Gas Leaks Help Sink Area Town

By JOHNNY HOLMES

Avalanche-Journal Staff MORTON - There are plenty of reasons why this small oil and cotton community 65 miles west of Lubbock has just gone bankrupt. City audits have shown that more than \$12,000 has disappeared from city funds in the last year, and that perhaps even more has gone undocumented; the city's method of handling its expense money was inefficient: the city office has staff has completely turned over; and the city leaders have shown an almost complete lack of foresight into their impending financial

Yet more responsible for Morton's bankruptcy than all of these factors combined is the antiquated and dilapidated city-owned natural gas system, which as one city employee said, "is not quite as leakproof as a screen door." That may be putting it mildly - city records show that during the fiscal year that ended March 31, 1979, the system leaked some 108,223,300 cubic feet of natural gas, which cost the city \$143,937

Debts Pile Up

In recent weeks, Morton, population 2,738, has found itself in debt perhaps as much as \$200,000 (about three times its annual tax collection), and has been forced to lay off 17 members of its 27man city staff, including all three of its police officers. City checks began bouncing at the First State Bank, the only bank in town, early in October, and one city official said the city had overdrawn its accounts to the tune of about \$88,000.

If we could straighten out that gas system, we'd be flying high again," said Mayor Pro-Tem Hazel Hancock, who has assumed command of the city since Mayor J.A. Love became hospitalized out of state earlier this year. "Right See GAS LINE Page 5

Alabaman Accepts City Church Call

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter idministration, saying it is unable to forecast early release of some 60 American hostages in Iran, called Sunday on 'politicians and former statesmen" not to inflame a dangerous situation.

'I think it would be extraordinarily useful if politicians and former statesmen could somehow refrain from attempting to capitalize in any way on this situation for their own advantage long enough for these people to get out," said Hodding Carter, the State Department spokesman

Carter said that while diplomatic efforts to free the hostages held for a seventh day in the U.S. embassy in Tehran were continuing. "I have no prediction to offer you on the time of release, nor do I have any expectation on this at all so far as tomorrow, or the next day, or

U.S. Citizens React To Iranian Seizure

DESPITE PLEAS for calm from President Carter and other officials and prohibitions against parades, the seizure of the U.S. Embassy in Iran sparked more demonstrations Sunday in the

In Washington, between 150 and 200 people, mostly young and apparently students from capital-area colleges, gathered in a steady, chilly rain outside he Islamic Center and marched near the Iranian Embassy.

One group of protesters across the street from the center set fire to an Iranian flag. That brought cheers and chants of "Down with Khomeini" as passing motorists honked horns in sup-

Khomeini is a reference to the Moslem leader of the Iranian revolution in which the Shah of Iran was deposed.

Other protesters chanted "Deport, deport, deport," apparently a reference to Iranian stuents in the U.S., while a sign held by some demonstrators read: Free Americans or Face the Consequ-

When the demonstrators walked to-

from the center, city Deputy Police Chief Robert W. Klotz warned that they could not carry picket signs, chant or stop, but would be allowed to "walk by the embassy like any other American cit-

Despite the warning, the marchers stopped in front of the Iranain embassy, and police in riot gear and mounted on motor scooters moved on them and hustled the crowd away.

At least one woman demonstrator who argued with an officer over tactics was struck in the face by a policeman.

Jordan Fox, president of the University of Maryland student association, said the demonstration was "a student-to-student effort" to express American student concern for the 60 Americans being held hostage by the Iranians.

Federal officials have prohibited demonstrations on government property in Washington, and the district's mayor, Marion Barry, ordered city officials not to issue parade permits to either pro-or anti-Iranian demonstrators. The students

SPAG Schedules Study and Powell reminded Americans Of Jobs Program Audit

ABOUT \$51,000 in what a state audit ing firm considers to be questionable expenditures in a locally-operated federal job training program will be discussed by the South Plains Association of Governments board Tuesday. The audit, conducted by the Texas

Department of Community Affairs under the auspices of the Department of Labor, reviewed local Comprehensive

Employment and Training Act (CETA) contracts from October 1976 to Septem-

SPAG Executive Director Jerry Casstevens, however, said the questionable costs mainly resulted because the auditing firm could not find records on some of the CETA participants. In those cases, the auditing firm automatically listed those participants' wages as "questiona-

Casstevens is to report back to the state agency by Nov. 18 with an explanation and complete documentation of the costs under consideration.

Casstevens said he plans to submit the information needed, "and as far as I'm concerned, that will end it."

Casstevens said, though, that if his answers do not satisfy the auditing firm. more research will have to be done until the matter is corrected.

A letter to Casstevens from the director of the state agency's auditing division said the accounting firm of Stanley, Wade. Durio and Broome noted several internal control and administrative weaknesses in the review.

These problems, Casstevens said, also resulted because the firm was unable

to find necessary CETA records. Casstevens is being asked by the firm to suggest ways to keep the CETA re-

cords from being lost in the future. Casstevens said the missing records have been misplaced during SPAG's changeover last year from its 1611 Ave. M location to its present address at 1709

A similar problem occurred with the internal audit of CETA operations by a Lubbock firm for the same time period.

That audit noted \$148,000 in questionable costs, but no fraud in CETA operations was discovered. The missing records were at that time also attributed to the resulting questioned expenditures.

Brown, appearing on NBC-TV's Nationwide Search ToBe Held For Buried Poisonous Wastes

Avalanche-Journal Staff BURIED FOR as long as half a century, poisonous chemical wastes that are scattered about the country, including several towns on the South Plains, are worrying the federal government.

The Congress and the Environmental Protection Agency have teamed up to begin a nationwide search for chemical waste sites that could be hazardous to human health.

The highest priority for the EPA now is to determine whether any of these sites are an imminent threat to the public," said Roger Meacham, spokesman in the agency's regional office in

In a recent survey of toxic waste sites conducted by the House's Commerce Oversight and Investigations subcomittee, Texas lead led the nation with 319.

Although most of the sites on the list

several public landfills and wastewater treatment plants also are included.

Area chemcal waste sites are located near Lubbock, Andrews, Big Spring, Borger, Brownfield, Crosbyton, Dumas, Odessa, Pampa, Phillips, Plainview, Seagraves, Seminole, Artesia, N.M., Carlsbad, N.M., and Hobbs, N.M.

The Congressional subcommittee compiled the list after it subpoenaed 53 of the nation's largest chemical producers and asked them where their chemical wastes were buried. Public sites on the "Potentially dan-

gerous" list include the Lubbock City landfill, the Lubbock County dump, the Plainview landfill and the wastewater treatment plant in Dumas. Some officials with these cities expressed surprise at being on the survey

list, but maintained they were meeting

state health regulations, and knew of no

· Lubbock city officials said only a small amount of liquid chemicals are brought to the city landfills, and that these are disposed of properly. Plainview City Manager John Hatch-

ell said no toxic wastes are allowed to be dumped in that city's landfill. However, some of the the companies called to testify before the subcommittee have been dumping toxic wastes for as long as 50 "But every dump and sewer plant in

the country is a potential health hazard, if not operated correctly," said Hatchell. In studying the survey compiled by

the subcommittee, EPA will be looking for large amounts of buried toxic waste that could contaminate land and air, especially near populated areas, and for waste sites near underground water sup-

But because hazardous wastes are buried at these sites, that does not nec-



will be a tremendous help to us because it collects much information we did not have the power to gain.

The EPA still does not have authority to inspect private chemical waste sites with a company's permission. However, legislation is being considered that would increase the agency's power in monitoring the private business sector.

Meacham explained that a wastewater treatment plant could be included on the list because it might be contaminated by chemical wastes from a nearby

Area industrical chemical waste sites include a gasoline plant in Andrews, the Cosden Oil and Chemical Co. in Big Spring, an oil refinery in Borger, a helium plant in Dumas, the Chapparal Disposal Co. in Odessa and the Celanese Corp. in Pampa.

Nuremberg Trial Participants Vow To Tend To 'Unfinished Business'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nearly 200 participants in the Nazi war crimes trials at Nuremberg, Germany, held a reunion here this weekend that evoked memories of the Holocaust of World War II and prompted pledges to tend to "unfin-

ished business The gathering marked the 30th anniversary of the conclusion of the historic trials in which some of the leading figures of Nazi Germany were held accountable for racial persection of the

'Today, 30 years later, the history is not finished," said Telford Taylor, the chief prosecutor at Nuremberg. The trials "have cast a long shadow."

He noted that West Germany has extended the statute of limitations on war crimes and that the United States is stepping up its campaign to deport Na-

cooperation in providing documents and witnesses that could help deportation ef-

But the weekend was as much a look back for the reunion's participants, many of whom had not seen each other for 30 years.

Drexel A. Sprecher, a prosecutor at Nuremberg who is now retired and living in Chevy Chase, Md., was the principal organizer of the reunion. The idea was hatched over lunch about five months ago by Sprecher and two Nuremberg colleagues. Charles Horsky and Walter J. Rockler.

the audience that caused ripples of Taylor, a law professor at Columbia University, said the lessons of Nurem-

berg have assumed a significance that few could have imagined at the time.

For example, he said that Americans who refused to go to war in Vietnam cited Nuremberg to make the assertion that there is a duty of conscience not to follow unjust orders.

Defenders of the Vietnam policy said the lesson of Nuremberg was to fight aggression, Taylor continued. And, he added, even the North Vietnamese invoked Nuremberg when they threatened to hold trials for captured Americans.

Yasser Arafat Out To 'Win Friends'

While Yasser Arafat prepares a new generation of potential martyrs in the guerrilla war against Israel, his Palestine Liberation Organization is going all out to pol-

ish its image and win support in the West.

The ultimate aim of this policy may be to seek a political alternative to the incessant bloodletting.

Arafat's offer to intercede for American hostages held by Iranian revolutionaries in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran is one more step in his bridge-building campaign to win friends and debtors among Israel's traditional supporters.

In recent months, the PLO has forged links in Western Europe and gained some public relations mileage in the United States, stronghold of Israel's international

Recent history has demonstrated, however, that such bridges can collapse overnight in the wake of a Palestinian terrorist strike. Alternating his roles between guerrilla leader and international mediator has been the hallmark of Arafat's mercurial leadership and the key to his own survival within the diverse Palestinian move-

A pattern is evident: When Arafat foresees clear rewards on the political front, he dons his statesman's cap, as he is doing now. When political moves appear doomed, he adopts the terror-war option, often because the more militant of those around him are pressuring him.

The 49-y :- old PLO chief often complained after the Lebanese civil war, which diverted and depleted his forces for nearly two years, that the 1975-76 moratorium on cross-border raids against Israel gained nothing for his movement in the interna-

When the PLO saw no gain for it in Egyptian President Anwar Sacat's peace initiative with Israel, Arafat threw in the diplomatic towel, assumed a lead in the Arab hard-line opposition and unleashed a bloody raid against the Israelis on the Tel Aviv-Haifa highway in early 1978.

He chose then to risk his flimsy Western bridges because they took him nowhere, his associates said at the time. Israel's subsequent invasion of Lebanon, which caused fewer Palestinian losses than many expected, bolstered Arafat's stock in the Arab community and inspired new confidence among his 12,000-man guerrilla

But Israel's stepped-up punishment raids against guerrilla strongholds this year have taken their toll, and Arafat has again turned to the political stage.

He broke the ice with Austria's chancellor, Bruno Kreisky, this summer and later got an unexpectedly warm welcome in Spain. Late last month, the Italian government bestowed its "political recognition" on the PLO and high Belgian officials met

with an Arafat emissary in what the PLO interpreted as de-facto-recognition.

In the United States, the resignation of U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young follow ing his unauthorized contacts with the PLO touched off a demand among many of Young's fellow blacks for U.S. recognition of the organization, which regards itself as a liberation movement. Arafat warmly greeted a delegation of black American

Stassen Hopes To Break Long Losing Streak

WASHINGTON (AP) - Harold Stassen hasn't been elected to public office since 1942, but that hasn't stopped him from running for president and running again, and again and again and again

He says if he were to sit out 1980, he would have no impact on public policy. And if he were to be nominated by the Republicans and win the presidency, he would have more impact than anyone

So, he says, he has chosen a middle course. He will run and make speeches, and be interviewed and be heard and have some impact.

Most candidates love to talk about campaign strategy. Stassen loves to talk about issues but becomes evasive when

he talks about his campaign. 'I'm not an optimist," he says. "I'm a realist.

There appears to be an element of Let's Pretend" in the exercise.

At age 31. Stassen was the "boy governor" of Minnesota - the youngest governor in history, and twice re-elected. In his third term, he resigned to serve as a naval officer in World War II.

In 1944, his keynote speech impressed the GOP convention. Minnesotans offered his name for president.

In 1948, he sought the nomination but lost to Thomas E. Dewey

In 1952, he ran again. But in the convention battle between Dwight D. Eisenhower and Robert A. Taft, he threw his delegates to Eisenhower. He served in Eisenhower's cabinet as foreign operations director.

In 1956, he offered himself as a candidate for vice president in a futile attempt to dump Eisenhower's first-term partner, Richard Nixon.

In 1958 and 1962, he ran for governor of Pennsylvania. In 1959, he ran for mayor of Philadelphia. In 1964, 1968 and 1976, he ran for

president again. He is 72 - and jokes that he makes

Bad Budget Still Buys Votes

DEMOCRATS in Congress dropped the curtain on one of the great political hoaxes of the 1970s in approving a 1981 budget that calls for a \$29.8 billion deficit.

His own party, with his encouragement, thus drops the pretense of trying to balance the budget during his term, as candidate Jimmy Carter had promised in 1976.

The fiscal 1981 deficit will be \$2 billion higher than that of 1980 and even this estimate may be \$3 billion or so less than the actual deficit will turn out to be.

That's because, in an effort to keep it under \$30 billion as the President asked, Congress did a bit of a magic trick: It just increased its estimate of 1981 revenues, with no real basis for doing so.

REP. KENT HANCE of Lubbock, we happily observed, voted against the record \$547.6 billion spending package.

He was one of only 45 Democrats in the House to join all but one Republican in voting against the outrageous budget, which was approved 205-190.

Going against the Democratic leadership, if that's an apt word, is not easy for a freshman member who wants to be effective for his district and improve his own position. Voting against fiscal irresponsibility is good for the country, though, and in the long run

will prove to have been the right move.

Hance was particularly concerned by the fact that the budget bill does not require reconciliation. This means that committees recommending spending programs won't be bound by budget limitations and the deficit could skyrocket.

So much for the pretense of living within our national means.

"It would not look good if Congress didn't pass a budget." he said in explaining how he drew support for the spending bill from "both the liberal and conservative wings of" his party.

He obviously thinks the budget Congress passed does look good. It increases spending for a host of income transfer payment programs, grants more handouts to cities which can't print money of their own and does no belt-tightening in a widening array of social

AN EDITORIAL:

Tilting At 'Windfall' Profits

THE BASIC FLAW in the proposed confiscatory windfall tax on oil company revenues never has been put into a perspective that the American public can understand.

That flaw is this: The tax would put the U.S. government into effective partnership with OPEC governments having a vested interest in pushing oil prices ever higher.

Revenues from the proposed tax would finance massive new social programs. At the same time, the tax would further discourage domestic production, thereby helping to perpetuate shortages which must exist if OPEC is to continue raising prices.

With the tax, our government will be fully committed to keeping prices high. It should be, instead, committed to working diligently-using every device at its command-to encourage or force the OPEC governments to lower their prices.

EVEN WITHOUT the added tax, the Carter administration and the Democratic majority in Congress are committed to encouraging high gasoline prices as an incentive to using less of it.

This commitment helps explain why the rate of inflation has increased by 154 percent since Carter was elected.

Federal taxes already take half of the oil companies' net profit. With chronic budget deficits exceeding \$3 billion a month despite this windfall revenue, the administration ale help consumers; it is a scheme to make the ready has an irresistable incentive to play U.S. government a partner with OPEC govalong with OPEC's price gouging.

Make no mistake about it, that govern-

mental price gouging—and not oil company profits—is the culprit. All profits of the big oil companies could be confiscated and the price you pay for gasoline wouldn't go down more than a nickel per gallon.

The misnamed "windfall profits tax" now being considered would be applied not against profits, however, but against increased gross revenues.

If enacted without a plowback provision exempting revenues that are put to use finding or developing new energy, the proposed new tax would be an enormous burden on the backs of American consumers.

SUCH A TAX, giving the politicians revenues with which to buy re-election votes from the poor, will make the U.S. increasingly dependent on foreign sources of oil.

Part of the plan, for example, is to take a bigger portion of your gasoline dollar and 'rebate' it to low and middle-income families to help cover the higher cost of heating their homes.

Even Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, rather than fight this socialistic transfer of income from your pocket to someone else's, is pleased with himself for getting Senate Finance Committee approval to let more low-income Texans benefit from the scheme along with snowbelt families.

Discussing Old Taboos Muted By New Taboos

WASHINGTON-Ours is a liberal age-one that preens itself on open discussion and the shattering of old taboos. Obviously there is a lot of truth in this. An age that televises commercials for diarrhea cures and what are called feminine deodorants can certainly claim credit for shattering something."

Yes, certain old taboos have been destroyed. What is less obvious is that new taboos are being erected. Liberals tend not to notice them because they are liberal taboos.

It is in the nature of a taboo, after all, to be tacit, habitual, half-conscious. To draw attention to it is a preliminary to violating it.

The Victorians didn't post signs everywhere forbidding the mention of sex; something in their temper simply exaggerated normal human modesty, and by a quiet convention the subject was treated with extreme delicacy.

TABOOS OF that kind are seldom experienced as repressive; among the people who create them, they actually produce greater ease of conversation. They are like rules of etiquette, or even rules of grammar: most of the time they are obeyed without even being thought about.

What are the new taboos? They are not as easily codified as, say, the Ten Commandments. But a few obvious areas of liberal squeamishness occur to me:

E-Race. This is the most obvious one. Most liberals would sooner die than say openly that one race is superior in any aspect to another, or even (what is more modest and human) that they prefer one race to another. Nor do they countenance open discussion of this issue.

In this way they are not without some reason: Nobody needs reminding how inflammatory the subject is, and it is extremely hard to make discussion of it open without the cranks taking it

But then that is true of the old taboos, too. Liberate the discussion of sex, and the pornographers quickly take over. Usually liberalism celebrates openness for its own sake, and hang the consequences. But not in ethnic affairs.

WHAT IS especially notable is the way liberals themselves act on positions they do not like to see asserted publicly. The migratory and marital patterns of white liberals don't differ sharply from those of white racists. They too "stick to their own kind": white liberals marry white lib-

I don't mean to suggest that white liberals are secretly white racists. I mean that they are strangely reluctant to discuss the implications of their own observable behavior, and to tone down accordingly the moralism that makes them so incensed against, say, federal court nominees who belong to racially exclusive private clubs.

2-Religion. Liberalism abhors assertions of religious truth. It forever seeks quasi-constitutional ways to exclude religion from public discussionand not because liberals really respect it in private discussion.

They regard it as a largely baneful force in human affairs, and think the proper way to handle it is to drop a few discreet reminders of its persecutorial history, and ignore it.

3-SEX. LIBERALISM puts a premium on worldly experience, pleasure and "fulfillment." It therefore is impelled to encourage sexual li-

4-Taboos. It is in the nature of a prohibited topic that not only the topic but the prohibition must pass unremarked. Liberalism, with its formal emphasis on free discussion, especially resists admitting it enforces taboos.



WASHINGTON-Being cheeky by nature, I offer some unsolicited advice to my friends in the reporters to seek out news about private people who are doing something about the energy crisis besides whimpering.

Those somethings are being done all across the country, but we of the media seem seized by an obsession with bad news. And it is true, of course, that a kind of national paranoia causes readers and radio audiences to welcome anything that feeds our surly masochism.

So I call attention to a story several days ago. It said that the millionaire boss of a company with membership in Fortune Magazine's roster of the 500 richest businesses is directing a let-me-at-it assault on the Republic's fuel shortage.

MICHAEL DINGMAN is president of Wheelabrator-Frye in Hampton, N.H. In collaboration with the Mateo Construction Co. of Boston, he has operated a trash and garbage conversion plant north of Boston since 'way back in 1975 that has produced more than 6.8 billion pounds of the purest form of energy-steam.

And his outfit has done so at a profit, without a dime's worth of government help or interference, and without fouling the water or atmosphere.

Dingman's Refuse Energy Systems Co. plant, a facility that cost a relatively mere \$50 million, burns 1,450 tons of garbage and trash a day, seven days a week-the daily equivalent of 67,000 gallons of foreign oil.

Dingman buys his fuel from 13 communities and 65 private handlers on Massachusetts' North Shore for \$14.82 a ton.

THEN HE sells the steam produced to the General Electric Co.'s jet engine plant, just across the Saugus River in Lynn, where the steam is used to produce electricity and heat.

Dingman's RESCO isn't fussy. It takes all kinds of refuse. "We get refrigerators," he says, "an old railroad track, and one day we got half of a Volkswagen.'

Magnets remove scrap metal from the ash, and the ash itself is used for highway resurfacing. It takes trucks only seven minutes to unload their

There is no sorting; a crane scoops up the stuff and drops it into a conveyor that feeds it into one of two huge furnaces. There, almost everything burns at a temperature of 1,650 degrees and under controlled pressures.

DINGMAN DIDN'T invent the process. He got a license to play copy cat from a Swiss corporation, then improved it to filter the byproducts of combustion so his plant complied with federal environmental standards.

Dingman is not playing hero; he's a businessman, not a philanthropist, you can bet he'd junk his plant if it didn't make money. That's in comfortable contrast to a similar plant in St. Louis that flopped after the ingestion of \$11 million in public funds.

What it amounts to is that government involvement frequently is the kiss of death. Too much paperwork, too many regulations, too many bureaucrats counting paper clips.

Dingman said hell, let's do it. That, my friends, is where America came from.

dy with scarcely anybody of prominence loyal to the President. Philadelphia is, therefore, a political wasteland

for Carter. Victory in the Pennsylvania primary clinched the 1976 nomination for him, and his strategists had looked to the 1980 primary next April as the potentially decisive Kennedy-Carter

But no Carter base in Philadelphia, thanks to three years of inattention, makes for bleak statewide prospects when combined with Kennedy's

Although his voting record is to the left of even Sen. George McGovern, Kennedy made clear he is no self-destructing doctrinaire through the nonideological content of his speech and his ability to attract disparate elements of the party.

HIS SPEECH at a fund-raiser for ex-Rep. William Green's campaign for mayor denounced "leadership that has failed to do the job." containing no more ideological overtones than John

F. Kennedy's exortations to greatness in 1960. Like JFK's campaign oratory, Ted Kennedy's comes over stronger on the stump than it reads in cold print. One Democratic insider who was shown an advance copy of the speech here was disappointed by "ho-hum rhetoric

He was shocked that when delivered in Kennedy's high-pitched, sing-song style, the prosaic language became a searing indictment of the Carter presidency

The \$100-a-plate diners, including top corporate officials, applauded frequently but with restraint. A more spirited reaction came later at a South Philadelphia rally where some 4,000 persons

SPEAKING WITHOUT notes, Kennedy shouted in tones of a carnival barker that in years past we didn't throw up our hands in despair. We didn't talk about a malaise of the American spirit. We rolled up our sleeves."

Old friend Bill Green was with Kennedy at every stop. But also at Kennedy's side during the South Philly rally were allies of outgoing rightwing Democratic Mayor Frank Rizzo, long Green's enemy.

Kennedy also telephoned to pay his respects to another Rizzo stalwart: city Democratic Chairman Marty Weinberg, absent from the evening's Green-for-mayor events.

Now that Kennedy actually has announced for President, Weinberg is likely to support him. So is ward leader Pete Camiel, who feuded with Rizzo as city Democratic chairman. They will surely be joined by Ed Toohey, head of Philadelphia's AFL-CIO, and most of the city's other labor leaders. Philadelphia liberals long ago backed Kenne-

AGAINST THIS ecumenical array, who is for Jimmy Carter? Nobody but some black leaders (believed unable to swing black voters from Kennedy) and 78-year-old ex-Sen. Joseph S. Clark.

The President is reaping the bitter harvest of three years neglecting the city whose 258,000 plurality overcame Gerald Ford's 127,000 edge elsewhere in the state.

The fact Carter has not set foot in Philadelphia as President may be justified by desire to avoid Rizzo. But that does not explain ignoring other party leaders.

Carter operatives talked privately of Pittsburgh-for-Carter counteracting Philadelphia-for-Kennedy with the issue settled in the smaller

BUT THERE is no sign Kennedy is significantly less popular in Pittsburgh than in Philadelphi-Furthermore, Carter cannot count on Peter Flaherty, who as mayor of Pittsburgh spearheaded Carter's 1976 Pennsylvania campaign. Back home after a short tour as Carter's deputy

attorney general, Flaherty calls himself "totally undecided" and, in fact, traveled to Philadelphia for Kennedy's appearance.

Above all, Carter is fighting a legend: the little dance orchestra wailing out "Camelot" at the dinner, accents reminiscent of the two earlier Kennedys, the stacatto call to greatness.

Since Kennedy will not match his rhetoric to his Senate voting record, Carter's irresistible course in this and other important states may be personal attack. His Philadelphia wasteland would then turn into a bloody battleground.

The Rev. Powell had been defeated by the Rev. Carlos McLeod, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Plainview, as president of the Baptist General Convention in its 94th annual session in Lubbock.

The fact that the Rev. Powell seemed to be a happy person had nothing to do with the events of the past few hours. Instead, we suspect the Tyler man manages to stay that way much of the

In brief, he exudes a self confidence and zest for life which we find healthy among ministers who all too often preach a doom and gloom phi-

AND HE ALSO is a man who gets down to the nitty-gritty in discussing the spiritual affairs of mankind, on a local, national or world level... We were made acquainted with the affable

Baylor graduate through a mutual friend. First off, the Rev. Powell has been in the business of seeking to help others for some 25 years now. His church is one of the fastest-growing in the state, now counting a membership of 1,600 as

compared to 700 when he took over... But, it was not about church membership that we got down to the nitty-gritty about with the Rev. Powell. It was about religion, the role of the ministry and church in world affairs, including politics, and how the church relates to today's modern' mores and morals.

Paul Powell says it like he thinks it...

"WE ARE GOING to have to change the world, if we do, by changing the heart and mind of the individual, not by force," he says firmly.

"If we do it by political activism, force, revolution, it is artificial. And it's not permanent. It's like straightening teeth with a hammer. You are going to lose more than you gain ... "

The answers were prompted by our query as to what he thought of ministers and certain church groups getting involved in "activist" movements, specifically the racial equality charade of the World Council of Churches and its involvement with the Marxist backed guerrillas in Zimbabwe-Rhodesia.

"We are in the business of changing the hearts of people through love and the teachings of Christ, not through violence," the Rev. Powell

Noting that individual Baptist churches in the huge Southern Baptist Convention are autonomous, the Tyler man made it clear he does not believe the church should become too closely associated with any one individual political candi-

BUT. HE hastened to emphasize that he feels the church does have an obligation to relate to those principles in everyday life which advance the brotherhood of mankind.

In that regard, he says he thinks of the Christian Life Commission, the more or less social-political action arm of the Southern Baptists as "an information agency, nothing else... The Commission came under fire during the

last Presidential campaign for taking a stance and issuing public statements which some regarded as supporting the candidacy of Jimmy Carter. On school busing and school prayer, the Rev Powell refuses to become embroiled in a purely narrow argument

But, he added, "we can make people go to schools, but we can't make them like one another. It must be done through a spirit of fellowship and brotherhood.

WE FOUND not only the Rev. Powell's remarks on church "activism" interesting, but in somewhat sharp contrast to other comments on the same subject of late.

Dr. Albert C. Winn, present moderator or presiding officer of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. was quoted recently as saying the greatest challenge the church faces in the 1980s is to strike a balance between inner spirituality and social

Dr. Winn made the statement in an interview with The A-J's Connie Chapman during a meeting of the Palo Duro Union Presbytery in Ver-

Winn, pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Richmond, Va., said the church "is ready to move forward...and the world is looking for the church to raise some banners... He said as an individual he supported passage

CERTAIN SEGMENTS of various churches in the U.S. today, including the Presbyterian at the national level, have embraced "social" and international political "causes" which have astonished

and disappointed many of their supporters.

Use of church funds to aid controversial activists and the World Council of Churches has brought criticism. If we understand what we hear from many, at least in this area, the average person thinks his church is getting out of line when it in effect gets

in bed with some Marxist guerrilla movement, even if it is indirectly. We feel the church, its teachings and preachings, must be a part of the everyday affairs of mankind. But, we think that key effort is diluted when the church expends its energies and funds

in highly questionable political practices which also embrace anti-church or even atheistic con-The battle for men's minds and souls is being waged on many fronts and even battlefields from

Lubbock, Texas, to the jungles of Africa today. This-nation and its leaders and its churches should make sure of what they are supporting,

(Continued From Page One) now, that thing's killing us.

Morton is almost literally bleeding to death, actually, as audits indicate that those 1979 figures are almost twice as bad as the preceding year, and those weren't exactly uplifting. During the five-year period encompassing fiscal years 1974 through 1978, the gas system leaked 418,893,000 cubic feet of natural gas, causing losses of city revenue of \$236,776, according to city audits performed during that time.

The audits showed that: in fiscal year 1974, the pipeline leaked 83,204,000 cubic feet of natural gas, costing the city \$18,471.

tem leaked away." "I told them (city council) we'd be bankrupt in three or four months," he said. "And we are."

Former city manager Wiley Hodge, who stepped down during an emergency city council meeting Oct. 29 and is now facing the awesome responsibility of handling the runaway network, explained that the system is constructed of ancient "invasion pipe," which was designed to carry oil to U.S. military forces during wartime, and "certainly not something designed to last 40 years.

Once "No Big Deal" "There were always plans to replace it with top quality pipe," he said. "But when gas was only 15 cents a thousand (cubic feet), the losses were considered no big deal. Now that we're paying so much more, the figures have become

immense. "This was never a concern to past councils because gas was so cheap,' Hodge said. "This thing came up 10 years ago and the council just didn't do

anything. The city council did make a move toward replacing the system in 1977, when Hodge first came to work for the city. At that time, the council secured a \$250,000 Community Development Block Grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, from which \$180,000 was earmarked for replacement of the leaky network. All the materials have been purchased, said Hodge, but only \$20,000 of the grant remains, and only about 11,000 feet of the 52,000 feet

of pipe have been laid. We felt like we could put the pipe in for about \$1 a foot then, so we bought all the materials," Hancock explained. "Then we found out it wasn't quite that easy - that we had to work around all the water and sewer pipes that were already there, and that it would cost us \$3 to \$5 a foot to get it in the ground.

"Meanwhile," he said, "those leaks were just a-blowin' and a-goin'." Hodge explained the city lost some other gas revenue this summer because the abundance of rainfall allowed many farmers with natural gas-fueled irrigation systems to farm dryland all year

long. "That probably cost us a good

overhead stays the same," he explained. 'The irrigation sales in an average dry summer are about equal to what Morton residents will buy in an average winter, so that usually gets us through the summer. But this summer was so wet nobody used any gas. We had some wells

we didn't even crank up." Morton also operates its own water system, which doesn't leak. "We hope to make enough on gas each year to pay the city employees and keep a little ahead. We have a bond on the water system that costs us about \$2,600 a month, so it takes all we bring in," Hancock said. "That gas system is supposed to be our bread and butter here.'

The city council's action leading to the declaration of emergency "Are simply amazing," said one city employee.
"They should have seen it coming and done something about it."

Minutes from city council meetings throughout 1979 indicate that as early as January 18, city employee Shelby Chancey "recomended the city purchase a gas leak detector and start fixing the leaks. Hazel Hancock told him we were working on the situation and would

Purchase Motion Delayed

Yet the minutes show a motion to buy the gas leak detector, a small, torchlike machine costing \$2,195, was not carried out until the meeting of May 14, some four months later. During that time, the city books indicate the gas pipes leaked some 36,897,500 cubic feet of gas at a net retail value of approxi-

mately \$65,000. And during the meeting of June 11, the minutes show that the council requested an outside contractor be hired to install the remainder of the system. That motion was passed, but because of the citys financial crisis, it was never

carried out The minutes from the Oct. 29 emergency session show that councilman Ray Luper "declared a financial crisis," and outlined a six-point program through which he felt the city could begin to regain its precarious financial footing. His proposals included consolidating the city and county law enforcement agencies; regenerating the help; fixing the gas leaks; laying off employees; hiring a qualified city manager, preferably one with a college degree and managerial background; and holding a bond election to fix the gas lines.

The three-man police department was completely abolished, and while the Cochran County Sheriff's Department didn't exactly consolidate (they added an extra man but not one of the three ex-

Morton policemen), it has lended some support. 17 of 27 city employees were laid off to save money, the search for a city manager is on and the bond election still is being considered.

Difficult Problems Remain

In the meantime, there remain some very real and difficult problems for the town, including a frustrating Catch-22 with the gas system. "What would be best is if we could put a bunch of people out there and just get all the new system in the ground as fast as possible," said "But since we don't have the money to pay them, we can only have a minumum of people out there working on it. And the fewer people we have working on the lines, the longer it will take to fix them and the more lost gas there is the more its going to cost us."

We've begun to collect our tax rolls and by Jan. 31, we should have about \$77,000 from there," said Shelton. We've laid off the police department and several more employees and the city will now operate as conservatively as possible and provide the minimum amount of services. And once we get square with the bank, we think we can borrow about \$25,000 to keep us going."

We've made some good progress with the leak detector, and we hope to cut the losses from the gas lines to a liveable amount in the next 90 days and

Hodge. "Actually, we have a crew of five working on the gas lines, and it's

been very efficient. We like it like that."

"We'll interview three men for the city managers job this Monday night (tonight)," said Hancock. "If we don't

get a city manager soon, we'll very likely go to a consultant and get him to explain all our options to us and exactly each of them entails. Then we can reach some decision on our own." 'Currently, we feel like we're looking at three choices," he continued. "We

can vote a tax raise and borrow from the bank; we can issue bonds on the city; or we can have a bond election. I really don't know what we'll do for sure right 'We do feel like the worst part is

over with, though, and now we just have to concentrate on picking up the pieces and going from here," he said. "Now everyone will know exactly what the situation is, and we hope they'll continue to give us their support. You know, when things are going

good, almost anybody can run the show," Hancock philosophized, "But when things start going bad, it takes some pretty special people to keep the show running. And that's what we need right now.

White House Defends Policies

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter won't officially become a candidate for re-election until next month, but top administration aides already sound eager to tangle with his principal Democratic challenger, Sen. Edward M.

The Massachusetts senator had barely finished making his first speech as a declared presidential contender last week when a White House official remarked anonymously:

"The president intends to run on his record. It is our impression that Senator Kennedy intends to run away from his." Kennedy also drew criticism during the first week of his campaign from officials willing to speak for the record, including one member of Carter's Cabinet, his press secretary and his top inflation fighter.

The Massachusetts senator launched his campaign on Wednesday, preceding Carter's expected Dec. 4 announcement by nearly a month.

Also jumping into the Democratic race was California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr., who is running a distant third in the polls and who so far has drawn little reaction from the Carter

Kennedy and Brown differ on many issues. But they sound similar when they criticize Carter's leadership.



Consideration Of Budget May Be Over

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senators could cast the last vote this week in the lengthy legislative consideration of the federal fiscal 1980 budget or they may continue the congressional confrontation a little longer.

Here is the status of major legislation:

Fiscal 1980 Budget

The Senate is set to decide whether to settle the long-running argument with the House over terms of the budget for fiscal 1980, the year that opened Oct. 1.

Since Jan. 22, when President Carter presented his initial recommendations for the spending and taxing year, the lawmakers have been examining and voting on budget proposals. Carter's latest revision calls for a \$33.2 billion defi-

Last week, by 65-27, the Senate approved a proposed compromise \$547.6 billion spending package containing a \$29.8 billion budget deficit and setting defense outlays at \$129.9 billion.

The House later agreed to that basic plan, 205-190, but deleted a related requirement that the lawmakers make \$3.6 billion in social program savings. The measure went back to the Senate which now must decide whether to go along with the House or continue the dispute. Arms Treaty

•Senate approval of SALT II, the proposed new strategic arms limitation treaty between the United States and the Soviet Union, is being recommended by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

In a key foreign policy victory for Carter, the panel voted 9-6 last week in favor of the pact which now faces lengthy debate and an uncertain fate in the full Senate. Supporters must round up a two-thirds majority vote to win approval of the treaty.

Chrysler Aid

The House Banking Committee is ready to take up a subcommittee-endorsed recommendation by the Carter administration calling for the federal government to guarantee up to \$1.5 billion in loans to the financially troubled Chrysler Corp. Such a guarantee would be less costly

for the nation than dealing with the impact of a Chrysler bankruptcy, Treasury Secretary G. William Miller told Congress last week

Welfare Revision

The House, by a 222-184 vote, passed a version of Carter's welfare-prevision plan and sent it to the Senate. The president said the legislation to restructure key programs for aiding the poor would be "a crucial step forward in the nation's 10-year effort to provide vitally needed reform of the welfare system."


The bill includes a federally ordered minimum payment floor for roughly 11 million persons now drawing welfare under the program of aid to families with dependent children.

Gasoline Rationing

•Congressional compromise standby gasoline-rationing legislation was signed into law last week by Carter who said he would produce a program "that will be acceptable, adequate and fair.

In St. Paul and Washington, politicians lauded a Minnesota widow's loving son who fought ferociously on Bataan's bloody

Italian-language newspapers in the United States hailed the farm boy whose last name sounded Italian. Bianchi's forebears actually came from France and Germany.

On this Veterans Day, there are some hometown folks here, very few, who still remember Willibald Bianchi.

'In the 1940s, everyone in Minnesota knew about him," recalled Magdaline Marti, one of Bianchi's four sisters and his closest kin still living in New Ulm.

An uncle, Alois Eibner, 84, said Bianchi "brought honor to his town" with the bravery he displayed in the Philippines. It was ironic that Bianchi came from New Ulm, a town

whose loyalty and patriotism were challenged in two world wars because most townspeople were of German ancestry. The city is proud to be the home of Lt. Bianchi," the New Ulm Journal editorialized. "New Ulm glories in the honor which has come to one of her sons. We hope, among other

things, this will help to answer the question: 'How does New Ulm stand on this war?"" On Feb. 3, 1942, when a rifle platoon was ordered to wipe

Early in the advance, he was shot in the hand and could no longer grasp his rifle. He moved forward, firing with his pistol. found one gunners nest and silenced it with hand grenades. As he did, two machine gun bullets ripped muscles in his

Bianchi fought on. He climbed atop a disabled American tank and turned its anti-aircraft gun on the enemy. Several



bullets hit him. A grenade blast knocked him off the tank, but by then Bianchi had so weakened the other nest that infantry-

Those who knew him best were not surprised by Bianchi's

"He was strong and courageous," said his uncle Alois. When he made up his mind to do something, he followed

'He was proud to be in service," recalled his sister Magda-"When he was in school and guys were bothering his sis-

ters, he would wade in and wipe out the whole gang," said another sister, Josephine McGraw of Wayzata. "He was a real man, but sensitive and loving," said a third sister, Mary Torpey of Crosslake. She said that Willibald, as a

boy, went into the woods each spring to pick wild flowers for

Bianchi dropped out of high school after his father died in a hunting accident. The only son, he helped out on the family dairy and turkey farm and hunted pheasants, rabbits and deer. He became an expert marksman.

He finished high school at an extension program in St. Paul then enrolled in the animal husbandry program at South Dakota State University, working his way through college as a janitor. He was on the poultry judging team, went out for boxing and played football.

He wore his ROTC uniform a lot, even when he went home on weekends, partly because he could not afford much clo-

thing but also because he liked soldering. Hewas known as Bill, but his closest fiends jokingl nicknamed him "Medals" because he was so proud of his ROTC decorations. He was a cadet major.

He graduated in 1939 and was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1940. Less than two years later, he was sent to the

When Bataan fell on April 9, 1942, barely two months after his heroism, Bianchi was taken captive. He survived the infa-mous death march, and other prisoners told how he moved up and down the line, spurring those crazed by hunger and thirst and sharing their burdens.

At the end of the march, more than 2,000 prisoners died the first two weeks. Some who lived told how Bianchi bartered with Japanese guards to get food for starving Americans.

But a hero's fame dims with time. In 1955, a new residential street in New Ulm was named Bianchi Drive and there was talk about placing a statue of Bianchi, or maybe a plaque, along the street. It never hap-

Flo Wilfahrt, a Bianchi Drive resident since the street opened, suspects no more than four of the 25 or so families along the street know who Bianchi was

Bianchi never saw Bianchi Drive. He never got back to

The coup was one of about 200 in Bolivia's 154-year history as a republic. That Natusch has lasted for almost two weeks, observers say, is the result of the military's reluctance to act against one of its own, a reluctance rooted in a civilian uprising in 1952.

Bolivia's 1951 presidential election was won by the candidate of the Nationalist Revolutionary Movement, a populist group. Then President Mamerto Urriligagoidia refused to recognize the election, however, and turned power over to a military junta.

Riots broke out in April 1952, and Bolivia's weak military was defeated by groups of armed civilian. Humiliated army leaders were forced to close the military college, accept NRM officials as officers, merge the army with the militia, and join the NRM. The army gained revenge on Nov. 4, 1964, when it overthrew President Victor Paz Estenssoro.

Army officers have stuck together ever since, fearful of a new attempt by civilians to destroy the military.

The unwritten rule is that whoever comes to power in a coup is supported by his comrades, at least until the top officers gather later and decide at a single meeting whether the coup-maker should stay or go.

The system makes it inviting for just about any colonel with a half-dozen armored cars to make a dash for the palace and hope for prolonged support from his colleagues.

In 1970, there were three coups within 24 hours.

Natusch, however, probably has less support than any president in the past 27 years, and appears to be hanging on by sheer force and repression, military sources say.

His problems are mounting, the sources say, and they predict he will not last much longer. The sources note:

· Natusch broke the unwritten rule by arresting officers before they could organize a meeting, and army support is wearing thin. Armored units guarding the presidential palace and patroling the streets of the capital pulled back to their bases Wednesday despite Natusch's plea for them to stay in La Paz.

· Congress voted Saturday not to recognize Natusch as president and called on the armed forces to unite with lawmakers to restore constitutional rule. Most politicians and top union leaders have refused to take part in a proposed

GALVESTON (AP) - Oil pouring from a burning tanker in the Gulf of Mexico formed a ribbon 17 miles long Sunday, but winds blew it away from the Texas shoreline.

Dissenters Arrested At 'Democracy Wall'

PEKING (AP) - In a stern warning to dissenters, uniformed police marched to "Democracy Wall" Sunday and halted the sale of transcripts of a young dissident's trial. Four persons were arrested.

Police did not say what charges were filed against the four, but sources among the dissidents said they were accused of publishing a court document without permission. The dissidents maintain the transcript was made from a tape-recorded account of what had been billed as a

"We don't know what we'll do now," one dissident said. "We were totally unprepared because the transcript already is on the wall. Authorities said this was a public trial and this was an objective account of a public trial.

Posters put up on Democracy Wall are a key device for Peking's dissidents. Sources said police arrested Long Chungqing, 19, a writer for a moderate literary magazine who was among those hawking the transcript. Two unidentified persons who bought copies of it and a man who objected when police tried to tear down a week-old poster on the wall also were arrested, the sources said.

The 15-page, home-printed transcript was being sold by members of The April Fifth Forum. It was titled: "The Trial of Wei Jingsheng. What Happened on the Morning of Oct. 16. A Tape Recording."

Wei, 29, editor of the dissident magazine "Explorations," was arrested March 29. He was convicted, after a sixhour proceeding to which only ticketholders and the government-controlled press were admitted, of giving military secrets on this year's China-Vietnam war to a foreigner and for ridiculing the Chinese socialist system and calling for democracy

On Oct. 16. Wei was sentenced to 15 years in prison. His appeal was denied last Tuesday by the Peking Supreme Court

mutual fund. I paid income taxes on this fund every year. I thought this would keep me in the clear with the Internal Revenue Service, if I ever cash in my fund. I was told recently by a friend that, in no way, am I free of the IRS. He says I will have to pay taxes again, when

What is this all about and why?

A. You may or may not have to pay more taxes when you "cash in" - redeem - your mutual fund shares. For your sake, let's hope you won't be hit with more taxes. I'm not wishing bad things on you -- just hopes that your investment has been a success.

When you redeem, the difference between your cost and the amount you receive will be either a profit or a loss - a long-term capital gain or a long-term capital loss. If you redeem at a loss, you'll have no tax to pay - because you'll have no profit.

Each year that fund has sent you a Form 1099" - listing the dividends and capital gains distributions you received during the year. You reported and paid income taxes on those dividends and distributions. But those past tax payments don't effect what tax - if any - will be due when you redeem.

If you took those dividends and distributions by check, your cost is the price you originally invested in the fund. If you reinvested those dividends and distributions to buy more fund shares as most mutual fund shareholders do your cost is your original investment, plus all those distributions.

Let's say you invested \$2,000 in that fund and, over the years, reinvested \$1,-000 of dividends and capital gains distributions. That makes your cost \$3,000. If you redeem all your shares and receive more than \$3,000, you have a profit subject to tax as a long-term capital

If you redeem all your shares at less than \$3,000, you have a loss. No tax but a far less happy state of financial affairs.

Q. Many years ago, I invested in a that, on over-the-counter stocks, the commission is included in the price of the stock and no separate commission is charged by the broker.

To whom should I complain?

A. No one. Your memory is a bit faulty. This column has explained that when you buy an over-the-counter stock - one not traded on a stock exchange the broker can charge you either a commission or a mark-up. When you sell an O-T-C stock, the broker can charge you either a commission or a mark-down.

You can't be charged both a commission and either a mark-up or mark-

In the O-T-C market, when a brokerage house acts as an agent, it buys or sells stocks for oustomers at the best possible price and charges commissions.

When a brokerage house acts as a principal in the O-T-C market, it buys stocks at one price and sells them at a higher price, the difference being the mark-up or mark-down.

Q. I am 75 and have a regular savings aocount at 51/4 percent interest, as well as a time deposit account at 63/4 percent maturing in five months. My children say I should buy U.S. Treasury Bills with this money when the time deposit ma-

I would not feel comfortable with those "T bills," even though they pay higher interest. I would rather have at least one savings account, on which I could draw in case of emergency, and put the rest of my money into a twoand-a-half-year time account. Am I thinking right?

A. You're right about having some of your money in a savings account for emergency purposes. I'd say that a couple of thousand dollars should be your emergency reserve.

But your children are very right and giving you good advice about what to do with most of your money. U.S. Treasury bills come in maturities of 13, 26 or 52 weeks and now pay much higher interest than you can get in two-and-a-half-year







To Your Good Health

By PAUL DONOHUE, M.D. Dear Dr. Donohue: Please, doctor, can you give me any information on myasthenia? I am having an awful lot of trouble trying to eat. — F.W.N.

To understand myasthenia (MY-as-THEEN-ee-uh) it is necessary to understand how muscles work. Think in terms of electricity.

Electricity is sent from a power plant along wires to final destination - like a lightbulb in your home. Electrical impulses from the central nervous system similarly go out through nerves to the muscles of your body.

When the lightbulb gets the electricity it turns on. When the muscle gets a nerve impulse it contracts. This is how we perform tasks, from scratching ear to digging a garden patch. Each act requires many, many such impulses.

No wire is long enough to lead from the power plant directly to your house lightbulb. That would be impractical and expensive. Nor does a single nerve lead directly from the central nervous system to a specific muscle. There are chains of

When an electrical impulse reaches an end of one nerve that ending discharges a chemical (acetylcholine). That causes the next nerve in the chain to fire and boost along the impulse.

The defect in myasthenia lies in a deficiency of this chemical (acetylcholine).

Fire Guts Nursing Home, 14 Killed

lieved started by a 4-year-old boy gutted a home for elderly and mentally retarded persons in this northwestern Ohio town Sunday, killing at least 14 persons and leaving two missing, officials said

Mayor R. Bruce Kidston said the victims, most in their 60s, were all "very badly" burned.

We have 14 confirmed dead and two names are missing off our list. There's a possibility we may end up with 16 dead. hope to God it doesn't run any higher," Kidston said.

They got seven people out the other side (of the building)," he continued. "We couldn't get anybody else out. They just couldn't penetrate. We just could

Police Chief David Norris said 13 of the dead were from the approximately The residents "ranged in age, I would say, from 40 to 70," Norris said.

The 14th victim was Norris' motherin-law, Gladis Coats, owner of the boarding house. Norris said she was 61 or 62. She had escaped the fire but returned to the burning house. Norris said she was found at the bottom of a flight of stairs, her arms around a female patient she was trying to carry out.

Kidston said Mrs. Coats "was assisting our firemen in getting people out." When firefighters were beaten back by the flames, Mrs. Coats "escaped from

Israelis Jail Mayor Of Palestinian City

JERUSALEM (AP) - The Israeli army Sunday jailed without charge the Arab mayor of Nablus, an influential Palestinian leader opposed to Israel's settlements policy and autonomy plans in the West Bank of the Jordan River.

The arrest of Mayor Bassam Shakaa, pending legal procedures to deport him, touched off angry protests in the West

In another devlopment likely to heighten tension in the occupied territories, the Israeli Cabinet adopted a general policy decision calling for more Jewish settlements and the enlargement of existing outposts in the West Bank, Gaza Strip and the Syrian Golan Heights. A Cabinet committee was left to work out details and no number was set for new settlements Following the decision, an organiza-

tion of poor Israelis scuffled with settlers at Gush Etzion, south of Jerusa-

The group, which calls itself the Black Panthers, complains the government is spending money on West Bank settlements that could be used to house the poor. Israel Radio reported that one of the settlers was beaten after he fired his weapon in the air, and troops disarmed two other settlers who shot over

Heading Off Resignations

The compromise Cabinet decision, accepted unanimously, seemed aimed at heading off a showdown and possible resignations within Prime Minister Menachem Begin's fractured government.

The Cabinet also chose a new site for the Elon Moreh settlement a few miles from the campsite it now occupies overlooking Nablus.

The Israeli Supreme Court ruled Oct. 22 that private land for Elon Moreh was illegally seized and ordered the settlement evacuated within 30 days. The settlers, who have strong right-wing support in the government, have so far ree threatening a major of frontation within the Cabinet that could topple Begin from power.

Town Council Resigns After Shakaa was taken to the maximum-security Ramla Prison near Tel Aviv. the Nablus town council resigned and other West Bank mayors consulted on a possible mass resignation. Scattered demonstrations, and school and business strikes were reported throughout the area, inhabited by 700,000 Palestinians.

No Doubt About Cause

Shakaa won a temporary injunction from the Supreme Court against his expulsion last week, but the army spokesman said the court did not bar Shakaa's detention until a hearing could be held.

No charges were filed and no reason for his arrest was given. But the action followed a remark he made in a private meeting last week that Israel could expect more terror operations like the 1978 coastal road massacre as long as the occupation of Arab lands continued.

The remark, leaked from the meeting by Maj. Gen. Danni Matt, Israel's top of ficer in the West Bank, created a furor in the Israeli Parliament and outraged a country still incensed over the deaths of 34 Israelis in that terror operation.

Officials Not Talking Officials refused to discuss the Sha-

kaa case or say on what grounds Israel was seeking his expulsion. Cabinet Secretary Arieh Naor said only, "Our decision was not related only to what Mr. Shakaa said, but more than that to what he has done." He refused to elaborate.

Last June, Shakaa defied a government order and led an anti-settlement demonstration. The case against him for that violation was frozen as a gesture to the United States, but it was not The expulsion action won wide sup-

port from Israeli politicians but seemed certain to stir major new unrest in the West Bank after months of quiet. Mayor Fahad Qawasmeh of Hebron

called the arrest "a clear policy of intimidation" aimed at frightening the mayors into dropping their opposition to the autonomy scheme

Shimon Peres, leader of the opposition Labor Party in Parliament, expressed satisfaction that the government had reacted to Shakaa's statement, but he refused to say whether he agreed with the attempt to deport him.

Marx Losing **Ground In Red China**

PEKING (AP) - In one of the most sweeping disavowals yet of Mao-style communism, a member of the Chinese Politburo was quoted Sunday as saying most of current "patterns and conventions" of socialism in China should be cast aside

Zhao Ziyang, in a speech reported by the official news agency Xinhua, said China must stick to the "socialist road," but he dismissed the economic theories of Marx and Engels, and said the Chinese have had "muddled ideas" about socialism.

The speech was particularly significant because Zhao, 61-year-old governor of Sichuan province and newly elected member of China's ruling Politburo, is a close ally of Senior Vice Premier Deng Xiaoping and is regarded by some as a candidate to succeed Sichuan native Deng, 75, in the top leadership.

The speech was given at a meeting of provincial, prefectural and county Communist Party secretaries Oct. 20-Nov. 4, Xinhua said.

Since the death of Mao Tse-tung in 1976 and the emergence of the "pragmatic" leadership of Deng and Premier Hua Guofeng, the process of dismantling the more dogmatic aspects of Maoism has advanced swiftly. But Zhao's statements, presumably made with Deng's blessings, were some of the hardest-hit-

'All economic patterns and conventions which hold back the development of productive forces should be abolished in order to make the best use of existing potential and get China's social productive forces to expand rapidly," he said.

"Of course we must adhere to the socialist road," he said. "But previously we had many muddled ideas about what is socialism.

"Things which are not an inseparable part of society were taken as inviolable holy principles, and this prevented people from emancipating their minds." This was an apparent reference to the slavish devotion most people in power paid to Mao's ideas during his 27 years

One of the things Mao insisted on was that class struggle, rather than economic development, should come first. Egalitarianism - payment of the same wage no matter what amount of work is done - was another Mao favorite.

Zhao criticized these and other aspects of Maoism

"I put out two fire calls. It probably took me three minutes to get there. By that time, the whole place was engulfed." he said.

Norris said six of the victims were found on the second floor: "Some of them were found in their chairs, some in their beds. Apparently they were taken by surprise. Very Badly Burned

'They've started to sift through the debris," Kidston said. "We removed all the bodies we have been able to find.

Williams County Sheriff Denver Mock, when asked about the existence of a sprinkler system or other safety devices in the home, said, "Not as far as I know. ... I know they hadn't been licensed for five or six years as a nursing

Most are burned badly, very badly.

The two-story brick and wood structure was a nursing home until 1973, according to Dr. John Ackerman, diertor of the Ohio Department of Healh. Converted to a halfway house for the mentally retarded, the rooming house was governed by local ordinances, he said. Kidston said the house had no sprin-

kler, but added that there was no legal violation. "A sprinkler would have saved the lives and everything. 'Mrs. Coats ... ran a very needed establishment here," he said. "A lot of

people lived here for a lot of years. They had nowhere else to go.' Of the Coatses, he also said: "These are good people who run this place. They were dedicated people. Gladis

Coats proved it this morning. They took in (people) nobody else wanted. Kidston said the fire broke out about 9:40 a.m. and was brought under control



We would urge all persons in responsible positions here and abroad to refrain from it. And that applies to the Soviet Union.

Administration officials made clear, meanwhile, that they believe the Iranians holding the embassy as well as those abroad are under the control of the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.

In Beirut, Lebanon, some 50 demonstrators thought to be Iranians burned a occupied an adjoining garden.

A U.S. official, who insisted he not be identified, said Khomeini and his associates had "ample authority" to end the siege of the embassy in Tehran.

They also have "moral authority to handle most of the demonstrations outside the country," the official said.

On Saturday, President Carter, moving to curb demonstrations in the United States, instructed the Justice Department to begin deportation proceedings against any Iranian students who are in the United States illegally.

Air Search Continuing For Lubbockite's Plane

PUEBLO, Colo. (AP) — The search for a missing plane has been moved from southern Colorado to New Mexico on the strength of the "first real concrete evidence" since the plane disappeared Oct. 30, said Ken Clark, spokesman for the Colorado Civil Air Patrol.

Information from federal flight-radar computers shows a small plane crossed from Colorado into New Mexico on Oct. 30, the day the missing aircraft took off from Grand Junction after refueling, Clark said.

The time frame of the computer report indicates the plane on radar could have been the missing plane, Clark said.

He said Colorado CAP units would remain on alert but were turning over the search operation to New Mexico authorities. The CAP has identified the pilot as David A. Jones, 33, of Lubbock, and the pas-

senger as Michael O'Keefe of Bremerton, Wash. The search began in the rugged southern Colorado Rockies last Friday when the

plane - believed en route to Lubbock from Washington - was reported missis Search efforts were hampered by the absence of a flight plan, and CAP officials said they were baffled by the plane's disappearance until the new lead was received Sunday from the Federal Aviation Administration.

HEARTLINE: I wrote you earlier and asked you if I would be better off moneywise to retire from the railroad on the regular age retirement or on a disability retirement. You answered that chances are the age retirement would give me a larger pension amount. Can you explain why there is a difference in monthly benefits under the two retirements? - F.S.

An employee's average monthly compensation is generally based on his or her highest taxable earnings excluding five years of lowest earnings and, in some cases, other years of low earnings. The number of years of compensation used for computing the average is generally determined by the number of elapsed years between 1956 and the year of eligibility for the annuity compensa-

For an age retirement, the year of eligibility is the year age 62 is attained and for a disability annuity it is the year the disability began. However, there is an advantage, not available to other annuitants, for employees who retire on a 60/30 annuity because they are deemed to be age 65 at retirement and thus the cut-off for determining the elapsed period is three years earlier. (The 60/30 plan means the worker is 60 years or older and has 30 or more years of service in the railroad industry.)

Doctor Sure Body That Of Oswald

SEATTLE (AP) - The doctor who performed the autopsy on Lee Harvey Oswald says he is certain the body was that of Oswald, the man accused of assassinating President John F. Kennedy.

There is overwhelming circumstantial evidence that it was Oswald," said Dr. Earl Rose, chief medical examiner in Dallas in 1963 when Jack Ruby shot Oswald.

But Rose said he would not object to exhumation of the body to verify the identity. "It's the American way, to explore every possibility," he said.

British lawyer-author Michael Eddowes has filed suit in Fort Worth asking that Oswald's remains be exhumed to recheck the identity.

Eddowes recently wrote a book in which he claims the Soviet secret police substituted a look-alike for Oswald when he was in the Soviet Union before Kennedy's assassination in Dallas on Nov 22, 1963. The writer was granted permission to see Oswald's medical, dental and X-ray records.

Rose, in Seattle on Saturday for a meeting of the National Association of Medical Examiners, said Oswald's wife nd mother identified the body

The grief of the two was such that my heart went out to her (the widow, Marina Oswald) in tremendous pity. She was a stranger in a strange land

Rose said, "I received the body after surgery had been done in an attempt to save Oswald. I was to check the cause of death and also any possibility of police brutality - which, by the way, I did not

There was some talk that Oswald could have been saved. I certainly don't think there was any chance. The bullet had severed two major vessels, the aorta and the vena cava, and the liver and spleen were damaged.

In my opinion, he could not have been saved. He had bled heavily, mostly internally. I recovered the missile and turned it over to police.

Rose said he measured Oswald, took fingerprints and X-rays and full-length photographs of the corpse.

There is some controversy about the height Rose reported and the fact he did not find a scar from a mastoidectomy removal of a projection of a bone behind the ear - that others claim Oswald had.

INDIAN LAWSUIT

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - A federal judge has heard final arguments in the Ute Indian Tribe's suit claiming jurisdiction over 3 million acres - three times the amount of land it now owns in eastern Utah. To discourage use of the automobile,

WASHINGTON (AP) - Governments trying to lure people out of their automobiles ought to consider promoting bicycles and mopeds as energy-conserving yet convenient alternatives, according to a book released Sunday.

This is a major conclusion of "Running on Empty: The Future of the Automobile in an Oil-Short World.

The book, written by Worldwatch Institute researchers Lester R. Brown, Christopher Flavin and Colin Norman, says that bicycles and mopeds are well suited for urban and suburban areas where short commuting and shopping trips represent the main transport

It claims that in the United States as a whole, 80 percent of automobile trips are shorter than 10 miles, "quite a reasonable trip by bicycle or moped.

The authors point out that the bicycle offers the advantage of an often-neglected renewable energy resource - the calories contained in food.

Communists Buried Peacefully

Avenging Of Murders Called For

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Chanting revolutionary slogans, banner-waving symathizers helped bury four slain communist activists Sunday after marching 11/2 miles through the streets flanked by police and combat-equipped National Guards-

An estimated 500 marchers braved an all-day rain to join a peaceful procession that included the caskets, covered in red sheets, of five Communist Workers Party members killed during a shootout at a "Death to the Klan" rally last weekend. Four men killed at the rally were buried Sunday. The fifth victim will be buried

later in South Carolina

Two widows, Signe Waller and Dale Sampson, were among a 10-member honor guard that led the march from downtown Greensboro to Maplewood Cemetery. Each carried an unloaded rifle and a poster picture of her husband. Five other wom-

en and three men, also carrying unloaded weapons, made up the honor guard. The honor guard and their weapons were checked by members of a 500-man National Guard battalion before the march began. Police armed with shotguns lined each side of the march route, moving along with the procession toward the cemeter-

The march proceeded through the rain-slicked streets without any major incidents, but police arrested several persons, including a few who were armed.

The Communist Workers Party had urged sypathizers from around the country to come to Greensboro, and police had expected anywhere from 2,000 to 5,000 people to line the parade route.

However, police said that only about 100 onlookers were on hand to watch the aproximatey 500 marchers. They were greatly outnumbered by more than 900 law

enforcement officers, including guardsmen, state troopers and local police. At the cemetery, caskets containing bodies of the four men were placed over their graves. Widows of the four men joined CWP representatives on a soundtruck

"It makes the cause of communism concrete for the United States people at a time when they really need it," said Phil Thompson, who identified himself as a spokesman for the CWP-USA

We want to use the CWP 5 to expose all capitalist politicians, be they Carter or Kennedy. The five CWP martyrs died a glorious death, fighting the bourgeoisie and its agents, the FBI and the KKK." Thompson said.

Guardsmen, state Highway Patrolmen and city police stood by in the cemetery during the service. National Guard helicopters circled overhead.

A dozen guardsmen strode in front of the procession, which was dotted with red flags, down Greensboro's Market Street, accompanied by the chant of "avenge the murder of the CWP 5" from the marchers.

The marchers carried huge banners proclaiming, "The whole world is watching, avenge the CWP 5." Some carried huge red, black and yellow banners saying: 'Death to the Klan and the capitalist class.' As the parade moved slowly along, the demonstrators sang revolutionary songs. A

group of seven persons, one playing a guitar, led the singing from a yellow truck that accompanied the bodies. Some arrests were made just before the march began. Officers delivered a group of prisoners to the city jail but declined to say how many were arrested or where the

arrests were made. A police spokesman said, however, that the prisoners included sympathizers for the marchers and for the Ku Klux Klan. Avenge the murder of the CWP 5," read a poster circulated by the party. It pictured a man in overalls clubbing a Nazi with a rifle butt.

Hours before the funeral, Nelson Johnson, an organizer of the parade, and Greensboro Mayor Jim Melvin agreed to some guidelines for the demonstration. Marchers agreed to follow a route set by police, and authorities agreed to allow

some marchers to carry unloaded rifles as honor guards for the five caskets. Greensboro, a textile and tobacco town of 160,000 people that was the site of the first lunchcounter sit-ins in the 1960s, had been calm throughout the weekend. Fourteen white men were arrested in the aftermath of the shooting, which killled

four white men and a black woman. Several of the supects claimed they were either members of the Ku Klux Klan or were Nazis. Melvin declared a state of emergeny on Saturday, giving police the power to

search cars and people and prohibiting the sale or display of guns or explosives. But there were no curfews or restrictions on businesses, and Police Chief William

E. Swing said the atmosphere in the city was unlike that which permeated racial conflicts in the 1960s.

In my view, what's going on between these various extremist groups is political. It's not racial. It's not a situation of black and white," he said.

The Iranians in Beirut scaled the fence surrounding the embassy grounds and shouted their support of Iranian revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, witnesses said. They said the U.S. Marine guards took to the roof with their light weapons and walkie-talkies while Lebanese gendarmes stood by, not interfering with the mob.

Americans! Long live the Iranian revolution! Long live Khomeini!" they shouted in Arabic and Farsi. The report that the Tehran hostages

would be freed soon was made by Al Jazirah, one of the leading Saudi newspapers. It did not identify its informants It said release of the hostages, held

since last Sunday when Iranian students seized the U.S. Embassy, would come as a result of negotiations by the Palestine Liberation Organization. The PLO has undertaken a major

role in the efforts for the release of the hostages and the cooperation between the PLO and the Iranian government will save the lives of the hostages," the paper added.

PLO envoys are in Tehran attempting to mediate an end to the takeover by Iranians demanding the United States

DENVER (AP) - An Iranian chemistry student was held for questioning Sunday after a 15-year-old youth was shot and killed and two companions were wounded after allegedly harassing the man, police said. The shooting outside Afshin Shariati's southwest Denver apartment came after

two days of demonstrations around Colorado related to Iranian students and the hostage situaton in Ira, but police would not speculate whether the shooting was connected with those protests.

The dead youth, identified as Paul Moritzky, died at the scene, officers said. His two companions were identified as Steve Roane, 17, and Michael Lopez, 16, also of Shariati, 21, is a student at Loretto Heights College, majoring in chemistry and

petroleum engineering, said apartment manager Steve Gerhart, a 25-year-old University of Denver graduate student Loretto Heights College is across the street from Shariati's third-floor apartment.

Police said no charges had been filed against Shariati. A neighbor, Kelly Ryan, 21, said she was in bed "when I heard some people run-

ning and glass crashing. I heard them running across the top stairs and then down the stairs. Then I heard two shots. I figured somebody had been shot or there had been a party or something. Jim Costillo. 29. who lives in an adjacent house, said someone began beating on

his front door early Sunday

A young man, later identified as Lopez, stood bleeding on his doorstep, Costillo said. "Help me, man, I've been shot. Let me in," Costillo said the youth told him. 'He said the Arabs had shot him," Costillo said. Costillo called police, who ar-

rived about five minutes later.

Detective Doug Hildebrant said the three youths "and several others" decided on

Saturday night that they would "find some Iranians to hassle. Hildebrant said they looked on mailboxes in the apartment house for an Iranian name then smashed a picture window in Shariati's third-floor apartment, apparently from the outside. Several other Iranian and Arab students live in the same building.

As the youths ran for their car, the detective said, Shariati ran out of his apartment and fired in the direction of the fleeing juveniles with a rifle. Moritzky ied there Lopez was wounded in his left arm and hospitalized. Roane

was shot in the lower leg and was treated and released. Gerhart described Shariati as "very polite. I've never had any trouble with him at all and he's lived here better than a year." Gerhart was not aware that the shooting

had taken place until told by reporters outside the three-story tan brick complex. The dead youth's mother, Annette, said her son was a sophomore at Lincoln High School and had played in a football game Saturday





Tech's Offense Puzzling

REX DOCKERY SHOOK HIS HEAD. The inability of the Texas Tech offense to cross the goal line this season is obviously just as much a puzzle to him as it has been to followers of the Red and Black in 1979.

"Unfortunately, it's just one of those things," Tech's second-year head coach conceded. "It's the first time something like this has happened to many of us (members of the Tech coaching staff). It's just something that we are going to have to work through.

Saturday's 3-3 tie with Texas Christian was the latest in a line of offensive disappointments for Dockery and the Red Raiders. For some strange reason Tech's offense breaks out in a rash every time it nears the end zone. The Red Raiders seem allergic to the end zone. They move the football consistently from their own 20 to their opponents' 20. But once inside scoring territory, anything is likely to happen and has.

Statistics usually tell the story of a football game. And Tech's offensive statistics inside the enemy 30 yard line this year pretty much tell the story of why

In nine football games the Red Raiders have managed only 11 touchdowns. That figure is way below the 24 touchdowns Tech chalked up during the first nine games of the 1978 season.

THERE HAVE BEEN THREE occasions this season when the Raiders haven't enough put a six-pointer on the scoreboard. Bill Adams' right foot is the only thing separating losses to Arkansas and Texas and the tie with TCU from being shutouts. Thank goodness for Adams.

In 1978, Tech failed to score touchdowns against only two opponents during the course of 11 games. Adams booted three field goals during each loss to Southern California and Texas A&M, but those games occurred early in the season. The Red Raiders didn't have a lot of trouble scoring after the fourth contest of 1978 - the Texas A&M tilt.

Tech's touchdown drought has been especially frustrating when you consider the Red Raiders have the most productive and consistent skill player in the Southwest Conference in senior fullback James Hadnot.

Hadnot leads the conference in rushing with 1,131 yards and ranks among the top five rushers in the nation, but he has yet to carry the football into the end zone for six points. The closest Hadnot has come to scoring was against TCU Saturday. On third-and-goal from the one yard mark, Hadnot tried the middle of the Horned Frog defense and was stopped after a gain of six, maybe

BREAKING STATISTICS DOWN even farther, you'll find Tech has been inside opponents' 30 yard lines 25 times this season - which doesn't count the 11 times the Red Raiders did score touchdowns. Fifteen times the Raiders have had to settle for field goals. On the 10 other instances, Tech has either fumbled, been penalized, been pushed back or just plain failed to touch pay-

Seven times the Red Raiders have had the ball inside their opponents' 10 yard marker. The results? Six field goals and the bad pitch which resulted in TCU being able to retain possession of the football Saturday.

And the missed opportunities of the offense hide the improved play of the Texas Tech defense this year.

Red Raider defenders gave up 198 points in the first nine games of 1978. After nine outings this campaign, Tech's defense has only allowed 133 points - approximately 14.2 points per game. Baylor had been the only team to score more than 21 points against that stingy defense. Texas scored only 14. Arizona scored only 14. And TCU scored only three. And the final result of those three games have been one loss and two ties.

The defense hasn't given up near the yardage it did a year ago, either. It hasn't turned the ball over quite as many times as it did in 1978, but it certainly has provided the offensive unit ample opportunity to score touchdowns.

YES. OFFENSIVELY SPEAKING, it's been a frustrating year for Texas Tech. It's hard to win football games when you're averaging only 13.4 points a game. But the Red Raiders have had their chances to score more points. Dockery will be the first to tell you that.

Unfortunately, it is a situation that is more frustrating for him than it could ever be for fans. And Dockery is constantly looking for the answer to crack that force field that keeps his offense from the end zone.

CBS Newsman Joins Network

Ted Turner wanted him for his Cable News Network, scheduled for a spring debut, he says he was a bit repulsed.

I thought it was a frivolous thing and I didn't want to lend my name and reputation to it," Schorr says. But the former CBS Newsman, a figure in a major First Amendment battle with Congress, winner of three Emmy Awards for reporting and an acclaimed newspaper journalist as well, didn't close the door. And now he sees the millionaire businessman from Atlanta as a man of vision.

Schorr says he thinks Turner may eventually force an overhaul of the three networks' news operations.

"He called me." Schorr said in a conversation during a recent trip here. "I'm wondering to this day why. Here you have this young, brash, athletic, somewhat explosive guy from the South, and I'm an older, very Northern, sort of more intellectual person. I would have thought we'd be poles apart.'

Schorr's business manager kept the door open because of the money, which Schorr says "was good from the start, we've never had to negotiate that." Schorr says his reservations concerned "ethics and professionalism.

Finally, Turner was on his way to a cable television convention in Las Vegas, that was on a Thursday night, and he said he was holding a press conference there Monday to announce the formation of Cable News Network," Schorr recalls. "He said he wanted me to come meet him, and he said, 'If you accept, I'd like you to be at the press conference with me.

Schorr went to the news conference. "He made it clear to me he was a kind of born-again news junkie, which I was loathe to believe, having watched his Atlanta station (WTBS, beamed by satellite to all 50 states). He offered to put assurances in writing that I would not be required to do anything inconsistent with my professional ethics and standards. Finally, I said, 'OK.'

"He has a vision, an enormously adventurous vision, Schorr says. "This will be a network of news only. Twentyfour hours. Cable companies who buy it will allocate one channel for it.

"We'll have fairly hard news in the morning, consumer-oriented stuff, backgrounders, throughout the day in 20-minute segments, with the headlines, so to speak, every 20 minutes. We'll switch live to Congress, the White House, if something is

'The beauty of this is, we won't have to go to anyone and say, 'Can we bump "I Love Lucy?" because this is a fully

Schorr will be senior correspondent in the 22-person Washington bureau, anchoring reports from there and the two-hour evening wrap-up, planned at 7 p.m. CST.

'I'll be the David Brinkley to his John Chancellor in Atlanta," he says. And who will that John Chancellor be? "Some star, I guess. He wants somebody even more recognizable than myself to start this thing off."

Japan Ready For 'Small Car War'

TOKYO (AP) - Japanese auto companies are emphasizing in their new models the strengths that helped make Japan the second-largest car-making country in the world - lightweight vehicles with engines designed to be cleaner

and give better gas mileage. The cars are being shown at the Tokyo International Motor Show, which closes this weekend. Thirteen Japanese and 26 foreign manufacturers are exhib-

iting 900 vehicles as well as motorcycles. Despite hour-long traffic jams to and from the fairground, just one mile from the downtown Ginza shopping area,

thousands turned out for the fair. Japanese automakers said they are gearing up for an anticipated "small-car war" with American manufacturers to meet the demand for lighter, roomier and more fuel-efficient small vehicles in

the next decade. Japan's Nissan Motor Co., maker of Datsun cars, said in a report "Looking Beyond the 1980s" that major emphasis must now be placed on vehicle weight reduction, front-wheel drive and elec-

tronic engine control technology. With keener competition in the small-car field in store for the 1980s, an automaker's chances of winning this international race mainly hinge on its capability for technical development and in-



Although details are not available, the cost of the office could range from \$100,000 to \$280,000 a year, based on Nixon's request for space and what sources say the bids are asking in priceper-square-foot

The cost for moving the office furniture would be an additional \$7,000 to \$8,-000, government sources say.

Nixon notified the General Services Administration on Oct. 12 that he would need office space in New York City when he moves into a \$750,000 Manhattan townhouse he purchased last month.

The GSA, the government's landlord and supply agency, advertised for the sace in The New York Times' classifiedads, requsting 4,000 to 8,000 square feet of "first-class air-conditoned offie space in Mid-Manhattan.

Young Star Not Taken By Films

NEW YORK (AP) - "Making movies was a new experience, but I wouldn't want to make it a career," said Kelly Reno, the 13-year-old star of "The Black Stallion," the film based on Walter Farlev's classic story of a boy and his horse.

"Besides, who'll take care of the ranch," the young actor said, referring to his home near Pueblo. Colo., where he learned to ride before he could walk. "I've been ridin' for as long as I can re-

In the movie, young Reno does most of his own riding and nearly all of the stunts, including the falls and jumps. He gives a lot of the credit to the black stalion, Cass Ole.

'He's really neat," he said. "He really knows what's going on and when that camera is rollin'. Once he hears it rollin' his ears perk up and he's just as lively as anything. A real good horse."

The film is about a young boy ship-wrecked on a deserted island with a beautiful black stallion. By helping each other survive, the boy and horse develop a lasting relationship. After their rescue, they meet an ex-horse trainer, played by Mickey Rooney, who arranges a race between the stallion and two of the fastest thoroughbreds of the day.

One of the most frightening scenes in the film involves a cobra that slithers up to Reno while he's asleep on the beach. When he wakes up, he's staring the snake in the eye.

Conference On Earth Sheltered **Housing Scheduled For Repeat**

A conference on Earth Sheltered street. In a properly designed earth shel-Housing for the Southwest, sponsored by the Center for Energy Research and the department of civil enginering at Texas Tech University, will be held Friday in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

Dr. Ernst W. Kiesling, chairman of the department of civil engineering, said that the first conference on the subject last August indicated a need to repeat the meeting.

Earth sheltered housing conserves energy, resists damage during storms and can be esthetically pleasing," Kiesling said.

He estimated that about 20 percent of U.S. energy consumption is the housing, most of it for heating and cooling. By using earth sheltered concepts and cost-effective solar systems, energy consumption can be greatly reduced.

Beyond energy conservation, earth sheltered homes are resistant to fire, of successful projects will be displayed. storms and weather damage," he said. They are easier and less costly to maintain than conventional homes. They are quiet and secure and they are efficient in terms of land use. They might even be cleaner, requiring dusting less often than the conventional home.

The earth sheltering concepts to be discussed appear traditional from the

Kiesling said that interiors are basically traditional, and the freedom allowed architects is equal to that of conventional buildings.

There are some disadvantages, Kiesling said, and those who are planning to build new homes should be advised of both advantages and disadvantages. The initial cost may be higher, for instance, but the savings might also be greater. The conference will deal with both advantages and disadvantages and cite local examples.

'This seminar will allow participants to hear professional architects and engineers and ask questions before making costly and important decisions," he said.
