SOLVING PANTRY PROBLEMS

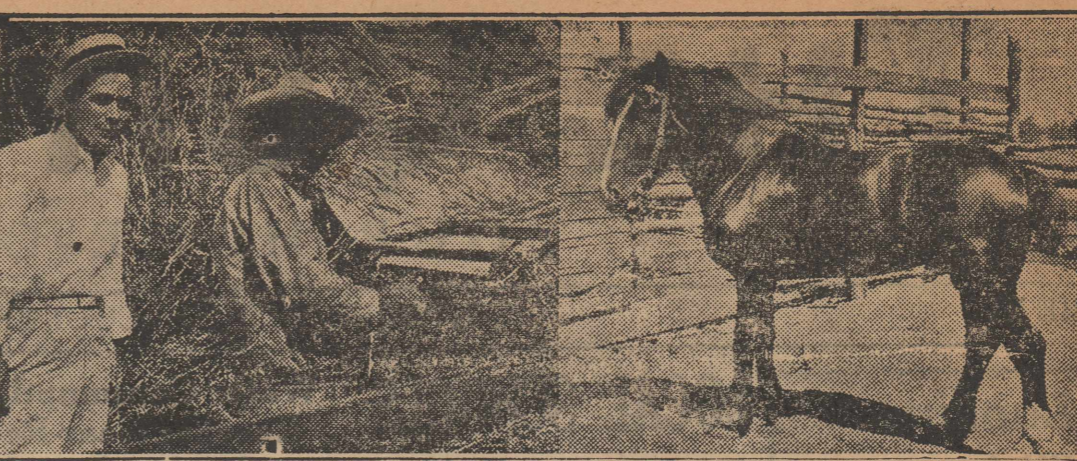
Instead of looking through boxes packed in various parts of the house for her canned food this year, Mrs. R. C. Chappel, Home Food supply Demonstrator for the Rock Creek Home Demonstration Club, is planning to build a portable pantry right in her dining room.

By tacking several layers of old newspapers on the inside of the pantry, following that with a neat covering of building paper, the food is not likely to freeze and at the same time will be conveniently located near the kitchen. Mrs. Chappel will use scraps of lumber which she already has, thus reducing the cost of her new pantry to practically nothing.

Prize-winning Horse Bought By Low-Income Farmers



The prize-winning Percheron stallion shown above is one of the 83 pure-bred sires which cooperative groups of low-income farmers in Texas and Oklahoma have been enabled to buy through loans from the Resettlement Administration. The other photograph was taken at a cooperative thresher also bought with a Resettlement loan for use of a group of low-income farmers whose fields were so small that they had been unable to obtain adequate services. More than 2,300 Texas and Oklahoma families are using such cooperative services established this summer by means of loans from Resettlement. In addition, individual borrowers in these two states have used Resettlement loans to buy 16932 milk cows, 17,288 horses, 20,111 mules and 137,812 head of poultry, and have also purchased \$750,000 worth of farm machinery.

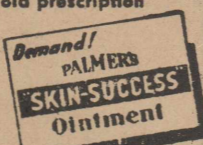

Its Chicken Canning Time

Now that you have decided which of the old hens, and roosters, too, for that matter, are liabilities rather than assets, perhaps you would like to have a suggestion as to what to do with them since there is not a fortune to be made by marketing them. So go out to the poultry yard and count the chickens that may be canned. Then come back to the shade, draw up a chair and think the situation over. And here is a piece of luck. These birds which are no longer profitable to keep are the best of the flock to can. The meat has more flavor and better texture after canning than that of younger birds.

It is a good plan not to use any of your sheet-iron or copper equipment because sometimes if meat is prepared for canning in such utensils it may later darken in the can. This is even more likely to happen with chicken than with other meats.

Of course there are many ways of canning chicken, but one which always appeals to the lagging appetite is chicken salad, and who does not like chicken salad? Canned chicken salad has a good flavor, and crispness is obtained by adding fresh celery or cucumber before serving.

FARM ACCOUNTING REVEALS LESSONS

Principles of Sound Business Management That Apply to All Farms

An analysis made of detailed records kept by a group of Wisconsin farms revealed several important lessons and the principles of sound business management derived from them apply equally well to other farms. Says an article in the Bulletin of the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association. The article says: "Investment costs, including interest, depreciation, repairs, taxes and insurance, are approximately two-thirds of all farm costs. Furthermore, these costs are largely independent of the production program of the farm. "This means that if a farmer cuts his production of crops or livestock, he increases his investment costs per unit of product produced, as a smaller number of units must then carry a large expense load as before. This illustrates the importance, from the standpoint of costs, of operating a farm at or near capacity. "Investment mistakes are more costly than many others because they cannot easily be corrected. If a farmer pays too much for his farm, his investment costs will be abnormally high as long as he owns it. If he constructs a \$4,000 barn, when a \$2,000 barn would have served his purpose, he will have excessive barn costs, year after year, during the entire service life of the structure. "This emphasizes the importance of a knowledge of investment values and the specific investment requirements of individual farms. Determining Real or False Economies "In working for greater economy, it is essential that the farm manager be able to distinguish between a real and a false saving. This can be done only through a careful estimate of the contribution to income, over a period of time, of each item of expenditure. Only if more is saved in expense than will be lost in income, can a contemplated cut in expense be designated as a real saving. "For example, dropping dairy herd improvement work may result in a yearly expense reduction. The question to decide is what effect the dropping of this work will have on the present and future income from the dairy herd. If the estimated loss in livestock receipts due to a lowered efficiency in feeding and breeding is greater than the original saving, then it would obviously be a false economy. "Substantial savings can be effected on many farms through the use of more home grown garden produce and farm cured meats. Why pay out money for products of this kind that can be produced much cheaper at home? The money saved from the family food budget can be used for the purchase of many things that will make the farm home a more comfortable and pleasant place to live."

Chicken Salad Recipe

Draw the birds as for baking. Place on a rack in a kettle, half covered with hot water, add one teaspoonful of salt per bird and simmer until tender. Avoid overcooking. Then remove the skin and bones, cut the chicken into small pieces.

- 4 pounds of chicken, cooked and cut into small pieces.
- 1/2 pound of olives, chopped
- 1 teaspoonful white pepper
- 1 cupful chicken fat
- 2 cupfuls vinegar
- Salt to taste
- Few drops Tabasco sauce

Remove one cupful of chicken fat from the cold broth, combine with the vinegar and pour over the chicken. Add salt, Tabasco sauce and more vinegar, if necessary, to season it well. Let this stand for a few hours for the best results. Then prepare the pimientos and olives. Add a small quantity of the chicken broth and heat to boiling. Add the marinated chicken and heat to boiling. Pack at once in sterilized cans. Process pint glass jars and No. 2 cans 110 minutes at 10 1/2 pounds pressure.

At the time of serving, mix the salad with thick, well seasoned mayonnaise and freshly chopped celery or diced cucumbers. Serve in nests of crisp lettuce leaves. What a treat for the family or unexpected guests!

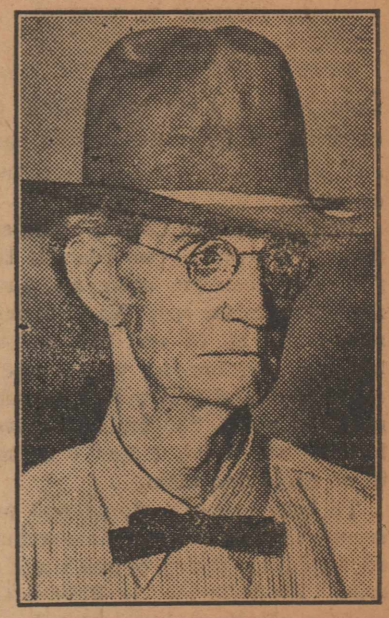

A Trench Silo

Farmers and Ranchers of Briscoe County have been overlooking one of their best insurance policies again at a shortage of feed, namely, trench silos.

In 1935 Briscoe County made sufficient feed to run two years if that feed had been put away and saved for that rainless day. Many farmers sold maize at \$8 and \$10 per ton last fall and bundles at 1 1/2 and 2 cents each and this year that same maize is worth \$30 and those same bundles are worth 5 and 6 cents— if we could find them.

To have properly stored and preserved this feed would have required very little outlay of work and no cash. Every farmer in Briscoe County could have dug a trench silo large enough to store all the feed that was grown on his farm and by so doing he would have had feed when he needed it at a price that he could afford to pay.

Also we do not have a bumper crop in Briscoe County this year we have enough "post tusties" to fill all trench silos and now is the time to dig and fill them. This little silo that will eventually burn up and away should be buried in a trench silo as soon as possible to save every bit of it that is saved.

One of the remarkable features of all filled trench silo is that if it doesn't happen to need it the next year after you fill it the feed will keep indefinitely. Experiments in our own state show that feed kept in a trench silo was as good and palatable the 13th year as it was when it was first stored. In Australia trench silos have kept feed for 21 years. Of course we wouldn't expect to work our silos that long out here. Very likely we will have a year before that long a time has passed that we would have to empty up and start all over again.

Trench silos are easy to dig. All you need is a team, a Fresno and a little "elbow grease." The pit should

be dug not less than 7 feet deep and not less than 7 feet wide—wide enough for a team. The length of the pit will be determined by the amount of feed available to be put into it.

For complete plans and detail of how to dig a trench silo and how large to make it contact the County Agent. Plans are free.

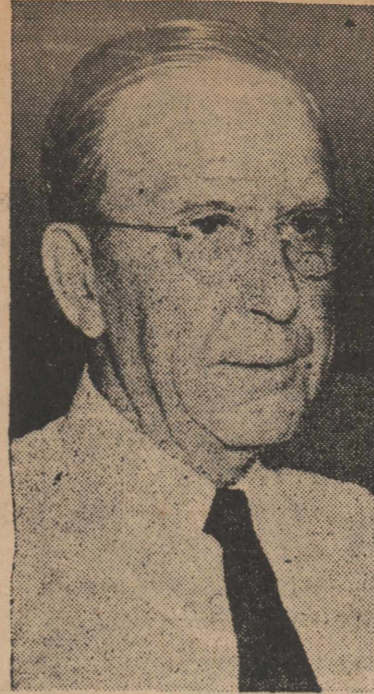
