### WALTER ROGER'S NEWSLETTER TO THE PEOPLE OF

THE 18th DISTRICT: WHY Mr. Norman? "Mr. Norman" is Mr. James M. Norman, who resides in Memphis, Texas. He was wronged by the government — his own Federal government; not deliberately wronged, perhaps, but nevertheless a victim of too much red tape or inefficiency or perhaps, a reasonable mistake. In any event, Mr. Norman has been out \$2,001.48 which in the opinion of the House of Representatives (which passed a bill for his relief), he is entitled to recover. He would have been well on his way to recovering it, had the other body of the Congress (sometimes referred to as the Senate) proceeded to discuss his bill for relief on its merits. However, when the bill for the relief of James M. Norman came up on the calendar of the Senate, an amendment known as the Mansfield-Dirksen Amendment was offered, to a bill to bar arbitrary literacy tests in Federal elections, for the contents of the Norman bill. 

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

Four different irrigation methods and four fertilizer treatments on cotton were tested to determine the effect on the efficiency of cotton at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1961.

James G. Valliant, recently promoted from Assistant to Associate Water Engineer, stated that the tests were designed to determine the combination or irrigation method and fertilizer treatment which would produce the greatest net return and the highest irrigation stages of growth, first bloom or

efficiency in the production of cotton. Four irrigation methods combined with 4 fertilizer treatments and three varieties of cotton were used. The irrigation methods were: (1) First bloom only, (2) First ton. Full Details of the test are in the complete High Plains Research Foundation Report No. 45, issued in April, 1962.

The three varieties of cotton were Gregg, representing early maturng; Lockett 88-A, representing mid-maturing, and Paymaster 88-90, representing late maturing as well as the open-boll type cotton.

Mr. Valliant concluded from cotton, response to the fertilizer is directly related to the rate of irrigation water, while the response to fertilizer in late maturing cotton could be due to the period of time the plant demands nutriants.'
