Also hail was reported in some sections. The gauge at Quitaque measured .35 of an inch after the weather cleared.

Election Here Is About As Usual

Although talk was big about the election this year, less actual interest was evidenced in the voting than was shown in the general election four years ago. In 1944, 264 votes were cast in the Quitaque box. This year 220 were counted.

The Democratic presidential candidate polled 181 votes, the Republican candidate 10 votes and the States Rights Party 6 votes. The Prohibition candidate polled 3 votes and Henry Wallace, not one, in the Quitaque box.

In the U. S. Senate race, Jack Porter, Republican candidate received 26 votes, to Lyndon Johnson's 155.

The ballot was overwhelmingly Democratic in this box.

Voting on the eight constitutional amendments showed about the same percentage in their favor except for the last one, No. 8 on the ballot, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners, etc. This amendment was not favored locally and the report shows 39 for to 52 against the amendment. However, unofficial reports in the daily papers show that all eight of the amendments carried.

SETLIFF ELEVATOR APPROVED FOR GOVERNMENT STORAGE

Setliff Elevator at Turkey has been approved by Commodity Credit Corporation for warehouse storage of grain under the government loan program. This is the only elevator in this area which has received such approval.

Mr. Setliff, with a crew of workmen, has been busy for several weeks preparing another building for additional storage facilities. He has put a concrete floor, in pit form, in his large warehouse and has added loading equipment to the warehouse to move grain into the elevator when desired. He believes that he now has adequate storage facilities.

Though most grain sorghums are still a little too green to handle, Mr. Setliff stated that they already had shipped one car.

Still talking in the grain line, Mr. Setliff stated that he had sold 5000 bushels of seed wheat to farmers in this immediate area and that there are a few more who have spoken for seed wheat and are waiting for moisture before planting. All are seeding the better type, or approved, wheat, he said. This is in addition to the many who kept their own seed for planting.

With favorable yield per acre there could be a large wheat crop next summer, Mr. Setliff stated.

Colored People Injured In Highway Crash

A serious accident occurred last Saturday at noon on the highway intersection on top of the hill in East Turkey when a truck loaded with negroes turned upside down.

There were 21 negroes in the truck, which also contained bedding, etc. and 16 of them were injured, three more seriously than the rest. All were taken to Dr. Acror's clinic for treatment, and were released during the afternoon except three, a negro man and two negro women.

The man had an arm fractured in two places, in the elbow and about midway between the elbow and hand. One of the women had practically all of her ribs broken, some of them twice, and her grown daughter suffered a fractured skull.

The man was released from the clinic Tuesday and the two women are expected to be released Saturday however they will be required to stay in bed for some time.

According to report the darkies had been pulling cotton around Plaska and were headed for Lubbock in a truck owned and operated by Albert Punch, a negro of Memphis, Texas. The other occupants were all from east Texas near Jacksonville.

At the highway intersection, it was reported, Joe Richardson who also was driving a truck pulled into the path of the one driven by Punch and the latter cut behind Richardson's truck, leaving the highway, in order to avoid collision only to have his path blocked by another vehicle.

The darky said he had his truck in low gear by that time and "gave it the gas" to miss the other truck, but when he cut his wheels to get back on the highway that his machine turned upside down.

Several cars and trucks were parked in the vicinity of the accident, one truck being parked beside the highway east of the intersection which probably obscured Richardson's vision. He and 14 truck were unscathed.

Punch's truck was pretty badly damaged but was able to operate under its own power after being righted and placed on its wheels.

Highway Patrolman Noel C. investigated the accident and cordoned the drivers of both vehicles to report.

PLANE CRASH NEAR MATADOR
Matador—The wreckage of a plane missing since last Thursday has been found near Roaring Springs. All of the craft's four occupants were killed in the crash. The plane, which met with the tragic crash on a flight from Oklahoma City to Denver City, Texas, was occupied by R. G. Rapp, millionaire president of Denver Producing and Refining Company, Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Tanks and pilot B. B. Parr, all of Oklahoma City.

Matador, Nov. 2—The city of Matador soon will own its sewer system and will have an increased water service.

Voters of the city yesterday almost unanimously approved an \$85,000 revenue bond election to purchase the sewer system and enlarge the water system. The vote was 111 for to 7 against.

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

ON THIS the 20th day of October, 1948, came on to be heard the petition of more than fifty (50) of the resident property taxpaying voters of Road District No. 6, of Briscoe County, Texas, the said petition having been set down for hearing on this date by an order of the Commissioners Court of Briscoe County, Texas, entered on the 4th day of October, 1948; and

WHEREAS, at the time and place set for said hearing the matter came on for hearing and consideration, and it appearing to the Court that due and legal notice of the date and place of said hearing has been given in the manner and for the length of time required by law, the Court proceeded to hear all evidence offered for and against said petition, and it appearing to the Court that the said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said Road District No. 6 who own taxable property in said District, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated within said Road District No. 6 of Briscoe County, Texas;

The said petition prays that an election be held throughout said Road District No. 6, of Briscoe County, Texas, to determine

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 16, General Laws of the State of Texas, passed by the 39th Legislature at the First Called Session thereof.
