Baseball Fans See Hot Game Sunday

Coming from behind after the Quitaque Indians had scored three runs in the first inning of Sunday's fracas, the Gasoline ball club counted two in the first, one each in the second and fourth to tie the score then turned on the heat in the seventh assisted by errors to win the old ball game 7 to 4.

The visitors from Gasoline faced some real pitching Sunday but were equal to the occasion, getting 11 safeties while the Indians managed to tap Earl Morrison for 6.

The Gasoline boys were credited with four errors while the locals were accumulating five, however errors in the eighth inning behind Gregg who relieved Willis in this frame were responsible for two of Gasoline's runs.

This being the crucial point of the game, here is what happened: With the score standing at four-all, P John, first up, was assisted to first base by an error on the part of Blankenship at short; Murray Morrison struck out; Ordis Chandler was given a life at first when he hit one through Gregg on third; Earl Morrison grounded to third, Gregg throwing out Chandler at second while Morrison was safe at first, Joe Chandler hit safely, Nook Bedwell was hit by a pitched ball and then Clyde Morrison came forth with a ringing two-bagger, during all of which time three runs crossed the plate but leaving Nook's runner stranded on third, Clyde on second, Martin Thrasher, that little piece of TNT on second base, came up and lofted one to left field which was taken by Jack Powell, thus ending the fireworks, the inning and the day's scoring.

Thrasher pulled two very neat and exceedingly fast double plays that stopped a couple of tentative rallies by the Indians, thus the side being retired in order on both occasions.

Virgil Gregg, according to custom, took a liking to one of Morrison's fast ones and poled it out for a circuit, the only home run of the game.

Willis, a new comer, pitched the first seven innings for Quitaque then turned the task over to Gregg. During his tenure of the mound Willis issued two free passes and struck out six men; Gregg walked none and struck out three. Earl Morrison, going the full route for Gasoline, walked five and struck out five.

AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS

BY THE BRISCOE COUNTY AGENT

Being away from the daily grind for a few days has put the writer out of touch with what's going on in these parts. Haven't been back in harness long enough to find out too much either. I found out while I was gone that there's a dark horse in the race for Governor. Didn't find out for sure what his name was but found out he was giving the other eleven candidates a run for their money.

The trip last week to College Station proved to be a lecture trip. We heard the agricultural leaders of the state and nation give their views of "what ails" agriculture. Some thought one thing was wrong and some thought another was wrong. They all agreed that whatever was wrong, the farmer was the key to its solution. They were agreed that farmer organization was the thing most needed. For those of us who have the ability to think, there's something to work on.

Compliance Checkup
Our compliance supervisors are busy these days checking the farms to see whether or not the farms are in compliance with the conservation program.

As fast as the farms are measured and "figured out" cards are mailed to those who are over planted on cotton or feed. About 2 or 3 days after your farm has been measured if you don't get a card telling you to plow up some feed or cotton you can begin breathing normal for the chances are you're in line OK.

Whenever a farmer is notified that he is long on planted cotton or planted feed he has two courses to follow. He may plow up his excess or

he can just set tight and take the penalty. The penalty for excess cotton is 5c per pound and for feed is 5 times what the pay would be.

Poultry Hints

The summer months are the best ones for mites, lice and blue bugs to develop. If you have a flock of chickens or turkeys you owe it to your self and to the poultry too, to do whatever you can to keep them free from insects and diseases.

Growing poultry cannot grow their best when they have a load of parasites to feed. Laying hens can not lay their best when they're too lousy to walk. Just a little time and money spent in getting rid of the parasites will net good dividends in eggs and meat for market.

Black leaf forty put on the roosts just before chickens go to roost will turn the trick for getting rid of lice. Neux Vomica in the drinking water will cause chickens to shed all their blue bugs and "stick tights." A good house cleaning and spraying with Carbolirium will keep your birds free of blue bugs for a whole year.

A good culling and a good tonic will be plenty worth your money if properly done—that is if you have a good flock. And if you don't have a good flock, a culling of the entire flock will do lots of good. When you cull out a flock like this you should replace them with good bloodstested chicks. Good chicks can be had from reliable sources and there is not reason for any one to raise inferior chickens.

If you don't have the best flock in Briscoe county it's your fault. You can have the best if you want it badly enough. Just try it one time.

History and Aims of FFA Work

The Future Farmers of America is a national organization of boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture classes of the public schools throughout the United States. The movement began in Virginia in 1926 under the leadership of Henry C Groseclose, now treasurer of the national organization. From Virginia it spread into the other Southern States and into sections of the United States as well. Now the movement is national in scope and forty-seven states and the territories of Hawaii and Puerto Rico have formed associations of Future Farmers of America affiliated with the national organization.

The FFA organization is built with the local chapter as its foundation and as this unit grows and develops through the activities of its membership, the state and national organizations grow.

Some of the aims and purposes of the FFA are to provide an opportunity for boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture classes to work for advancement of their community, district, state, their fellowmen and themselves, by teaching them:

1. To follow and serve unhesitatingly and distinctly facts-truth
2. To follow and serve the truths with such kindness, pleasantness, cheerfulness, and agreeableness as will bring satisfaction in every-day life.
3. To love labor as the source of joy in life.
4. To transmute the spirit of the daily task on the farm by high ideals and standards.
5. In a way to develop leaders and cooperative enterprises.
6. To create and nurture a love of country life.
7. To provide recreational and educational entertainment for Future Farmers of America.
8. To promote thrift by membership.
9. To afford a medium of cooperative buying and selling.
10. To establish the confidence of the farm boy in himself and his work.
11. To promote scholarship.
12. To develop local leadership.

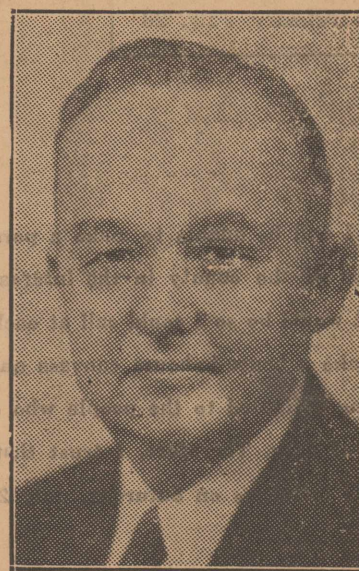

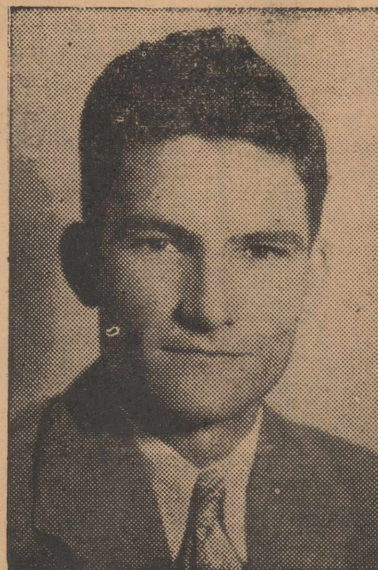
