-Mary Elizabeth Trostle ½ cup shortening (butter is best) ½ tsp soda ½ tsp grated lemon rind 1 tsp nutmeg 1 cup sugar

2 eggs, beaten 2 tbsp milk 2 cups sifted flour 1/2 tsp baking powder

Blend butter, salt, lemon rind & nutmeg; add sugar gradually, cream well; add eggs and milk and mix well. Sift flour with baking pwd. and soda. Drop from teaspoon on baking sheets. Let stand a few minutes, then flatten, stamping with a glass covered with damp cloth. Sprinkle some cookies with sugar, others chopped coconut or nuts, some with maraschino cherries. 
