### Baptist W. M. U.

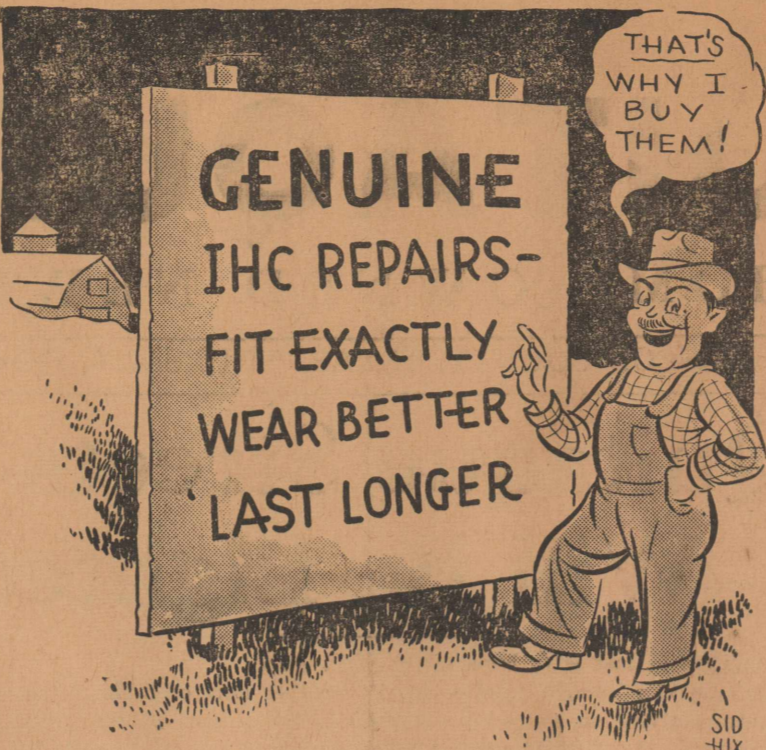
Circle No. II of the Baptist W M U met Monday at 2:30 p. m. at the home of Mrs Buddie Morris in Bible study.
