If He came unexpectedly, I wonder what you'd do.

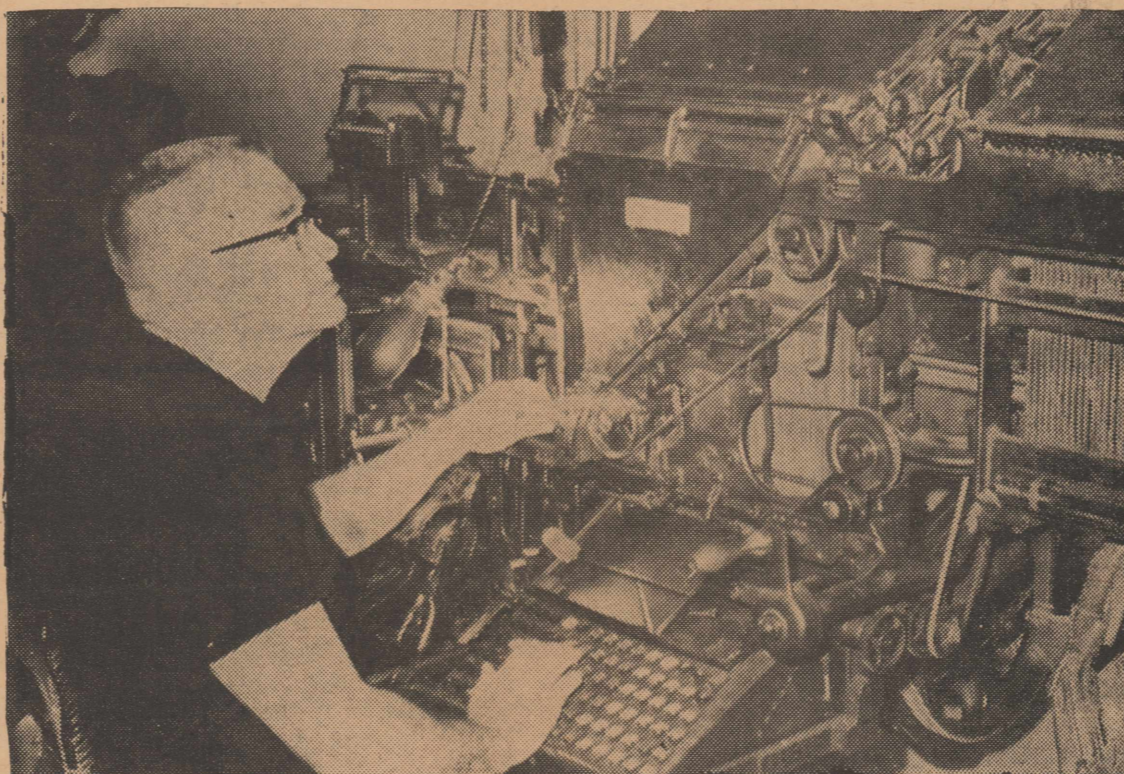

Your community newspaper is many things to many people of each community. To the housewife it's a shopping aid, whereby she is better able to help feed and clothe her family; to her husband it's a source from which he derives information bearing directly on his business or profession; to the sportsman it's a source of enjoyment; to the students it's an instrument through which they receive public recognition for outstanding efforts in academic, sports or other activities; to the community leaders — civic, church, social and other service organizations concerned with the spiritual and material well-being of the people — it's an instrument for welding these people into a force capable of instituting and carrying out and completing projects of benefit to the community; to the businessman it's a means of educating the people of the community to his products and services.
Your newspaper is all of this and more. And yet — there are people who will discredit these papers and the part they play in the community they serve. That's strange too, because no matter who owns and edits the newspaper — it still belongs to the people of that community. It's their voice; and it's as good as they will it to be. It's their support, their encouragement, their cooperation that contributes to the end result.
Every issue represents a lot of work on the part of the reporters,

editors and publishers. There's lots of telephoning and leg work to trace out facts, lots of writing, re-writing, typesetting, composition, ad building, ad selling in every issue. Much of this work takes place in the wee, small hours before the inevitable deadline. All in order that facts of importance to you and other members of the community will reach readers at the usual time.
Except for a period of two months since 1921, according to Dick Hooks, who was post office clerk at this time and put up the first issue. The original publication, the Quitaque Post, ceased publication about three months after its plant burned January 1, 1960.
But in June of this same year, Gaston and Lottie Owens, present publishers, published the first issue of The Quitaque Tribune.
Mr. and Mrs. Owens, who are long-time residents of this area, returned to Quitaque from Wichita Falls, where Gaston worked at The Wichita Printing Co. and Lottie was a Sears Roebuck and Co. employee.
Gaston is a graduate of Quitaque High School and Lottie of Silverton High.
Gaston's personal history is more or less closely tied in with the history of the Quitaque newspaper. He worked for three different publishers — C. B. McDonald, W. R. Scott and Dean Humphrey.
He spent 4½ years in the Air

Force during World War II, getting his "boot training at March Field, Calif., then was transferred to Muroc, now Edwards Air Force Base in California. He spent two years overseas. Following his discharge in 1945 he lived in Brownwood until 1948 when he returned to Quitaque and went to work again for the W. R. Scotts and also attended Wayland College and a summer term at West Texas State.
Lottie, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ed Vaughan, worked for Rayburn Burgess when he was in business at Silverton, later worked at the Badgett Pharmacy and at Minter Dry Goods. After her marriage to Gaston and coming to Quitaque she worked for the Burgess Pharmacy. After moving to Wichita Falls and before going to work for Sears, she worked at Fedway for about a year. Both Lottie and Gaston are active in church work and as active in other community activities as their duties will allow. They have two sons, Dwain, who is married and lives at Silverton, and Eddie, 10 in the Fourth grade at the Quitaque Elementary School.
Cappy Wise, son of Mrs. Earl Wise, has made up the rest of the force at the Tribune for the past two years. Cappy works after school and Saturdays and is a graduating Senior this year.
Mrs. Arnold Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James May, is the Flomot correspondent for the Tribune.

Tuesday's program was an observance of the event.

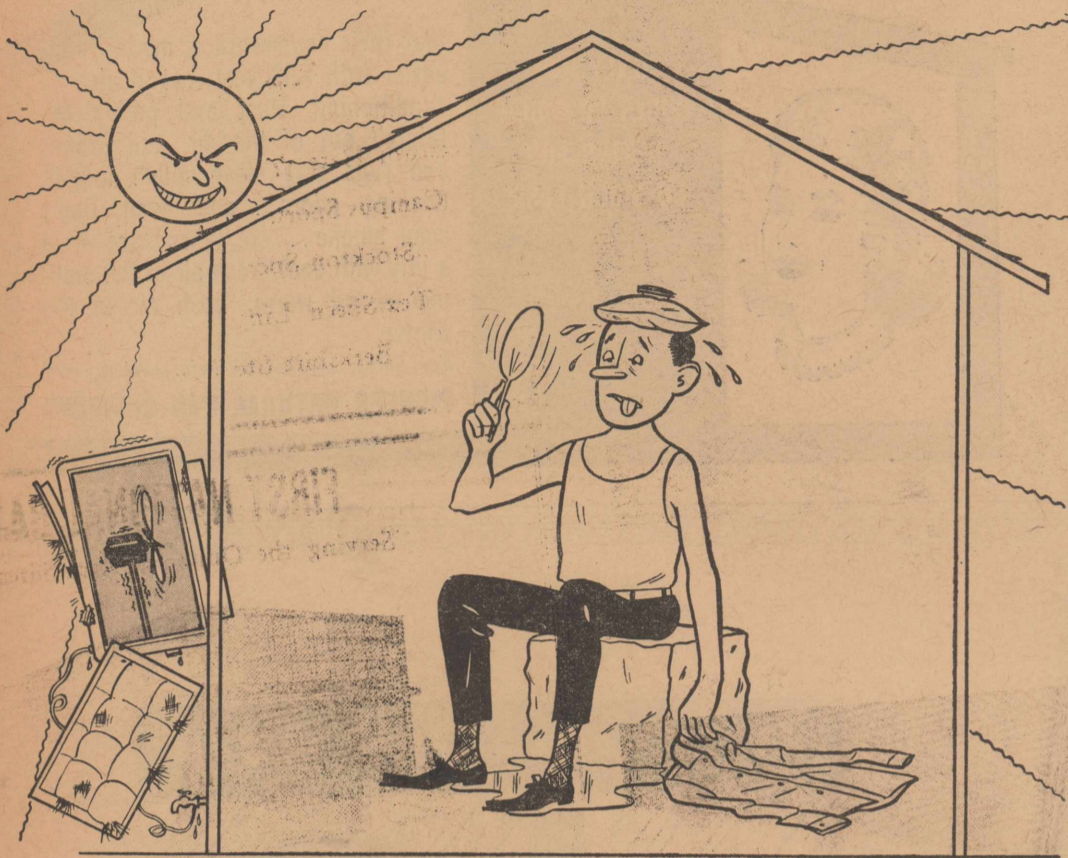

A devotional was led by Mrs. Ray Persons, taken from Exodus 4:2, "The Lord said, what is that in thine hand, and he said, a rod."

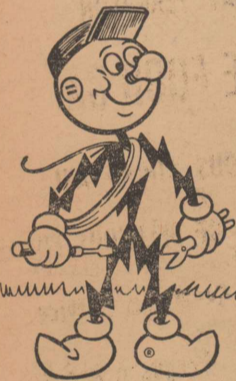
Mrs. Persons closed with a prayer.
