Verdict Favors Hill Hall County Libel Suit Memphis—A Hall County jury

\$1000 verdict against Raymond election campaign.

The verdict returned in Judge Gribble's 100th District Court clos-For her wedding the bride chose ed two days of testimony by the verdict which favored Hill.

Marvin Simpson, Fort Worth attorney who represented Ballew, Mr. Boling was reared in Roaring immediately indicated he will appeal the verdict if motion for new trial is denied. Such an appeal would be filed in Seventh Court of Civil Appeals, sitting in Amarillo.

Hill had asked \$40,000 in damages from Ballew, claiming the man opposed him in the sheriff's race injured his (Hill's) reputation by statements made in campaign speeches.

The jury findings gave Sheriff Hill \$500 actual damage and \$500 exemplary damage. Only 14 witnesses appeared during trial of the case, which attracted a capacity crowd throughout the proceedings.

Selection of the jury began at 10 a.m. Tuesday and the panel was completed in less than an hour. Only two prospective jurors were disqualified by Defense Counsel, Simpson and Otho Fitzjarrald of Memphis, attorney for the plain-

The jury retired with the case Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning returned the verdict for Hill.



Items of Interest From the SCS Office

One of the most important obectives in the sound management of range lands is to bring about improvement in the native vegetation so that this protective cover will properly sustain the livestock industry by furnishing the water sheds. A soil, to be fertile and contain the essential plant elements and an abundance of microscopic life that has the power of converting minerals and nitrogen into forms available for plant consumption. The microscopic life thrives in decaying organic refuse from plants, whch in turn benefit from the plant food thus made available.

The roots of most desirable pasture grasses are found in greatest abundance in the first 15 inches of the soil, and when abundant and vigorous under good management, they offer a binding understructure resistant to the eroding forces of wind and water. This lay-



When too intense grazing is introduced into the semi-arid range country, the normal trend in plant succession is reversed and there appears a type of vegetation less able to protect the soil or provide adequate forage for livestock. The most palatable forage species are the first to be thinned out by hungry stock, and in the absence of competition by the most desirable plants, less palatable species become more abundant, and the range deteriorates. Many of these less palatable species, such as thistles, pigweeds, sunflowers, and certain perennial shrubs are less desirable also from other standpoints. Most of them have single toproots incapable of binding the soil into durable sod. Consequently the less protected top layer of fertile soil is subjected to serious erosion and may be transported for many miles by wind or terrental rains that wreck havoc in heavy floods. Adequate protection to such soils is possible only with increased vegetation, and this, in turn, is often practicable only by making greater moisture supplies available to the plants.




