OPEC HIKE, INFLATION

Gasoline Prices Rising Again

NEW YORK (AP) - Gasoline prices are climbing again, and analysts say the cost of pulling up to the gas pump could be as much as 10 percent higher in the next two months.

Wholesale gasoline prices have been raised as much as 6 cents a gallon in the last week as major producers responded to announced retroactive crude oil

price increases. But other factors are at work in the market, including inflation, Iran's embargo on oil shipments to the United States and revised government rules on the mark-up gasoline dealers are allowed, analysts say.

Crude oil price increases expected to be approved by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries this week could push up prices by as much as an additional 10 cents a gallon, analysts say, based on reports from the OPEC meeting in Caracas, Venezuela.

The national average price of all grades of gasoline currently is \$1.03 a gallon, according to the Lundberg Letter. 'The brunt of it will hit in February," said Mark Emond, editor of the Los

Angeles-based newsletter that covers the gasoline industry. "February ought to On Monday, Standard Oil Co. of California, which markets under the Chev-

ron brand name, and Exxon Corp. said they were raising wholesale gasoline prices 6 cents a gallon in response to Saudi Arabia's decision to boost crude prices \$6 on a 42-gallon barrel to \$24. Since last week, Mobil Corp. and Texaco Inc. have raised the price of a gal-

lon of gasoline 3 cents; Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, 2 to 3 cents; CITGO, a penny; and Sun Co., 2 cents. Chevron, Mobil, Texaco and Exxon depend heavily on Saudi oil, and ana-

lysts expect Texaco and Mobil also to raise their prices in response to the Saudi Mobil's 3-cent increase came before the Saudi action. Texaco raised prices

Saturday, but said its increase was not related to the new Saudi crude oil price. Neither would comment on plans for further price increases. OPEC-triggered increases will not be felt at the consumer level for a few

weeks because federal gasoline price controls require that oil companies wait a month before passing on higher costs to consumers.

However, because Saudi Arabia's 33 percent increase was retroactive to Nov. 1, Chevron was able to raise prices without delay.

Additional training is needed for deputies, Blanchard said, noting that he plans to seek the cooperation of the commissioners in providing funds to send members of his staff to various law en-

American Income Climbs In November

WASHINGTON (AP) - The income of Americans rose a strong 1.1 percent last month to an annual total of nearly \$2 trillion, the government reported today.

But the report from the Commerce Department also shows that Americans dug deep into their savings accounts in November to spend considerably more than they earned, after taxes.

Total personal income rose 0.9 percent in October.

After taxes, the money available for Americans to spend was up \$16.9 billion, on an annual basis, in November to nearly \$1.7 trillion.

But spending increased at an annual rate of \$27.3 billion, meaning that Americans pulled the difference - \$10.4 billion from savings.

The annual rate would be the total earning, spending and saving for one year if the monthly change continued at the same pace for 12 consecutive months.

"I guess the best answer (to explain the November figures) is that Americans didn't spend their money in October," said a Commerce analyst who asked not to be identified.

He pointed out that after-tax earnings increased at an annual pace of \$13.4 bil-

lion in October but that spending went up only \$1.8 billion, on an annual basis, and savings increased \$11.5 billion. We know that in October people

were perhaps concerned about what would happen when interest rates were tightened so much by the Federal Reserve," the analyst said. "This may have increased indecision about buying.

The Federal Reserve moved to tighten credit on Oct. 6 by raising a key interest rate and changing the method by which it controls the nation's money sup-

The report also showed that prices in

rate of about 11.4 percent.

This inflation figure - known as the Personal Consumption Expenditures price deflator - is used to help economists determined how much a person's ability to purchase goods and services was affected by rising prices.

In October, for example, after-tax income went up about 1 percent. Because prices rose about as much, a person could buy little more with his or her additional earnings.

The deflator figure is different from the Consumer Price Index, which reports

on changes in the price of a set marketbasket of goods selected in 1967. The deflator is considered a more accurate measure of inflation because it takes into account changes in buying habits and puts less emphasis on housing costs.

The Consumer Price Index went up 1 percent in October. The November figure is scheduled for release later this

The Commerce report also showed an increase in farm income increase for the first time in eight months. Farm income rose 1.3 percent to an annual \$46.9 billion, the report showed.

a sack of corn and dried bread, rationing the contents of their waterskin from oasis to oasis. Tradition cites stops they made on the way - in a cave, beside a spring, beneath some palm trees which yielded dates for a meal. Leopards and wolves prowled their campsites.

Along one midnight stretch of road, they are said to have passed through a sleeping gang of bandits. A lookout, named Titus, urged his partner, "Let those persons go quietly that our company may not perceive anything of them." But the other, Dumachus, wanted to rob them. Titus, taking coins from his girdle, bribed him to let them go on.

They went through Goshen, and came eventually to the delta, that river-silted 'black land" of Egypt, hemmed in by the red rolling sands of desert, a region of inundation and drought, of fertility and famine.

Heliopolis, center of pantheistic cults and the lavish temple of the sun-god, Re, apparently became the main locale for the footsore migrants. Situated just northeast of modern Cairo, it is now called Mataria, and is dotted with shrines marking the passage of Joseph and his family - the sycamore tree where they rested, a spring where Mary bathed her

child and washed their clothing.
As a woodworker, Joseph had trouble finding work, since in that almost treeless, rainless land, firm wood is scarce. Besides that particular handicap, there were everywhere more workers than work - the numberless fellaheen.

But it is said he eventually got employment for a time building coffins for a burying ground at Deir el Muharrak.

According to stories circulated in that ancient land for nearly 2,000 years, the family moved about a great deal, to various towns, living sometimes alone, sometimes with others, in hovels and mansions, once with a kindly widow once with a wealthy benefactor named Eleazar.

The scene about them was the once powerful kingdom of the Pharaohs. which by then had become a vassal province of Rome, following Cleopatra's loss of her throne and suicide about 27 years earlier on Marc Antony's defeat at Actium. The atmosphere, however, remained Egyptian - the animal idols, the elaborate processions for "sacred bulls," the incantations, clattering chariots, magicians, oracles, the corps of perfumed temple women.

A man could buy a waxen image to

scorpions, or to put a hex on an enemy.

But also it was a time of intellectual richness at Alexandria, the Greek and Roman-built coastal city, where the great Jewish philosopher, Philo, was developing his teachings about the "logos" - the divine intermediary among men, revealing God.

That concept later would be applied to the then ignored, unknown child-in-exile, Jesus. Writes St. John: "And the Word (logos) became flesh and dwelt among us.

In some of the Egyptian towns, there were Jewish communities, the diaspora of banishments and commerce. HeliopolMary are said to have worshipped.





Legal Battle Develops Over Nativity Display

DENVER (AP) - It may not be art, but the way they deck out the Denver Ci-ty-County Building for Christmas is a 30year tradition. Multi-colored lights trace every column and balcony on the blocklong building and the traffic jams as new-

comers and oldtimers drive slowly past. Now a federal judge says the nativity scene has to go because its religious theme violates constitutional guarantees of separation of church and state, and city officials say they'll continue their fight

Hours after U.S. District Judge Richard Matsch ordered the life-size creche dismantled and removed, the Denver City Council voted 11-1 Monday night to back Mayor Bill McNichols' decision to

The nativity scene and the rest of the Civic Center displays officially began Sunday night. The display is to continue nightly through Jan. 1, and will be lit again during the National Stock Show in mid-January

Matsch's ruling was a victory for the American Civil Liberties Union, which filed suit on behalf of a group called the Citizens Concerned for Separation of Church and State.

In his 18-page opinion, Matsch said city leaders had only "feeble" excuses for displaying the scene depicting Christ's birth in a manger.

The mayor was called as a prosecution witness last week, and said the scene and lighting is good for Denver's image. McNichols said the display is important for the downtown area's economy, since it draws shoppers to nearby stores.

Matsch, in his ruling, said it was difficult to imagine James Madison, president and constitutional architect, "anticipating that municipal officials would use public funds on a religious display for the purpose of enticing people to come into a commercial area and spend their money with private merchants.

A psychologist called as a prosecution witness said the nativity scene's display had a negative effect on children in religious minority homes. Not only does it

TODAY'S EDITORIAL:

Policy Plan Ill-Planned

THE PRESIDENT'S decision to meddle in the fierce economic struggle between traditional downtown business districts and suburban shopping centers is foolhardy.

Intervening between cities and their suburbs is a dicey undertaking at best because these disparate constituencies represent the two largest concentrations of voters.

Satisfying one invariably means antagonizing the other. But the administration has been struggling for more than a year to fashion a policy statement on the complex issue as a means of attracting political support from both.

The latest draft has as its primary objective discouragement of any federal actions which might "lead to the construction of large commercial developments in distressed communities, or promote unnecessary urban

BUT THE International Council of Shopping Centers and the National Retail Merchants Association believe the drift toward federal planning and zoning is divisive.

The shopping center trade association warned that the administration's plan "puts the blame on suburban shopping centers for the deterioration of downtown retailing (and could serve only to) set cities against suburbs

was unveiled at last month's annual convention of the National League of Cities.

After months of compromising, the last draft included "concessions for all of the interest groups involved but was pitifully weak as a statement of national policy," said syndicated columnist Robert Walters.

JACK H. WATSON, a senior member of the White House staff, bravely defended the administration's handiwork. Said he: "The term 'shopping centers' never even appears in these guidelines. In addition, all earlier references to central business districts and downtown areas were replaced by 'older commercial areas'.

The White House scrapped a proposal to establish a new downtown revitalization advisory committee ostensibly designed to help strengthen existing central business districts. Yet it retained some harsh language aimed at suburban malls, to wit: Some shopping centers "have drained economic vitality from existing business districts.

What we now have is a statement that may serve the short-term needs of the 1980 presidential campaign, but nowhere near anything resembling a coherent policy on the

Iran Ravaged By Neo-Savagery

WASHINGTON-We are used to being civil even to the uncivilized. We are not supposed to call them "savage"; they are merely "pre-modern." Their countries are not "primitive"; they are, rather, "developing.

All this unconscious self-flattery assumes that the universal destiny of mankind is to turn into folks like ourselves. They are pre-us, developing into something us-like.

Ayatollah Khomeini is doing his best to set us straight. When a man like him calls you "Satanic." he is trying to suggest that he has certain reservations about your form of civilization.

On the surface it is all about the shah. The United States supported the shah, and the shah tortured and killed people, and Khomeini wants him

OTHERWISE. KHOMEINI, lover of justice, will kill the innocent Americans he has been tor-

One might wonder why we are not hated similarly by, say, the Ukrainians. We formed an alliance with Stalin that saved him from Hitler and helped make permanent the Soviet oppression of the Ukraine.

Reasonable people understand that no nation can always be choosy in its alliances. At various times we needed Stalin and the shah, even if they

The Shi-ite hatred of the shah and the United States has little to do with outraged humanitarian-

Under the shah, the least modernized Iranians underwent a series of severe cultural shocks. Like so many other countries. Iran was unready for sudden Westernization.

The shah's secularizing progress, with its cosmopolitan ties to the infidel world, brought what many Iranians could only regard as a riot of de-

The moralistic purge extends to all things foreign, and even such native evils as prostitution and alcohol are ascribed to pernicious foreign in-

Irrational though it seems, Khomeini's fiery bigotry has its own logic. The moment Mecca's Grand Mosque was attacked he laid it to the twin

Satanic powers of America and Zionism. Such intuition needs no evidence.

There we got a foretaste of the espionage "trial" the hostages will face. But this is the way savages use words-as a form of weaponry.

The rule of law, the separation of powers, toleration of opposition, immunities for diplomats and measured utterance itself are all components of

In taking our citizens as hostages, Khomeini's

avatars deliberately broke off all communion with our civilization, and told us dramatically that our very standards of justice are corrupt.

Soon after the burning of our embassy in Pakistan, Zambia's "moderate" Kenneth Kaunda inspired and praised a mob attack on the British embassy in his country.

The savages are feeling their oats, and they seem to grasp the logic of the situation better than men as civilized as Cyrus Vance.

The Trouble With Math Could Be In Your Mind

WASHINGTON-You blank out... Never seem to be able to balance your checkbook...Shrink from the chore of adding up a restaurant bill...Just can't calculate what your living costs are.. Are you frightened by figures? Do numbers

You could be suffering from math anxiety,

More than 60 percent of American adults are unable to use basic math to solve everyday problems -a deplorable situation that costs these individuals (you?) a minimum of \$100 million a year and the nation more than \$3 billion annually!

The problem crosses all brackets of income, education, sex, occupation, etc. "The people I've seen run the whole spectrum," observes Dr. Stanley Kogelman, a math therapist.

THEY INCLUDE LAWYERS, judges, writers. photographers." Of Dr. Kogelman's therapy-seeking clients, two-thirds are women.

This proportion is due less to women having more problems with basic math than men but more to the fact that they are ready to seek help, Dr. Kogelman says.

In addition, he notes that more and more women are returning to the work force; more and more want MBA degrees; many are trying to improve their performance in business.

Millions of consumers are unable to use basic math and lose hundreds of dollars yearly because of this handicap, according to one national report. Their problems include: balancing checkbooks; sorting out the best buys at the grocery or drug store; calculating a proper tip on a restaurant bill; determining if it's correctly added.

BEHAVIORAL SCIENTISTS go along with Dr. Kogelman (whose paperback, "Mind Over Math," McGraw-Hill, \$3.95, is just out) in feeling that the problems many have with basic math stems from unpleasant early experiences with the subject.

This phobia has been dubbed "math anxiety," and educators have been aware of it for the past 20 years, even though widespread public interest has developed only in the past four-five years. An estimated 100 colleges are now offering

courses in dealing with this problem-ranging from the University of California (UCLA) to State University at Purchase, New York. Interest in the problem is spreading to Europe

and Canada. The University of Calgary has established a program. Among the mathematicians involved is Carole

Lacampagne, a college teacher, who says "many people believe they are the only ones who have this kind of disease. But everybody is a little concerned about mathematics. The idea is to smooth

WELLESLEY AND WESLEYAN academicians turned their attention to the problem some time ago when they found women students encountering difficulties in their chosen careers. In fields that stress statistics, there was no college math

below calculus. Additional evidence was found at UCLA where freshmen women had less math than newly-arrived male students. Upshot: Out of 10 first-year women, nine had to limit their majors to the school's five areas of education not requiring cal-

Now educators are reaching below the college level to stem math anxiety.

THERE IS NO "instant cure" for math anxiety. says Dr. Kogelman. The important point is to admit you are blocked out

Too much early educational rigidity is a fundamental reason for the negative response to mathand the general attitude that math is in the "male province" explains why women have had trouble.

To help cure yourself Trust your intuition when it comes to math.

. When budgeting, work out a formula that is right for you. Setting up a budget is a beginning.

· FORGET THE NOTION that there is only one way to solve a problem, advises Dr. Kogelmanand if you have to go back several times to solve a problem, take a break. The professor confesses he never works more than an hour on math without

· If there is no nearby program to work on math anxiety, call your local college or community continuing education administrator. They're eager to develop responsive adult courses.

A Profile In Discouragement

WASHINGTON-When asked about the impact of Chappaquiddick on his presidential candidacy, Sen. Edward Kennedy says that, of course, what happened happened, but he hopes the American people will judge him on his total record. Fair enough.

So Josh Muraychik has done this. Muraychik—a

OVER THE YEARS, the senator has led the fight against the anti-ballistic missile; opposed continued production of the Minuteman III; been against the MX missile: voted for cancellation of the B-1 bomber; worked to block development of the neutron bomb:

Expressed "serious misgivings" about the cruise missile: been a leading advocate of a comprehensive nuclear test ban; and, voted for a McGovern "transfer amendment" to shift \$1.7 billion in military funds to domestic social spending.

In the strategic nuclear area, on 55 roll calls,

U.S. programs only four times. By comparison, the Senate voted to strengthen or support these programs 42 times.

As for the general defense area, including funding for non-strategic forces as well as the overall level of defense spending: On 68 roll calls, Kennedy voted pro-defense 13 times, while the Senate as a whole voted pro-defense 51 times.

IN 1976, IGNORING the overwhelming evidence of a massive Soviet military buildup, Kennedy said, incorrectly, that "the biggest canard of all is the charge that the Soviet Union is outspending us on defense.

The city's first marker designating an official historical site was placed at the former location of the Childress Building at Main Street and Avenue H this morn-

The building, which was torn down this year to make way for expanded facilities of Lubbock National Bank, was one of the oldest structures of its kind in Lub bock history and was occupied by several retail hardware businesses over more than six decades.

The building was erected in 1917 by the family of Bruce Barrier. The Barriers went out of business and the building was occupied by Cole-Myrick Hardware

Oscar and Joe Nislar opened Nislar Brothers Hardware Store at the location in March 1923 and stayed in business there until they sold out in 1932. At that time, the store was sold to the

The only reason we bought it then was because nobody else wanted it," Terry said

The store at that time, minus the building itself, sold for a mere \$19,000. The partnership's firm was later succeed-

ed by Fred Childress Hardware Co. The store was sold to Richard Jay and Leslie Duncan in 1968, and although the company was moved to 915 Ave. H, it still retains its original name.

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (AP) - After months of waiting, Marine Pfc. Robert Garwood was to appear at a military hearing today to hear evidence against him on charges that he deserted and collaborated with the enemy in Vietnam.

Testimony was to be offered at the hearing - called an Article 32 investigation and roughly equivalent to a civilian grand jury - to determine whether Garwood should face a court-martial.

The presiding officer at the hearing, Maj. T.B. Hamilton Jr., will listen to witnesses and recommend whether there should be a court-martial

If convicted of either desertion or collaboration with the enemy, Garwood could be sentenced to death







Furniture Mart Combines Traditions

Americans are known for their belief the future. But it looks as though merican manufacturers of wood furniare had the past in mind when they deded on new designs seen at the recent ational furniture market in North Caro-

Traditional furniture introductions were made at the fall session of the twice-yearly market which assembles retailers and manufacturers for a weeklong orgy of shopping and shoptalk.

Most of the retailers' choices will be seen by consumers starting in the spring

Major wood-furniture producers introduced large, new collections based on Italian, French, English and American styles of the 18th and 19th centuries. Among design elements observed fre-

quently was the combination of at least two woods of different colors in a single piece. Generally, darker-colored woods panded or trimmed furniture made of ighter-colored wood.

Dressy ornamentation, almost like dressmaker detailing on clothing, was a feature of many new pieces. An effect

used often was inlaving of several woods to form a design. The inlaying was real in expensive furniture and pretend, using a variety of methods, in less expensive furniture.

Also quite common were painted decorative motifs, brass trim and combinations of brass and moulding. At least three manufacturers ornamented china cabinets and other pieces with crackled

In prior years, chrome furniture and chrome trim on wood furniture showed up at all price levels and in all styles. This year, the chrome was replaced by brass. Brass accessories and brass accents on furniture were seen in almost every showroom.

Does this mean that chrome is out? Not on your life! The American homefurnishings market, with its tens of thousands of suppliers and retailers, offers an exceptionally wide choice of merchandise. Though some styles may occasionally be hard to find, nothing ever really disappears completely.

If anything was hard to find, it was interesting, new modern designs. There were some. But the larger manufacturers concentrated on traditional furniture

Among noteworthy new modern groups, however, is a collection of tables and dining storage pieces by Paul Evans for Selig Mfg. Co. Evans borrwed the traditional craft technique of reverse painting on glass. But he did his reverse painting on plexiglass. And instead of the traditional stylized scene, he spatterpainted the clear acrylic sheets with free-form splashes and dots. The effect is a bit like a Jackson Pollock painting.

The acrylic tables and buffets are available in solid colors too, such as ivory, brown, dark green and red.

At other markets in recent years, furniture that consumers take home in a box and assemble themselves has been increasingly popular, especially in stripped-down, modern styles. This time, there were new examples of selfassembled furniture. But some of the new designs are traditional, not modern.

Our retailer customers asked us to make ready-to-assemble, traditional furniture," said Bruce Perlo, president of Sugar Hill Furniture. The company did just that.

The demand for traditional, self-assembled furniture indicates the growing acceptability of this type of furniture to American consumers, said Perlo.

Consumers like the furniture because it is less expensive. There is a saving of at least 11 percent, which represents what it costs to deliver furniture to a customer's home, said Perlo. Savings are usually greater, since it costs retailers less to stock, knock-down (or KD in

industry terminology) furniture. Wall systems and modular furniture are growing in popularity each year. At the recently concluded market, traditional-styled stacking furniture and wall systems were introduced by a number of

manufacturers Although French, Italian or early American stacking furniture is incongruous in theory, in practice the furniture is attractive. Even more important, its storage capacity and flexibility make stacking furniture highly desirable to consumers, no matter what style furni-





al Home Improvement Council. Why the rapid growth in home

improvements? New home prices are beyond the reach of many Americans," explains NHIC president Eugene B. Squires Mortgages are difficult to obtain and when they are available, interest rates often exceed 10 percent.







Arkansas President Takes Houston Post

Houston has named a new president, luring the president of the University of Arkansas system to take over the leadership of four campuses in the Houston metropolitan area with a student population of more than 40,000.

Dr. Charles E. Bishop, 58, was elected by UH regents Monday to succeed Dr. Phillip Hoffman, 64. Bishop will assume his duties Feb. 1, university officials said. Dr. J. Davis Armstead of Lubbock, a

member of the university's board of regents, assisted in the selection of Bishop. Hoffman resigned abruptly Sept. 10 when the regents refused to accept his nominee for a position as interim chancellor of the university's downtown cam-

Bishop will receive \$75,635 a year, a house and a car, UH officials said.

Since Hoffman's resignation, the acting president has been Robert C. Maxson, 43, chancellor of the university's Victoria campus. Officials announced Monday that Maxson will return to Victoria when Bishop assumes his duties.

Hoffman had previously announced that he would retire on Aug. 31, 1980, but after his nomination was rebuffed by the board, he immediately resigned saying the board's action was eroding the responsibility of the president's office.

Bishop will become president of a university that has been plagued by financial mishaps the past three years. In 1977, a university financial analyst was fired during a scandal involving the investments of university bonds.

Since 1977, two men have received federal prison sentences and two other men have received probationary sentences on state charges evolving from the financial controversy.

The University of Arkansas board will meet Thursday at Little Rock to name an interim president, according to Louis Ramsay of Pine Bluff, board chairman. committee also will be appointed Thursday to begin the search for a new president, Ramsay said.

Man Appointed To Judge Post

Bill Brister was sworn in Monday afternoon as the new bankruptcy referee for the Northern District of Texas U.S. District Court.

Brister, a local attorney, has been serving in the part-time post of federal court magistrate. Brister will continue to hold that job in addition to the bankruptcy judge position. Both federal jobs, which until this month were considered part time, have been consolidated.

Following Brister's swearing-in ceremony in the federal courtroom, local attorneys on hand for the occasion remained for a retirement party in honor of 88-year-old Frank P. Murray.

Murray, who held the bankruptcy court judgeship since 1949, was the nation's oldest bankruptcy court judge during his last year of service with the feder-

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Gary Coleman, the 11-year-old actor who stars in the television series "Diff'ent Strokes," is a millionaire.

He also held the title of chancellor of the university campus at Favetteville The UA system also has campuses at Little Rock, Pine Bluff and Monticello, law schools at Fayetteville and Little Rock and a medical school at Little Rock. He was paid an annual salary of \$59,-

500 and was one of the state's highest paid employees. Before coming to Arkansas, Bishop was chancellor of the University of Mary-

land at College Park and prior to that was vice president of the University of North Carolina. Bishop spent most of his academic ca-

reer at North Carolina State University as a professor of agriculture and economics. He is married and has two children.

AUSTIN (AP) - Natural gas utility companies in Texas will be allowed to charge customers for part of their advertising costs, but not as much as they had

The Texas Railroad Commission adopted a rule Monday authorizing utilities to count as much as 0.2 percent of their gross revenues as allowable expenses for advertising when requesting rate increases.

Pioneer Natural Gas Co. of Amarillo had proposed a rule that would have let gas utilities include up to 0.5 percent of their revenues for advertising and for charitable contributions.

The commission, however, accepted the recommendation of hearing examiner Tom Hill to permit 0.2 percent for advertising only.

The commission said the rule does not allow money spent on political, religious or social causes to be counted in rate requests, nor money used to promote wasteful uses of energy.

Critics of the rule at a July 17 public hearing included utility analyst Jack Hopper of Electric Consumers of Texas. Inc.: ACORN - Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now - and Plainview City Councilman Tom Almon.

Hopper said Pioneer had threatened those who had received company contributions by indicating it would cut off support if they did not back the proposed



Americans Participating In National Unity Day

President Carter, urging Americans to fly their flag high in a demonstration of concern for American hostages in Iran, proclaimed today National Unity Day. He needn't have bothered. Most were way ahead of him.

Lights dimmed at halftime in San Diego Stadium. A "Days of Concern" week was in its third day in Greenfield, Mass. Connecticut Gov. Ella Grasso had suggested a silent candle vigil.

In Tehran, the first batch of Christmas cards reached the U.S. Embassy where students holding the hostages promised delivery to the captives.

Thousands more cards and packages flowed through U.S. Post offices toward the 50 American hostages. Postal workers at Kennedy Airport in New York said they were receiving 80,000 cards and letters a day addressed to the hostages.

Matthew Creegan flew the Stars and Stripes from his terrace at Co-op City in the Bronx. The 52-year-old letter carrier, angered at events in Iran, has flown the flag since Saturday from his apartment in the New York City borough.


Carter on Monday said the American flag would be "a most fitting symbol" to hostages in Tehran.

But Americans conceived other meth-

ods of observance. Gov. Grasso urged Americans in all towns and cities to gather at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday and burn candles in a silent vigil for the hostages.

In San Diego, Dorothea Morefield and her four children were special guests of San Diego Chargers President Eugene V. Klein for Monday night's game against the Denver Broncos for the American Conference West title. Morefield is U.S. consul-general in Tehran and one of the 50 Americans being held and threatened with spy trials.

Miss James, 21, recounted how she was working in her shop with Rhonda Jordan, 18, and Susanne Knight, 17, when discussion of a gift for the hostages came up Saturday.

'We were talking about sending a Christmas card but we were too late," she said. "So we ordered a floral arrange ment. We were curious if we could send something and they could receive it."

The comfortable, but by no means plush, Chennault Suite is being renamed in honor of the deposed Iranian monarch who spent two weeks there before leaving Saturday for Panama.

Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi, reputed to be one of the world's richest men, roughed it in a drab, wooden, twobarracks built for cadets during World War II and converted 16 years ago into modest suites for visiting colonels and generals. The daily rate is \$4 per per-

"These are nice by military standards, but I'm sure it's a budget motel. room compared to what the shah is used to," said Maj. Elliot Johnson as he led reporters on a tour of the quarters.

The shah didn't even get the best of the 12 suites in the building. Security problems prevented that. His bedroom window in the best suite would have overlooked a road rather than a fenced

The Shah Suite is a small, two-bed-

decor approximates that of a good, but not luxurious, hotel.

The shah's bedroom has one bedside table and lamp, a dresser, a plastic clock radio, a Gideon Bible and a brass bed a new one, not an antique. The sheets are military issue. There is daily maid serv-

The austere bathroom has no tub, only a shower.

A large console color television dominates the living room. There is also a couch, two easy chairs, a small desk and chair and a tiny kitchenette. The Shah Suite comes with complimentary Air Force stationery in the desk drawer.

Lackland's VOQ is a row of four asbestos-shingled barracks built in 1941 for aspiring air cadets. Few Air Force bases still use World War II vintage buildings for visiting officers.

Until the shah's barracks building was remodeled about three years ago for VIPs, all of the VOQ quarters were Spartan by even military standards. "I stayed in there before they remodeled them. Believe me, they were terrible," Johnson

The entire senior officers building

was reserved for the shah, his wife. Air

Force security agents and the shah's bodyguards, aides and dogs. The four-barracks complex, usually empty during the holidays, was sealed

Bruce Gulsby, the VOQ's civilian manager, acknowledged that a few rules had to be altered for the facility's celebrated visitor.

For instance, the instructions posted on the wall forbids pets. The shah's Great Dane and his wife's poodle always accompany the royal couple.

"A special exemption was made. The

dogs stayed in a laundry room," said

The notice in the hall sternly states: 'No weapons or ammunition will be retained in the facility. Such items will be registered and stored at the Security Pol-

The shah was heavily guarded by armed bodyguards and Air Force agents packing automatic weapons and hand grenades. "Obviously standard procedure couldn't apply there," Johnson

However, royalty did not earn the shah any special maid privileges.

necessary," she wrote. "It would have to be the best-kept secret ever. A Bloomington, Minn., resident wrote that the Iranian demands are not unrea-

sonable. "Tell the Iranians we are sorry we supported the shah after all," he told Carter. "Please forgive us. Here is your

A Norfolk, Va., correspondent asked sympathy for the shah. The author, whose letter predated the shah's recent departure for Panama, said the deposed "is welcome to stay at place. He can have food and a hot bath anytime. I am not a crackpot.

Recalling that Iran released 13 black and female hostages in the early days of the crisis, an Alexandria, Va., man suggested the United States use a similar

"Why do't we roud up all the Iranian students who are here illegally and hold them in jail until the hostages are released?" he asked. "We could send back the dark-skinned ones and the women and keep the light-skinned ones

Burt Reynolds Remains Top Box Office Draw

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - For the second straight year Burt Reynolds is king of the box office, an honor bestowed by the only people who really count - the men and women who own theaters.

Reynolds' arched eyebrow charm, wicked laugh and handsome kisser captivate women. Men are able to identify with his laid back, good old boy image, not to mention his sexual success with

The 48th annual Quigley Publications (a trade publishing house) poll of U.S. exhibitors, representing every part of the country, voted Reynolds the biggest marquee draw in the country

Reynolds' popularity in 1979 can be traced to the reception of "Starting Over" with Jill Clayburgh and residual receipts of "Smokey and the Bandit," the third most popular box office film of

all time behind "Star Wars" and "Jaws." Actor Reynolds' private life swinging bachelor who dates actress Sally Fields - apparently attracts as much attention as his antics on screen.

It was Reynolds' seventh appearance in the poll, going back to 1973 when he was voted No. 6.

This year Reynolds narrowly beat out Clint Eastwood for the No. 1 spot.

Eastwood has been a regular in the Quigley poll for the past 11 consecutive years, including first place in 1972 and 1973. He scored mightily at the box office this year with "Every Which Way But Loose" and "Escape From Alcatraz."

Curiously, "Every Which Way But Loose," a comedy in which Eastwood costarred with an orangutang, earned more money than all of the actor's "Dirty Harry" pictures combined.

The balance of the top 10 in the exhibitor poll: Jane Fonda (3), Woody Allen (4), Barbra Streisand (5), Sylvester Stallone (6). John Travolta (7), Jill Clayburgh (8), Roger Moore (9), Mel Brooks (10).

Fonda and Allen enjoyed big hits this year - Fonda in "The China Syndrome" and Allen in "Manhattan."

Stallone, who was No. 1 in 1977 thanks to "Rocky," placed sixth this year because of the overwhelming popularity of "Rocky II." Clayburgh's appearance with Reynolds in "Starting Over" accounts for her No. 8 spot.

Roger Moore made the list on the strength of "Moonraker," his most recent appearance as superhero James

But the inclusion of Streisand, Travolta and Brooks is incomprehensible unless their old pictures are being rerun in theaters. Streisand and Brooks did not appear in new movies during 1979.

Travolta, who may or may not be a flash-in-the-pan, was second in the poll last year because of the success of "Grease" on the heels of "Saturday Night Fever." His most recent film, Moment By Moment" with Lily Tomlin, was an unqualified box-office disas-


It's possible theater owners rate boxoffice power by past performances which would acount for the presence of Streisand (A Star is Born) and Brooks (Silent Mövie). Perhaps it's a projection of their future potential.

This theory is apparently borne out by the 15 stars who comprised the top 25 in the annual poll of theater owners.







Carter's handling of the Iranian crisis has helped give his standing with the public the largest boost of his tenure in office. But with more than 10 months left before the election, the seemingly intractable problems of the economy and energy are still major weak spots for

Carter's overall job rating has leaped 21 points since the crisis began and 15 points since the last AP-NBC News poll three weeks ago.

Forty-five percent of those questioned Dec. 11-12 said Carter's work overall is excellent or good. Forty-one percent said his work has been "only fair" and 12 percent rated it poor. Two percent of the 1,595 adults interviewed nationwide by telephone were not sure.

In mid-October, before the hostages were seized Nov. 4, 24 percent rated his work excellent or good and another 24

forts only fair. The rest were undecided.

The AP-NBC News poll taken Nov. 27-28 found 30 percent rating his work excellent or good, 49 percent only fair and 18 percent poor. Three percent were not

On foreign policy, 48 percent in the most recent poll said Carter's work has been excellent or good, up from 24 percent in October. Thirty-three percent said it has been only fair, down from 43 percent. Fifteen percent called it poor, just over half the 28 percent found in October. The remainder each month was undecided

On the specific issue of the Iranian crisis, Carter continued to draw overwhelming backing.

Sixty-nine percent said they approve of the way he is handling the situation Twenty-one percent disapprove. Nine percent were not sure and 1 percent had not heard of the crisis.

But on the economy and inflation, the public judgment of Carter remains harsh.

Nineteen percent said Carter is doing an excellent or good job on the economy. versus 35 percent who said he is doing a poor job. Forty-two percent said he is a doing only a fair job. Four percent were

Perception-Building

WASHINGTON (AP) - In the convoluted world of pre-primary politics, it seems better to be down than up. With a little luck, the self-proclaimed underdog can say, once the votes are counted, that he did better than expected.

So, President Carter's campaign chiefs are going through a period of what one called "building perceptions" in the contest for the Democratic presidential

Perception-building, as played every four years in Washington, involves creating impressions about how your candidate and his opponents will do in the political tests each faces.

At the heart of perception-building are predictions that your campaign will not do as well as the opponent's in a primary election, or contentions that a victory isn't important.

The campaign of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, Carter's leading challenger for the nomination, has done some perception-building of its own. In a recent interview, Kennedy said that Carter was 'clearly" the front-runner in the nomination race. In other words, he, Kennedy, was the underdog.

And last week, the Massachusetts senator said he was not surprised that public opinion polls show a dramatic rise in ap-

Robert Strauss and Timothy Kraft, the chiefs of the Carter-Mondale Presidential Committee, spent an hour Monday with a group of Washington columnists and reporters, offering as little as possible that might come back to haunt them in the next few months of primary elections.

Strauss, who has taken part in this exercise for several campaign seasons, led the journalists down the paths of finances, strategy and campaign themes. He encountered no dead ends.

After one series of questions, Strauss, exasperated, said: "I don't know where the hell we'll be next March. You'll make me eat my words.

On finances, Strauss said Carter was doing well - \$6 million in contributions. \$4 million in expenditures - and suggested that the Kennedy campaign was not as well off as the senator's team as-

Kennedy reportedly just cornered \$2.5 million in a week of fund-raisers, but Strauss, asserting there might be a gap between what was claimed and what actually was raised, said: "I'd like to have the difference to live on.

Tax Officer Appointed By County

LEVELLAND (Special) - Hockley county commissioners have appointed Christy Clevenger to serve as interim county tax assessor-collector following Wallace Thrash's removal from office.

Thrash, who has served as county tax issessor-collector since September, 1972, was indicted Dec. 8 by a Hockley County Grand Jury on five counts of alleged theft, tampering with government records and official misconduct. He is free on \$5,000 bond.

District Judge M.C. Ledbetter issued the order to temporarily remove Thrash from office Dec. 8. A hearing concerning Thrash's removal from office has been set for Jan. 7 in Judge Ledbetter's court. Arraignment for Thrash is scheduled Jan. 8 in the same court. Lubbock attorney Travis Shelton is representing

Hockley County district attorney E.W. Boedeker says he does not know if Thrash's salary will continue during the time he is suspended from office. "I am not sure about this and would prefer to do some checking before attempting to answer this question," Boedeker said. Records indicate that Thrash's salary for 1979 is \$17,258.76.

O.R. Watkins, retired school-city tax assessor-collector, had been named to fill Thrash's position but declined to take the job Dec. 10. Judge Ledbetter submitted Miss Clevenger's name after Watkins turned it down. She has served as chief deputy in the county tax office for sever-

Although officials said they do not know how much money is missing from county funds, Boedeker said the county tax assessor-collector allegedly charged \$1.50 each for abstract certificates issued. Thrash is accused of entering only \$1 into county books.

Boedeker said that investigations of the tax office began early in 1979 when the county commissioners court received a letter accusing Thrash of misconduct in connection with the county's refund account. The district attorney said audits of that account were instrumental in the de-

cision made by the grand jury. Thrash ran for county tax assessorcollector in the May 1972 primary, opposing incumbent Frank Burnett. Burnett resigned from the office before the general election, and Thrash was appointed to fill the unexpired term on Sept. 1, 1972. Thrash had been a farmer before he began serving as county tax assessor-

dents appointed in mid-July to investigate the myriad problems at Health Sciences Center Hospital delivered a mildly critical report Monday, but Lubbock County Hospital District officials appeared pleased with the results.

The committee of citizens, headed by Jim Granberry, had been asked by county commissioners to explore avenues of help for the facility.

"We think things have changed since we were appointed," Granberry told the LCHD board of managers. The hospital was still trying to overcome massive problems with its billing system as well as cut costs when Granberry's group took

He told the board that his group stood ready to do more work if needed, but added that redirection is needed in light of improvements already made at the facili-

Dr. R.C. Douglas presented his subcommittee's findings on relations between the hospital, Texas Tech and the university medical school, saying, "The biggest problem we see here is of operation and management." When talking about cooperation, the board needs to include more people, Douglas said.

He stressed that the medical staff is not necessarily the same as the medical school - that different rules and guidelines apply to each. Closer communication between the hospital administration and the medical staff was recommended.

Douglas also pointed out that there is virtually no communication between the hospital and regional counties, despite the reported "dumping" of non-paying patients by these counties. Subcommittee chairman Giles McCrary, who had researched the regional county program, also stressed the complete lack of com-

'With all due respect to the board," McCrary said, "there has been relatively

little effort made in the region toward communication." Hospital and county officials in the surrounding area don't know how to approach the hospital, even for admittance of patients who could pay

'You all have been so busy putting out day-to-day brush fires" that you haven't been able to work on overall policy, he said. McCrary said the neglect is understandable but needs to be remedied.

Douglas discussed reported problems with the hospital's nursing administrative staff, saying they are "running their own show" in many instances instead of

following hospital policy. The nursing staff is also resistant to change, he add-

Dr. John Selby was not present to give his report, but Granberry read the findings of his committee on community physicians' rapport with the hospital. He also mentioned the nursing staff, saying community physicians complained about

Selby said that private doctors complain they don't get as much attention at the hospital as does the medical school faculty and that their patients do not receive as much interest.

tal rules make it less appealing for doc-tors to work at Health Sciences. If privileges are broader in other city hospitals, few physicians feel compelled to bring their patients to Health Sciences.

Bill Moss, chairman of the committee for evaluation of political and govern-mental affairs, said his group has talked to local and area politicians, getting favorable response on the question of state support for the hospital.

"Our work is quiet and in the background," Moss said, explaining that most politicians didn't want to announce their support until campaigns get underway. He warned, however, that most people he has talked to stress that the hospital 'must have its house in order' financially before the legislature will look seriously at providing aid.

After Granberry's committee members finished their reports, the board voted to extend the suspension of the hospisuspension was merely a continuation of a money-saving policy instituted by the board in early summer, which eliminated the hospital's contributions to an employee retirement plan until the financial situation at the hospital stabilizes.

Soviets Begin Full-Scale Effort To Restore Yalta Meeting Site

YALTA, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Thirty-five years after the Yalta Conference, the Russians are still trying to get it all to-

A full-scale effort is now under way to restore Livadia Palace, where Josef Stalin, Winston Churchill and Franklin D. Roosevelt gathered for one of the most important meetings of this century.

Now, however, the palace is almost

Only one of its 60 rooms even remoteresembles the way it looked when the Big Three leaders met here Feb. 4-11, 1945, three months before the Third Reich's surrender, to divide up postwar Europe and plan the occupation of Ger-

A solid-looking round table and armchairs sit in the palace dining room, once used by Czar Nicholas II and later by Soviet lung patients. Could it be the conference table of the Allies?

"No," a guide said sadly. "But it looks just like it.

To make matters worse. Soviet archivists are just finding out that certain facts they collected on the meeting are For example, officials long thought

that a walnut-paneled room just off the main hallway was Roosevelt's bedroom during the talks. Historians now know it was really his reception room. And for years, the Russians thought

that a young man seated near Churchill in the official painting of the conference delegations was Sir Alan Brook, chief of the Imperial General Staff.

Actually, it is only an interpreter. Alexander I. Volkov, deputy director of the Livadia museum, said in an interview he was obtaining more information about the Yalta Conference almost daily, and tracking down the whereabouts of the Victorian furniture used for the week-long talks.

When the Soviet Crimea was occupied by Nazi forces, the Germans used Livadia Palace as their command post. Shortly before the Crimea was liberated on April 16, 1944, the Germans looted the palace, carting off everything from tables

to doorknobs to plumbing pipes. The Russians hastily refurbished the palace before the Yalta conference was convened. Stalin ordered furniture loaded onto trains and, immediately after the talks, ordered it sent back to Moscow.

No wonder, then, that the palace is still stripped bare.

Relatively young for a museum, Livadia Palace was opened to the public in 1974, to coincide with U.S. President Richard M. Nixon's visit to Yalta with Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev.

Soviet officials said they were disappointed that Nixon had declined their offer to tour the Yalta Conference site.

Once the summer watering place for only 224 wealthy Russian landowners or aristocrats, Yalta is now a bustling city of

Named for the Greek word meaning meadow, Livadia Palace was built as a summer home for Czar Nicholas II in

After 1934, the palace was used as a hospital for wounded soldiers under the German occupation. Partisans prevented the Nazis from blowing up the house when they departed in 1944.

While its inside may be depleted, the palace's grounds are immaculately kept. Its air is fragrant with cypress trees, evergreens and cedars of Lebanon.



Rocket-Powered Vehicle Smashes Sound Barrier

if. (AP) - With movie stuntman Stan Barrett at the controls, a rocket-powered dart on wheels roared to 739.666 mph and became the first land vehicle in history to break the sound barrier, according to Air Force measurements.

Barrett was driving the threewheeled, dart-shaped vehicle more than 600 mph on the strength of its 48,000-horsepower main engine before he turned on the added 6,000 pounds of thrust from the engine of a Sidewinder missile

through the sound barrier Monday to what the Air Force measured at Mach 1.0106 — or a little more than 1 percent above the speed of sound, car owner Hal Needham said.

"When I hit the Sidewinder I was really accelerating unbelievably," Barrett said. "I felt a lot of buffeting, then a period of smooth out, and then it was like it hit a wall, but it turned pretty smooth again. Then came the biggest jolt shortly after. I guess it was re-entry going

Ten hours after the run, the Air Force issued its figures along with a statement that its best engineeering practices were used to check the radar information. It said the data was "not calibrated or certified" and "in our judgment this data would not be sanctioned.

But that was enough for owner Needham, who plans no more sonic tries for

Russian Nuclear Sub Threat To U.S. Navy

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. intelligence sources say the Soviet Union has started deploying a new nuclear-powered attack submarine that is faster and can dive deeper than the most advanced American subs.

The Alfa-class submarine may pose a major problem for the U.S. Navy in the future if it is built in large numbers, analysts say. Attack submarines are used to fight other submarines and to hunt and sink naval and merchant surface ships.

U.S. intelligence has been aware for some time that the Russians were testing the new Alfa submarine, but its first operational deployment into the North Atlantic was detected only recently.

There were indications that the Alfa sub accompanied a Soviet missile-firing submarine from the northern part of the Soviet Union, using the noise of the Alfa's machinery to throw off U.S. acoustic devices seeking to track the missile submarine to its patrol area.

Workers Refraining From Rehabilitation

WASHINGTON (AP) - Many disabled American workers are discouraged from seeking rehabilitation because they are overinsured for disability, the health insurance industry says.

The Health Insurance Association said this week that in some cases, a disabled worker would lose money if he returned to his old job. An industry study suggests that limiting benefits to 55 percent to 65 percent of pre-disability gross income would encourage disabled workers to seek rehabilitation. Since disability benefits are tax free, the worker needs only 65 percent to 75 percent of his previous gross pay to maintain his standard of living, the study says.

be the use of titanium rather than steel in construction of hulls Titanium is considered to be much stronger than steel and able to take the enormous pressures experienced in ocean depths. Titanium is lighter in

weight than steel. The Soviets customarily pay less attention to making their submarines quieter, and thus less vulnerable to anti-submarine attacks, than do American designers. Navy experts say the Russians apparently are willing to sacrifice the security of quieter engines in favor of higher speeds generated by noisier power

President Pays Tribute To Jewish Hanukkah

UPDATE

WASHINGTON (AP) - As he lit the candles on a Hanukkah menorah, President Carter said the Jewish holiday celebrates a commitment to life and freedom that is especially meaningful while 50 Americans remain hostages in Iran.

The president lit only the star at the top of the national Christmas tree last week, saying the other lights will be illuminated when the hostages are freed.

On Monday night, he visited Lafavette Park at the north end of the White House where a 30-foot electronic menorah was erected to celebrate the eight-day Jewish Feast of Lights.

Hanukkah, which means "dedication," celebrates the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem more than 2,000 years ago by the Macabees after their victory over the Syrians. Carter described the holiday as marking a commitment to life and freedom.

'These commitments to live and to be free are ever-present in the hearts and minds of all Americans because we know that 50 of our fellow human beings, our fellow citizens, are not free and they want to live," he said.







Last-Minute Moves May Cut Tax Bills

NEW YORK (UPI) - Timing is the secret of many techniques for trimming income tax liability and, late as it is, there are adjustments that could save money on 1979 tax bills.

Here is a sampling of last-minute moves that might prove valuable before the Dec. 31 close of the normal tax year. None will work for every taxpayer and so should be verified as being applicable in individual circumstances.

"For most taxpayers, year-end tax planning takes the form of tax deferral," notes the accounting firm of Arthur Young & Co.

Tax deferral can mean speeding payments that will lead to deductions, delaying income where possible and, in some cases, foregoing deductions to produce a bigger break in future years.

Moving up deductible payments is the most obvious and easiest of tax moves. Charitable and political contributions, unreimbursed business expenses, medical and dental bills, state and city tax payments, among other items, are deductible within permissible limits for the year that payment is made.

Before grabbing the checkbook, however, figure out whether any added deductions will have the most value this year. The standard deduction, now known as the zero bracket amount, has been raised to \$3,400 for marrieds filing jointly in 1979 and to \$2,300 for singles.

If total itemized deductions, including accelerated payments, do not exceed the zero bracket amount or are borderline, consider shifting payments into 1980. These plus acclerated payments at the end of 1980 could make itemizing next year more worthwhile.

Some taxpayers make this a routine crowding controllable deductions into alternate years and settling for the zero bracket amount in the interim.

Medical and dental expenses, if you

have some choice about them, are a good area to apply this tactic. Such expenses are deductible to the extent they exceed 3 percent of adjusted gross income. Any payments that don't push you over the 3 percent minimum provide no tax benefit.

In deciding to lump medical payments, remember that prepaying for treatment next year does not qualify for a deduction this year.

Prepaying interest, such as on a home mortgage, isn't allowed as a deduction although points paid on a home mortgage generally can be deducted currently.

Champions At All Levels

A. We figure Rose made that comment as a joke, to downgrade the generosity of his gifts. If he wasn't joking, he's in trouble with IRS on that point. You can make no deductions for charity if the gift is to an individual. There is a \$25 limit to gifts of good will. Finally, an employee is not allowed to dispense such

So Rose has to pay the tax on the \$20,000 himself.

Q. I understand that the National Football League will never grant a franchise in Canada without permission of the Canadian Football League, unless the CFL has completely gone out of existence. Can you tell me what the prospects are for either?

-Jules Klein, Montreal,

A. The CFL couldn't survive if its larger cities went into the NFL. It may not survive, anyway. According to expert journalist Gorde Hunter, Hamilton, Saskatchewan, Ottawa and Winnipeg are in severe financial difficulty, and Vanocouver is asking city fathers to build a \$100 million stadium.

Some clubs have kept heads above water in the past by staging \$100-a-plate dinners in the off-season. But that won't cut it these days. Hunter gives the CFL five years to fold.



'Cool Clyde' Returns As Honoree

He was cool Clyde, a proud peacock strutting his gaudy plummage. He tooled around town in a Rolls Royce, wearing fancy furs and partying till the wee hours at the poshest night spots before retiring to his East Side penthouse with the round bed and mirrored ceiling.
"When people think of New York

they think of Walt Frazier," he said. And he believed it. When someone described him as a black Joe Namath, he countered by saying Namath was "a white Walt

For years the city was his personal plaything. He had it all, and used it all for his enjoyment. He was young, handsome, rich, sexy, talented and famous, envied by men and desired by women.

'It was a perfect marriage," he said of his decade with the New York Knicks. 'They got two championships and I got fame and glory.

It was, for cool Clyde, the best of all possible worlds. And then it all came apart. A back injury in 1975 reduced his

effectiveness; the retirements of Willis Reed and Deve DeBusschere reduced it even more. The Knicks fell below the 500 mark and Clyde, in the forefront during the glory days, bore the brunt of the blame

"It got so bad that I became a recluse." he recalled. "I staved to myself and did a lot of reading and soul-search-

In 1977, the marriage came to an end. The Knicks signed Jim Cleamons to take his place and shipped Frazier - their alltime leader in scoring and seven other categories and a symbol of the cosmopolitan, championship team - off to Cleveland. . . Cleveland, of all places.

"I never did do much partying out there," said Frazier. "I lived out in the country and didn't go out much."

Leg injuries, plus a personality clash with coach Bill Fitch, reduced Frazier to a spectator for most of his two seasonsplus with the Cavaliers. When new coach Stan Albeck swiched to a all-out running game this season, the 34-year-old Frazier found himself left in the starting gate. He was placed on the injured list as the Cavs tried to deal him, then placed on waivers when they found no takers.

'Nobody wants to go out on waivers - I never even knew what waivers were," said Frazier.

Embittered? Disgruntled? Angry? Not at all. It was a calm, composed Walt Frazier - surprisingly so - who spoke of the bad times as well as the good prior to last Saturday night's stirring ceremony at Madison Square Garden, when his uniform No. 10 was retired. Frazier joined Reed, his teammate on the 1970 and 1973 National Basketball Association champions, as the only Knicks players to be so honored.

"I've learned more from the bad times than the good," said Frazier. "The trade completed me as a person, as a man. Now I'm at peace with myself.

room blackboard. It was textbook football, performed to perfection by Prof. Staubach.

He has done it before, of course. Fourteen times in his career. Staubach has taken Cowboy teams that were behind in the final two minutes and marched them to the winning points. That is a frightening, almost awesome ability to ignore the pressure of the clock and perform small-sized miracles.

The technique is simple. Staubach uses the clock, getting maximum production out of each and every second. He will call two pass plays in the huddle. If the first one is complete, say in the middle of the field, then the second one is incomplete, thrown out of bounds, stopping the clock and saving a timeout. Staubach preserves his timeouts, protecting them for those final moments when Dallas needs them most.

One last-gasp touchdown is tough enough but on Sunday, Staubach needed two of them to catch Washington in the waning minutes. With 3:49 to play and the Redskins leading 34-21, Randy White recovered a fumble, giving Dallas the opening it needed.

Staubach needed just 89 seconds for the first touchdown, moving the Cowboys 59 yards on three passes, zip. . .zip. . zip, dissecting the Redskins' defense like a surgeon working with a scalpel.

Now, with 2:20 left, Dallas was still six points short. Other teams might have tried an onside kick at that point, concerned that they might otherwise never see the football again. But the Cowboys have confidence in their defense and on third-and-two Larry Cole stopped John Riggins cold, forcing the punt.

With 1:46 left. Staubach was at his 25yard line. This time, the TD drive took 67 seconds and when Rafael Septien kicked the extra point, the Cowboys had the victory and another NFC East title.

And there were still 39 seconds of those precious last two minutes to spare. Staubach threw 10 passes in the two

scoring drives, each one of them from the shotgun formation, where he has an extra second or two to make each play work. Most other clubs shun the shotgun and some even make fun of it. But Staubach flourishes with that extra sevenyard margin working for him, and who can argue with success?

Now he has the club back in the playoffs and don't be surprised if Dallas is the NFC club in Pasadena on Jan. 20 for Super Bowl XIV. It would be a fitting climax to what has been a bizarre year for the Cowboys

One of their defensive ends has been busy trying to prove he's not Too Tall to become a champion boxer. Their most flamboyant linebacker is prematurely retired, waiting for Hollywood to discover

Their best wide receiver spiked a ball in the end zone with such exuberance that he twisted his knee and has been virtually invisible ever since. They have played with 10 men on the field and they have played with 12 men on the field And they even, occasionally, have played

with the regulation 11 men on the field. Though all of this riot and ruin, Staubach stands tall. In the most hopeless of situations with time running out, with the crowd roaring, with the game on the line, he remains cool. But Lombardi could tell you all about that. After all, cool, like cold, is just a state of mind.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) -Norm Ellenberger's reign over the University of New Mexico basketball program apparently has come to an end, although the flamboyant coach still has one last hope.

Ellenberger, known as "Stormin' Norman" during the days when his free-wheeling basketball teams were chalking up victories and attracting large crowds, was fired Monday by university president William E. Davis.

But Davis said Ellenberger can ap-

peal the decision to the university's Board of Regents.

Neither Ellenberger nor his attorney, David Norvell, was available for comment on whether they would appeal. But Norvell left the door open for such an ac-tion by saying in a letter to Davis that he did not believe "due process had been af-forded his client."

Davis said Norvell told him in the letter that Ellenberger had not been able to speak for himself while his status at the university was being considered because of a grand jury investigation. The grand jury is looking into possible mail fraud and bribery involving the junior college transcripts of a player on the UNM basketball squad.

Davis said at a news conference Monday that he received the letter from Norvell earlier in the day. He said it was in response to a letter of dismissal for Ellenberger that he had delivered to the attorney Sunday.

In announcing the firing of Ellenberger, Davis read the letter of dismissal.

He said he had reached the same conclusion as the university's Athletic Council, which decided after a hearing Friday that Ellenberger had violated regulations of the university, the Western Athletic Conference and the NCAA.

And he said because "these actions further constitute willful and grossly incompetent conduct injurious to the University of New Mexico basketball program" he had decided that he "must dismiss" Ellenberger.

Ellenberger, 47, was in the final year of a three-year contract that paid him an estimated \$38,000 a year. He had been the Lobos' head coach since 1972 and his teams had compiled a 134-62 record.

New Mexico won the WAC title in two of those seven years and the Lobos' home attendance was among the highest in the nation.

John Bridgers, UNM's new athletic director, also appeared at the news conference and said the search for a new coach would begin immediately.

Charlie Harrison, an Ellenberger assistant, has been running the club since Ellenberger was suspended by Davis late last month. Bridgers said he would not consider Harrison for the head job but would recommend that the new coach retain Harrison as an assistant.

Bridgers said he had no evidence that Harrison, who joined the UNM staff this year, was involved in any of the alleged doctoring of transcripts. He said, however, since Harrison had been a member of Ellenberger's staff that he believed it was important for the image of the university that Harrison not be given the head coaching position.

Ellenberger and his chief recruiter, Manny Goldstein, were suspended by Davis Nov. 30 in the wake of an FBI investigation into possible mail fraud and bribery involving the alleged doctoring of transcripts for a junior college transfer

on the Lobo basketball squad. Goldstein resigned last week

The coaches were suspended after the FBI released a transcript of a wiretap telephone conversation in which Ellenberger and Goldstein discussed a method to falsify a player's academic transcript so he would be eligible to play at UNM.

The transcript, contained in a sworn affidavit filed in U.S. District Court, alleged that Goldstein had the junior college transcript of UNM basketball player Craig Gilbert doctored.

By KAY BELL Avalanche-Journal Staff Sixty farm laborers have filed lawsuits in federal court accusing two Lamb County farmers of illegally contracting farm work in 1978 and 1979 and failing to pay, workers the minimum wage.

The farm workers, all Mexican-Americans living in or near Earth, contend they were hired to work for Bill Watson and Weldon Barton by a third party not registered as a farm labor contractor with the Department of Labor.

And, according to the separate law-suits prepared by Edward J. Tuddenham of Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc., in Hereford, both Barton and Watson paid the laborers only \$1.85 per hour for hoeing fields during the 1978-79 agricultural sea-

All 60 of the farm workers are listed as plaintiffs in the suit against Watson. Thirty-six also initiated the similar legal action against Barton. Both lawsuits also ask the court to grant the petitions "representative" status for other farm workers they say also were illegally hired and underpaid by the Lamb County landown-

The petitions, filed in Lubbock's U.S. District Court, allege that Barton and Watson approached Maximo Bosquez in June 1978 and June 1979 and asked Bosquez to recruit field workers.

However, the suits charge, Bosquez was not a registered farm recruiter as required by the federal Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act. And neither Barton nor Watson asked about Bosquez's status as a contractor when they asked him to find workers they could hire at \$1.85 an hour, the suits contend.

Additionally, the petitions charge Watson and Barton with the federal violation of not maintaining employee work records for the two seasons the field workers were hired.

The farm workers are asking that a jury hear the cases and then award the laborers \$500 each for each proven violation against Watson and Barton. The workers also are seeking the additional money they would have made during those two seasons if they had received the federal minimum wage - \$2.65 per hour in 1978 and \$2.90 in 1979.

Early Therapy Will Help

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm writing to you about my daughter who is 65 years old. She went to town with her cousin. She came home 10 minutes after she had left and said she felt funny and couldn't stand on her left foot. She wanted to go to the bathroom so I put my arm around her but before we got there she went down with no feel-

ing in her left foot and all her left

We called the doctor and he said she had a stroke. He put her in the hospital but two weeks have passed and there has not been any improvement. She gets two therapy treatments a day but her hand and foot are useless. She has a good mind and has never had high blood pressure and didn't smoke. Why would something strike her just like that? Will she ever get better? Her doctor tells her it will take time. I really need her and miss

her so much

DEAR READER - Of course you miss her. It's always a shock when you see someone who appears to be perfectly healthy develop some sudden severe illness such as a stroke or heart attack. It's true that smoking cigarettes, having high blood pressure

and having high cholesterol levels all increase your risk of having either a stroke or a heart attack. The fact that you don't have any of these risk factors doesn't guarantee that you won't have one. It just decreases the risk. By the time a woman reaches 65

years of age in our society, she frequently has quite a few fatty cholesterol deposits in her arteries to the brain, to the heart and elsewhere in the body just like men. That's why the rates of heart attacks for men and women become equal at about that age. At earlier ages, they are more common in men. Strokes are sometimes confusing to people because they can produce

such a wide variety of symptoms. Almost all of our visible body functions are passed through the brain. Moving your feet, hands and body all depend on going through the central switchboard of the brain itself. The same applies to speaking, swallowing and various facial movements.

A stroke involves damage to an area of the brain. If it happens to be an area that controls the left arm and left leg, they may be paralyzed as in your daughter's case. A different area might involve the right arm and right leg and they would be paralyzed. Still a different area might affect the To give you a better idea of what

To prevent strokes you should do about the same things you do to try to prevent heart attacks. Stay lean, stay on a low-fat, low cholesterol diet, stay physically active and don't smoke cigarettes. The same measures are important after a stroke has occurred to avoid a second one. Certain medicines are also important.

Many patients can be significantly improved by early therapy. The fact that your daughter is in the hospital and getting therapy is in her favor. Such early therapy often will help a person regain his speech more rapidly if it is possible or regain better muscle
