FUNERAL SERVICES HELD TUESDAY FOR MRS. E. P. RUMPH

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church here Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 for Mrs. Rosa Lee Rumph, a long-time resident of Quitaque and widow of the late Dr. E. P. Rumph who practiced medicine in this area from 1915 until his death in May, 1943.

Mrs. Rumph died Sunday morning, January 20 at 5:45 at Zoe's Rest Home in Childress, where she had been for the past year. She had made her home at Quitaque for 48 years.

She would have been 85 years of age on March 5.

She was a member of the First Methodist Church here.

Officiating at the memorial service was her grandson-in-law, the Rev. Buren Stewart of Carlsbad, N. M. He was assisted by the Rev. Kenneth Metzger, pastor of the Methodist Church here and the Rev. Bob Beck, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Paducah and a former pastor here.

Rosa Lee Rumph was born on March 5, 1878 in Hill County, Texas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Elliott. She was married to E. P. Rumph on December 15, 1895 in Jim Ned County, Texas. They came to Briscoe County from Taylor County in 1915.

Mrs. Rumph is survived by two sons, Dr. Quay Rumph of Houston, Texas, and P. P. Rumph of Durango, Colo.; two daughters, Mrs. Solon Owens of Turkey and Mrs. Dudley Crump of Clovis, N. M.; one brother, Jack Elliott of Fort Worth; three sisters, Mrs. Mable Reed, Sherman, Texas, Mrs. P. L. White, Abilene, Texas and Mrs. Pete Williams, Graham, Texas; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Interment was in Rest Haven Cemetery under the direction of Roberts Funeral Home, Inc.

DEADLINE NEAR FOR COMPLETION OF SCHOOL CENSUS

Superintendent of Schools Johnny Mason stated this week that the School Census is moving along very well but he reminded people of this school district that January 31st is the deadline for finishing the census.

The greatest lag in the census, according to Mr. Mason, is in reporting the youngsters who will be in school for the first time next fall. He says that he feels sure that there are a number of children here in the school district who will be in school for the first time next year whose names are not yet on the census and it is very important that they be counted. It means money to the school and it is needed for the operation of our school.

Supt. Mason requests that anyone knowing of a beginning student whose name has not been reported to please call him before the deadline, which is Thursday of next week.

Dates Set For Rodeo

DRIVERS URGED TO OBEY TRAFFIC LAWS CONCERNING SCHOOL BUSES

Supt. Johnny Mason reported this week that there have been an increasing number of motorists who are violating the law in regards to stopping for school buses loading or unloading children.

Failing to heed the law is a very serious offense and some citizen could find himself in trouble if the failure to stop is reported. The drivers of the buses need only to report the license number of a vehicle failing to stop for a school bus loading or unloading and then the matter is out of the hands of the school. Supt. Mason made it clear that the school was not threatening anyone but was only trying to prevent an accident. These things do happen. It will be remembered that such an accident did happen not too far from here a few months ago when a child ran from behind a stopped school bus and was hit by a pickup that did not obey the law.

Mr. Mason reminds that the law says it is "unlawful to pass a school bus from either direction without stopping while bus is loading or unloading passengers. After stopping, you are allowed to proceed at a speed not to exceed ten (10) miles per hour."

Of course there is no one who would intentionally harm a child, but if you fail to obey the law and a child runs from behind the bus,

The Quitaque Panthers roll on undefeated and practically untested in district competition while the Pantherettes have just about been eliminated from any chance at a district crown as the two teams split games with Matador here Tuesday night.

The Pantherettes lost to Matador 41-23 as the Matadorettes' Jill Scaff won on a 37-point scoring spree. The Pantherette forwards meanwhile were unable to hit the basket at all. The Panthers took an easy 73-41 win over the Matadors in the second game of the evening.

Tuesday night's games marked the end of the first round of district play with the Panthers leading the pack with 5 wins and no losses. The Pantherettes have won 2 and lost 2. Matador's girls team is undefeated in district play to lead in the girl's division.

Brightest spot of Tuesday's games was the performance of Jack Johnson, the Panthers big 6-6 center. For the second game in a row Jack tossed in a 36-point total. In the Lakeview game Jack scored 36 points and against Estelline he made 24 points for a three game total of 96 points. He is really beginning to hit his stride now and his performance is improving every game.

The Matadors made a contest of the game Tuesday night for the first quarter and trailed by only 14-19. However the Panthers out scored the Matadors 20-5 in the second period of play to lead 39-19 at halftime. Coach Gene King pulled his starters about midway of the final period as the score continued to mount against the out-

classed Matador lads. Jim Saul and Bobo Morrison were back in uniform and in action after being out for the last games due to illness. Jim missed two games and Bobo had to sit out the Lakeview contest. Butch Brown, who became eligible only last week, had to miss Tuesday's game because of an ear infection.

Friday night the Panthers will drive over to Flomot to start the second round of district play. The Pantherettes will not have a game since Flomot does not have a girls high school team. However there will be a Jr. High boys and girls games to go along with the Sr. High game. Next Tuesday night the Panthers and Pantherettes will go to Estelline for a pair of district games.

HIGHWAY PATROL REPORT FOR MONTH OF DECEMBER

The Highway Patrol investigated 3 rural accidents in Briscoe County during the month of December according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for an estimated property damage of \$1,100.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Briscoe County from January through December of 1962 shows a total of 27 crashes resulting in 2 persons killed, 15 injured.

The estimated property damage amounted to \$21,930.00.

When the final reports are tabulated in March of 1963, it is estimated the death count will be approximately 4% above the 2314 killed in 1961. This increase should be a challenge for every individual to put forth his best defensive efforts to prevent accidents for the new year.

The Veteran Patrol Supervisor cautions all motorists to beware of icy patches at bridges, underpasses and in shadows. Reduce speed before you reach the slippery area.

NOW IS TIME TO SOIL TEST

College Station. — Now, when soil and weather conditions are nearly ideal, is the time to soil test fields to be fertilized next spring, says W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist at Texas A&M College.

The chemist says that samples sent to the laboratories now will avoid the spring rush of sampling and fertilizing and that recommendations will be returned in one to two weeks.

The way the sample is taken is

very important because the tests can be no better than the samples tested. They should be representative of the field tested and the field should be divided into uniform soil areas, explains Bennett. If there are marked differences in the slope, color or texture of areas of the field, these should be tested separately because there may be fertility differences in these areas and thus differences in fertilizer needs.

If part of an area has been fertilized, limited, manured or cropped differently, it should be sampled differently, Bennett adds.

Your county agent can help you in your soil sampling and provide you with an information sheet for the job. Bennett advises seeing him soon and sending your sample to one of the three soil testing laboratories at Lubbock, Seymour or College Station.

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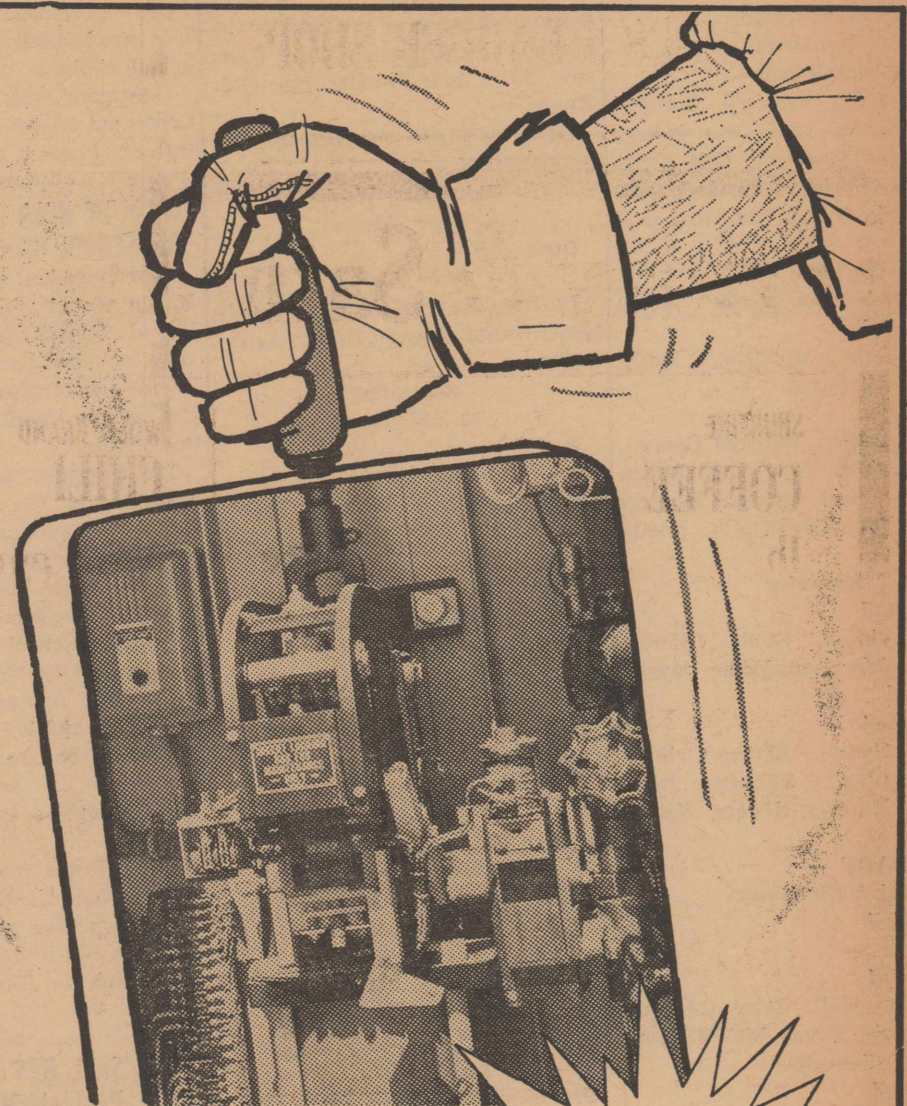

NOTES FROM THE MEMPHIS COTTON CLASSING OFFICE

With only about 2% of the cotton crop remaining to be harvested, the sub - freezing weather of the past week again stopped the gathering of the crop, says K. E. Voelnel, Officer in Charge of the Memphis Classing Office. Samples classed amounted to about 6,000 compared with over 23,000 the week before. The largest number of samples classed in a week this season was 33,000. To date a total of 200,482 samples were classed.

The Memphis Classing Office, which is a seasonal set - up, will close for the 1962 - '63 season on Wednesday, January 23. Samples shipped on or after that date will be classed by the parent office in Altus, Oklahoma.

White grades represented only about 3% of the total classed this past week according to statistical estimates. Approximately 64% averaged Light Spotted; 27% Spotted; 4% Tinged; and 2% Below Grade. The predominating grade was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted with 45%. Grades were reduced because of the following reasons: 4% because of Preparation and 26% because of Grass and Bark.

The staple length averaged shorter than previous reports with 17% 29/32 inch and 81% 15/16 inch. About 22% of the cotton classed today was Wasty.

Micronaire averages showed 27% reading 2.9 and lower; 36% 3.0-3.4; 21% 3.5-3.9; and 16% 4.0 and higher.

The demand for public school teachers for the next five years will approximate 47,000 in Texas, an average of 9,400 per year.

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS' WASHINGTON REPORT

Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa announced today that Jan. 31 has been set as the deadline for accepting nominations of candidates for the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy.

Mr. Rogers is entitled by law to nominate 10 qualified applicants from the 28 - county area of the 18th Congressional District.

He announced he will receive applications for nominations up to the Jan. 31 deadline.

The Merchant Marine Academy, one of the five federal academies, trains young men for careers as officers in the nation's Merchant Marine. Its four-year college program leads to a BS degree, a U.S. Coast Guard license as a third officer or third assistant engineer in the Merchant Marine, and a commission in the Naval Reserve.

Successful nominees will attend the academy with the school year opening this fall.

Congressman Rogers said prospective applicants seeking more detailed information about the program of the Merchant Marine should contact his office or write to the academy's training representative, Maritime Administration, P. O. Box 52948, New Orleans, La.

Because of the Texas State Teachers Association's concern for qualified teachers in the future, Texas now has 393 chapters involving over 19,000 future teachers in student professional organizations. Texas NOW needs 7,000 teachers as replacements for those now employed who do not meet the minimum requirements for certification.

The number of emergency permits issued annually in Texas has increased from 1,121 in 1955 - 56 to 7,099 in 1961 - 62.

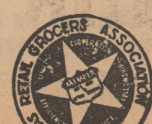

Austin, Tex. — Dan Blocker, a really "big" man, will be the recipient of the Texas Press Association's 1963 "Texan - of - the - Year" award.

Announcement of his selection has been made by George Baker, president of the newspaper associa-

tion and publisher of the Fort Stockton Pioneer.

The presentation to Dan Blocker, 300 - pound co - star of the NBC-TV show Bonanza, will be made at TPA's Mid - Winter Meeting at the El Tropicano Hotel in San Antonio on Saturday evening, January 26.

Blocker, known on TV as Hoss Cartwright, was born in Bowie County, Texas, on December 10, 1929. He grew up in the Texas Panhandle and received his education in Texas.

Weighing 14 pounds at birth, he pulled the scales to 105 pounds by the time he entered grade school. He became known among his friends as "The Big'n". At age 10 he worked alongside grown men at grain elevators and could whip any of the local toughs, regardless of their age.

Despite his extraordinary strength, Dan Blocker had other ideas than pushing his weight around as a strong man. When 12 years old he enrolled in the Texas Military Institute at San Antonio. At that time he weighed 200 pounds and stood six feet tall.

From the military institute he went to Hardin - Simmons University at Abilene for a semester, then to Sul Ross State College at Alpine, on a football scholarship, to major in physical education.

He changed his major to drama before he was graduated in 1950. From Alpine he went to Boston for summer stock. Then, as did most young men of his time, Dan Blocker received greetings from The President and went overseas for a whirl at Korea.

When he finished his army hitch, he came home with the stripes of a first sergeant, to further impress Dolphia Parker, his college sweetheart. They were married on August 25, 1952. They now have four children, twin girls and two boys.

Blocker returned to Sul Ross shortly after his marriage to work on his master's degree. He left classes for one year to teach in the high school at Sonora. Upon receiving his Master's degree in drama and English, he taught school at Carlsbad, New Mexico.

In 1956, he went to Los Angeles for graduate work at UCLA. Almost immediately he was chosen for a feature role in a Gunsmoke episode, where he made more money

Funeral arrangements had not been completed. The rites probably will not be conducted before Monday and will be at the Immanuel Baptist Church in Fort Collins.

Rev. and Mrs. Saul were married in early 1961. She was Jera Lynn Wilhite, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. (Doc) Wilhite of Fort Collins. She has two brothers, Carrell, 13 and Rodney 10.

The Rev. Saul's church is the Bellevue Baptist Church. Funeral arrangements for Mrs. Saul and the baby were under direction of the Riddell - Hays Mortuary in Fort Collins.

Spencer's parents live at Fort Collins. He and Mrs. Spencer had been assisting Rev. Saul with the music at Saul's church between terms at Wayland.

Glenn Saul is a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Saul of Quitaque. The Plainview Daily Herald
