Funeral Services Held For Marvin Wise

Funeral services for Marvin D. Wise, 61, were held at 3:00 P. M. Sunday, April 27, at the First Baptist Church here. He was a member of this church.

The Rev. Roy Davidson, pastor officiated at the service. Burial was in the Quitaque Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home of Turkey.

Death came to Mr. Wise at 6:15 P. M. last Friday afternoon in Stanley Hospital at Matador. He was stricken ill around noon Friday and was rushed to the hospital.

Marvin Dawson Wise was born September 20, 1900 in Hico, La., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wise. The Wise family moved to Quitaque when Marvin was about six years of age.

He was married to Miss Carrie Hortman on March 5, 1921 at Memphis, Texas.

Mr. Wise was a carpenter by trade until failing health caused his retirement a few years ago.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Ethelle Gardner of Sharron, Pa.; three sisters, Mrs. Jim Stroup, Quitaque, Mrs. Ben Parnell of Monroe, La., and Mrs. Odell Wilkes of Meadow; and two grandchildren. One son, Byron, preceded him in death.

Lloyd Dunlap, driver of the third automobile involved in the accident and Claud James Holmes, both of Lubbock, riding with Dunlap were not injured.

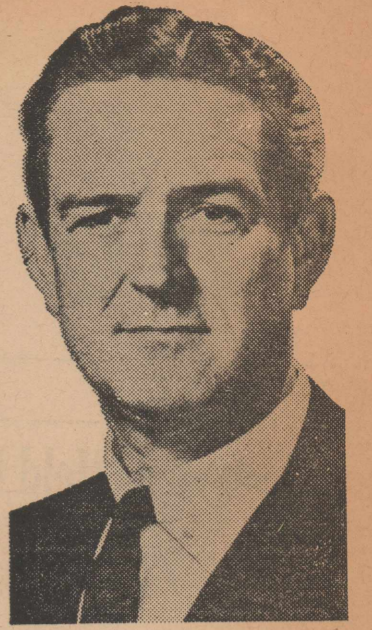

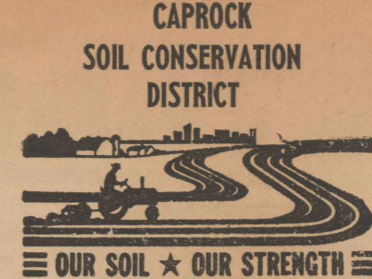

In the recent group meeting held in the PCA Bldg. Mr. Jack Douglas, Area Agronomy Specialist, spoke on the Establishment and Proper Management of Permanent Pasture Under Irrigation.

He pointed out there are two types of permanent pastures to choose from: The sod forming type, which includes Bermuda grasses with Midland and Coastal, the more adapted varieties of this area, and the tall growing grasses with your native species the most suitable, which includes Switchgrass, Indian Grass, Bluestems and other native species.

Mr. Douglas pointed out that management plays a big part in determining the production you can expect from these irrigated pastures.

The most important factors are selecting fertile soil, the amount of water and fertilizer applied and controlled grazing.

He also stated that with good management it would not be uncommon to expect 600 to 800 lbs. of beef per acre.

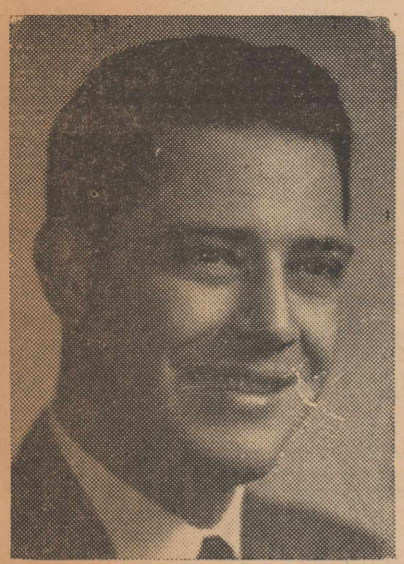

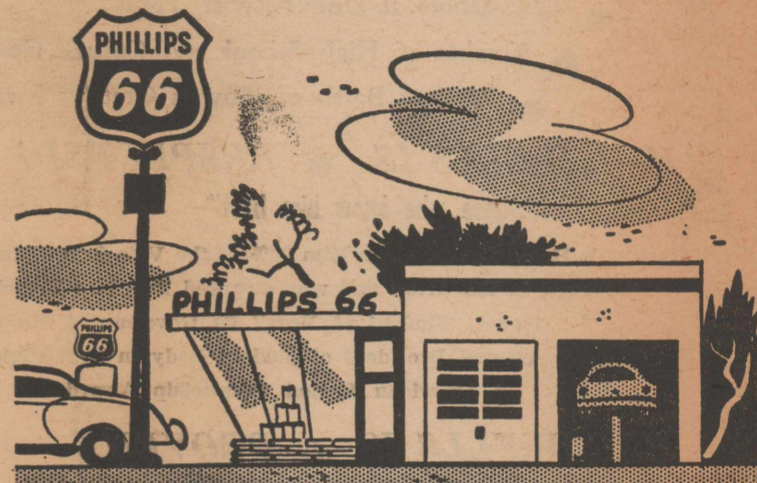
