17,000 UNNECESSARY TEXAS DEATHS IN '34

More than 17,000 Texans died unnecessarily during 1934, according to a report just issued by the Texas Planning Board's public health committee. In each instance death was caused by a preventable disease. The report also points out that Texas spends 10.73 cents per capita to protect domestic animal from disease but spends only 3.68 cents per capita for disease control among human beings.

W. H. Garrett, resident engineer at Tulia, will take Mr. Ingram's place on the Highway 86 project here. At present, Mr. Garrett will continue to make his home in Tulia.

According to Mr. Ingram, work on the local project will continue rapidly from now on. Plenty of teams and trucks have been allowed on the job, and practically all material has been purchased for the construction of culverts and bridges. Inclement weather has greatly slowed up the drainage and grading of Highway 86 during the past month. With favorable weather, good progress is expected from now to the first of the year.

FARMERS' INCOME FOR AUGUST \$649,000,000

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—The agriculture department reported today that farmers' cash income in August was \$649,000,000, a decline of \$85,000,000 compared with the July total of \$734,000,000.

The August figure, however, was \$39,000,000 above the total cash income for the same month in 1935.

Asserting that the decline from July to August was "contrary to the usual increase," federal economists said it was caused by "exceptionally heavy and earlier than usual marketing of wheat in July."

Rainfall During September Totals Nearly 9 Inches

Rainfall for the month of September made a new high record for the past several years, when precipitation totaled 8.80 inches, and brought the year's total up to 15.83 inches. Since the report in last week's Quitaque Post, .78 of an inch was recorded.

Rain continued to fall over a large part of Texas last week-end, and floods were recorded in some areas. Saturday a cold wave hit the Panhandle with snow reported at Texline. Frost was reported at Silverton the first of the week, but none was had in Quitaque.

Last Friday, moisture totaled .03 of an inch, Saturday the rainfall was recorded at .22 of an inch and on Sunday, .53 of an inch was recorded.

Voluntary Debt Adjustments Help Briscoe Farmers

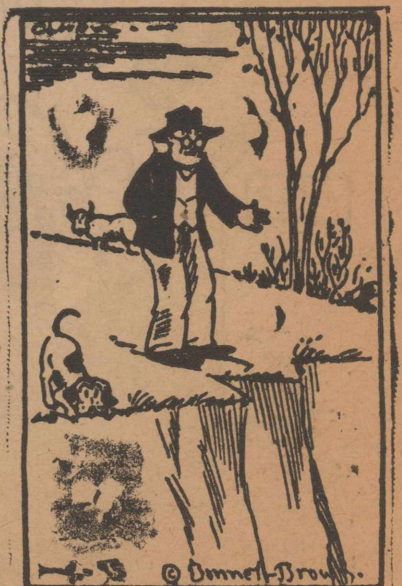
The treasury of Briscoe county has received \$3,176 during the past year as a result of voluntary debt adjustments reached through aid of the Resettlement Administration.

Adjustments have been made for 19 farmers of this county to prevent foreclosures or forced sales. A total of 5,856 acres of land, as well as other property, was involved. Debts amounting to \$70,900 before adjustment were reduced by \$4,450.

"One long-time purpose of the Resettlement Administration is to help farmers toward ownership of the land which they operate," said Q. E. Brown, chairman of the county debt adjustment committee. "It is just as important to keep them from losing land which they already own as to help them buy new land." He said that the debt adjusting work is largely with small farmers whose financial needs are so small that other agencies find no profit in handling them, or where the debt is so large, in proportion to the value of the property, that other financing agencies consider it unsafe. The Resettlement Administration makes no loans for paying delinquent taxes, interest or principal, but through committees of local volunteer workers brings

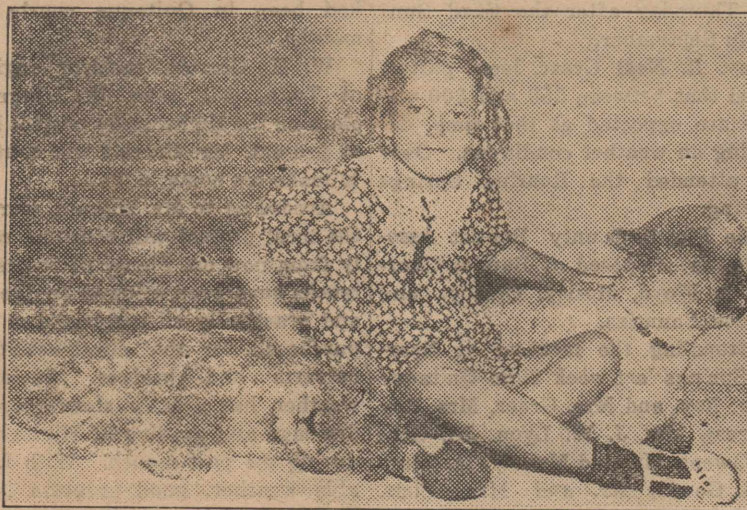

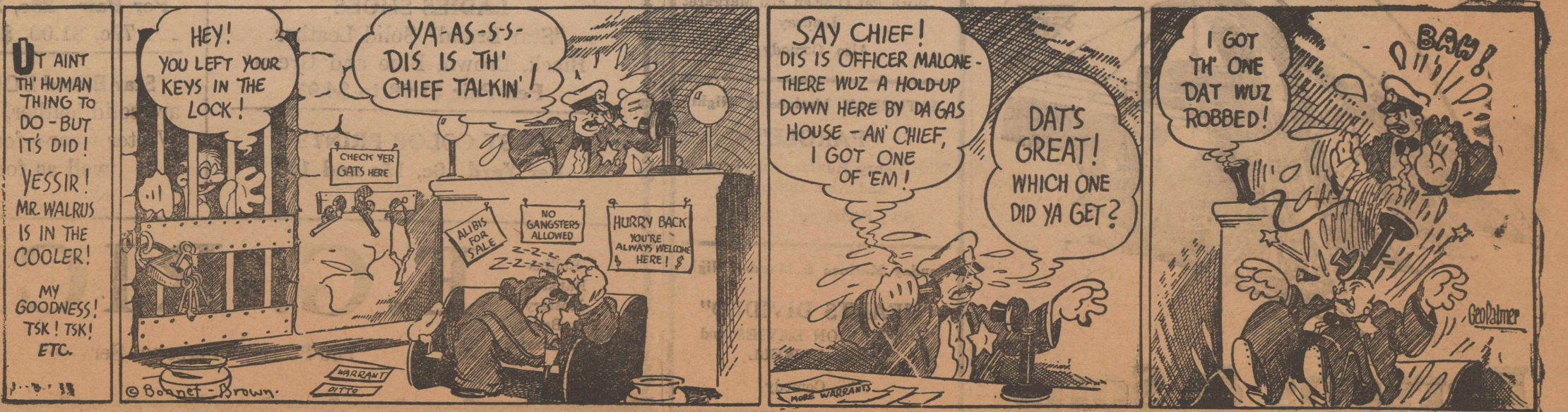

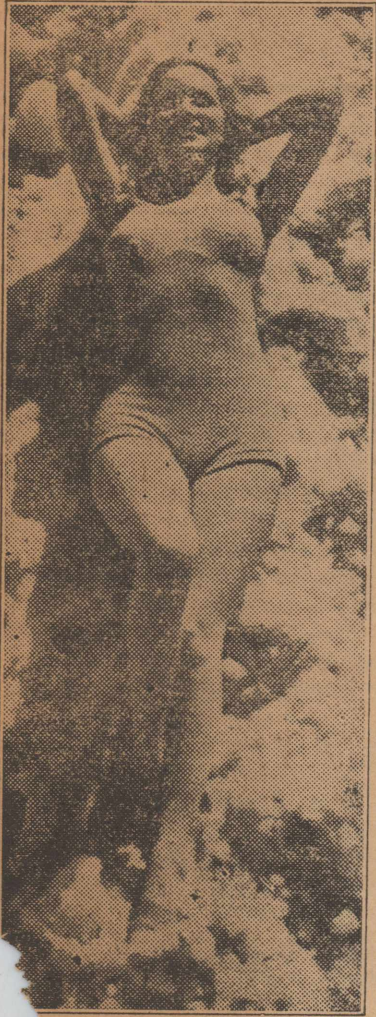

have thought of that outfit for a ten spot, but since the subject has come up we'll have to say something about it. Recent communication from the Washington office tells us that they are in the act of issuing checks at the rate of 40,000 per day with only about a million to be issued.

The payment we receive on these tags will be at the rate of 4c per pound on the sold portion. They sold only about 20 per cent of the total which we turned in. The unsold portion of tags will not be returned as they are useless. The unsold poundage will be kept in Washington, but any individual who wants his unsold poundage returned (so he can show his grand children that he and Uncle Sam used to be partners) may be able to get them returned by writing to Mr. E. L. Deal, Manager of the Certificate Pool—but who wants any useless paper on hand? Most of us have some oil stock or some other kind of stock on hand if we need any useless paper.

Trench Silos

Since the rains we are having many inquiries about trench silos. This is a good omen. It shows that Briscoe County farmers are beginning to wake up to the possibilities of the trench silo. When we stop to consider the fact that anything that cattle will normally eat can be put into a trench silo, as a filler gives the most of us something to put up as silage—it may be tumble weeds, careless weeds—or something else but it all makes good silage.

Health Education Important Program

AUSTIN, Sept. 29.—Assembling of students in the schools of the State this month calls to public attention the definite health responsibility of parents and teachers, as well as health workers, and is the subject of an address from the State Department of Health to the citizen-ship.

"A public health education program is an outstanding factor in the development of the physical, mental, and social welfare of the school children of today," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. "Health teaching should be a basic part of every educational program."

"Practically every phase of the school system is related to health. Housing, screening, diet, disposal of wastes, exercise, rest, even the manner of daily contact with others, all have a direct bearing on health. Schools must treat the child as a whole—with his physical condition related definitely to his mental and emotional capacities.

"Prevention is the all important factor in the control of communicable disease. 'Communicable'—as we know—describes that kind of disease which may be imparted, either by personal contact or transmitted from one person to another through some other method. One by one, the communicable diseases, such as smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, and typhoid fever, are being controlled by preventive or immunizing agents. It is much better for all concerned that the child should be protected from ever taking these diseases, which often leave some condition that will cause trouble later in life.

"Assume your responsibility in community and work for the development of health education which will pave the way to a better health for the future."

about agreements between the debtor and creditors for reducing or extending the indebtedness to such an extent that the debtor has a reasonable opportunity of paying off. Assistance is rendered in refinancing the debt, through the Farm Credit Administration or other public or private lending agencies.

Although it can make no loans for payments on land or taxes, the Resettlement Administration is authorized to make loans for purchase of teams, tools and supplies. Such loans were made in many of the cases adjusted during the year. Unsettled cases pending September 1 totaled six.

The next meeting will be held on Monday afternoon at the church, when the society will start a study course.

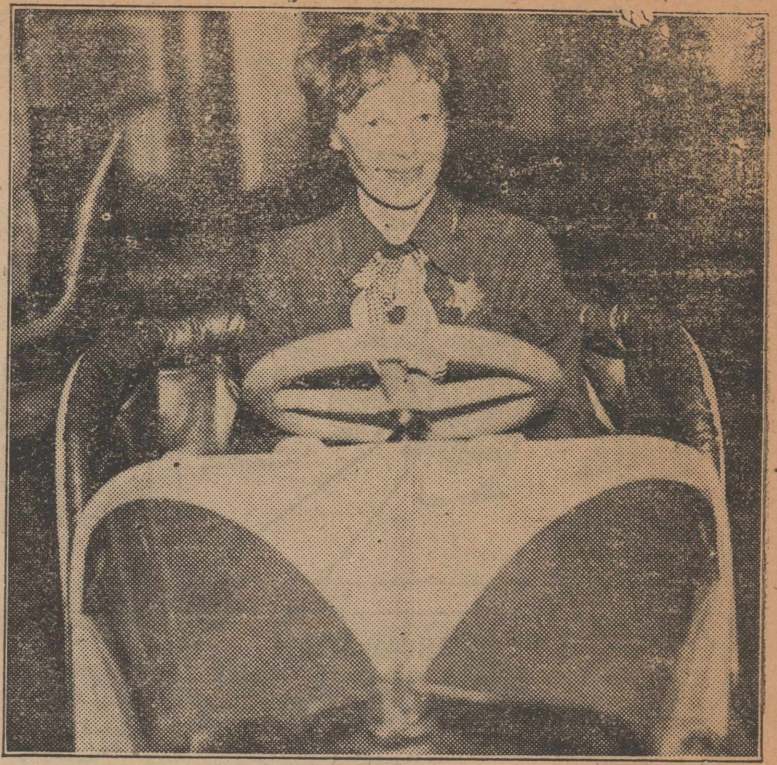

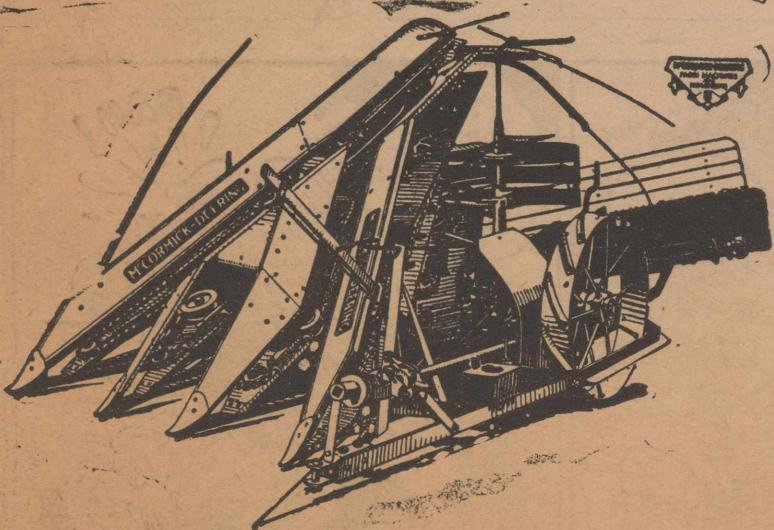
