Quitaque Wins Again In Close Game Sunday

Quitaque copped a good ball game from Turkey Sunday afternoon 6 to 5 in a contest that furnished lots of entertainment and some tense moments for the large crowd of fans present.

The game was not matched in time to get any publicity for the affair in the papers, otherwise the attendance would have been even better. But fans who failed to see the game were the losers.

Turkey scored her first run in the second inning when Third Baseman Earl Buchanan singled, stole second and came home on a hit by Wayne Hunter. Starting each inning at bat Turkey scored again in the third when Peejinx Buchanan was issued a free pass to first.

Meyers, first up from Squaw Town in the third, singled, stole second and scored on a hit by Rusty Morrison. Score at end of third was 2-1 Turkey.

Turkey came back in the fourth and made two runs, when Earl Buchanan, with two men out, came up and drew a pass, Wayne Hunter singled, P. Buchanan singled and Stewart singled, E. Buchanan and Hunter crossing the plate. This made the count 4 to 1 in favor of Turkey, but Quitaque came back in her half to mark up three tallies, thus tying the score at 4 all in this fashion:

After two men were out, Morrison walked, Wilson singled, Bedwell was safe on an error by the third baseman, Van Meter poled out a two-bagger and three runs scampered across the plate to tie the count.

Turkey scored again in the seventh when Walker singled, stole second, advanced to third and scored on a hit by Doc Williams. Dock later was the victim of a double play when Farley hit to short, who stepped on second to retire the side since two men were already out, but the play for double at first was completed, making four outs for the inning which figures Farley at bat with no credit, no nothing. Score Turkey 5, Quitaque 4.

Quitaque picked up two more markers in the eighth when Rush, first man up, walked; P. John singled, Patrick singled, and Herrington drove in two runs with a long double, his only hit of the game.

Herrington was left stranded at second however, despite the fact that up to then no outs had been chalked up. Meyers, who followed Ross, fanned and E. Morrison grounded out pitcher to first base. Skipper then came up and flew out to centerfield to retire the side.

Walker had gotten around to third base in Turkey's half of the ninth, and Doc Williams was on first as the result of an act of charity, purposely granted, when the side was retired, ending the game. Score: Turkey 5, Quitaque 6.

Mrs. Wells, who was Miss Marian Atkins prior to her marriage, in 1927, was born in Amarillo April 3, 1909, and had lived in Wellington for 19 years. She was a member of the First Methodist church and had been active in girl scout work.

She was society editor and business manager of the Wellington Leader, published by her husband, a well-known figure in Texas newspaper circles. Wells is secretary of the Texas Press Association.

Survivors include her husband, one daughter Lucy Diane Wells, 14; her parents Mr. and Mrs. Temple Atkins, Shamrock; one brother Temple Atkins, Jr., Shamrock.

EVERYDAY RELIGION

WINDS OF THE SPIRIT

By E. B. Thompson

Dr. Leslie D. Weatherhead—the great pastor of City Temple in London—talks about reading the Bible with active imaginations—and goes on to illustrate his point as follows:

"I love the story of Nicodemus going to Jesus by night. Here is a chance for you to let your imagination paint a picture—the moonlight, the old man stumbling along. He does not think Jesus can tell him much, but if there is any more to learn, he is willing. A fine type of old religious leader. I can imagine those two sitting together in the upper room in the house where Jesus was staying in Jerusalem. I imagine an evening breeze rustling the vine leaves on the trellis that has been fixed up outside the house. I imagine Jesus telling Nicodemus that for all his learning, he has got to start all over again, like a little child, and begin at the beginning. Then I think as the evening breeze sweeps past the house, Jesus swings open the window as he says, 'The wind blows where it will, you can hear the sound of it, but you can not tell where it comes from nor where it goes—so is everyone that is born of the spirit.'"

"Why if you are reading imaginatively you will find yourself saying 'My word, I must open a few windows in my life. I find that just knowing the facts about religion has nothing to do with it. I have to experience the breath of the spirit in my heart!'"

"And so, as you read the story of Nicodemus, you find that he fades into the background, and you, in some imaginative upper room, are sitting there talking to Jesus yourself; and Jesus is looking at you with eyes full of love, and he is telling YOU that YOU must begin all over again. If you are a wise person, you will finish that period of reading on your knees, and you will be saying, 'O God, show me how to open all the windows of my being that thy faithful spirit of love may sweep into my stuffy heart.'"

With that, let us take reluctant leave of the sage from the foggy city across the Atlantic; but let us follow that lovely figure of the winds of the spirit to suggest two things. First, that there are things which we should ask the wind of the spirit to blow away—prejudice, hatreds, abnormal fear. And second, there are values latent in each of us upon which we should want the spirit to blow—dead love, lazy intellects, neglected consecration.

Let us fling open the windows of our souls, that the winds of the spirit may blow through us—and upon us.

News From The County Agent

SLEEPING SICKNESS IN HORSES

It is more important for horses to be immunized against "Sleeping Sickness" than it has been in the past several years. The late spring and early summer is the proper time to vaccinate, since the disease usually occurs during a period of hot dry weather. The first cases of "Sleeping Sickness" usually appear in July or August. This year the disease appeared much earlier than usual, which indicates that there will be numerous cases before the end of the summer unless the animals are immunized. The immunizing treatment consists of two vaccinations injected into the skin of the neck at seven to ten day intervals. This treatment will give immunity until cold weather prevents the spread of the disease by flies and mosquitoes.

WEED CONTROL CHEMICALS

The use of chemicals for weed control is rapidly becoming popular on farm land and lawns. The new chemical containing 2 4-D is now available in many business places. It will destroy practically all broad leafed plants and it is not harmful to people or livestock. It has very little effect upon grasses and it does not harm the soil.

2 4-D is a hormone which kills the plant by over stimulation. It comes in a powder or liquid form which will mix with water to make a spray material. The cost is \$7.00 to \$10.00 for enough material to kill an acre of such troublesome plants as ragweeds or bindweeds. One hundred fifty to three hundred gallons of spray is needed to cover an acre of solid weeds.

Most plants are killed with one application if all parts of the plant are well covered. Best results are obtained if the spray material is applied when the temperature is about 70 degrees. It has not been definitely determined if this new material will permanently kill blueweeds, but some recent experiments make it look promising for blueweed control.

Train Schedule Change

Schedule changes in passenger runs on the Burlington main lines affected schedules of local trains beginning Sunday, June 9. The east bound passenger train which formerly arrived at Quitaque at 11:48 a. m., is now due at 11:23 a. m. The west bound which formerly arrived at 9:19 p. m. is now due at 9:34 p. m. The train leaving Quitaque at 11:23 a. m. arrives at Childress at 12:55 p. m., and returning leaves Childress at 7:55 p. m. and arrives at Quitaque at 9:34 p. m.

A release for publication from the main line (which arrived too late for last week) stated that departure times of several trains were advanced in the speeding up of schedules, and travelers are cautioned to inquire about these changes to avoid missing a train.

The West Texas, which formerly made a morning trip from Dallas and Fort Worth to Wichita Falls, now leaves Dallas in the evening at 9:15 p. m. instead of 7:10 a. m. to provide a supporting service as far as Wichita Falls for the evening Gulf Coast Special from Dallas and Fort Worth to Colorado. Earlier arrivals will be made in Amarillo and Denver and at intermediate points.

The southward Gulf Coast Special will leave Denver at 7:00 p. m., the same as presently, but its arrival in Amarillo will be at 10:05 a. m. the following morning, Fort Worth at 7:50 p. m. and Dallas at 6:10 p. m., a full hour sooner than these cities now are reached.
