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Panthers Win Two

Pantherettes Lost First Conference Game to Matador Last Friday

Quitauque High School's basketball teams won three of four games played Friday and Tuesday nights, the Panthers remaining undefeated in district competition and the Pantherettes dropping their first district game, that one to Matador last Friday night.

The Matador girls won over the Pantherettes 50-34 in the first of two games, while the Panthers slapped down the Matadors 81-51, although they looked pretty bad, in winning.

The Pantherettes, wanting to win the Matador game over all others this season, simply could not find the scoring range and were outscored in a rough and tumble affair that was nip and tuck for the first quarter and a run away for the last three. Janice Dudley, usually the high scorer for the Pantherettes, went out of the game early via the foul route, after making only one field goal, and this hurt their chances, also. Ethel Austin fouled out and several others played much of the game with several fouls hanging over them. It was Matador's night in the girl's game.

The Panthers were hitting the bucket well, but were making too many mistakes to look good in beating the Matadors. Perhaps it was a good game to get out of their system.

Jimmy Mayfield led the Pantherettes in scoring for the night with 19 points. Sharon Bailey contributed 6 points, Jennifer Whittington 5, Janice Dudley 2 and Chlonze Woods 2.

For the Panthers Sammy Johnston tossed in 20 points to capture scoring honors for the night; Dellis Monk and James Starkey each chalked up 19, Robert Phelps scored 16, Bobo Morrison 4 and Jack Johnson made 3 points before leaving the game after having been charged with five fouls.

Friday night's games at Matador marked the first round of district play for the local teams and left

the Panthers high and dry in first place in the standings, head and shoulders above the rest of the teams in the district. The Panthers are in second place at the half way point having lost 1 and winning 4. They still have a chance at the district crown, however.

Tuesday night the local teams started the second go-round of district competition by taking two wins over Flomot, the Pantherettes winning 33-22 with the reserves playing most of the game. Judy Colvin sparked the locals with 15 points; Tommy Lou Johnson was runnerup with 11, Jimmy Mayfield tossed in 7 points, and Sharon Bailey 5 points. For Flomot Kimbell was high with 11 points, Judy Gilbert made 10 and Jean Green 1.

In the second game of the night the Panthers outscored the Longhorn 86-21. Although he played only 10 minutes, Sammy Johnston managed to garner scoring honors with 19 points. Dellis Monk was next with 14 points, Jack Johnson dropped in 12 points, Bobo Morrison 10, A. B. Lyles 8, Jim Saul made 8 points, Robert Phelps 6, James Starkey 5, Cappy Wise and Bob Saul each made 2 points. For the Longhorn, Sheldon Jacobs was high with 8 points.

The local teams are playing in the Estelline Tournament this week end. The Pantherettes play Lakeview today (Thursday) at 7:40 P. M. and the Panthers play Childress B at 9:00 P. M.

SHARON BAILEY LOCAL WINNER IN NATIONAL CONTEST

Sharon Bailey daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Bailey, is winner in Quitauque High School in the 1962 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She achieved the highest score in the examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by senior girls December 5. She became eligible now along with winners in other state high schools, for the title of State Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The girl named State Homemaker of Tomorrow is provided a \$1,500 scholarship by General Mills, sponsor of the program. The state runner-up will receive a \$500 scholarship.

In addition, the State Homemaker of tomorrow and her school advisor will join with other state winners in an expense-paid educational tour of New York City, Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. At the latter, the 1962 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named.

The national winner will have her scholarship raised to \$5,000 with second, third and fourth place winners being granted scholarships of \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

The knowledge and aptitude test, prepared and scored by Science Research Associates, Chicago, is the basis for selection of local and state winners with personal observation and interviews serving as factors in national judging.

The 1962 Betty Crocker Search reached another all-time high in enrollment with 406,132 girls in 12,874 schools participating. The program now is in its eighth year. By the end of this year, more than two and a half million girls will have participated and scholarship awards will have totaled more than three quarters of a million dollars.

Marshall Formby Makes Formal Announcement

Calling for a return of the Government to the people of Texas Marshall Formby, Wednesday, made his formal announcement for Governor in the Democratic Primary. Formby made his announcement from McAllen, in the Valley, where he was guest of honor at an appreciation dinner. Recently, the highway through the Valley was named the "Marshall Formby Valley Expressway".

Formby is a former County Judge; former State Senator; and a former member and Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission. He is a strong advocate of the State Farm-to-Market Road System.

"Texans are demanding a more positive, progressive state administration, headed by a governor who is not obligated to any cliques in either Washington or Austin. People are tired of the bickering and fussing among elected executives in Austin and they want a new leader - but one who will not be dictated to from Washington," Formby said in his announcement.

"Furthermore, the State needs a good, solid businessman approach to solve the State's economic problems. I propose to bring sensible and logical leadership to the Governor's office when I am elected".

Formby's platform includes favoring a simplified tax system; amending the so-called unfair merit car insurance ruling; increasing the speed limit to 70 miles per hour on 4-lane divided highways in rural areas and then strict enforcement; solving the State's water and soil conservation problems; less red tape for small businessmen and farmers; and, operating Texas on a cash basis. He favors greater consideration for the State's senior citizens.

WALTER ROGER'S NEWSLETTER THE NEW SESSION

On January 10th, 1962, the House of Representatives of the United

States Congress convened for the second session of the 87th Congress.

The session commenced with the usual handshaking and greeting among the Members returning to the Nation's Capital for further considerations of old problems, and attacking the new. The oath was administered to the new speaker by the man who has served longest in the House, to-wit: the Honorable Carl Vinson of Georgia, Chairman of the Committee on Armed Services. The new Speaker then administered oaths to the new Members replacing those who had passed away or resigned. The year 1962 has already claimed another Member of Congress in the passing of my good friend, John Riley of South Carolina. John was a southern gentleman in the best traditions, a man of staunch character and great ability. It will be most difficult for the people of South Carolina to replace him.

Since this is the second session of the 87th Congress, it is not necessary for all the Members to be sworn again, nor to reconstitute the several Committees of the Congress. Hence, can be started without delay. The Committee Chairmen have already begun to outline the year's work and set meetings of the Subcommittees and the full Committees. It is hoped that by doing this the unfinished work of the last session may be quickly concluded and the new work for this session can be attended with dispatch. This would make it possible for this session of Congress to adjourn some time in mid - summer, rather than being held over until the fall. The wives and children of the Members have been most anxious that some plan be worked out so that the Members could spend some time with their families during the summer vacation periods. For a number of years it has been impossible for the families to make the usual vacation plans while the children were out of school. This situation finally developed into a mild revolt - last year by some of the Members' wives. Although this revolt was unsuccessful, the feeling is still prevalent and it may be expected that the issue will be revived until some action is had. It is my feeling that Congress could adjourn by July 15th. If this is done, it will mean that work must be pushed without delay in all of the Committees.

There is no doubt but that there will be many heated debates during this session on the several subjects mentioned in the President's

State of the Union message. There also a number of bills left on the calendar from the last session which will prove controversial.

On the subject of international matters, you can expect to hear much from the Select Committee which we in the Congress last session formed for the purpose of looking into shipment of goods to Red and Red-satellite countries. In fact, information will be forthcoming within the next few days as the opening salvos in clearing up this problem and in putting a stop to practices that should not be followed.

There will be opportunity for action on three measures passed by the House last year. One of these, H.R. 4469, bars the employment on waterfront facilities and U. S. merchant vessels of persons who refuse to appear or to answer questions on Communist affiliations or commit perjury before any Federal agency. Another, H. R. 3247, clarifies the term "organized" as used in the Smith Act to make it apply

to continuing as well as original Communist activities. This bill will plug up a legal loophole that the Communists were trying to avail themselves of. Another is H. R. 8465, which prohibits shipments in interstate or foreign commerce of articles imported to the United States from Cuba. This measure passed the House and it is hoped that it will become law this year.

The Congress should also address itself to continuing and vigorous action to ferret out possible infiltration of Communists or Communist sympathizers into the Federal government or any organizations doing business with the Federal government. This is a continuing job and one that must be of primary concern at all times. Several measures which I have introduced can be effective weapons in this battle to assist the security agencies of our government in fighting this battle. I expect to prepare and introduce others as the needs of the enforcement agencies are made known.

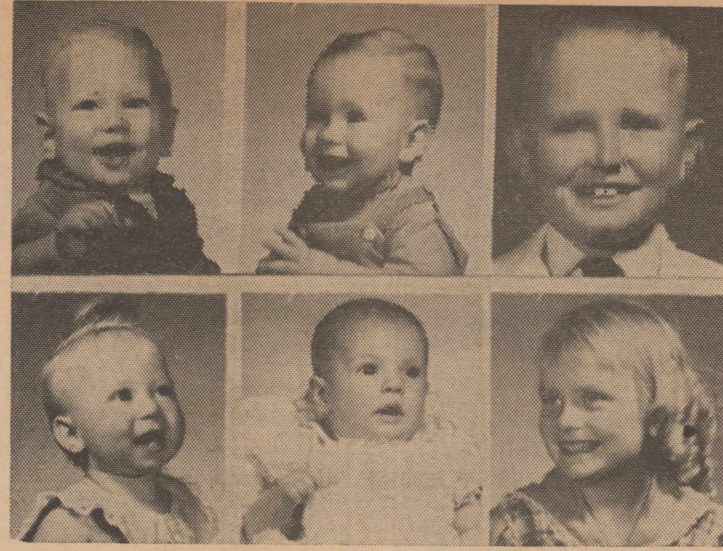

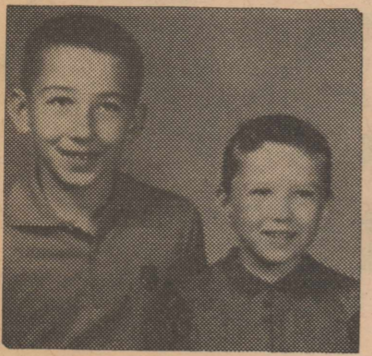
