No 'Quick Fix' Foreseen For Hospital Problems

BROOKWOOD Medical Services representatives are confident they can pull Health Sciences Center Hospital out of its financial tailspin — but they warn against expecting any quick solutions.

The director of hospital development for the Birmingham, Ala., management firm, Robert Berryman, spoke optimistically of the hospital's future Thursday. He had just been told by officials from the U.S. Department of Health, Educathe U.S. Department of Health, Educa-tion and Welfare that his firm has 90 days to draft a prediction of hospital fi-nances for the department to study.

The study will be used in determining whether HEW will grant the Lubbock County Hospital District a delay in making its substantial twice-yearly loan

"Everybody is looking for a quick fix," Berryman said. "It just won't hap-

He said his firm would not be able to save the hospital during the 90-day trial period, but would be able to work up a plan of action for overhauling the facili-

Brookwood has a track record of taking financially strapped hospitals and turning them around, Berryman

claimed. He admitted during Thursday's meeting with HEW that the firm-has not previously contracted with teaching hospitals, but added that individuals within the firm (including himself) do have that

City Council members decided Thursday to co-sponsor the meeting, scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Thursday in the Civic Center Banquet Hall, after learning that implementation of the state tax reform

legislation must begin this fall.

By Nov. 15 all taxing authorities in Lubbock County must have elected a five-member board of directors for the appraisal district, City Manager Larry

Cunningham told the council. All taxing authorities are covered by the so-called Peveto bill with the exception of county governments which must decide by Sept. 15 whether they will par-ticipate in the single appraisal districts. "The thing we feel we need to do is

get the taxing authorities together in some sort of meeting," Cunningham said, "so we all have an understanding of what the effects (of the law) will

School Superintendent Ed Irons, who was present for the council discussion, said the meeting should be held as soon as possible because of deadlines set for

ementing the law. The taxing authorities in the apprais-al district will share in the cost of running the district based on their share of the total tax levy, Cunningham said, but the special districts like water and hospi-tal districts won't have a say in who is

on the district's board.

Votes for members of the board of directors are based on a taxing authority's share of the total district tax levy.

On the advice of City Attorney John Ross, the council voted to file a class action suit against signers of LPOA petitions calling for a charter amendment election. The suit asks for a definition of the council's responsibilities regarding the election.

"It is clear you are being asked to

"It is clear you are being asked to take an action in clear conflict with the state constitution and state law," Ross

Election Request Denied He recommended, and the council animously approved, not calling an election "at this time" and authorizing the

judgment.
The class action "is the only way to receive a final determination and have the issues laid to rest" as to whether the three proposed charter amendments are in conflict with state law and are not subject to the initiative process, Ross

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'Living In Terror,' Similar To Plot Of Birds' Says Family PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Tom and Patricia Smith are living in terror, the kind befitting a scene from Alfred Hitchcock's film "The Birds."

The difference is the Smiths' problem is bats — about 800 of them — which are nesting in the attic of their 150-year-old home in nearby Franklin Park.

Small enough to fit through a crack just % of an inch wide, they swarm from the house at dusk every night to find food and return before dawn.

They rattle at the bedroom windows and scare the children playing nearby. Once, one of them got through a window and

scared the Smiths' 6-year-old daughter, Jennifer, so badly she

became hysterical and has been receiving counseling since.

"Have you ever seen 'The Birds?" Mrs. Smith asked.

"That's what it looks like. They come out in groups of 25 or 30 from all sides of the house. They'll fly around the house or fly off and come back at 4 or 5 a.m.

And Mrs. Smith readily admits, "We're definitely scared." The Smiths so far have been unsuccessful in fighting off their unwanted boarders. They hired a roofer to patch the cracks and holes that let the bats out, but the creatures scared

After rejection from six exterminating companies, they've contracted a national company to do the job.

But even after the bats are all dead, the problem won't be

"The main thing is to kill them, but we'll have to get rid of them, too," Mrs. Smith said. "Once they die they'll become imbedded in the rafters and bring bugs upon them; which

The Smiths bought the old house for \$35,000 last November. The former owners never mentioned that Dracula's pets

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



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

Right Man For Tough Job

THE APPOINTMENT of New York banker Paul A. Volcker as chairman of the Federal Reserve Board brought President Carter the most rousing round of applause he's heard since inauguration day.

Praise of Volcker as "an excellent choice" came from the financial community, economists, Wall Street and a cross-section of Congressmen.

They said his knowledge, wisdom and experience will reassure our allies about the direction of U.S. monetary policy, stabilize the dollar and assure that the Fed will remain politically independent and not subject to pressure from the White House during next year's Presidential campaign.

THAT'S HIGH PRAISE indeed and, with his confirmation practically assured, gives Volcker a healthy send-off on his mission of helping to solve the nation's mushrooming economic crises.

Outgoing Chairman G. William Miller, who has been tapped to succeed Michael Blumenthal as Secretary of the Treasury, former Chairman Arthur Burns, Blumenthal, stock market analysts, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., chairman of the Senate Banking Committee and a frequent critic of Millet were among those rushing out with high praise of Volcker.

SALT II--A Reluctant Vote

THE FINELY orchestrated effort on the SALT II could take place without detecpart of the Carter administration to gain approval for SALT II continued in Washington

Sometimes, one had the feeling, as did members of the Senate Committees conducting hearings on the crucial pact, that the hand of the director could be seen either shing or propping up the person testifying

This was true in the appearance of some members of the military high command and top officials.

THE LATEST such "convert" is none other than Malcolm Toon, U.S. ambassador to the Soviet Union.

Discarding what he termed an initial reluctance to back the controversial SALT II treaty. Toon told members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that it is "the best that could have been obtained."

Toon originally had said that concern over the loss of U.S. intelligence listening posts in Iran might cause him to oppose the treaty on grounds that Soviet compliance with its terms could not be adequately veri-

But, in a change of heart, he told the Senators that after receiving the same briefings given President Carter, he has concluded that "no militarily significant violations of

hope. And if he is unusually successful, his "non-political" appointment could be the best political move Jimmy Carter has made.

TOON, WHO has submitted his resignation, remains as ambassador pending Senate okay of former IBM executive Thomas J. Watson Jr., who has been named to succeed

Apparently Toon did not address himself to just how the U.S. will be able to replace the loss of the key Iranian listening posts, nor the fact that Russia is still objecting to U.S. flights of its U-2 planes over Turkey to check on Soviet activities.

In view of past Russian transgressions and broken promises, not to mention treaties, verification is a must.

TOON'S SUPPORT for SALT II follows endorsement of the pact by some of the nation's top military leaders.

Senators have shown an increasing interest in seeking to learn how many "arms have been twisted" to elicit what appears to be a steady diet of support for the pact.

In view of the White House's new "stick by the President or else" policy, one has to wonder if those in and out of uniform are speaking "the party line," or their own deep-rooted feelings.

Perhaps we shall learn more when the 'opposition" is heard from later.

Humans Die Not Pests Due To Pesticide Ban

WASHINGTON—Among the untold stories of our time is the fact that self-styled humanitarians in the United States are helping inflict enormous suffering on millions of people around the globe. I refer to the relentless warfare of the so-called

wironmental movement and its allies in the U.S. government against the use of agricultural

In the endless struggle against disease and fam-ine, the technological breakthrough symbolized by the initials "DDT" was a glorious victory for

By bringing pests and parasites under control, it curtailed such lethal diseases as malaria, typhus and yellow fever and permitted a dramatic increase in agricultural yields.

IN THE PAST decade, however, much of this achievement has been unraveled. Thanks to the crusade of the environmentalists, and the regulations of the government, DDT and many other pesticides have been banned, while development of possible substitutes has been brought to an

ective halt. The result is that the insect hordes once tamed by science and technology are staging a spectacular comeback, bringing with them resurgent illness and starvation.

Two recent news items tell the story. One reveals that hordes of grasshoppers are swarming through the Western and Midwestern states, threatening colossal devastation to crop and

rangeland.

States reportedly hit by grasshopper plagues are Arizona, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas and Wyoming. In some of these states, grasshopper populations have reached a level of 100 per square yard (eight is considered enough to justify emergency spray-

THE GRASHOPPERS, along with other in-sects, have staged their comeback since the ban-ning of DDT and other pesticides. In this respect, consider a second item in the

news, which tells us a federal judge in South Dakota has barred emergency use of the chemical

toxaphene against the grasshoppers.

Meanwhile, the grasshoppers are proliferating. The problem was lucidly stated by the late Dr. Robert White-Stevens, chairman of the Bureau of Conservation and Environmental Science at Rutgers, in an address prepared for delivery shortly before his death last fall.

ACROSS THE United States, he noted, a plague of spruce budworms, tent caterpillars, grasshoppers, gypsy moths and numerous other insects had been allowed to spread, rayaging millions of acres of cropland and forest-all in the name of preserving the environment.

'Along the Eastern seaboard." White-Stevens noted, "from New England to West Virginia, more than two million acres of forest, parkland and ornamental trees...have been defoliated by a

resurgence of the gypsy moth.
"Some areas of New Jersey have lost over 75 percent of the oaks to repeated annual defoliation by this major forest pest...The gypsy moth is demic in all the New England states, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, sequestered in nearly 10 million acres."

OVERSEAS, THE problem is even worse. In countries such as India, Sti Lanka, and Bangladesh, the phaseout of DDT has permitted a grim resurgence of malaria.

On the Indian subcontinent, the number of malaria cases has risen to more than six million a year, accompanied by more than half-a-million

In Africa, in 1977, an estimated one million children died of the disease.

As Dr. White Stevens put it: "The enormity of the inexcusable campaign to ban DDT and its re-lated organo chloride pesticides is now beginning to become clearly apparent...Millions of innocent humans will perish untimely as a result of these misdirected, arrogant decisions."

For the first time, Reagan defeated Jimmy Carter in the last national poll. He's been leading all other contenders for the Republican nomina tion forever, although he's not an active candidate and has kept a low profile.

Listen to one of Jerry Ford's top helpers, who would commit suicide if he was identified in

"There is a feeling in the Republican Party that Reagan is the only candidate who could beat Teddy Kennedy," he says.

Jimmy Carter? "Reagan," says the ex-Ford man, "would win in a landslide. We don't worry about Carter "

Reagan is a positive candidate. He knows what he's for and what he's against. But he no longer is an isolated far-right conservative.

THE MIDDLE has moved toward him, as a man who has always been for a balanced budget and against buckling under to "foreign powers," a man who has always been against high taxes and Big Government.

Indeed, one of the best things that has happened to Ronald Reagan is the current energy

Middle America sees the crisis as a plot by "foreign powers" to bring us to our knees. And it remembers that Reagan is accustomed to speaking softly but wielding a big stick.

Jimmy Carter also has given Reagan aid and comfort. Carter campaigned as an anti-Big government candidate. He's only made government worse, as Reagan reminds his adoring audiences in his best I-told-you-so tones.

REAGAN HASN'T changed basically. He still thinks the Panama Canal treaty was a giveaway. But so do a lot of American voters. He thinks SALT II stinks. So do a lot of American voters.

He wants to cut taxes and get government regulators off business's back. So do a lot of American voters. Reagan is the biggest draw on the Republican

rubber-chicken circuit. That figured. The man is an authentic star up on that stage.

What didn't figure a few years ago was that he'd be drawing GOP moderates and liberals to hear his litanies about what a lousy job a Democratic President is doing.

These are the same people who in 1976 thought a Reagan candidacy would be the death of the Republican Party.

THERE REMAINS the issue of age. Reagan would be 70 years old shortly after moving into

But that doesn't bother members of his team, who claim that age is relevant and that their tiger is in better physical and mental shape than any

There remains, too, Jerry Ford. The report persists that Ford has told his pals that if Reagan is leading in the early primaries, he'il jump in to "save the party" from the Californian.

That would be interesting; Ford still has plenty

of friends in the party. But this is not 1976. Reagan now has broadened his support. Now he has the aura of a winner. And he's not even running

MAYOR DIRK West isn't your ordinary, gar-den variety mayor. Or cartoonist either, for that

"Duh Dirk," as his Aggie "admirers" admit, is a man who speaks his mind.

Accordingly, he steps on some toes. And sometimes turns around a time or two to get attention. He also isn't afraid to work, to learn something new, to defend and criticize his city.

Mayor West, his prematurely gray hair more so after four years as mayor pro-tem and about 15 months as mayor, did all those things in a "State of The City" report to the Downtown Rotary Club this week.

As an avowed "one-termer." Dirk the mayor told it as he sees it. As Dirk the person, it's the only way he knows.

HIZZONER SAYS he learned one thing very

quickly in his job...
"It's called the theory of disbursement," he said. "That is, whatever hits the fan isn't necessarily distributed equally.

What Mayor West has to say about the "plus" side of Lubbock is worth sending to prospective residents and businessmen. Here is a brief rundown as West sees Lubbock today...

"Lubbock has about 200,000 citizens, approximately 17 percent Mexican American, at percent black...Lubbock has 51 public schools, Texas Tech University, Lubbock Christian College and other institutions of learning, both publ-

"There are more than 150,000 vehicles registered for street use in Lubbock County...We are the home of Reese Air Force Base, with around 3,300 civilian and military personnel...Lubbock is the world's largest inland cotton market, and home of the world's largest cotton seed oil mill.

"Lubbock is known as a city of churches with some of the largest congregations in the world. "Our annual retail sales are almost a billion dollars. Our unemployment rate is one of the lowest in the nation. We are the eighth largest city in Texas, and we have the lowest tax rate of any of the eight...'

THERE'S MORE, the Mayor said. With the good news, there is some bad news...
"In 1977, Lubbock led the nation in traffic deaths per capita...In 1978, our crime rate was about the worst in Texas per capita...

"We are outgrowing our water supply...We are outgrowing our Police and Fire protection capa-bilities...We are outgrowing our streets and traff-

We are faced with expanding our city services to take care of 200,000 people today and planning for 300,000 people 10 years from now...
"Lubbock had an unprecedented tax revolt last
Spring. We are victims of inflation, and we are

concerned about rising costs of living... As mayor, these facts and figures also impress me," he said.

HIZZONER SAYS the days of the "ribbon-cutting" mayor are over.

West says he's not putting down the folks who came before him because "a major reason we have such a fine city is the work those people did

But today, it's a whole new ball game... A ball game where nice guys might finish last. Hard, unpopular decisions have to be made...And tough problems arise constantly.

West says he has been a bit "pushy" at times. "I have lectured a few people. But, by being somewhat pushy and aggressive," he says, "we have done something about our shockingly bad traffic record," citing a 50 percent reduction in

The mayor says something has been done about Line and Crime Eye with making major inroads in recent weeks. "And in addition to cutting taxes, in spite of continuing inflation we are going to hold taxes down...'

ONE OF THE "sore points" which rankles West is the demand by some for more and more reductions in taxes and then more and more complaints about lack of certain city services.

"Less local government...less controls...less expense...less services? What these folks that gripe the most want is a

free lunch, and as the saying goes, there ain't no such thing as a free lunch anymore... Then Hizzoner makes his point: "I want to tell you something that I believe sincerely. The City of Lubbock is run as inexpensively, conservatively and as expertly as any city even close to our size in the nation. There is no doubt whatever

that you get your money's worth in Lubbock for

the city taxes you pay." THE PAST five years that West has served on the City Council have been busy ones.

As he noted, in that period, Lubbock got a new city manager, a new city secretary and city attorney, a new airport terminal, a new Civic Center, a new Canyon Lakes area, lots of new people, new industries and "goodness knows what we will see in the next five years ... "

As we said, it was a virtuoso performance. And although we haven't always agreed with "Duh" Dirk, overall he's done a good job

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Parts Of 'Horror' Story Said Born Out Of 'Many Bottles Of Wine'

AMITYVILLE, N.Y. (AP) — A law-yer for the man who killed six members of his family in the house that inspired the book and film "The Amityville Horror" said Thursday that parts of the best-seller were invented "over many bottles of wine.

William Weber, who represented Ronald DeFeo, convicted in the 1974 slayings of his parents and siblings in the house said some events in the book by Jay Anson were made up by George and Kathy Lutz, who lived in the house for just 28 days before moving in January

Among the fabrications are so-called horrors of green slime coming from the keyholes, a stench, gnats and flies in a bedroom and unexplained noises, Weber

Reached at ABC where they were appearing on "Good Morning America" Thursday, the Lutzes declined to discuss the book. However, they insisted during their TV appearance to promote today's national premiere of the movie that the experiences recounted in the book had actually happened to them.

Told of Weber's charge, John Koshel, the general counsel for Prentice-Hall Inc., which published the hardcover book, said it would be inappropriate for him "to comment on the alleged inaccuracies or untruths in the book since the

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Cost Of Gasoline To Blame For Consumer Price Rise In June

WASHINGTON (AP) — The soaring cost of gasoline and fuel oil pushed consumer prices up another 1 percent in June as inflation continued to erode the value of American incomes at an annual rate of over 13 percent, the government reported

Prices have increased 6.3 percent since December, meaning the dollar lost 6.3 cents of its purchasing power from January through June. Inflation for the year is now projected at 10.6 percent by the Carter administration.

sumer prices increased 1.1 percent in May and have increased near or above 1 percent in every month so far this year. The annual rate of increase in consumer prices for the past three months was

13.4 percent, the worst in more than five years - since a 14 percent annual rate of increase in the first three months of 1974.

Alfred Kahn, the president's chief inflation adviser, said rising oil prices were responsible for about half of the overall increase in June and are the major cause in the worsening of inflation this year.

Gasoline prices increased 5.6 percent in June to an average of 85.6 cents per gallon for regular, while fuel oil prices increased 8.6 percent. Gasoline has increased at

an annual rate of 60.8 percent so far this year, while fuel oil has risen at a 70.6 per-

An annual rate means that if price increases continued at the same rate, that would be the total increase for the year. The price figures also are adjusted for sea-

There was a good report on food prices, which edged up only 0.2 percent in June, the smallest monthly increase in a year. Grocery store prices actually declined 0.1 percent on the strength of a drop in prices of meats, poultry, fish and eggs. Beef prices, which had increased sharply during the preceding eight months, dec-

lined 1.3 percent However, the Agriculture Department reported separately that it expects retail food prices to rise "close to 11 percent" during all of 1979, which means steep increases are still ahead this year.

HEARTLINE: I am 77 and can no longer live alone as I'm doing now. When my grandson was 11 years old, I took over his care. Now he is 30 and married and both he and his wife work. I would like to sell my home and use this money to help them buy a place for all of us. How do I go about this as cheaply as possible on taxes, etc.? Do I just give them the money? I'm not particular that my name be on the property. -

There are various ways you could transfer the money to your grandson and his family. In most cases, Uncle Sam will get his cut one way or another. You might consider giving your grandson and each person in his family \$3,000 per year, because you can give this much a year as a tax-free gift. Depending on how much you receive from the sale of your home, you could give each member of his family \$3,000 between now and Dec. 31, and then give another \$3,000 to each of them again on Jan. 1. You can make this gift every year.

This would require filling out a gift tax return each year, but the gift of up to \$3,000 per person is tax-free for you and them. You might discuss this with your bank, a reputable tax consultant or an attorney, but this is, as you wanted, a cheaper way to pass on funds to loved ones. Just check with the right people and make the decision that best fits the needs of you and your family.

HEARTLINE: My sister-in-law has lived with my wife and I for the last 19 years since her mother passed away. Last year, she developed a rare disease and it necessitated removal of her forearm. Since that time, she has been unable to work. I got her on Social Security disability, and on July 4, she turned age 62. I can't even get straight information from Social Security about my question.

What we really want to know is - is on Social Security disability? Her only income right now is her disability check for \$248 per month. Our concern is if she needs further hospitalization, whom can we write or go to? I am on Social Security myself at age 62 and my finances are also limited. One source said she has to wait two years after going on disability. Another said she is automatically covered now. Can you give us a straight answer? - G.F.S.

At least one of your sources is correct. Your sister-in-law will be eligible for Medicare 24 months from her determined date of eligibility for Social Security disability. This date is shown on her Social Security award letter. Until then, her alternatives would be private health insurance or possibly Medicaid.





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HEW Mulls Extension Of Hospital Loan

ment of Health, Education and Welfare didn't promise any help for Health Sciences Center Hospital but they did give the county hospital district 90 days to persuade them that a loan extension is in order.

in order.

Hospital district board members met Thursday with both Washington and Dallas HEW representatives in an effort to convince them that the county-supported teaching hospital needs an extension of at least one year on its loan payments. The HEW representatives said they couldn't make a decision based on their present knowledge of the situation.

But the government visitors gave the hospital 90 days beyond Aug. 1 to draft a financial projection on which they will base a decision. Brookwood Medical Services of Birmingham, Ala., which the board has agreed will manage the hospi-

board has agreed will manage the hospital for at least 90 days, has been charged

with drafting the projection.

The hospital district missed its July 1 payment on an \$8 million loan for the hospital's construction. The July pay-ment was to be \$440,132.25. Board members are proposing that HEW give them a year's "hold-off" to allow them to straighten out their financial problems

before resuming payments.

However, during Thursday's meeting an extension of two years was also dis-

Dallas representative Gary Silman told the board that HEW had several major concerns in considering the loan extension. These include greater community support of the hospital, increased revenue, better management and more paying patients. Board members and visiting county commissioners outlined a brief history of the hospital

and its major problems at this time.

Dr. Richard Lockwood, vice president for Health Sciences Centers, emhasized that the Texas Tech University School of Medicine is completely dependent upon the future success of its primary teaching facility. The medical school needs all of the area medical centers associated with its program to ac-

commodate projected enrollment.
"We do not have the luxury of simply turning community hospital and unloading our teaching needs," Lockwood said.
Board member Dub Rushing seemed

to surprise the HEW officials by asking for an additional \$2 million to keep the hospital running until its finances become stable. He called the extension a common business practice, adding that the hospital's efficiency probably would diminish if the staff didn't know when it was going to be paid.

"Let's act like grownups," Rushing said. "You give us \$2 million and a hiatus and we'll pay you back."

Silman said HEW does not have that kind of money. He said the two alternatives to the solution probably were a deferment of the payment or complete forgiveness of the payment for a specified period.

'She's really two people," says Stephen Birmingham, an acquaintance from prep school days and author of the biography, "Jacqueline Bouvier Kenne-dy Onassis."

'When you're on a one-to-one basis with her, she's rather shy and seems rather frightened and a little wistful and hesitant, her eyes darting around the

Her trend-setting style was etched in the public mind during her years as President John F. Kennedy's wife and, after 1963, as his grieving young widow.

Five years later, the public saw the single-mindedness for which she is known. Defying considerable criticism, she emerged unruffled from a Greek Orthodox church as the wife of divorced billionaire Aristotle Onassis.



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

That point was first made when this interviewer showed up at Showplace Six and discovered the two young stars were inside one of the auditoriums watching the new comedy "Meatballs." So much for formality, right? And the point was reinforced a bit later through the friendly joking between the two (Miss Whelchel said it was fun being the only girl in the film, and Pride came back with, "Yeah, that's 'cause she got all the attention."), and also through the touching upon

Pride's sports goals. Advance publicity, after all, stated that Dion Pride was still considering a career in major league base-

Miss Whelchel, though, was the first to comment, nodding toward her co-star and saying, "Dion just pitched a shutout, so of course he's real high on baseball right now." She wasn't kidding. Pride was indeed proud of his recent accomplishment, citing the fact he had not been throwing well of late and happily concluding, "But I got my good control back in that game. I had good speed, too."

Indeed, Pride says he does not want "to skip being a kid." A high school senior at Jesuit Prep in Dallas, he has already lettered in football, basketball and track, as well as baseball. Miss Whelchel has been acting for half her life, but she still insists she plans on going to college. And she finds time for riding horses, too.

Nevertheless, both handle their acting responsibilities very well in "The Double McGuffin" and both plan on remaining in

the entertainment business.

Miss Whelchel, an extremely lovely teen-ager who sported a "Born Again" necklace and an obvious affection for jewelry on the day we met, said her acting career was born of timidity. "I guess I got started because I was shy," she said. "My mother enrolled me in an acting class to see if it would help, and I just loved it. I did some stage work, and I also practiced a little ventriloquism. . .Then I was cast in 'The New Mickey Mouse Club' in 1975."

Her agent then just happened to make a random call to Mulberry Square Productions at the same time producer-director Joe Camp was looking for a girl to play Jody in "The Double McGuffin." Bingo — she auditioned and got the part.

And she certainly hasn't slowed down since. After completing her work for "The Double McGuffin," she departed for locales in Berlin and Munich to film "The Magician of Lublin." It offers an even bigger and certainly more dramatic role, as she co-stars with Louise Fletcher and Alan Arkin and plays a girl dying of tuberculosis. While she says she will not demean herself on screen ("I'm not going to accept a part that would leave me no self-esteem"), Miss Whelchel mentioned more than once her desire to grow into an actress of consequence.

She enjoys doing commercials, for example, but says her goal is "to be the leading lady in a Robert DeNiro film." Not because of any sort of schoolgirl infatuation, but because "all of DeNiro's picture's have been very, very good. He gets good directors, too. So if I could be in a Robert DeNiro film, I'd be confident I was making a good movie."

Dion Pride also plans to keep performing — but on the concert stage more than the movie screens, The son of country singer Charley Pride, he said, "I like acting, and I'd like to make more movies and some commercials. But music is my first love. I guess you could say my goal is to be a singer-actor, but list 'singer' first."

Pride was recommended for his role in "The Double McGuffin" by his fifth grade teacher, and found himself audi-

Pride was recommended for his role in "The Double McGuffin" by his fifth grade teacher, and found himself auditioning for a small part and yet earning not only the lead role, but also a couple of music credits. "I was kind of nervous auditioning," he said, "because when Joe (Camp) moved me to a bigger part all I could think was, "What did I do wrong with

Both songs in the picture are sung by Dion, but the decision to do that wasn't made until the film crew was already on location. Pride explained, "I don't think Joe even knew how much singing I'd done. But we all went down to see my father sing in Atlanta, and I joined him on stage ... I've been singing with my dad the past four summers. I also sing at his golf tournaments, and we sang just a little while back at Six Flags.

"If my parents would let me, I'd have an album out right now."

But his parents are very firm about making sure he doesn't rush into anything. "My mom would like for me to go to college first," the muscular, broad-shouldered young star said, "but I'm not sure I want to go to college. In fact, I really







TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

DR. PAUL E. RUBLE

Dear Dr. Ruble: What would cause a nine-year-old boy to pull his hair out of his head? This child seems to be mentally OK, also physically, but he now has a little bare spot the size of a silver dollar. His father was killed, so he lives with his mother and stepfather. Do you think this is temporary or should he have psychological counseling? - C.F.

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trouble.

Children who find themselves in new surroundings or with new parents face new tensions and some relieve them through a variety of neurotic habits. Hair-yanking is one. Nail-biting is another. Sortie youngsters ride out such rapids and are unaffected.

Hair-pulling occurs in the best of homes. Some children may be upset by school pressures. I have known dedicat-ed hair pullers to abandon the practice as soon as school lets out only to resume it the next fall. For some, it's a temporary quirk. For others it represents a serious emotional situation that is best straightened out promptly.

A bald spot the size of a silver dollar indicates some pretty serious hair-pull-ing that certainly warrants some close attentions to whatever factors are prompting it. If he continues, he should be evaluated first by the pediatrician, who may advise counseling to correct the emotional problem:

There is one medical complication the parents should be aware of — bezoars. Those are accumulations of hair balls in the stomach from ingestion of individual pulled strands. Some youngsters engage in this practice. (Folks addicted to persimmons, too, should be aware of bezoars. Bezoars may cause digestive obstruction of the stomach out-

Dear Dr. Ruble: My girlfriend and I both weighed the same until two weeks ago. She went on a 14-day fast and lost 20 pounds. If I fast for two made lost 20 pounds. If I fast for two weeks will I lose 20 pounds, or do individuals vary in weight loss? — C.T.

I'm not sure I know what you mean by the word "fast." I don't think your girlfriend gave up food entirely for two whole weeks. If two people weigh the same, are of the same height and body frame, and undertake the exact same diet scheme both should lose the same amount of weight in about the same amount of time. If one is heavier than the other he or she might lose more weight more quickly (at least initially) under the same circumstances. If one is lighter, weight would be more difficult to lose. Much depends on how physically

Anything that comes close to fasting is not wise. You can accomplish the same weight loss over a slightly longer period with gradual calorie reduction and you won't be a "loser" in other re-

Dear Dr. Ruble: Please explain what the term "bloodless surgery" means. What are the advantages and

disadvantages? - Mrs. G.N.Y.

You have to ask the person who is using the term. It can mean a variety of things. In general, it means cryosurgery (freezing), cautery (burning), or disintegration of tissue by such means as laser beam, etc. Too, some surgery is done using a tourniquet, as on a limb, to limit bleeding. You have seen me mention the tying off of a hemorrhoid as an alternative to cutting it away. The hemorrhoid tive to cutting it away. The hemorrhoid eventually withers because of a lack of nourishment and sloughs off on its own. That's a form of "bloodless surgery." The absence of bleeding simplifies the surgeon's job.

Dear Dr. Ruble: I had a lung x-ray and my doctor told me I had a slightly enlarged heart, but not to worry about it. But I do. Should I? — Mrs. A.I.

This is usually an insignificant (but frightening) observation. An enlarged heart is not normal in the strict sense, but it can result from normal and harmless factors — years of heavy physical activity, as an example. In this respect the heart, which is made up chiefly of muscle, responds to extra exercise by getting larger, just like your leg muscles get larger when you do lot of running. A heart may enlarge if a person has high blood pressure, again reflecting the extra work load.

If your doctor says you're healthy consider your heart size normal for you. One can be perfectly healthy and have a slightly enlarged heart. Find something else more worth worrying about.

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
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

Shades Give Windows New Look

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Crewmen Sought For August Reunion

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — David Looney is trying to track down the men who served aboard the heavy cruiser USS Los Angeles from 1945 to 1963.

Looney, who served on the ship from 1952 to 1956, wants to reunite all of the enlisted men and officers who sailed on the ship from the end of World War II until it was scrapped in 1963.

So far he and his colleagues have contacted nearly 300 of the ship's alumni, and they hope to double that number before a reunion planned for the weekend of Aug. 10-12 at the Marriott Hotel near Lambert Field.

It isn't easy finding all the sailors who manned the vessel which saw heavy action during the Korean War. The Navy cannot help because of legislation passed in 1975 which prevents the release of military records.

Looney said the Navy won't even confirm which men are still alive, although he guessed about 30 percent of the estimated 10,000 sailors have died.

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Photos Become Key Part Of Life

He re-emphasizes that photography is a particularly significant and vital visual force in the world today.

"Pictures are everywhere," he says.
"They are framed and displayed at home and at work. They hang on walls, lockers and auto visors. Pictures are taped and pinned on bulletin boards, doors, closets, posts and windows. They are crammed into cartons, dumped into drawers, enclosed in envelopes, shoved into shoe boxes and wadded into wallets.

"Similarly, cameras have become a common artifact of American life and our society. They appear everywhere and are used by everyone. Guests and bystanders with cameras rub shoulders with professionals at weddings, graduations, opening nights and public events. We're all aware that our travel and vacation experiences must be documented with photographic evidence. In most cases, the trip is deemed a success or failure depending on how the pictures turn out.

"Out of the deluge of billions of pictures from millions of cameras, what is the impact that photographs have on us. What do they mean to us?"

To get some answers, Don conducted

a research study in 1978. His subjects were men and women between the ages of 17 and 50 who lived in southern California and in the greater New York City area but who represented many areas of the country. They were a cross section of varied ethnic, social, occupational and educational backgrounds.

The subjects were asked to look at four photographs and freely give their response to each one without any prompting. Then Don probed their responses to find what motivated their thoughts. All the interviews were tape recorded; studied and evaluated.

All the freely given responses were classified into one of six categories; Deductive, Evaluative, Subjective, Photographic, Objective and Reflective.

A Deductive response is a factual statement that can be deduced from one

or more visual cues in the photograph. The statement could be substantiated as to whether it was true or false. An example: "This is a mother and her son and daughter."

An Evaluative statement expresses a value, opinion or judgment stimulated by one or more visual clues in the photo but which cannot be substantiated as fact.

"The girl looks happy and the boy

A Subjective response also expresses a value, opinion or judgment but it isn't based on visual clues or substantiated as a fact. An example: "The picture was taken at Easter." In this case, there was no basket, flowers or special attire that would indicate the picture was taken at Easter time.

Years ago, when spring came, Indians would cut their hair, grown long through the cold winter, and spread it on their vegetable patches to discourage animals from browsing there.

Today, scientists — and farmers — are collecting human hair from beauty parlors and barber shops and putting it in net bags they hang from trees and shrubs to deter deer from feeding on them.

It works quite well, says Jay McAn-

inch, wildlife biologist at the Cary Arboretum of the New York Botanical Garden at Millbrook. Testing has been under way there since 1977.

The method, says McAninch, is inexpensive, the material readily available,

non-toxic and completely bio-degradable. Cause deer a hair 100 cen What he wants to know is how long centimeters.

the hair will remain effective under various climatic conditions, and the best packaging techniques for best results. Rain washes away the hair oil, which is the key ingredient, and sunlight causes bleaching. The hair is not effective for more than one season.

McAninch says human hair will repel deer up to about a meter (approximately a yard) away: that unwashed hair is better than washed; that short hair works better than long hair because it is cut closer to the head and thus has more of the oily sebum secreted onto the hair by the scalp's sebaceous glands. The sebum is what keeps the deer away.

Checking his test results, McAninch said the hair balls repelled as follows: empty bag, 60 to 90 centimeters (because deer are timid of objects) washed hair 100 centimeters; unwashed hair 120 centimeters.





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
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
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Training Puts Emphasis On Water Efficiency

On-Farm Irrigation Tests Conducted

che-Journal Farm Writer Putting more emphasis on water effi-ciency for private farms is the purpose of joint training sessions this summer for Soil Conservation Service and High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 personnel, according to Myron Namken of Lubbock, area SCS

"A series of on-farm irrigation efficiency tests are being conducted on the South Plains to teach water management to the staffs so they will be able to work with irrigators," Namken said.

"When trained, the SCS and HPUWCD employees will be able to point out inefficiencies in both sprinkler and surface irrigation systems and offer alternatives for improvement," he explained. The evaluations will be conducted at no cost to the farmer.

Last April, a team of irrigation specialists evaluated the center pivot strin-

kler system on the Texas Boys Ranch east of Lubbock.

In a 26-page booklet, complete with the analysis, recommendations, charts, tables and plates, the HPUWCD and SCS explained the situation of the acreage's current water supply and outlook for the future if present rate of use continues. A similar description and summary will be prepared for farmers who request water efficiency tests from the agencies in the future. Namken said.

Leaks at the pivot, obstructed nozzles and irregular application were noted in the Boys' Ranch study, as well as a pump operating considerably below a normal average.

A 10-member training team returned during June to determine if the implemented recommendations were achieving better water efficiency

In the return evaluation, we replaced one of the sprinkler nozzles with a device to measure the velocity in the pipe in feet per second," Bob Arhelger

of Lubbock, district SCS conservationist, said. "The number obtained was converted to gallons to determine how much is being applied to the field."

Catch cans were numbered and placed every 30 feet. Water collected in the cans was measured to calculate uniformity of application, Arhelger ex-

"The cost of purchasing the pivot sprinklers and the cost of pumping water," he noted, "make efficient use of such systems vital. The recheck of the system, Arhelger

said, found water output had dropped since April, indicating a problem with the pump or well, and those nozzles not replaced after the first check had since worn and were putting out an excess of water for the system.

"The problem with the pump or well and the nozzles would have gone without correction," he said, "had the training team not checked the system which was causing an improper pattern and irregular application on the field.

Namken said about 50 SCS employees in the 11 counties surrounding Lubbock should be fully trained by the end of the season to assist farmers in irrigation evaluations. Water district personnel who participate in the sessions should be able to talk to irrigators and find where possible inefficiencies may be occurring in their systems and refer the farmer to the SCS for further testing, if necessary.
"The SCS staff should be able to con-

duct about 100 to 200 irrigation tests a year," the engineer said. "And refresher courses will be conducted every season for new employees.

In training sessions conducted by Y. E. McAdams, retired regional specialist engineer for the SCS, trainees will learn how to identify soil types, measure the water holding capacity of a soil, determine the quantity of water in the soil and calculate the quantity of water that needs to be applied by irrigation to bring the soil to field capacity in the root zone.

Other phases of training will include transportation and distribution of water on the farm, moisture extraction patterns of various crops, efficiency of irrigation application, evaporation of var-ious sprinkler types and measuring well

"The water district is supplying most of the equipment for the sessions, Namken pointed out, "and there are plans to purchase more.

"The equipment will be used both to perform evaluations on private farms and to demonstrate equipment use to the farmer who may be interested in

The workshops, which were started about two months ago, have had good response from both the irrigators on whose farm the evaluation-training has been done and from the staff being trained, according to SCS and HPUWCD

We hope to expand these training programs in the future to include the northern regions of the Panhandle,'

ing." he said. Meat Prices Trimmed By Middlemen

WASHINGTON (AP) - An Agriculture Department official said Thursday middlemen recently have been passing along to consumers some of the declines in the farm prices of meat animals, which helped soften the June increase in overall food prices.

But Howard Hjort, the department's chief economist, said retail prices of beef and pork still are too high, considering the lower prices farmers get for cattle and hogs.

"At least some of the decrease in farm prices for meat and pork...are finally being passed through to consum-ers," Hjort told a news conference.

However, he said, the price spreads between the wholesale carcass value of beef and pork and what consumers pay at stores "are still wider than can be jus tified by cost increases at the retail lev

Hjort said in May, according to his figures, retail beef prices were about 15 cents a pound higher than could be justi-

The preliminary figures for June and early July show those margins were trimmed but still averaged about 10 cents a pound higher for beef and five cents higher for pork than need be.

A report showing the latest developments in middleman price margins is being sent to the Council on Wage and Price Stability for review. The council has been contacting supermarket chains and others about the meat price margins in what Hjort described as "very friendly conversations" aimed at relieving some of the pressure on food costs.

Hjort said that for all of 1979 he expects retail food prices to average "close to 11 percent" above what they were

The department had been projecting food prices at "around 10 percent" higher than last year but officials for some weeks have cautioned that those could be moderately above 10 percent, depending on the middleman margins for meat and other factors.

Hjort said middleman food margins still are among the uncertainties about the final outcome of food prices this year, along with what happens to the farm production of broilers, hogs and

Rising coffee prices and the demand by the Soviet Union and other countries for U.S. grain also will have an effect on consumer food bills in coming months,

Hjort said retail food price increasesin the second quarter "moderated significantly" and averaged an annual rate of 7.5 percent, compared to the first quarter's annual rate of 17.7 percent as shown by the Consumer Price Index.

Further, he said, the increase in April-June was "fundamentally different" from the sharp boost in the first three months, with marketing costs being the main cause rather than rising farm commodity prices.

RAIL RATE BOOST ASKED

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's railroads asked the Interstate Commerce Commission Thursday to approve selective freight rate increases averaging 8 percent nationwide. The petition said the increases would result in a modest improvement in earnings. If they are denied, it said, "earnings will decline well below the present inadequate levels." The railroads said that without additional revenue, net operating income for the industry will drop \$586 million to a national deficit of \$52 million.

THE CARTER ADMINISTRATION is said to be about ready, barring lastnute changes, to announce a 1980 wheat program with no set-aside and a \$2.50 per bushel loan level.

Without a set-aside, the 1980 target price by law will drop to about \$3.01 per bushel from the \$3.40 level of 1979. This is because the target price must be calculated from a specific formula if a set-aside is not in effect.

Since the administration approved a set-aside in the 1979 program, Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland was able to increase the target price to \$3.40, well above what the formula would have dictated. The 1979-crop loan rate is \$2.35 per bushel.

Sources say the administration appears to be willing to ask Congress to legislate a 1980-crop wheat target price above that dictated by the formula

IT IS BELIEVED THE ADMINISTRATION would support a \$3.40 target price. Some sources suggest the White House might go as high as \$3.50, alugh several agencies could be expected to oppose this level.

The administration now is talking with congressional leaders about how and when the target price proposals should be raised.

Wheat and feed grain target price increases could be proposed jointly in a separate piece of legislation or could be tacked on as an amendment to an existing bill. Introducing separate legislation on target price increases could involve lengthy hearings and markup in committee, some sources said.

Some farm-oriented members of the House favor adding 1980 target price increase measures to the English bill. This bill, which would boost 1979 target prices for wheat and feed grains 7 percent from 1978 levels, probably won't be debated by the full house until after the August recess.

Rep. Glenn English, D-Okla., author of the bill, is said to favor another 7 \$3.63 per bushel in 1979 and about \$3.88 in 1980. It also would put the corn target at \$2.35 in 1979 and \$2.51 in 1980.

MEANWHILE, ADMINISTRATION OFFICIALS said this week it is possible a decision will be made well before October on whether to raise the limit for Soviet grain purchases in the fourth year of the U.S.-U.S.S.R. grain supply agreement, beginning Oct. 1.

While they said it is possible the timing will be pushed forward, officials emphasized that no decision has been made on an early announcement or on how much the level should be raised.

The pact allows the Soviets to buy a minimum of 3 million metric tons and a maximum of 8 million metric tons of U. S. grain per year. Purchases above 8 million tons require talks between the two nations.

If an early announcement is not made, a decision would have to be made by mid-October, when the next round of talks between the United States and the Soviets are scheduled. But several farm groups and some farm-state congressmen have urged that

the United States immediately raise the limit on the amount of wheat the Soviets can buy in the fourth year. THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF WHEAT Growers, in meetings last:

week with top White House, Agriculture Department and State Department officials, recommended that the Soviet purchase limit be raised for wheat, especially in light of the ample U. S. supplies this year.

would be raised for Soviet corn purchases until after the August U. S. crop On wheat, the United States should seize the opportunity to sell more to the Soviets because Argentina has little exportable wheat left, he said, while

Consumers Buy Cheaper Meat, Sometimes None

AUSTIN — Texas consumers may be reacting to higher beef prices by purchasing cheaper cuts of meat, or no meat at all, but a marketing specialist warns livestock cers that this likely is the mildest form of protest.

Ed Uvacek of Texas A&M University warns livestock producers that, while they may regard the consumers' reluctance to purchase choice cuts of beef with distaste, "it may be preferable to some other alternatives suggested by some advocates."

Uvacek goes on in his weekly column to quote consumer advocates. as calling for a one-day nationwide consumer strike this fall against rising food, housing, energy and health care costs. "Guess what will get the blunt of their concern?" Uvacek writes.

He also points out that Sen. George McGovern has introduced the only mandatory wage and price controls legislation of the 96th Congress. Many livestock producers are just now recovering from former President Nixon's mandatory price freeze

So Uvacek suggests producers just take the criticism in stride.

"Consumers have had relatively low beef prices and very cheap hamburger for the last four years. Now, all of a sudden, retail prices have moved up quite quickly and ground beef prices all skyrocketing," he writes.

Backpackers Visit Pecos Wilderness

"The goal of life is living in agreement with nature." - Zeno (335-263 B.C.) Greek Philosopher.

The backpacks were double checked for weight and balance. 'Everybody ready?" asked Robin Roberts. The answer was a unanimous "Yes!" as we started hiking a forest trail in the high country of

New Mexico. Roberts along with Bobby Nunn, partners in The Backpacker, a firm specializing in hiking, backpacking and lightweight camping equipment, seemed to wear their packs effortlessly. The rest of us were unaccustomed to the bulky equipment hugging our shoulders.

Our group (all Lubbockites) consisted of Keith Anderson and his wife Mary, their two daughters, Dana (age 12) and Denise (age 9), and this writer.

Inside or tied to our packs were sleeping bags, tents, food and water for a weekend in the Pecos Wilderness close to Mora, New Mexico. The word "close" is when one considers that our campsite was four

hours away, and more than 2,000 feet uphill. Because our campsite at North Fork Lake (altitude 12,000 feet) would be surrounded by patches of last winter's snow, we also carried winter clothing.

The thin mountain air and the unaccustomed physical exertion called for a brief rest after only 15 minutes of hiking.

Anderson passed around his canteen of water and noted, "Like many people, I hiked and camped as a Boy Scout and a young adult. But, I lost interest for awhile. Now I want my family to learn the joy of wilderness camping. It's a memorable experience we can share, although our son is still too young to make such a trip." Anderson continued, "This kind of family togetherness can offer our children many values that will be important to them the rest of their lives.

Determination - when a goal seems impossible..... I decided that was probably one of the values he had in mind as I groaned to stand up and start again on the trail. Our objective was now just 3 1/2 hours

Hiking higher and higher, via switch-backs, the fragrance of wildflowers complemented the scent of pine needles. The only flower I was able to identify was the Indian paintbrush. Their red profusion lined the primitive trail in sun and shade. Nunn said he had a field guide in his pack that would help us to identify the different flowers.

Roberts and Nunn explained during one stop that most of the weight in a backpack should be near the top of the frame. The frame on which a cloth sack (pack) with partitions or pockets is attached is available in different materials including aluminum and magnesium. Several of our frames were made of RAM-FLX, a high impact but lightweight material used by Coleman's Peak 1 line of backpacking equipment. My Peak 1 frame and pack weighed only 69 ounces. A Peak 1 two-man tent and a sleeping bag were also made of special lightweight material. When your home is on your back - ounces

By the way, The Backpacker, located in Redbud Square, will counsel anyone (without obligation) on backpacking equipment and techniques. New materials and designs have made backpacking easier for more people. But the many designs have made product choice more difficult than a few years ago.

Taking our time, and stopping often to rest and enjoy the scenery. we reached North Fork Lake late in the afternoon. The lake was almost a perfect circle. The crystal clear water, fed by melting snow, was pure enough to drink withouth the need for purification tablets.

Even in July, snow is common this summer in Bounded on the west by a high ridge, the setting was absolutely beautiful. Squirrels and jays went about the business of looking for food amoung the fir and pine forest that sheltered our side of the lake. Quickly the compact tents were set up and a small campfire was

started in the safety of a cleared area surrounded by acircle of rocks.

Dinner consisted of spaghetti with meat balls, fruit drink, spiced tea, biscuits, and chocolate pudding for dessert. All of the meals were of special lighweight, freeze dried prepackaged foods stocked at The Backpacker. Breakfast the following day consisted of scrambled eggs with bacon bits, hash browns, orange juice and coffee. Dana and Denise opted for hot cocoa for their eye opener. Other meals would include vegetable soup, chicken and rice, French apple compote, and the old standby; beef jerky. Most trail foods are developed to furnish

Each evening was memorable as we sat around the warmth of the campfire. We talked of the qualities of sleeping bags filled with goose down as compared to the man-made Hollofil II. We recalled old radio shows ("The Shadow knows....."), favorite movies and books. And we learned more about each other.

We learned that Nunn has been seriously involved in backpacking for five years. Roberts has been into backpacking for four years, and is an advisor to Explorer Post 507. Anderson, a district assistant with Equitable Life Assurance Society, is involved with Scouting as an assistant advisor with Explorer Scouts. He is also chairman of the Eagle Scout Review Board for Lubbock.

Mrs. Anderson (a public school teracher), Dana and Denise had decided that the campsite and the outdoor experience were worth the long hike. The two girls were having an outing in an area enjoyed by a privileged few. They decided also that the many comforts of home would no longer be taken for granted. They learned many camping crafts such as the importance of layered clothing for warmth, canopies over tents, and why a pot of water boils faster when it is covered with a lid at high altitudes.

The following day brought unexpected visitors. A bighorn mountain sheep entered our camp during breakfast, and allowed itself to be fed some trail biscuits. Later in the day, a group of Outward Bound young people shared North Fork Lake with us.

Before we started down the trail, Dana and Denise had the interesting experience of a July snowball fight, and sliding down a snow bank



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



Stingley Learned: 'People Cared If I Live Or Die

By HOWARD ULMAN CHICAGO (AP) - It's that time of year again.

A time for mid-summer dreams of passes to be caught, of touchdowns to be scored. A time for pro football players to be on the move, to be running and blocking beneath the training camp sun. But for Darryl Stingley, that midsummer dream faded into a nightmare with the paralyzing crunch of a helmet.

"I was thinking a week ago that last year I was packing my bags to take off" for training camp, he says. "I know to myself, deep down inside, what I would have been able to do if I had been there. It's just that the facts will beget be proven. The stats will never be written down.

Stingley was an outstanding receiver for the New England Patriots of the NFLa He had spent five seasons with them. His last was is best — 39 catches Ior 657 yards.

In a preseason game last Aug. 12 he was hit by Jack Tatum of the Oakland Raiders and paralyzed from the chest down. In the days that followed, he nearly died. To this day, he's not ready to reveal his feelings about Taturn. Today Stingley can move his right arm and talks of walking again. No stats

can be written down to measure his spirit. 'I really have a lot more meaning and purpose to live for now than I ever had before," he said. "I'm going to overcome as much as I can. . . as much as

I can. There won't be any quitting or giving up. For the first time since his injury, Stingley, 27, granted a face-to-face interview Wednesday night in the modern apartment he shares with his mother. On the wall above his stereo there is a plaque that he says holds special meaning for him: "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the differ-

At this point, Stingley said, there is nothing he thinks he cannot change. With hard work and luck, feeling may return to his legs and, perhaps, he will

"It has happened overnight to some people. That's why the doctor says the ky's the limit," he said. Still, he is realistic. He exercises two hours a day, five days a week, with the help of a nurse, Barbara Bradford. He is doing it ing him well. Among the writers have been Sens. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and Birch Bayh, D-Ind.

It means that they really think about me. All those people thinking of me. There's strength in numbers. I really believe they've helped me come this far," he said. "I feel the best thing I can give them back is to get better. When I feel depressed it's always temporary because there's always somebody I can call. People really are beautiful, All you have to do is reach out, reach out. This world is going more toward the self. But there really are people who give

of themselves. That's the most precious gift you can have."

Stingley, an articulate, soft-voiced speaker said he's accepted the fact he probably won't play again and has learned to live with his disability.

"I just wheel my chair into the van, like 'Ironsides'," he said. "You can really live a full life the more you become adjusted to your situation. It's unlimited what you can do.

Stingley said the recent death of St. Louis receiver J.V. Cain made him reflect on his own situation.

'All I kept thinking is maybe it's just an act of God. I never question God's acts," he said. "I've got my life and I still have my limbs. They weren't blown off. 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
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
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

"I think what Franklin and I bring to the roles are humanness and naturalness," she said. "Once that statement has been made you have to react as a married couple. Many people think Franklin and I really are married.

What Franklin and I have is an easy relationship. We took to each other and have a nice rapport. We don't have a stiffness. We have a couple of arguments about piddling things like bills. We don't. get up in the morning and say, 'Aha, you're white, and I'm black.

The challenge of such a role, she said, is retaining the racial identity that the black community expects.

She said, "Helen is sophisticated but has all these sides around her that I bring to her. The important thing is how you behave as a human being.

Roxie said she is able to bring some of her own experiences to the role. In real life she is married to a white man and they have a 15-year-old son, Leon-



Screen Actor Grateful For Boost Given Career By Dracula

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HOLLYWOOD (AP) — It was one of those "magical opening nights," Frank Langella recalls, when everything seemed to go right and the audience stood and cheered at the final curtain.

Langella, who had known triumph and fallure in the theater, turned to the other cast members and admonished: "Don't trust any of this."

A day later, the actor was in England to start the Walter Mirisch production of "Dracula," which is adding to the chill factor in the nation's movie theaters this summer. Even now Frank Langella is distrustful of the process that brought him first to Broadway stardom and had made him a film lumi-

'It has no reality to me at the moment," he remarked over lunch in his 10th-floor suite at the Beverly Wilshire Hotel. "My identification with Dracula ended last Fedruary when we completed the film. All of the film company's concern with press kits, posters, ads and publicity campaigns is foreign to me. Right now I'm all wrapped up in Harry Crystal."

That's the role he will be playing in "Those Lips, Those Eyes," the United Artist movie he'll make in Cleveland this summer. Harry Crystal is miles away from Count Dracula, a romantic singer who is the mainstay of a small operetta theater. It is Langella's singing debut, and he is spending his spare time listening to records of Nelson Eddy, Howard Keel and Gordon MacRae.

Obviously Frank Langella aims to escape the spectre of Dracula that haunted the last 30 years of Bela Lugosi's career. The Hungarian actor was reduced to endless revivals of the stage play or parodies of the role he created on Broadway and played in the 1931 movie. One of his final performances as Dracula was in "Abbott and Costello Meet Frankentein" (1948).

References to Dracula are inescapable, as when Langella asked the waiter to bring ketchup for his scrambled eggs. A few minues later he was talking about a sequel: "I suppose there would be the natural inclination to bat one out - oh, I did it again!

Recovering, he added: "It seems to me there has never been a sequel that wasn't aimed at cashing in on a success. That doesn't interest me."

Although he aims to escape the vampire aura, Langella is grateful for what "Dracula" has done for his career. The tall, smooth-voiced actor had previously been known as a sturdy performer in plays from Moliere to Albee and such movies as "The Twelve Chairs" and "Diary of a Mad Housewife."

He admitted that his first reaction to "Dracula" was negative. Not being fond of horror movies, he hadn't seen early Lugosi nor the Christopher Lee Draculas that were hammered out in England during the 1960s.

"I had said no to other proposals for 'Dracula,'" said Langella, 39. "They were either going to be musicals, or they were going to be camped up, or they

were going to stess the violence.

Then John Wulp called me about doing a straight version of 'Dracula, drawing entirely from the original play. He saw the count as a tragic Byronic figure condemned to eternal life, and he wanted to produce the play all of a piece, the costumes, settings and acting contributing to the mood.

'John remained true to his word. I kept waiting for him to say, 'Now put in the fangs,' but he never did. He did have touble selling his concept. By the time 'Dracula' was produced, he had had to enlist five others a coproducers.' The movie, written by W. D. Richter ("Invasion of the Body Snatchers") and directed by John Badham ("Saturday Night Fever") also remains true to the original. The cast includes Laurence Olivier as Dracula's scholarly nemesis Jan Francis as the more or less willing victims.
