Griffin Serves Aboard Veteran Battleship Texas

(The following informal summary of the battle activities of the U. S. Texas has been prepared by the ship's public information officer, and distributed to all hands for their personal correspondence.)

Considered a "luck ship" since her commission in 1914, this destroyer was the only ship in the fleet which has maintained this reputation by blasting her way through five invasions and emerged unmarked.

As a result of their constant vigil, the Texas was one of the few ships to emerge from that battle unharmed by Japanese pilots.

At an age when most Battleships would be considered obsolete, the Muleshoe "Texas" showed that her guns still packed the wallop that they did when she first met the Germans 25 years ago in World War I.

From then on she was given little rest for she became a front line fighting ship. Her African assignment was followed by three in European waters off France, and then came two Jima and Okinawa in the Asiatic waters of the Pacific, which gives the Texas rightful claim of being the only Battleship to have fought in waters of three continents—Africa, Europe and Asia.

If you were at The Valley Theatre Sunday or Monday you saw a news reel of the monkey men making arrangements with American generals for the surrender of the nation which so arrogantly planned the subjugation of the whole world by brute force and open murder of the innocent.

Where the Japs misfigured, I suppose, was that they could establish themselves in their stolen territories before we could prevent it, and that their public opinion would militate against waging war on the scale they figured necessary.

Well, as I said before, if you attended the theatre and saw the new reel, and looked at the specimen of the master race shown there, you wouldn't be surprised that the Japs spent so many years figuring it out just right — and

then came up with the wrong answer. This writer has no aversion to cold weather in September except for one thing which had him worried. He knew that if a cold spell came before straw hats went out he would very likely be sitting up nights with his friend, Tye Young, who without a doubt would have contracted pneumonia. If it is still straw hat time of the year, Tye will wear his straw. And a man, he says, looks foolish wearing his straw hat with a sweater or coat. And he, Tye says, him being a business man and all, can't be made to look foolish, can he?

It's logic all right, men, but logic might not ward off an attack of pneumonia. And that's why I sure was dreading a spell of cold weather before straw hats went out.

They have got to where, in some circles, they call old Bill Collins, "Gopher Bill." But, pardner if you him to call him that you better smile. This writer lives right near Bill, out on Holly Street, and we have one gopher between us. We used many suggested remedies including the water cure, poisoning, and so forth. A gopher is a mean animal and causes damage to your grass and vexation to your spirit.

Some of the folks who left this community in the early days of the war to go to war factories are coming back. This writer talked to one older couple who had a nice home and an easy living right here but

chose to go and work for three years in a munitions factory.

They are glad there is no longer any need for their services — but they are proud they went and helped make the tools of war to bring a quicker victory and peace. And I call it downright patriotic. These people went to work at midnight, I reckon, it's the graveyard shift. And they missed mighty few days work in all that time, be the weather foul or fair, work day or holiday, living in cramped inconvenient quarters taking a long ride to get to their place of work, and whose nearness is a comfort to them. They were not in danger, but otherwise their work compared to that of soldiers and there are millions of people like that, who performed a similar service, and deserve a vote of thanks and a pat on the back by their country.

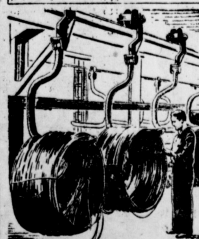

In consequence, men will not be free to visit their families at coastal ports, but will move without delay to their own districts.

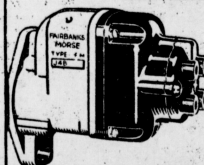

New Fabric Will Not Rot, Mildew

A new cotton fabric that will not mildew or rot has been developed by scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The new fabric was buried in the ground for 6 months with no significant loss of strength, says Mrs. Laurette Wilson, county home demonstration agent. This material has the strength and appearance of ordinary cotton, in addition to its ability to resist rot. And the process by which it is made causes no discoloration of the fabric. The treatment is somewhat similar to the acetate process for rayon, but the new cotton fabric has no odor and it does not become sticky. And fortunately the treatment will not cause any harmful effects on foods, so it will make excellent sacks for shipping fruits, vegetables, and other food and feed products.

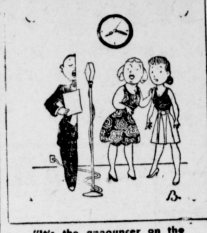

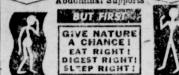

"Of those who have expired licenses, probably a considerable number have developed defects or attitudes, or records of traffic violation and accident that give them cause to fear examination.

"Of course most delinquents are merely lazy or negligent.

"But whatever the reason, the impressive facts remain that 18 per cent of drivers cause 85 per cent of collisions, and unlicensed drivers figure in more than a proportionate share of them. As traffic volume and fatalities continue to increase the citizen's obligation to comply with regulatory measures likewise increases. We are headed for a
