This And That About One Thing and Another

A gift subscription received this week goes to Mrs. W. D. Oats of Slaton, (formerly Miss Mildred Osman) from her grandmother, Mrs. W. O. McFall.

Answer to our request for candy recipes was very gratifying, especially a prompt one with some delicious sounding recipes from California. Mrs. Leslie Burns, always thoughtful and considerate, (nee Cleota Rogers) sends the following interesting directions for Date Sticks which she says taste something like fruit cake, and the longer you keep them the better they are—they are quite "chewy", too, says Cleota.

Which reminds us that when we published Mrs. Benson's Orange Cake recipe, we said that the cake "would keep indefinitely", but several who tried said that it didn't keep at their house at all—it was gobbled up before it got cold. The one Mrs. Benson made really was delicious.

Back to Cleota Burns: She says the fudge recipe is "wonderful but do not double the recipe, make the second batch.

DATE STICKS

—Mrs. Cleota Burns
1 c. flour 1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. nutmeg 2 eggs
1 c. sugar 1 tsp. melted butter
2 c. chopped dates 1 tbsp. water
1/2 c. chopped walnuts

Sift flour, measure, sift again with baking powder, salt, and spices.

Beat the eggs, add sugar gradually. Add butter, dates and nuts.

Add one half of the flour mixture and all of the water. Mix well. Add remainder of flour.

Pour the batter in 2 baking pans 8"x3"x2". Bake 325 degrees for 35 minutes.

When this is done let the "cakes" cool before cutting them in strips one inch wide, and roll in powdered sugar. Put them away wrapped in wax paper for one week before serving.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE

Two 1-ounce sqs. unsweetened chocolate grated.
2/3 cup milk, scalded 2 cup sugar
1 tbsp. light corn syrup
2 tbsp. butter 1 tsp. vanilla

Melt chocolate in the milk. Add sugar and corn syrup. Bring to a boil, cover with a lid and cook for three minutes (no longer).

Uncover and cook to soft ball stage (236 degrees) stirring frequently.

Remove from heat and place pan in cold water. Add butter and cool to lukewarm (110 degrees) without stirring.

Add vanilla and beat vigorously until thick and no longer glossy. Quickly spread in greased dish, or on wax paper.

Mrs. Scott, I have found that raw milk burns too easily and that canned evaporated milk (mixed half water and half canned milk) is much better in the fudge. It makes the candy more creamy also.

And speaking of food, reminds us that we live among the nicest folks in the world. We're always having to thank someone for something nice they've done for us, and that's the most pleasant job we have. This week we're full to the brim of appreciation—and good tender, delicious elk steaks. First time we've ever eaten elk, that we can remember, so we saved the bundle of steak to share with our children in Pampa and everyone enjoyed the meat treat, thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Tibbetts.

And we're anticipating another delicious morsel. Mrs. Bill Woods has a special way with candy and she brought us a box of her own hand dipped, home made, chocolate covered cherries. We're using all the resistance we can muster to stay out of them until the other half of this editorial staff is ready for his share—and he'd better get ready pretty soon, because our resistance to chocolate candy is weak.

CLINIC AT LUBBOCK FOR CEREBRAL PALSID CHILDREN

Lubbock's Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center will hold a clinic which will hold a clinic Monday, November 22 for the examination of cerebral palsied children. This center is sponsored by the Lubbock Cerebral Palsy Society and the Rotary Club and the services of the Center are available to any children in the community in need of such care.

Cerebral palsy is also referred to as spastic paralysis and occasionally as birth injury and research has shown that treatment is most effective when started within the first few months of the child's life although children respond to treatment begun at a much later age.

Physicians from Fort Worth and Amarillo specializing in the treatment of cerebral palsy will be present at the Center, Monday, November 22 to examine children and order treatment. Physical therapy care is available daily under the direction of Miss Esther Snell, a registered physical therapy technician.

The Treatment Center is located at 1317 Tenth Street, Lubbock. Parents who wish to bring their children to the clinic are requested to come to the Treatment Center at some time before the clinic date so that a case history may be obtained and an appointment made for clinic examination. Further information may be obtained by contacting Miss Snell at the Center or calling Lubbock 6541.

Services At Matador For The Long Brothers

Final services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist church at Matador for William Bryan Long, who was killed at the age of 19 in the service of his country in Germany on March 30, 1945. Rev. Potts, pastor of the Matador Baptist church conducted the service, assisted by the pastor of Roaring Springs Baptist church. Interment was in the Roaring Springs cemetery.

Billy was born June 21, 1926 at Roaring Springs. He was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Long, formerly of Roaring Springs, but who now live in Matador. He graduated from the Roaring Springs schools, and attended Texas Tech for some time before entering military service in November, 1944. Only four and a half months after enlistment, he was sent overseas for combat service and was killed within a month after landing in Europe.

Mr. and Mrs. Long lost two sons in the war, the notification of the death of Ensign Thomas E. Long, Jr., arriving just a month prior to the notice of Billy's death. Ensign Long was lost in a plane which was shot down over the water. The family has never received any of the effects of this son, and no trace of the men or the ship has ever been reported. Memorial services were held for Ensign Long, in connection with the reburial rites for his brother.

Survivors besides the parents are a brother, Charles Long of Roaring Springs and two sisters, Mrs. Amos Persons of Durango, Colo., and Mrs. James Baird of Quitaque.

Election Dates Set For Farm Committeemen

Community farmer committee elections will be held in Briscoe County December 8, 9, and 10, it was announced by the County Agricultural Conservation Committee early this week.

At these elections committeemen to administer the Agricultural Conservation Program and related programs for 1949 will be chosen. Since both the Agricultural Conservation Program and Price Supports are of vital concern to farmers of Briscoe County, it is to the best interest of each farmer to participate in this election.

This farm program with its elected farmer committees gives farmers an opportunity to administer their own program. It is truly a democratic method of administration.

Any person who is participating in the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program, who is eligible for a commodity loan or other price support or who has a contract with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is eligible to vote in the elections. Details of how the elections will be held are as follows:

Dec. 8; 8:00 a. m.-5:00 p. m., Silverton, Francis, San Jacinto, County Court Room.

Dec. 9; 8:00-5:00, Quitaque and Kent Communities, City Hall, Quitaque.

Dec. 10; 8:00-5:00, Antelope Flat, School house.

Ballots will be mailed to every eligible voter in the near future. Voting by mail will be permissible.

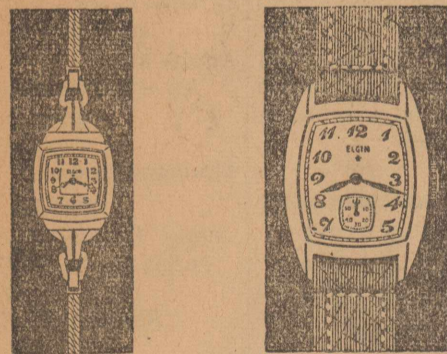

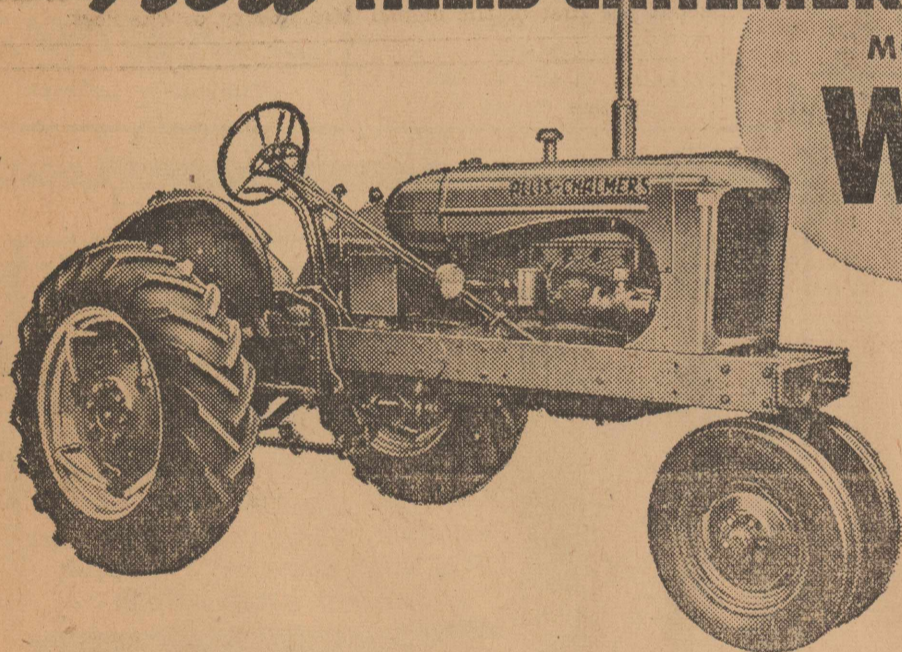

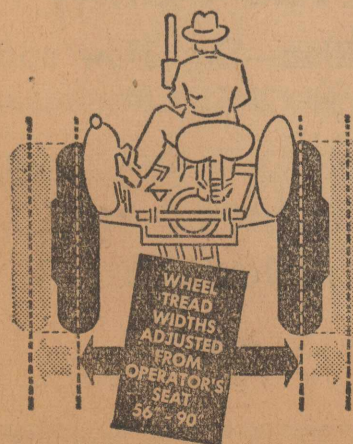

QUITAQUE REPRESENTED AT WATER PLANT SCHOOL

College Station—Another phase in the continuing program of instruction for water plant and sewage disposal plant supervisors has been completed by W. A. Howe, a member of the staff of the Texas A&M College Industrial Extension Service.

This was announced by E. L. Williams, IES director, who stated that Howe conducted courses at Plainview for 25 supervisors of municipal water plants and 15 sewage disposal plant supervisors. During the three week duration of the course, Howe acted as a consultant in assisting individual supervisors in the solution of problems peculiar to their particular areas, Williams stated.

A dozen west Texas municipalities were represented in the class enrollment, the announcement stated. Communities represented were Plainview Olton, Littlefield, Dimmitt, Tulia, Silverton, Quitague, Lockney, Floydada, Crobyston, Petersburg and Abernathy.

HEEL FLIES CAUSE DAMAGE AND DISCOMFORT TO CATTLE

A great deal of progress has been made during the past five years in controlling heel flies, reports Leo White, county agent. Heel flies are killed while they are grubs in the backs of cattle. Some farmers have completely eradicated these pests from their herds by rotenone during the winter. The most common method of killing grubs is to dust the backs of the cattle with a powder containing five percent rotenone and rub it with the hands to scatter the powder evenly over the back of the animal. White says the first application of dust should be put on when the first grubs are changing color.

The grub turns brown before it emerges from the back and falls to the ground to spend the remainder of the winter. The grubs usually appear in the backs of cattle in November and some of them remain there until the latter part of February.

The first grubs usually begin to change color in December so animals should be treated two or three times during the winter at 2 week intervals. There is no need to treat animals unless the grubs can be felt in the back because the rotenone causes the grub to emerge before maturity and die.

The most encouraging fact about heel fly control is that the fly never travels over one half of a mile from where it is hatched. This makes it possible for one cattleman to clean up his herd and get very little reinfestation from his neighbors. Heel flies cause damage and discomfort to animals that should be stopped.

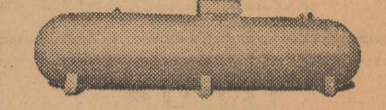

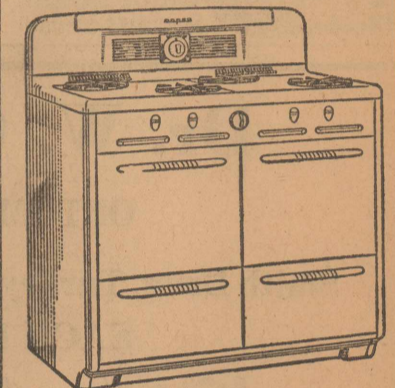
