Former Quitaque Man Makes A Good Mayor

J. G. Gowin, formerly of Quitaque is receiving some well earned recognition and highly deserved praise for his achievements in the office of mayor at his new home, Wynona, Okla. An item in an issue of the Wynona newspaper published early in this year says:

"As a New Year's greeting, we wish to tip our hat to Mayor J. G. Gowin and each member of the council, the city clerk, treasurer, marshal and manager of the municipal waterworks for the excellent job they have done during 1947.

"At the municipal election last April many citizens were surprised when they found that Gowin (an old time Baptist preacher) and his Independent Citizens ticket was swept into office. Only two of the incumbents were re-elected.

It was with some misgivings that the new administration took over. There was \$60,000 due on the old \$500,000 waterworks and sewage bonds and city finances were low.

Since the administration took office, more than \$4,000 has been paid on the old bonds. Improvements have been made to the waterworks plant and new equipment has been installed. Much credit for the financing of the old bonds is due to Ex-Mayor James Howell, who was not defeated but moved away from Wynona, and City Attorney Leander Hall of Hominy.

About 10 blocks of our main streets have been graded and gravelled or surfaced with crushed rock. Street improvement work is still going on and funds for this work are now being released from priorities.

Last fall Mayor Gowin inaugurated a "clean-up" campaign and worked with his own hands in removing debris from alleys and streets. He poured concrete and erected immovable barriers in the shape of barrels bearing "Keep to the Right" signs in the center of the intersections at Main and Osage and Highland and Osage streets.

The merchants and business men of Wynona caught the spirit of the campaign and many of the stores and business houses have been remodeled and repainted and show more care and neatness in the arrangements of stocks.

Another thing of which we are proud is the fact that there is less lawlessness, drunkenness "hoodlumism" and disrespect for the things that are sacred in Wynona than ever before. Hats off to our preacher-mayor.

Jury Disqualified

PCA Members Attend Meeting At Memphis

Three hundred fifty-eight stockholders and guests of the Memphis Production Credit Association gathered in the Memphis High School auditorium Monday for an association's 14th annual Stockholders' Meeting. The group represented farmers, ranchers and their wives from the 9 counties served by the association.

Theme of the meeting was in celebration of the retirement of \$125,000 in government capital. It was pointed out that a token government investment of only \$5,000 remains of the original \$250,000 invested by the Production Credit Corporation of Houston in the local organization. Retirement of the government capital was made possible by the growth of the member-owned capital to \$250,150 at the end of 1947.

Plans were made to retire the remaining \$5,000 in the near future, leaving the association completely owned by its members.

R. B. McMurry of Memphis and Otis Wilson of Quitaque were returned to the board of directors by a vote of the stockholders. Other business included a report from the board by President Wilson and the secretary-treasurer's report by Don Wright. Principle speaker was L. Roy Prescott, treasurer of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston. The 1947 nominating committee, of which R. H. Tanner of Flomot was chairman, was re-elected to serve during 1948.

Following the meeting, lunch was served in the high school gymnasium.

Attendance figures showed 137 Class "B" stockholders from Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley, Foard, Hall Hardeman and Motley Counties; six Class "A" stockholders and 215 guests.

At the board's reorganization meeting Monday afternoon, Mr. McMurray was returned to the presidency; Mr. Wilson was re-elected vice-president, and S. M. Jolly, Paducah, and Mr. Wilson were returned to the executive committee. Other directors are Tom B. Berry, Wellington, and J. C. Franks, Flomot.

Other officers re-elected for another year were Don Wright, secretary-treasurer, Adrian Odum and Mrs. Willie Isham, assistant secretary-treasurer.

WAYLAND VISITORS ARE DINNER HONOR GUESTS

The group of young people who were here Sunday from Wayland college to conduct services at the Baptist church were entertained at mealtime by the young peoples department of the church. A dinner of meat balls with vegetables, green beans and potatoes, congealed salad, hot rolls and chocolate pie was served at the pastors home.

Thirteen young people were present for the noon meal, and nine were back for the supper of leftovers. Mrs. Roy Burgess directed and helped with the preparation of the meals. Guests from Wayland were Sam Choy and Edward Arakawa, both of Hawaii, Billie Nunley of Lubbock and Audrey Barron of Lamesa.

Three Hurt Thursday In Crash On Highway

Two girls and a man from Quitaque were injured in a car mishap about 3:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon on the highway a mile west of Silvertown. The car turned over and was badly wrecked, it was reported. The victims were taken by Stewart ambulance to a Tulsa hospital.

Betty Pointer, 16 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmo Pointer, was the more seriously injured, her condition being reported as critical.

Shirley Foster, 14 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harve Foster, received a broken collar bone and other injuries, the report stated.

Dilly Pierce, owner of the car, was hurt but the extent of his injuries had not been determined when a telephone conversation was had with George Stewart at the hospital a couple of hours after the accident. X-ray pictures were being made of Pierce at that time.

No particulars of the crash nor how serious the injuries were obtainable in time for publication, however it was stated by witnesses that the car seemed to have gone out of control.

The Right Hand Signal May Save A Life

A call to arms was issued today by W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol.

The arms referred to are the kind you stick through car windows to signal your intentions to other drivers.

"Hand signals are a means of self-preservation when you are driving an automobile, as well as a courtesy to the other fellow," Chief Elliott said.

He emphasized hand signals as one of the important laws designed to make motoring safer, and appealed for better voluntary observance to the regulation in cooperation with a nationwide "Learn and Obey Traffic Laws" program during February.

Captain Polk Ivy of the Amarillo District offered these hand signalling tips:

1. Give signals far enough in advance to allow the other driver to adjust himself—at least 100 feet.
2. Hand signals do not justify you in making unexpected or illegal maneuver. For example, to make a left turn, be in the left lane before you reach the corner.
3. Get both hands back on the wheel before starting to turn.
4. Hand signals are not uniform throughout the country. A safe rule is to be prepared for anything when another driver holds out his hand.

Red Cross Opens Drive For Funds March 1

According to Leo White, Fund Campaign Chairman for the Briscoe County Chapter of the American Red Cross, the annual membership drive will open in Briscoe County as well as over the entire Nation, on March 1st.

The quota for Briscoe County for this year has been set by the National Chapter at \$1000.00. This amount is a slight increase over the quota for last year, but is far below the amount required of us during the war years.

According to Mrs. Waunita Hutcheson, Red Cross Field Representative who visited in Silvertown last week, the increase in quota over last year is due to the following needs, both Nationally and Locally.

1. The ending of the fiscal year has been changed by the National Chapter from March 31st to June 30, therefore all the money collected at this time will have to last sixteen months, or until June 30, 1949.

2. The Army and Navy Hospitals all over the Nation have requested the return of Red Cross Services, this will call for increased expenses by the Red Cross.

3. Last year was a very heavy disaster year all over the Nation and more than eleven Million dollars was spent by the National Red Cross in areas stricken by storms, floods, fires, etc.

4. The Red Cross has been asked by the Army and Navy to set up a National Blood Donor Program. This program has been approved by the American Medical Association and the Red Cross Board of Governors, and will be a heavy financial drain on the Red Cross.

As in the past years, Community Solicitors are being appointed to call on you for your contributions. These people give willingly of their time and efforts in this worthwhile campaign, and your co-operation in helping in every possible way will be appreciated.

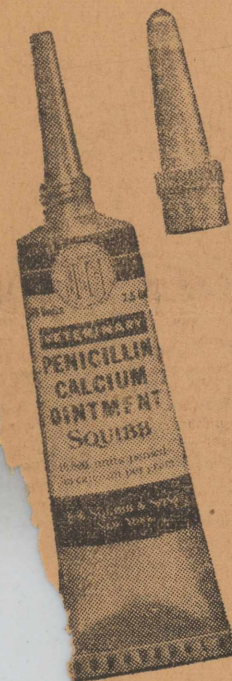

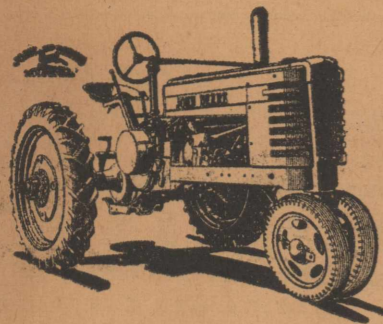

This And That About One Thing and Another

The most noticeable building note this week is the new fence under construction at the Higginbotham-Bartlett company. The old high board fence has been taken down and a new low picket fence

is being built.

Our recipes are coming in slowly but surely. We have a few more, and each week we get a different vinegar pie recipe. It seems there are three ways to make them, cooked custard, baked custard and

cobbler. We'll get some of these in soon. Here is an unusual cake recipe which certainly looks interesting. It is from Mrs. Seburn Neatherlin, and she includes several icing recipes also:

Whipped Cream Cake, (or better named 5 Minute Cake.)

Whip 1 cup cream, (sweet) until foamy but not stiff. Fold in 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs beaten to a froth and 1 teaspoon desired flavoring. Sift 1½ cup flour, minus 2 teaspoons, substituting 2 teaspoons cornstarch for flour removed, 2 teaspoon baking powder and ¼ teaspoon salt. Fold into egg mixture. (Do not beat.) Bake in two eight inch layer pans for 20 minutes at 375 degrees.

I often bake this in an oblong pan 8x12 inches and 2 inches deep and ice with our favorite quick icing while the cake is warm, cutting in squares for serving. Never remove cake from baking pan until serving time.

Quick Icings

Minute Fudge Icing

¼ cup butter ¼ cup milk
½ cup cocoa 1 cup sugar
Melt butter, add other ingredients Boil 1 minute. Beat until smooth and spread quickly.

Cream Icing

1½ cup sugar 2 T butter
1 heaping t flour ½ cup cream
or milk

vanilla

Mix together and cook to soft ball tested in cup of water. Beat until smooth and spread.

Apple Icing

3 tart apples (grated) Rind of oranges (can be omitted)
Rind of 1 lemon 1½ cup sugar
1 beaten egg

Mix in order given and cook in double boiler until thick. Spread on cake.

Jiffy Icing

Mix together 3 tablespoon melted butter, 5 tablespoon brown sugar, 2 tablespoon cream or top milk, and ½ cup shredded coconut or chopped nuts. Spread on warm cake (in pan).

Place under broiler with heat turned low. Broil until bubbles are over all the surface and is brown.

When I haven't brown sugar I use 2 tablespoon white sugar, adding a few drops maple flavoring. I get good results.

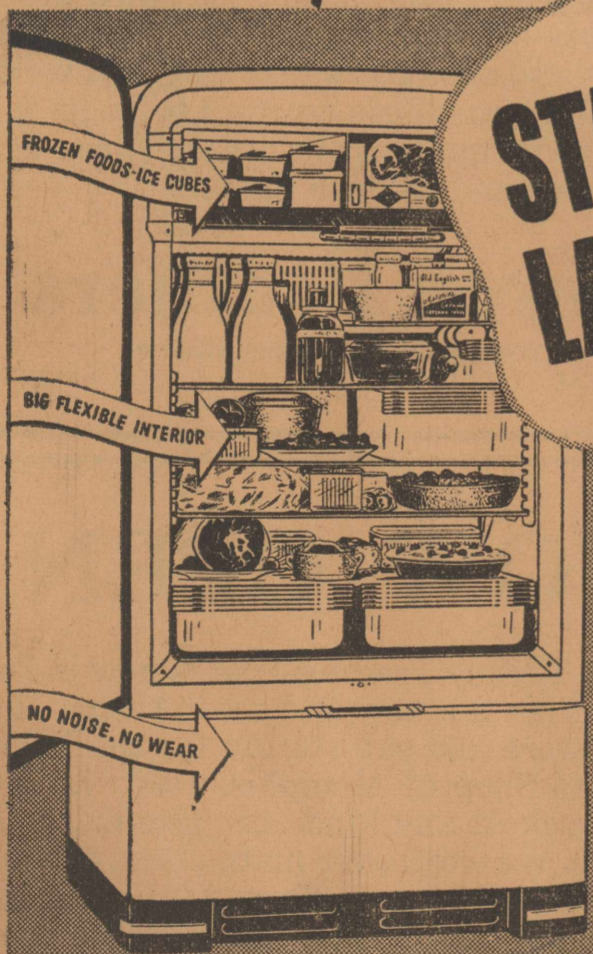

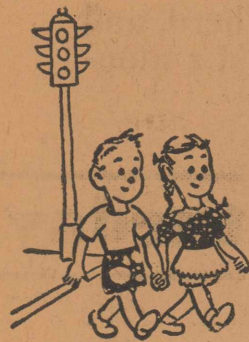

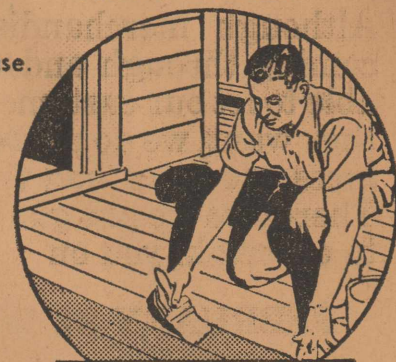
