Mexican Man Drowns In Tank At Flomot

A Mexican man, about 23 years old, was drowned Wednesday evening in the pool, east of Flomot on the Wade Martin place. The man, Enece Vapapa Garcia, had come in that morning, planning to pull bolls in the vicinity, and with a group of friends went swimming in the tank, which is a dammed up canyon, and very deep in places.

The men entered the pool about 6 p.m., and Garcia drowned shortly after. No details of the accident were learned, but he presumably was stricken with cramps or became exhausted while in deep water.

Neighboring communities were called in to help locate the body and remove it from the pool, and intensive search was made where the drowning man disappeared. It was about nine o'clock, three hours after the accident, before the body was found with hooks on trot line, and it was about 20 feet from where it disappeared, in shallow water just a few feet from the bank.

Ambulance from the Stewart Funeral Home took the body to Turkey and it was shipped this morning (Thursday) by rail to the man's home at Falfurias, Texas.

BUILDING SPURT

There's a building spurt on—some of it just prospective—but quite a bit now in progress.

GINNING REPORT

The two Quitaque gins reported up to Thursday morning, 181 bales ginned of this season's crop. This is behind last year's report which gave 290 bales for the two gins on Sept. 24.

Cotton is beginning to come in steady now, and the pleasant hum of the gins is sounding up into the night hours. Final report for last year showed around 5200 bales for the two Quitaque gins, and estimates are about the same for this year. The cotton south of town and in Gasoline area is good, but over the area in general is not as promising as last year. However with the increased acreage, ginners are predicting the yield to be about the same as last year.

Switching several players to run in a substitute for Lewis, was confusing to the inexperienced Panthers and weakened the back field which was not up to par.

Farm-Market Road Plans Are Resumed

S. C. McCarty, district highway engineer, met with the commissioners court at Silverton Monday morning and suggested a plan for paved farm-market roads in Briscoe county.

The district engineer stated that he would recommend that the state build the road south from Quitaque to the Floyd county line, provided the precinct would vote bonds to complete the paving at Gasoline to the Motley county line.

The south road to Floyd county would connect with paving in that county, which would include two bridges. At a meeting held the week previous, as reported in the Floydada Hesperian, the Floyd county paving would be "two and 7-10 miles from a point north of Fairmont to the Briscoe county line, where it would join with a similar program in Briscoe county, leading to Quitaque. This would give the northeast corner of Floyd county its first paving and first all-weather road to market".

The proposed bond issue for completion of the Gasoline road to Motley county, would be about \$22,000, and a petition calling for an election to decide this issue, has already started circulating and carries a large number of signatures.

Motley county is making an effort to connect with this paving, if the issue carries.

This proposition has every advantage over a previous one which met with approval early in the year. The Gasoline proposition is to build the road on the 25-75 set-up, in which the state furnishes 25 per cent of the cost, and the engineering expense, and maintenance, the road district furnishing 75 percent of the expense of construction.

Mr. McCarty estimated that \$22,000 would take care of the road district's share and he advised immediate action, stating that it should be on record in time for state action by January 1.

From the SCS Office

Four acres of yellow blue stem grass seed was planted on Oscar Weeks place located in the Rock Creek Conservation Group, Friday. The seed was furnished by the district for trial planting.

A high point was located this week on Mrs. Mattie E. Taylor's farm located six and one-half miles southeast of Silverton in the Haylake Conservation Group. The farm is operated by Mr. W. E. Austry.

Sweet clovers are key plants in conservation cropping systems followed throughout this area. They can reach deep into the subsoil and bring up the minerals which have become exhausted on the surface. No other legume so well penetrates the plow sole and subsoil and opens the soil for aeration and moisture penetration. Sweet clovers resists cold and can be planted either in fall or spring.

SEEDING WINTER LEGUMES

More and more farmers in Briscoe County are beginning to see the need for conservation and protection of their soil by seeding Austrian winter peas, dixie wonder peas, and hairy vetch.

This practice has been approved for the 1949 program. The Government payment for seeding winter peas and dixie wonder peas is \$5.50 per hundred pounds. The payment for seeding hairy vetch is \$13.83 per hundred. A purchase order for \$5.50 per hundred pounds may be issued to the seed dealer at the time the peas are purchased, thus leaving a balance of only \$4.25 per hundred to be paid by the producer. The purchase order is also applicable to hairy vetch.

This week we have issued approvals for the winter legume practice to C. T. Rucker, Johnnie B. Whiteley, and Gerald Smith all of Quitaque Community. Johnnie B. Whiteley plans to seed 300 pounds of Austrian winter peas this year.

Now is the time to start this practice. Information regarding winter legumes is available at the AAA Office. Prior approval must be issued by the county committee before seeding. A purchase order must be issued before purchasing the seed.

Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Lewis took their son Don to Matador Tuesday where xrays were made to determine the extent of injuries which Don received in football practice here last week. His collar bone was cracked, the pictures showed, and that means that the Panthers must get along without a star player for the next six weeks.

if no complications set in.

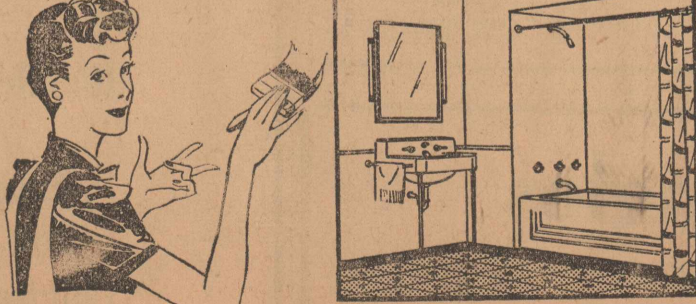
