Psalms 103-2 "Bless the Lord O my soul, and forget not all His benefits."

According to some readings, the original of that is "forget not to remember all His benefits." The word "memory" is an interesting word. It literally means, "to member again"—o live over and in a measure at least, re-experience. That is, in remembering, we use our imaginations to actually re-live our past blessings. Thus this singer of Divine Songs knew that if he could get his people to re-live their blessings, they would be thankful for them, but if they were too busy to do that, they would not be as grateful as they should be.

An old song we used to sing more than we do now was "Count your Blessings, name them one by one, and it will surprise you what the Lord has done." That takes an effort, it takes our attention. We cannot count our blessings if we take them for granted.

Then we can see from the end of the year that many experiences which were perhaps not counted as blessings as they happened to us, have turned out to be blessings after all. "God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform." Let us then grasp and hold all of life's experiences for whatever blessings they may hold for us.

Not only that, but the Christian can actually borrow happiness on a prospect, and be thankful for the blessings he can expect as he faces his unborn tomorrows. God is good, this we know because He has been good, and we face our future in the calm assurance that He will be good. "Bless the Lord O my soul—for all His benefits."

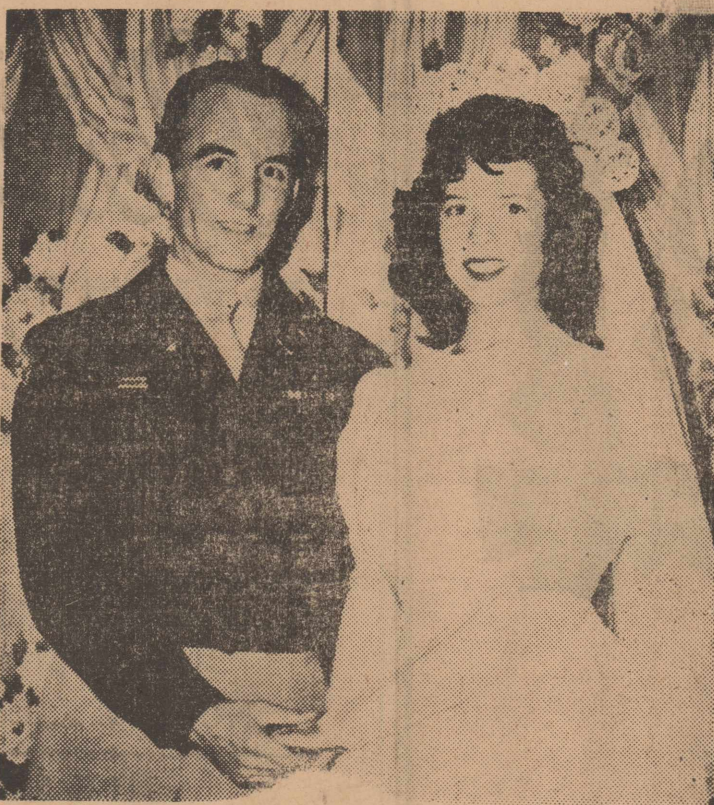
The lights will be turned on Saturday night, Dec. 14, to burn each night until after Christmas.

J. W. Busby, 84 years old, died at his home at Turkey at 12:10 o'clock Tuesday morning as the result of a stroke which he suffered at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon.

A short service was held in the home at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday with Rev. P. A. Powell, pastor of the First Baptist Church officiating, then the remains were taken to Silverton where funeral services were held at 3:30 p. m. in the First Baptist church with the pastor, Rev. G. A. Elrod officiating assisted by Rev. Powell. Interment was in Silverton cemetery.

Turkey friends acting as pallbearers were Jim Nat Hill, Will Guest and Charley Russell. The other three were from Silverton.

James William Busby was born August 27, 1862 at Henry, Tenn., and came to Texas at the age of 20, settling at Plano. In 1886 he was married to Miss Licenie Ingram of Plano. To this union eight children were born, three passing away in infancy.

The surviving children are R. H. Busby of Megargel, Jim Busby of Amarillo, Floyd Busby of Iowa Park, Mrs. Florence Graham of Graham and Mrs. I. W. Fulgham of Martindale. A number of grandchildren also survive.

Mrs. Busby passed away in August, 1931 and in October, 1941 he was married to Mrs. Georgia Lyles of Turkey, who also survives.

After leaving Plano the Busby family moved to Seymour, later to Silverton where they lived eight years, and moved to Turkey community in 1929, where he had continued to make his home since.

Mr. Busby was converted early in life and united with the Presbyterian church. At the time of his death he was 84 years, 3 months and 6 days of age.

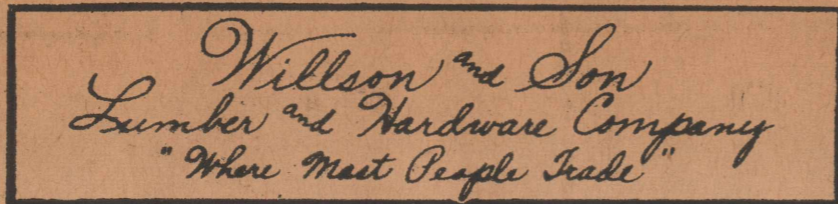

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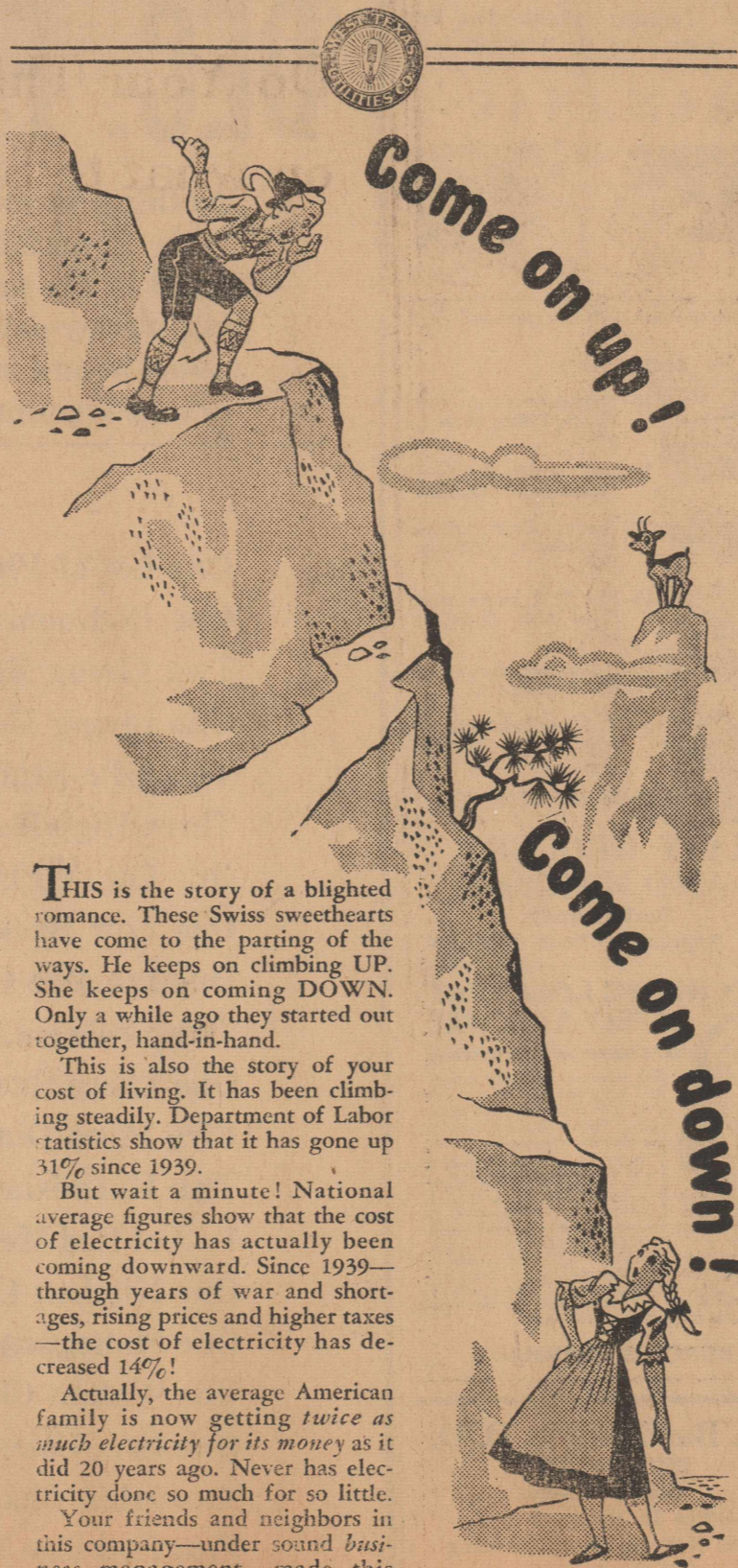
