J C Rhoderick, playing fullback, crossed the stripe early in the first quarter for Quitaque's single tally. The game was not as one-sided as the score would indicate and the local lads deserve full credit for the game fight they put up against such strong competition.

Practically all of the Flomot reserves got a taste of the game and some experience, Coach Jackson pulling his entire first string in the last moments of the game, after he had the contest well on ice, and ran in a full string of "Calves."

These Calves experienced difficulty in staving off another Panther counter, the latter carrying the ball to within a foot of the coveted line but lacked whatever was needed to shove it across.
