## This And That About One Thing and Another

Candy recipes seem quite popular this time of year. This week we have a marshmallow recipe, which we recommend since it is contributed by Mrs. W. A. Smith. Mrs. Smith says that her daughter Violet (Mrs. Wilson Reed) used the recipe while Wilson was in service and sent some of the candy to him overseas and he received it in good shape. So we judge it will keep very well.

Some young boys are anxious for a taffy recipe. "Pulling candy" is a favorite winter passtime and believe me, when boys ask for a candy recipe (to use themselves) we'd sure like to furnish it. Please, let's have the taffy recipe. One of the boys said he'd be looking for it—said the trouble with that date bar we published last week, was that it said "store for a week before using", and he wanted to eat his candy as soon as he made it.

### MARSHMALLOW CANDY

—Mrs. W. A. Smith  
Measure 2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup corn syrup, 1/2 cup hot water, (rinse syrup from cup with this); cook until it forms a medium ball. While this is cooking soak 2 tsp. gelatin in 1/2 cup water.

Beat 2 or 3 egg whites (depending on size) with a pinch of salt. When syrup has reached firm ball stage, add the gelatin to it; after the gelatin has dissolved pour the mixture over the beaten egg whites; add 1 tsp. of vanilla and beat until mixture holds to shape fairly well. (It takes a good bit of beating.)

Pour onto board dusted with more sugar and let set until it's firm enough to cut, which doesn't take very long. Cut out with a small cutter, or in squares with a knife. Dust with sugar and store.

### COLORED MAN DIES AT GENE BERRY PLACE

Otis Price, a colored man, who was working on Gene Berry's place, died very suddenly Thursday afternoon, Nov. 18, at 1:20 p.m. Price had come in Sunday to look over the cotton, and Monday joined the crew of workers on the Berry farm, whom he knew as he had previously worked with them at Memphis.

The man, whose home was at Borger, had complained of feeling ill Thursday morning and a doctor was called to attend him. Later in the day when his companions became uneasy because he did not report for lunch, they went back to the house to see about him, and found him in a critical shape. A doctor was called again, but the man was dead before he arrived. A heart attack was given as the cause of death.

The body was taken to Turkey for embalment by Stewart Funeral Home and sent to Borger for burial. Price is survived by a daughter of Borger and a son from Lubbock. Had he lived until Nov. 20, he would have been 50 years old.

## Victory Is Decisive In Road Bond Election

The road bond election held Saturday, Nov. 20, was overwhelmingly in favor of issuance of the bonds. In the Quitaque box 127 votes were polled (a very representative number for Quitaque) 125 favoring, and 2 against the bond issue. In the Gasoline box 13 votes were counted, all in favor.

The election was held for the qualified voters of Road District No. 6, to decide whether or not road bonds in the amount of \$22,000 would be issued, for the purpose of completing the paving on the Gasoline road south to the Motley county line. This will leave only a few miles of unimproved highway from Quitaque to Flomot, and residents in that section of Motley county are making an effort to complete the unpaved gap, thus giving them a hard surfaced road into Quitaque.

The construction of the Gasoline road would be under the state highway's set-up in which the state furnishes the engineering requirements and one-fourth of the cost of construction; and assumes maintenance. It was understood that the \$22,000 would cover the cost to the road district for their part of construction.

At a meeting held last summer at Silverton, the district highway engineer, assured the commissioners court that he would recommend to the highway commission that the state assume the hard-surfacing of the road south from Quitaque to the Floyd county line. So prospects are favorable that both these roads will be built at the same time, and Quitaque will have two badly needed farm-market highways from the south.

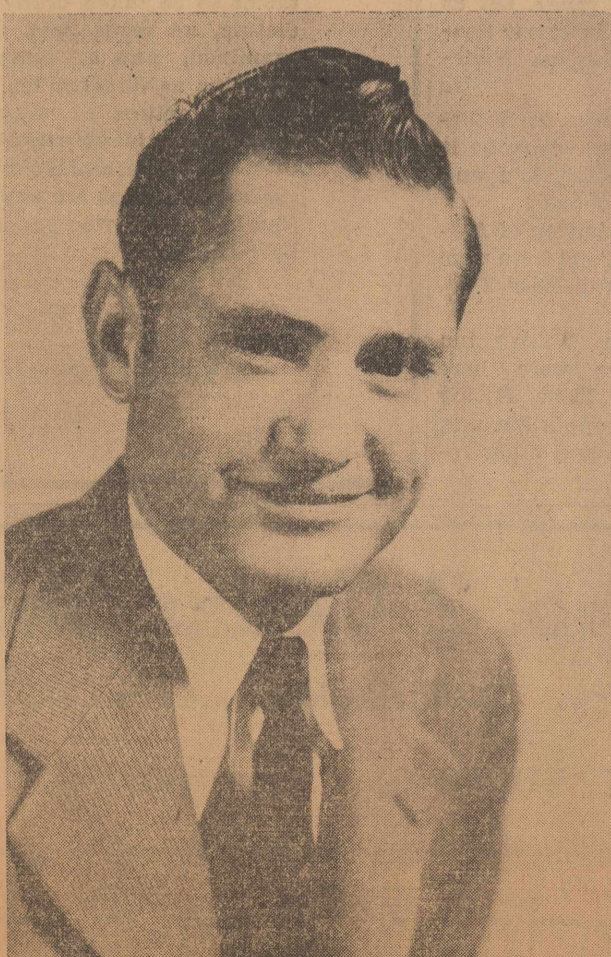



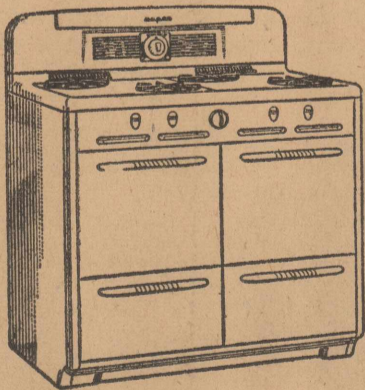

Mr. Earl Cantwell, Chmn. of Board of Supervisors was leaving following the meeting to attend a State Association of District Supervisors meeting at Brownwood. He plans to return with valuable information for the cooperators and soil technicians as well.

Soil technicians ran irrigation ditch lines for Alvin Redin of the

Redin Conservation group, Wednesday November 3.

Irrigation ditch lines were run for W. A. Stephens, a cooperator in the Francis group, Wednesday, November 3 by the soil technicians.

Soil technicians ran diversion ditches for J. H. Burson Land and Cattle Co., Friday November 5. This place is in the Ranch Group.

Soil Conservation Technicians staked out a farm pond site for Lee D. Bomar November 12, 1948. Mr. Bomar is a cooperator in the West Silverton Group.

A high point was located by SCS technicians November 10, 1948, for Roy Tisdale, a cooperator in the McPherson Group.

A topographic map was made recently for Joe McWaters, a cooperator in the Vaughn Group. Topographic maps enable Mr. McWaters to determine the kind of irrigation systems he will need.

Austrian Winter Peas can still be planted and will serve as a winter soil improvement crop. It is too late to figure on winter grazing; however, some spring grazing could likely be obtained. Winter peas are excellent soil builders and will fit into a cropping system during the winter months and still allow the same land to be used for other crops next summer.

**LIGHT ON THE SUBJECT**  
College Station—"If the light

from lamps seem dim these longer evenings, look them over with the idea of getting better reflection," advises Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A.&M. College.

For example, dark colors absorb light, and so a lamp shade which is dark inside actually wastes light, she points out. A white paper lining or a coat of white paint, or even white shoe polish on the inside may double or treble the light given off.

"The shape of the shade counts too," Mrs. Claytor says. "Wide, flaring shades give off more light than narrow shades with straight sides."

If you're planning on buying lamps, take into consideration the size of the shade and the height of the lamp. Table lamps need shades 14 to 16 inches across the bottom, and large floor lamps need shades 18 to 20 inches across the bottom.

A short floor lamp is usually better than a tall one. A lamp about 45 inches from the floor to the bottom of the shade is usually better than a tall one, because the source is nearer the book or other place where ample light is needed.

"A table lamp, used on a desk or reading table, is best when about 15 inches from table to the bottom of the shade," Mrs. Claytor concludes. "If it is taller the white lining of the shade may cause a glare in the eyes."

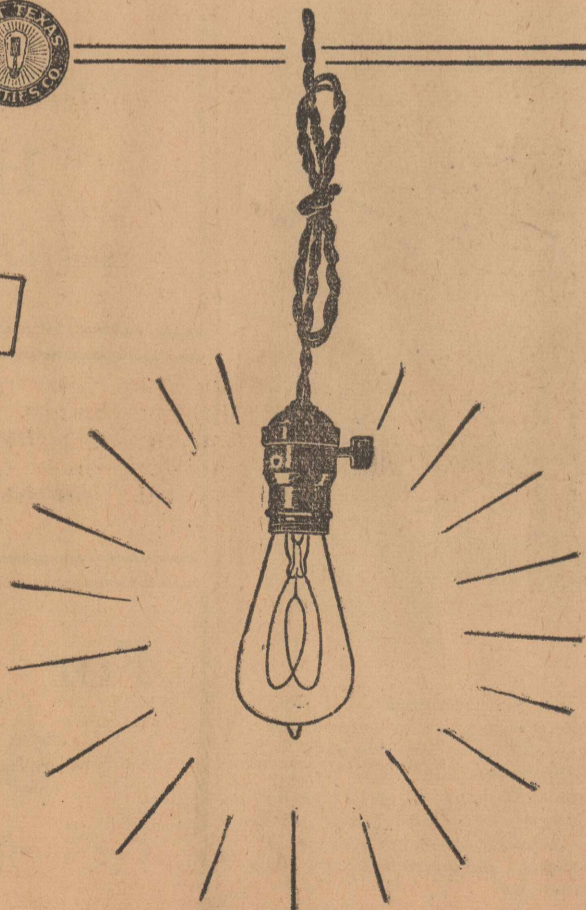

**CHECK VENTILATION WHEN GAS IS USED FOR HEATING**

Austin—With the advent of cold weather each year in this State, several deaths are usually reported, resulting from asphyxiation by gas

fumes in improperly ventilated homes or sleeping quarters.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning in this respect, emphasizing that it is never safe to sleep in a tightly closed room with a gas fire burning. Even if there are no leaks, the air soon becomes vitiated and unfit to breathe.

"When occupying a room in which gas is burning, be sure always to have at least a window or door open, to admit fresh air", Dr. Cox said. "If the weather is too cold to permit leaving an open window in the room occupied, then play safe by opening a door into an adjoining room, where a window can be opened."

Dr. Cox said he was prompted to issue this warning early in the season because of the fact that thousands of new residents in the state have come from districts where they have been used to burning coal, wood or oil, and they do not know the dangers of gas fumes in improperly ventilated homes.

"Occupying a room heated by an

open gas flame, and at the same time keeping the room tightly closed, may prove disastrous the very first time it is tried," Dr. Cox said. "It is better not to risk it even one time. Always be sure that your room has plenty of fresh air, but make doubly sure when you have a gas fire burning."

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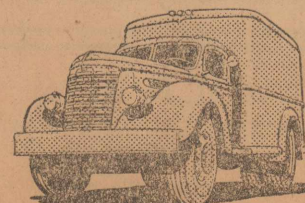
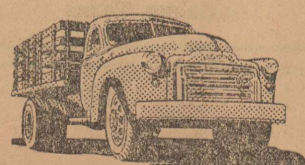
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
