Quitague Won The Ball Game Sunday

Turkey and Quitague locked horns in a hotly contested baseball set-to Sunday afternoon in the Squatown arena, furnishing the big crowd of fans with plenty of entertainment—in fact the interest was so intense that it was carried into an after-show. This however was broken up without bloodshed.

Turkey, first at bat, led the way in the scoring until the fifth inning, having scored one run in the initial frame, eight in the 4th and one in the 5th for a total of 10.

Quitague, held scoreless until her division of the fourth, broke loose and paraded five runs across the plate then came back in the fifth to score seven more, and take the lead 12-10.

Going into the sixth frame Turkey scored two more runs to knot the count at 12-all which prevailed until the last half of the eighth when Joe Bedwell's boys jumped on Hanna with a vengeance to score three more on a double by Herrington, a double by Soup Wilson, a hit by Patrick and a safety at first for Skipper Wilson on an error.

Entering the ninth, after two men were down P-Jinks Buchanan singled, Farley reached first on an error, Thrasher was purposely walked, but the Gobbler City crew was unable to reach pay dirt.

There was lots of good fielding during the game as well as good hitting, some fast double plays being pulled by each side.

CHILDRESS VOTES BONDS FOR TEMPORARY WATER SUPPLY

In a telephone statement Wednesday night Paul Ord of Childress stated that the bond election in that city held Tuesday carried by a vote of 599 to 17.

These bonds were voted for the purpose of supplying a temporary water supply, laying the pipeline and paying an engineering firm to make a survey of the Quitague Creek dam project.

The new effort to supply Childress with at least a temporary supply of water calls for 15 new wells, Mr. Ord said, and the funds will be used to defray this expense, connect the wells and pipe the water into Childress.

Other than the engineering survey it had no bearing whatever on the Quitague Creek project.

The engineers are working on the mammoth project at Quitague Creek. This project will take from three to five years to complete and the government estimate of the permanent water supply runs to nearly six million gallons a day. The project will cost \$2,000,000.

"Childress is going to be one West Texas town that will never again run low on water," said Mayor H. C. Preslar.

Construction Started On Elevator At Quitague

Work started Saturday on an elevator at Quitague, located on the gin spur of the Ft. Worth and Denver railroad north of the Farmers Gin.

The elevator, of 500,000 pounds capacity or approximately 8,500 bushels, is being built by George A. Setliff who let the contract to F. S. Clements, Littlefield contractor.

All material for construction of the plant has been bought and is being hauled to Quitague as rapidly as possible and the machinery for the elevator has been bought and is storage at Lubbock ready for installation as soon as the building is completed.

Mr. Setliff said the new elevator will be ready for operation within six weeks from the date of construction started, which will be in ample time to handle this year's grain crop.

The new elevator will fill a long-felt need in Quitague community and will be a great convenience to farmers.

AN ABANDONED RIVER!

She was a cheerful young lady from Minnesota—visiting a college chum in West Texas. A group of youths were driving over our vast domain, and crossed Red River on a splendid concrete bridge. It was during a dry season, and Red River at that time and place was just a vast expanse of sand stretching east and west as far as the eye could see. It was so unlike her own State, where the rivers run constantly, that the lass from the "Land of a Thousand Lakes," suddenly exclaimed, "Tell me, why did they build this expensive bridge over an old abandoned river?"

Now I am sure that if our friend could have seen Red River at some other time she would have had ample answer as to the need of that bridge. But, I have been thinking about that statement of hers. "Expensive bridge—abandoned river." Could it be that our churches have done some of that sort of thing? Have we given attention to the building of expansive and expensive programs and plans, when perhaps the rivers of spiritual power that sustain and support our lives, have been somewhat neglected if not abandoned?

The Board of Supervisors approved conservation farm plans for J. W. Reid, Carl V. Wimberly, Joe O'Neal and Scott Smithee of the Crass conservation group. Farm plans were also approved for M. A. Graham, J. W. Monroe, Oliver Savage and J. H. Burson Land and Cattle Company Trust, at the last regular meeting in Silverton on August 9.

Application for soil conservation work was approved for Bud McMinp, Claude Allison D. R. Blackerby, Merle D. McMurtry and W. B. Hill.

Johnnie Burson, who operates the J. H. Burson Land and Cattle Company Trust ranch, increased the water shed drainage area of stock water tank from approximately 40 acres to 200 acres by constructing one and one-half miles of diversion terrace. The diversion terraces were designed by soil conservation service engineers assisting the board of supervisors of the Cap Rock soil conservation district. The construction was done by patrol type grader.

True Burson, a cooperator, established contour guide lines on approximately 500 acres of land on his farm last week. These contour guide lines will be used for tillage and seeding on the contour according to Mr. Burson.

J. W. Reid, a cooperator in the Crass conservation group, floated his wheat land on his farm last week with an all-steel land leveler.

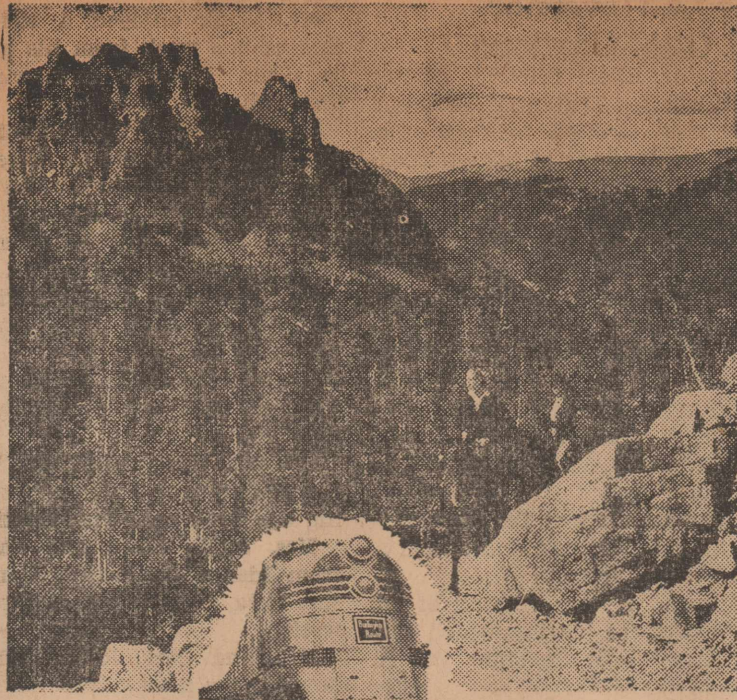
