

Sugar and spiec should be kept in clean, tight containers. "When you open your cupboard door and get a spley whiff of cinnamon or cloves, you've been caught off guard," the specialist says." You are losing fine flavor along with that fragrance on the kitchen air."

The best place to store flour is in a tight can, jar or bin which will keep out light as well as moisture, mice, bugs, and dust. In humid climates, bread will stay fresh longer and keep from molding if it is wrapped in moisture proof paper and put in the refrigerator. In drier climates it can be put in a ventilated box.
