This And That About One Thing and Another

A crew of men has been quartered in Quitaque the past several weeks, working over the tunnel on the Fort Worth & Denver, south of here. The work includes refacing tunnel No. 2, dropping the top back for a longer slope, to insure safety and eliminate the wash of rocks, etc.

Wellman A. Barch of Dallas is supervising the work, and foreman of the 12-man crew, who are with Allhands & Briley Co., railroad contractors of Dallas. Equipment on the job includes a power shovel, 3 bulldozers, drag line and jack hammer crew. Some dynamiting is being done, so if you hear a boom or feel a jolt, don't fear an earthquake, tho they did have one recently at Memphis.

Dr. C. E. Donnell of Plainview was in Quitaque last week, contacting oldtimers gathering material for a history of Briscoe county which he is writing. Dr. Donnell is a real old-timer, coming to Briscoe county with his father in 1891. He practiced medicine at Silverton from 1917 to 1921, and also for several years in other Plains city including Canyon, and says he "knows more people than anybody."

The Quitaque Elevator is preparing for a good season, states manager—and owner, Odell Setliff. Odell states that estimates are about one-third above average yield for the season, and though not anywhere resembling last year's bumper crop, the yield promises to be a big one and the price is good. The machinery at the elevator has been speeded up for faster service to enable the elevator to handle more wheat. Also a balance indicator has been installed on the scales so that truckers can check on their weights, and a set of new dump scales installed in top of the elevator so that wheat may be weighed as it is loaded out.

A new recipe that is tried and true is always good news to a cook. Mrs. Kelly Tipps, visiting here from Laredo, (with her son George and daughter Margaret) (and Kelly) says she tried the lemon snowballs and thought they were fine. This recipe came from Cleota Burns, in California.

We mentioned the Tipps family individually because last week we said the Tipps and their 'sons' were visiting and little Margaret is a very charming, if quite serious, young lady, who joined the family just five months ago and we needed to straighten out that mistake.

Items of Interest From the SCS Office

Tom Barbee who has a farm four miles northeast of Quitaque in the Hamilton Conservation group completed building approximately five miles of terraces with a disc-type terracer this week. The lines for these terraces were run by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service.

O. C. Crabtree and H. A. Boggs, cooperators of the local Cap Rock Soil Conservation District, who operate farms in the Gasoline Conservation Group four miles northeast of Gasoline planted some Weeping love grass seed this past week. Mr. Crabtree owed five acres and Mr. Boggs three acres. This planting will be used for both grazing and wind erosion control.

Ditch lines for irrigation were run by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service for Bill Hardin whose place joins the town section on the southwest corner.

J. L. Webb, who operates the Schott ranch below the cap, has a planting of Canada Wild Rye that looks promising. Glen M. Jamison, local Work Unit Conservationist who made the above observation, states that a reasonably good stand was obtained and the recent rainfall will speed up the growth.

Canada Wild Rye is an excellent grass for fall, winter and spring grazing and at one time was very plentiful in the roughs and sandy land below and adjoining the cap. Due to its high grazing value it was practically killed out by heavy stock use some years ago. It is probably that only inaccessible areas around the cap saved it from being completely killed out.

This seeding was made last fall under very unfavorable soil moisture conditions, yet a good stand was obtained. The winter months were equally unfavorable as far as moisture and extremely cold weather were concerned so it appears that with only average moisture conditions we should have no trouble in obtaining satisfactory stands. The seed was sown with the use of an ordinary grain drill so the planting procedure should not keep anyone who wishes to establish a patch for seed production purposes from trying it.

Bill Helms who is one of the supervisors of the local Cap Rock Soil Conservation District has a small patch of Abruzzi rye that looks good. In spite of being planted late, January 15, it is better than half knee high now with quite a number of heads showing. Wheat sowed along beside and head of the rye shows very little promise with approximately one fourth the amount of foliage present that is found on the Abruzzi rye.

Abruzzi rye is a crop that will grow well on the sandy soils near Quitaque and Gasoline. Planted in the fall it will furnish excellent grazing both as to quality and amount and as a winter cover crop to reduce wind erosion.

Mr. C. T. Rucker who owns and operates a farm two miles southeast of Quitaque looked over Mr. Helms' small trial patch of this (Continued on Back Page)
