Items of Interest From the SCS Office

The Supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District met Wednesday, April 14, at 10:30 a. m. with members Bray Cook, Bill Helms and L. A. McJimsey present. Mr. W. Scott Amend, District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service from Plainview and Leo White County Agent, were visitors at this meeting.

The following applications for assistance were approved: E. Posey, J. R. Scott, Jr., J. W. Dillard, Mrs. R. E. Bell, J. P. Hollingsworth, Eual C. Newman and Frank Mays.

Farmer - District agreements were signed for Mrs. W. W. Reid, C. E. Bedwell, O. C. Crabtree and Grady Tyler.

Irrigation ditch lines were run this week by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service and Edd Thomas who lives nine miles southwest of Silvertown. Lines were also run for Luther McJimsey who lives four miles east and Johnnie Quillion who operates a farm seven miles southwest of Silvertown.

Orlin Stark had district technicians lay out terrace lines on his farm one mile east of Quitaque last week. Terraces will be constructed in the near future.

Ditch lines for irrigation of wheat were run for Eural Vaughn, W. C. Strickland, Elmer May and Allen Kellum recently.

Alvin Redin, who operates a farm four miles south of the Rock Creek Station, applied nitrogen fertilizer to a part of his improved pasture this past spring. Results are beginning to show that the fertilized areas have better growth than adjoining unfertilized areas. Mr. Redin applied approximately one hundred pounds of Ammonium Nitrate per acre.

Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service laid off ditch lines recently for irrigation of wheat for Edwin Crass who farms in the Crass Conservation Group, Roy Tisdale in the McPherson Conservation Group, Spencer Long and Clyde Lightsey who farms in the West Silvertown Conservation Group.

Elmer Vaughn, who farms near Hay Lake, 8 miles southeast of Silvertown, had terrace lines run on his farm last week. Soil Conservation Service technicians helped Mr. Vaughn run the lines.

Irrigation ditch lines were run for the watering of alfalfa on Mr. H. C. Farmer's place fourteen miles southwest of Silvertown. Mr. Farmer is a cooper with the local Cap Rock Soil Conservation District.

J. L. West who farms two miles southwest of the Rock Creek Station made an experimental planting of Orchard grass and Meadow fescue grass this past week. These grasses were planted in separate plots so that seed harvest can be made if they proved desirable. Mr. West will irrigate these plots to insure the best possible growth.

TO WHEAT GRADING SCHOOL

Odel Setliff spent the week end in Amarillo where he attended a wheat grading school. Odel states that the information he received and skill developed in grading wheat at the school will be of great value to him and his customers in operation of the Quitaque elevator.

Odel states that heretofore growers of high qualified wheat had been penalized because of the mixture with other grades which were not acceptable at the mills. Now he is qualified to grade and group wheat as it is brought to the elevator which is the first step on the Oklahoma-Texas wheat improvement program with the ultimate goal of regaining markets now lost to other states and assuring farmers who raise good wheat top market prices.

Local Students Place High At District Meet

Regional interscholastic meet for classes AA, A and B schools, held at Lubbock Saturday, April 24, was attended by more than 150 schools from the Oklahoma and New Mexico borders and the north and west to towns as far east as Wichita Falls and south through Monahans and Pecos.

Quitaque contestants who had won in the various contests at district meet held two weeks previously at Estelline were eligible to compete at regional meet.

The contests in which Quitaque contestants placed at district meet were:

Typing, first place, Paulita McCracken; 3rd place Patsy Stark.

Tennis, girls singles, Patsy Stark 2nd place: boys singles, Bobby Jack Ham, 2nd place: boys doubles, Earnest Barbee and Tad Persons, 2nd place: jr. boys doubles, Buddy Holcomb and Don Lewis, 2nd.: girls doubles, Jareen Holcomb and Jo Dean Bedwell, 2nd.

The eighth grade girls volley ball team placed 2nd.

In track and field at district, Earnest Barbee placed in 100 yard dash and 220 low hurdles; Kenneth Hamilton placed in shot put; R. W. Bull placed in 880 yard dash; Curtis Monk also placed in low hurdles, making all these boys eligible for regional meet this last Saturday.

In the typing Class B schools there were 35 entries from the various districts. Panhandle won first, Nazareth second, Paulita McCracken placed 6th and Patsy Stark 7th.

There were only 8 points difference in the first seven contestants in this typing contest, so the Quitaque entrants rated very high and we are proud of them, even though they did not qualify for state meet. Many of the entrance papers were discarded by the graders because the contestants made entirely too many errors. Our girls said many of their errors were made because with so many typewriters operating they were unable to hear the bells on their machines signifying a new line, and thus wrote into the margin which is counted an error just as much as an error in a word.

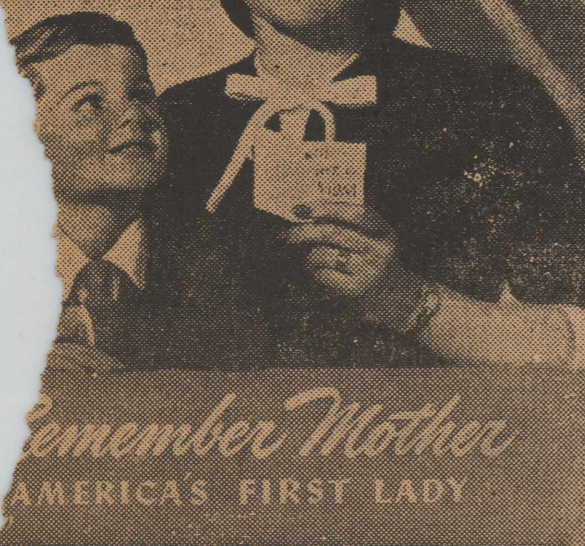

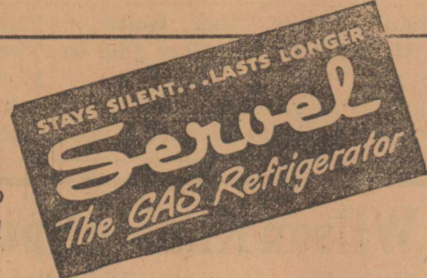
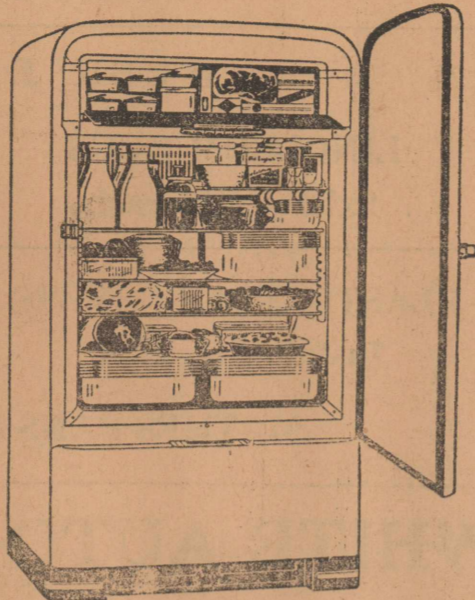

DON'T TAKE MEDICINE FROM 6 BOTTLES WITHOUT LABELS

"Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the need for reading labels on drugs and medicines before taking them," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "Frequent reports are received of accidents, some of them fatal, affecting people who have formed the hazardous habit of taking medicines without carefully reading the labels."

Equally dangerous is the habit of taking medicine after the directions on the label have become obliterated, which many people do, thinking that they can remember what the bottle contained. Reach-

ing for a bottle and taking medicine in the dark is another dangerous practice. It is important to remember that the law requires labels to be attached to drugs and medicines in order to protect the public.

Dr. Cox urges people to follow the simple rule of reading the label before using anything from a carton or bottle, either as food or as medicine. In grief, his advice to the public is: "Be sure you know what you are taking, and when in doubt-DON'T TAKE IT."
