This Ammendment would simply give to a foreign country authorized to receive aid from this Country the choice of permitting this continuing trade with Cuba or accepting our foreign aid, grants and loans. > However, a country could say that they preferred to trade with Cuba and turn down the foreign aid, or some countries, friendly to us but not receiving foreign aid, would not be effected. Efforts were being made and had been made in our diplomatic circles to pursuade friendly nations to cease this trade with Cuba. It was the opinion of many that if effective results could be brought about by agreement with these nations, it would be more helpful in the solution of the overall problem. However, as time ran on,

it became apparent that all the foreign nations were not going to make such an agreement. In recent weeks several of such nations freely voiced publicly their inten tion not to cease this trade. Consequently, it was my opinion that it was time for the Congress to act on this subject. Therefore, I intro duced HR 13214 which reads as fol

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

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

COTTON HARVEST STILL MOVING SLOWLY

Cotton harvest is still moving slowly, according to Charles E Cox of the Altus Classing Office. Only about 1500 samples were classed during the week, as compared to more than 12,000 for the same week last vear.

Statistical averages showed a further decline in grades. An estimated 10% of the cotton was called in the white grades, 74% light spotted, and the remaining 16% spot ted. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted and Low Middling. Light Spotted were most predominant and about equal, together accounting for about 60% of the grades.

A wide range of staple lengths continue to show up, but the average dropped to 31/32. 15/16, 31/32, and 1 inch accounted for an estimated 88%, with about equal amounts of each length.

Micronaire estimates on cotton received during the week made a definite upward trend for the first time this season. Estimates showed 17% reading 2.9 and lower; 21% between 3.0 and 3.4; 18% between 3.5 and 3.9; and 45% reading 4.0

Little or no cotton is going into trade channels. Some small amounts are reported going into the gov-
