondary flunked out) and we also had a few disciplinary problems."

The biggest losses came several weeks ago when all-America defensive lineman Bruce Clark wrecked a knee and his runningmate, tackle Matt Millen, hurt his back. Both have missed the last few games and will miss the Pitt contest, as well, although Millen could return for the Liberty Bowl.

'Our record is about right, although I thought we might be 8-2," Paterno says. We weren't a very good team early in the year because we were so inexperienced. I thought if we got by the first couple of games we'd be all right, but we lost two big ones early (Texas A&M and Nebraska).

Nevertheless. Penn State has extended its NCAA record of consecutive nonlosing seasons to 41 in a row. The Nittany Lions last lost more games than they won in 1938 when the record was 3-4-1. Since then, they've had 26 straight winning years, two .500 seasons (1965-66) and 13

more winning ones.

The University of California's acceptance of a bid to meet Temple in the Garden State Bowl on Dec. 15 brings to mind the fact that the school's last bowl appearance was the Jan. 1, 1959, Rose Bowl, a 38-12 loss to Iowa. Early in the next season, the Golden Bears met up with Iowa again and this time they bowed 42-12

Dave Maggard, now Cal's athletic director, remembers that late in the latter game the officials gave the Golden Bears a fifth down. One of the Iowa linemen caught the boo-boo and hollered at the referee, but a merciful teammate said, "Aw, let 'em have it." "We've improved since then," Mag-

gard points out.

Why isn't Tuskegee Institute of Tuskegee, Ala., in the Top Ten?

Claude Campbell of Knoxville, Tenn. points out that Tuskegee beat Florida A& M 16-14. Florida A&M beat Miami, Fla. 16-13. Miami beat Penn State 26-10. Penn State beat Rutgers 45-10, Rutgers beat Army 20-10, Army beat Stanford 17-13. and Stanford tied second-ranked Southern Cal 21-21.

There's something about being on probation that does things to Oklahoma schools. The University of Oklahoma won a national championship in 1974 while in the NCAA's jailhouse and this year Oklahoma State surprised most folks with a 7-4 overall record and a 5-2 third-place finish in the Big Eight.

The Cowboys, under first-year head coach Jim Johnson and with walk-ons and freshmen compiling a goodly portion of the roster, won four conference games on the road, two more than any previous Oklahoma State team had ever won. And the seven victories made Johnson the winningest first-year coach in the school's history.

Among the walk-ons who have starred for the Cowboys are defensive end Rick Antle and quarterbacks Harold Bailey and John Doerner.

The winless Florida Gators wore orange shirts for the first time ever against unbeaten Florida State. It was reminiscent of Notre Dame's switch to green jerseys two years ago preceding a rout of Southern Cal.

Florida didn't win but the Gators gave Florida State a better game than anyone had a right to expect, succumbing 27-16 after being tied 10-10 in the fourth

The Gators weren't particularly impressed with the Seminoles, but that's to be expected from bitter rivals like these.

'If they're No. 5 in the country. well. I won't say it. Let them have their day," said Florida nose guard Robin

Bear Bryant on upsets: "Major upsets happen every week. With the squad limits as they are, the haves don't have as much and the have-nots have more. If you go out there and you're not ready to play, you get beat.'

# Smith Overcomes MHS Fumble

Embarrassing moments are like that. Oh, Smith didn't rip his britches at the church picnic. Even worse. He fumbled. And the bobble didn't come in the fourth quarter of some JV game, either.

It occurred in the third quarter of a Class AAAA regional football game against Ysleta Bel Air, with Monterey fighting for its playoff life.

But the story doesn't stop there. No

As the newspaper account recalls, Smith was trying for extra yardage when "the ball popped into the air, and Bel Air's Victor Hernandez caught it on the dead run at the 18 and raced 82 yards for

And that's the rest of the story.

"It was terrible," commented Smith, who at the time was only a sophomore. "I'll never forget it. It was really terrible. Plus, my sister was taping it (the game)

But Smith didn't do the popular thing and erase the boo-boo. Instead, he kept it intact, fumble and all, for posterity.

"That was an important part of the game," said Smith. "I didn't want to get rid of it. In fact, I listened to it the other

Two years later, Smith is again getting ready for a regional contest. This one, against another El Paso school, Coronado, takes place Saturday in Jones Stadium, starting at 2 p.m.

And Smith hopes it comes out the same way the 777 game did, with Monterey on top.

Since that night back in the Sun Bowl, things have changed dramatically for the stocky Monterey tailback. During the later part of Smith's sophomore season and throughout his junior year, he was used primarily as a running back. Emphasize the word running, too, he adds.

Jazz dropped a 122-118 decision to the Los Angeles Lakers. "I'm pleased with our team now.

Perhaps Utah's best move was the trade of forwards that brought Adrian Dantley from Los Angeles in exchange for Spencer Haywood on Sept. 13. Dantley burned his ex-teammates for a career-high 50 points Tuesday night, the most by any player this season.

But it was not enough to provide a victory for the Jazz's largest home crowd of the season, 11,673. Kareem Abdul-Jabbar clinched the triumph for the Lakers with six free throws in the final 30 sec-

In other NBA games, the Atlanta Hawks outgunned the San Antonio Spurs 143-120, the New Jersey Nets beat the Milwaukee Bucks 118-93, the New York Knicks edged the Detroit Pistons 116-114 in overtime, the San Diego Clippers defeated the Chicago Bulls 128-103, the Kansas City Kings nipped the Houston Rockets 117-115 and the Denver Nuggets beat the Washington Bullets 96-91

Jamaal Wilkes led Los Angeles with 29 points, including 12 in the second period when the Lakers built a 91-83 lead. Abdul-Jabbar finished with 28.

Dantley, a muscular 6-foot-5 forward who won Rookie of the Year honors with Buffalo in 1977 but is now playing for his fourth pro team in as many seasons, made 21 of 27 field goal attempts. "Nobody in the league can stop Dan-

tley," said Nissalke. "He is one of the top three or four forwards in the NBA without question.'

### Carlen Goes 8-3 With Own Players

COLUMBIA, S.C. (UPI) - Coach Jim Carlen says his first four years at South Carolina amounted to a prelude to the 1979 season.

"The magic year is the year you get all of your own players," said Carlen, who was named UPI's national coach of the week Tuesday. "The truth is you've got to have recruited your men."

The Gamecocks ended their winningest season ever, 8-3, with a satisfying 13-9 victory over arch-rival Clemson Saturday and will face Missouri in the Hall of Fame Bowl at Birmingham, Ala., Dec. 29.

Carlen's choicest recruit has been George Rogers, a bonafide all-America candidate who was switched from fullback to tailback at the start of the season when starter Johnny Wright got hurt. Rogers, a bruising 6-foot-2, 210-pound Duluth, Ga. junior, rushed for more than 1,000 yards for the second year in a row and is the nation's second-leading rusher behind Heisman Trophy candidate Charles White of Southern Cal.

With a 5-5-1 record and a lackluster passing attack last year, Carlen decided to change his strategy and installed a two tight-end offense.

"Instead of throwing the ball, we ran more," he said. The switch worked, but there were some doubters after North Carolina crushed the Gamecocks 28-0 in South Carolina's season opener. But the team rebounded, winning its next five games, including victories over neighboring Georgia and Oklahoma State. The Gamecocks also shut down Tangerine Bowl-

bound Wake Forest, the nation's Cinderella team. South Carolina's only other losses were at Notre Dame, a one-point game

decided in the last 42 seconds, and at fifth-ranked Florida State. While Carlen, a born-again Christian who is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, says he would not trade Rogers for any other running back in the country, including White, he is quick to add that the whole team was re-

sponsible for the Gamecocks' best year.

"We just had a better team all around." he said Carlen's 31-25-1 record at South Carolina marks the third time he has given new life to a football program. In five years at Texas Tech and four years at West Virginia he had a combined mark of 62-33-5

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The 1979 All-America team, announced today by Newspaper Enterprise Association, has the phenomenon of a sophomore at the controls.

Art Schlichter, the brilliant young quarterback of the Ohio State Buckeyes, was a popular choice to be the field general of the NEA team, chosen by a consensus vote of college coaches, football writers and pro scouts.

He was joined by four juniors and 19 seniors on this mythical squad, which features good regional distribution. No one section of the country, or conference, dominates the roster.

There are four repeaters from last years team: running back Billy Sims and linebacker George Cumby of Oklahoma, and defensive backs Johnnie Johnson of Texas and Ken Easley of

Jumping up a notch from the 1978 NEA second team are defensive end HughGreen of Pitt, noseguard Bruce Clark of Penn State, running back Charles White of USC, and guard Brad Budde of USC.

Budde was the outstanding lineman of the year, a monstrous blocker who has been impressive for all four seasons of his varsity career.

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

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

If the AAU decides to reinstate the amateur status of Stones, that would mean that the 25-year-old native of Glendale, Calif., would be eligible immediately to compete in the United States.



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

# Idaho Solon Hansen Enjoys Being In Spotlight

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. George Hansen's one-man mission to Iran is creating an uproar - but it's not the first time the Idaho Republican has tried doit-yourself diplomacy.

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His record suggests he relishes center stage and can take the heat of the spot-

Connie Hansen shrugs off her husband's detractors, who are legion in the nation's capital. Their objections, she says, are "their problem, not mine."

'I'd rather see a congressman walking the streets of Tehran than young American soldiers," she said this week.

Early in the Iranian erisis, Hansen called for President Carter's impeachment if he did not resolve the problem. In the end, he decided - not unchar-

acteristically - to take matters into his The Iran visit is not the 49-year-old

Hansen's first headline-making trip abroad. His earlier ventures include: -A flight to Bolivia to obtain the re-

lease of a constituent jailed on drug -A trip to Nicaragua shortly before

After almost a week in Iran, Hansen managed Sunday to visit a number of the 49 hostages held at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran since Nov. 4.

Hansen also met with militant students and reiterated his proposal for a congressional investigation into Iranian charges that the deposed shah used death and torture during his 37-year

Hansen's plan did not sit well with the White House or congressional leaders, who say there should be no concessions to the Iranians until the hostages

Connie Hansen, her husband's staunchest ally and unpaid administrative assistant, says of his latest spell in the spotlight: "My husband wasn't elected to be a wallflower ... (The trip) was a very elemental thin to do... People can't fathom that anything that simple would

She adds: "My husband knows his rights as a citizen, and he hasn't done anything to violate those rights in any

Hansen's constituents back in Idaho offered mixed reactions to the Iran trip. For example, while one praised Hansen's "courage to speak up for what needs to be done," another labeled his mission "the dumbest thing he's ever

A Mormon with five children, Hansen is a former life insurance salesman who served two terms in the House before losing a bid for Democrat Frank Church's Senate seat in 1968.

He bounced back in 1974 to return to the House, campaigning against big government. He proposed, among other things, that the Internal Revenue Service pay interest to the taxpayers on their

Salety and Health Administration.

placed him in the public eye. Four years ago, Hansen pleaded guilty to campaign finance violations and was sentenced to two months in jail. He later was allowed to settle the conviction by paying a \$2,000 fine. The judge said he found no criminal intent in

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### Iran Media Coverage One Sided

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - In banner headlines and prime time broadcasts, the Iranian media tell of the glorious struggle of "God and us" against the root of all evil, the United States, but they ignore most demands for the re-

lease of the American hostages. No message of support for the Nov. 4 takeover of the U.S. Embassy by militant students and the holding of the 49 American hostages goes unreported.

Tehran's six main newspapers, all solid supporters of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini and his revolution, carry such headlines as "Seizure Hailed," "Millions March," and "Imam (Khomeini) Raps

Hours of government television and radio time are devoted to speeches. sometimes more than an hour in length. and statements by Khomeini, the leader of Iran's revolution, and members of his ruling Revolutionary Council.

The Tehran Times, now the capital's only English-language newspaper, had a front-page story about a group of Iranian students who burned an American flag in Kuwait to support the embassy seizure. But it made no mention of President Carter's warning that the United States would hold Iran responsible if any harm came to the hostages.

When statements by Carter and other U.S. officials are reported, they usually are linked to Iranian denunciations or counter-warnings.

But Carter and the United States are featured in daily stories of anti-American accusations and editorials charging them with past and present wrongdoing

Charges include helping the deposed shah to embezzle billions from Iran, suppressing U.S. blacks, pillaging the Third World and organizing the armed takeover by Moslem fanatics last week of the Grand Mosque in Mecca, Islam's holiest

Sometimes it is more than a matter of news selection.

Lilian Johnson a secretary who was one of the 13 hostages released last week, made confused references at a news conference in the embassy compound to counterfeit U.S. currency being brought to the embassy before the occu-

Under the headline: "Hostages Reveal 'Plot' to Hit Iran's Economy," the Times claimed Miss Johnson had said: The object was that the monetary system of Iran should be paralyzed."

Since the siege began, Iranian television has offered little respite from its deluge of religion and politics.

The number of American and other foreign television programs dwindled after the revolution last February, with kissing and drinking scenes cut from those still shown.

After the embassy takeover, American movies and serials disappeared. The time slot once occupied by The Waltons now features a talk show with Moslem

Khomeini and his supporters have also done a complete about-face in their attitude toward foreign journalists, 18 of whom they expelled before the embassy seizure. Hundreds have been admitted to cover the siege, and officials and demonstrating crowds court foreign television audiences

Iranian officials say frankly they want maximum coverage in the Western media of the revolutionary viewpoint and the outpouring of anti-American sentiment. But they are not always happy with the published results or the questions asked them.

At a recent news conference, National Guidance Minister Nasser Minachi lectured foreign journalists at length about avoiding distorted and dishonest

But a correspondent who asked why Iranian television and radio was allowed to report an anti-government demonstration by Iran's rebellious Kurds as a rally in support of the embassy takeover was

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

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Oil Sheiks Warned Of Inflation

KUWAIT (AP) - Treasury Secretary G. William Miller said today that excessive oil-price hikes by Arab oil producers would result in inflated prices for the goods they import from industrialized nations.

World inflation draws considerable influence from oil prices. So higher oil prices mean inflation, more inflation means lower purchasing power and that means more inflation," Miller told reporters at the end of his five-day tour of three Arab oil producers on the Persian Gulf.

The oil ministers of the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia, the two other nations Miller visited, met today and reiterated that future oil price hikes should be "reasonable and gradual." 'We cannot go on with our prices so

high because this will have negative etfects on developed and industrial nations," said Mana Saeed Oteiba, the outgoing chairman of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and oil minister of the U.A.E. Oteiba conferred in the Saudi capital

of Riyadh with his Saudi counterpart Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani on the Dec. 17 OPEC conference in Caracas, Venezuela. Both had earlier said they favored a moderate price increase at next month's meeting of oil ministers from the 13 OPEC nations.

Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and the emirates together produce 14 million barrels of crude oil a day, 70 percent of total production in the Arab world and more than a quarter of U.S. foreign oil imports.

Miller told a news conference in Kuwait that an appropriate oil price was one "which allows both proper recovery of value for the seller and contributes to a world economic system that can sustain itself and assure stable values. He sought to assure Persian Gulf oil

producers the Carter administration follows a policy "of maintaining a sound dollar, because we know that any actions that contribute to inflation or currency disturbances are against the interests of

"We have a policy to control and reduce inflation in the U.S. which would take some years because it is built up over a long time," Miller said.

He said he opposed suggestions by several of OPEC's 13 member-nations that oil prices be linked to the cost of manufactured goods.

A justice of the peace ruled the death was accidental and no criminal charges

were filed in the incident. Michael and Debbie Schwartzkopff of 2714 62nd St. allege that Spurrier was driving in excess of the speed limit, failed to keep a proper lookout and did not take action that could have averted the collision. Mrs. Spurrier is named as co-defendant, according to the petition prepared by Lubbock attorney A.W. Salvars, because she gave Spurrier permission to use her vehicle the day of the mis-

### **Price Of Gold** Up In Europe

LONDON (AP) - Gold prices jumped \$10 an ounce in Europe today, apparently spurred by a surge in the price of silver touched off by reports the United States may enlarge its silverstockpile. The dollar fell sharply in Tokyo and opened lower against major European currencies. Gold prices jumped \$5 an ounce at the

opening and climbed another \$5 by midmorning to cross the \$400 an ounce bar-The metal was trading at mid-day in

London at \$404.50 an ounce, its highest level since Oct. 10. It closed in London Tuesday at \$394.25 In Zurich, where gold reached an alltime peak of \$444 an ounce in trading on

Oct. 2, the metal jumped from Tuesday's close of \$393.75 to trade at \$404. "It's coming from silver after reports that the United States might increase its silver stockpiles," said one London gold

Silver rose nearly \$1 an ounce in London today to just under \$18 an ounce.

The dollar fell back in Tokyo after the Bank of Japan stepped in to bolster its currency. After topping 250-yen to the dollar on Tuesday for the first time in more than two years, the dollar closed nearly two yen lower today at 249.65 yen,

NEW YORK (UPI) - Watching Liv City. Ullmann portray a woman's pain as she speaks to her unfaithful lover on the phone 'ls poignant, emotionally harrowing and almost painful in its intensity.

Given the intimacy of the television screen, it's uncomfortably like peeking through a keyhole to watch a person offguard and suffering.

In Jean Cocteau's "The Human Voice," the Norwegian actress combines the French playwright's lines with a dancelike choreography of body and face that is both compassionate and pitiless.

The one-woman "The Human Voice" combines with the operatic treatment of the same material, "La Voix Humaine." to present PBS audiences with a twohour tour-de-force tonight starting at 7 p.m. Central time (check local listings).

The scene opens with a woman in a nightgown alone in her bedroom, obviously in great distress. The phone rings and the anguished conversation begins, with the audience hearing only the woman's half of the dialogue.




