Borger—Mrs. Fannie E. Hedgecoke, 88, pioneer citizen of the Panhandle, died at 12:30 p. m. Sunday, March 24, following a heart attack in the home of her son E. V. Hedgecoke, seven miles north of Borger.

Known as "Aunt Fannie" to many, she was born in Franklin county, Texas, October 11, 1857 and came to Huteson county with her husband, now deceased, in 1899.

In addition to her son, E. V. Hedgecoke, she is survived by two other sons Earl M. Hedgecoke of Amarillo and Sid S. Hedgecoke of Hot Springs, Ark. She was a member of the First Baptist church and the Eastern Star, Stinnett.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist church in Stinnett, and interment was in the cemetery at Canyon beside her husband.

## SPLENDID RAIN AGAIN SOAKS THIS SECTION

General rain fell over this section March 26-27 which measured one inch at 7:00 a. m. Wednesday, however the rain continued to fall for a couple of hours longer than that and probably brought the total to 1.25 inches. The rain fell just right and all of the moisture went into the ground, giving this section of the country the best season at this time of the year that it has enjoyed in a number of years.

West of Quitauque the fall was lighter, J. P. White reporting .65 registering on his gov't. gauge.

## ONLY A LITTLE LACKING ON RED CROSS QUOTA

R. B. Persons, chairman for the Quitauque area of the Red Cross annual drive for funds, reports that the quota for this section is almost attained. The quota for Quitauque this year is \$440 and Mr. Persons stated that he had reported \$431 to the county treasurer this week—lacking only \$9 of being over the top. He said he expected to have this amount in a short time.

Mr. Persons reported that response to the drive had been very good. Not many had been reluctant to contribute because "the war is over", most people realizing that a large amount of the Red Cross funds remain in the county, and the work continues to be necessary and do good, in peace as in war.

## DON'T FORGET THE ELECTIONS SCHEDULED FOR NEXT WEEK

Two elections are scheduled for Quitauque next week, however we had incorrect information in the Post last week.

The school election information was wrong. This election will be held the first Saturday in April which is April 6 and you still have another day to submit names to the county judge if you have a candidate in mind for school trustee. The terms of Alton Johnson and C. T. Rucker expire this year and two trustees will be elected to fill these vacancies.

The city election will be held as stated, on Tuesday, April 2, for the purpose of electing a mayor and three aldermen. Names submitted for the ballot in this election are: Mayor, M. L. Roberson; Aldermen, I. G. Grundy, Orlin Stark and J. C. Rhoderick. Grundy and Stark are now members of the city council and their terms expire this year, as well as the term of J. T. Persons, whose name does not appear on the ballot for re-election.

Tommy Sherrill, 4-H Club boy from Dimmitt, won the grand champion's rosette with a light Poland China entry in the South Plains Junior Fat Stock show, held this week at Lubbock, according to a report of the show in the Amarillo News-Globe of March 27. The report listing the winners in the swine division of the event stated: "Castro County's champion swine breeding club boys kept in step with their past successes by capturing the grand championship at the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show."

Tommy is the son of Rev. and Mrs. U. S. Sherrill, of Dimmitt formerly of Quitauque, where Rev. Sherrill served four years as pastor of the Methodist church.

## District 4-B Meet At Flomot Last Week End

The District 4-B meet, held Friday, March 22, at Flomot attracted a large crowd and showed an awakening interest in interscholastic league work. The literary events were held in the morning with Supt. Lee Vardy of Turkey in charge. Volley ball was played by the senior girls in the gym in the afternoon. Estelline won the volley ball meet, with Flomot placing second, Silvertown third and Turkey fourth.

In senior boys track and field events, Flomot took the championship with 74 and a half points. Estelline was runner up with 41 and a half points. Other teams scoring were: Silvertown 24, Turkey 15 and Quitauque 4.

Flomot took 8 of fifteen first places. New district records were established in ten of the fifteen events.

Barnelle Washington of Flomot was high point man with 20 and a half points. He was closely seconded by M. C. Jones also of Flomot with 17 and a half points. Each of these boys took four first places and tied each other for the points is due to the method of fifth place but the difference in scoring points for the winners of the relay races. Wise of Estelline was third with 15 points.

In junior high school boys track Turkey was winner with 27 points. Flomot scored 21, Quitauque 18 and Estelline 1. Bill Dean Washington of Flomot was high point man with 13 points. He was closely seconded by Hanna and Guest of Turkey and Barbee of Quitauque. Barbee took first place in both the 50 and 100 yard dashes.

In grade school junior boys track Flomot was winner with 23 points, Estelline scored 17, Quitauque 14 and Turkey 11. In this event Quitauque had only a one-man team. Their entrant was R. W. Bull who took first place in both the 50 yard and 100 yard dashes, third place in the broad jump and third place in the high jump to score all of Quitauque's 14 points and become high point man in this division. Titus of Flomot was runner up with 12 and a half points to his credit.

Flomot is grateful to all who came and helped to make the meet a success. It is hoped that every school in the district will send a full representation next year and that this will become one of the best districts in the state.

## QUITAQUE TO HAVE BASEBALL CLUB THIS YEAR

Baseball players and fans of Quitauque had a meeting last Friday night and decided Quitauque would have a baseball club this year. Joe Bedwell was chosen as manager of the club and Maynard Wilson was elected captain. Practice will start as soon as the ball grounds can be gotten into shape and the club will be ready to function and take on some competition the latter part of April.

Citizens and business people of the town have contributed more than \$200 for playing equipment, the exact figure was not available, and other pledges are yet to be paid.

Those who will compose the playing team have not been chosen, but this will be done when the boys start working-out and trying-out.

This is baseball, and not softball. More information will be published as progress of organization is made.

## News Letter From Congressman Worley

A very constructive move was made last week by Secretary of War Patterson when he appointed a six-man board of former servicemen to study the much criticized "military caste system."

Heading the Board will be Lt. James H. Doolittle, of Tokio raid fame and subsequent distinguished service. On the Board will be ex-GIs and officers as well. Former Technical Sgt. Jake Lindsey of Mississippi, the one-hundredth infantryman to win the Congressional Medal of Honor, will serve, along with Troy H. Middleton, comptroller of Louisiana State University, who as a lieutenant general commanded the 45th Division in North Africa and Sicily. Other members include Robert Neville, New York newspaperman and former lieutenant colonel, Adna H. Underhill of Freeville, N. Y., who was a paratrooper captain and Anzio veteran, and Meryl H. Frost of Hanover, N. H. a former Air Force sergeant badly wounded in Italy.

Secretary Patterson said the Army investigation will look into the relations between officers and men both on and off duty, investigate provisions for their housing, clothing, and recreation facilities, living conditions and the promotion system. Enlisted men and officers in service at the present time will testify at the hearings which will start late this month. A large number of witnesses, including civilians who had close contact with service personnel, such as workers of the Red Cross, will be heard.

It is expected that the Navy will announce the appointment of a similar board soon. Vice Admiral Louis A. Denfeld, Chief of Naval Personnel, disclosed that the make-up of the Navy board has not yet been determined but stated that it would consist of reservists or former naval men.

Patterson, in appointing the Board, said that in planning for a peacetime Army any change in personnel policy should be made to achieve a citizen's Army of the best type possible. "In the last few years millions have served in the Army who would not have done so had it not been for the war—and while the experience of the war is still fresh in our minds, the time is right to take stock and determine what changes should be made in our practices."

Another announcement made by the War Department was that of 212 Brigadier Generals being reverted to the permanent status of Colonels, which serves to give some idea of how rapid has been our demobilization policy.

## BIG RODEO AT CHILDRESS SCHEDULED FOR APRIL 5-6-7

\$1,000 in prizes will be offered at the rodeo performances on April 5, 6 and 7, according to Ray Grimes, president of the Childress Rodeo Association. Four shows will be held, on Friday afternoon, Saturday afternoon and evening and Sunday afternoon.

Calf roping, ribbon roping, bronc riding, and steer riding will be featured events with a ladies stake race, musical chair and square dance on horseback as added features, Grimes said.

Four hundred dollars in cash prizes will be awarded at each show with a ladies wrist watch as the prize in each the stake race and musical chair race.

Cowboys are expected in Childress from a wide area for the show which will officially open with a cowboy parade at 1 p. m. Friday.

No show will be held on Friday evening, Grimes said, because of the annual Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development banquet.

First, I want to thank you for the many Posts I have received since I have been over here in the Pacific. I have really enjoyed reading the paper, it has kept me pretty well informed on the news in and around Quitaque. I'm sure all the other boys from home are equally grateful. I also want to tell you that you can quit sending the Post now! I'm not angry about anything. As a matter of fact I am pretty happy. You see I have points, and in the near future I hope to be a civilian again. Yeah! I guess Quitaque will have to put up with me again.

Here is hoping that Quitaque is having some swell spring weather. Here in Japan we have been having a long winter. It has been pretty cold for the past six months. And to my way of thinking, it is getting colder instead of warmer. I guess coming from a hot climate didn't help much either. I'll really be glad to get back to Texas where a guy can count on his four seasons each year, instead of all four in a single day, or only one each year.

I suppose you have heard rumors concerning the beauty of Japan. Well, here is a little straight dope. Japan is a beautiful place—that is, quite a lot of it. It must have been really beautiful before our bombers paid their tribute here. The people, well they proved their stupidity when they tried to win world conquest. They should have been content with what they already had.

Since landing here last August, I have been doing quite a lot of sight seeing. I have visited Mt. Fuji several times and almost every other place within 300 miles of here, that was worth seeing. Some of my friends here are crewmen of Navy PBV's and now and then I have been lucky enough to fly with them. Japan looks kinda torn up from the air.

They tell me there is some good hunting to be had farther north. I guess I won't be here to do any myself though. I like to hunt, but not well enough to turn down a trip to Texas. I did kill a couple of squirrels on one of the trips I made to Odwara. The Japs here in the Yokosuka area and every where else in Japan, I guess, are trying to improve their standards of living. There are quite a few American Japs living in this vicinity. Their influence with the other Japs is helping the occupation forces a great deal too.
