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Congressman Walter Rogers' Newsletter

A TRIUMPH FOR DECENCY

Among criminals, the most reprehensible species are those animals who trade on human prurience by peddling pornography. The lowest form of this vile class are the dealers in obscenity who move their wares among children.

Thus it was with considerable satisfaction that I noted this week of the conviction — 28 counts of a federal indictment — of one Ralph Ginzburg, a 33-year-old Brooklyn native who was out to pile up a fortune by publishing pure filth. Ginzburg's main endeavor in pushing a variety of erotic material was his magazine "Eros," which, when publication began, brought a deluge of complaints to my office and those of other Members of Congress and to the Post Office and Justice Departments.

Others who deal in salaciousness can contemplate the possible penalty Ginzburg could pay, after sentencing is pronounced shortly, for his adventure in defying decency and the law: 140 years in prison and \$140,000 in fines.

I am pleased to report to you that the federal government is working diligently to clean the mails of such trash as "Eros" and to bring to justice the men engaged in this despicable "industry." In the period from July 1, 1962, to May 24, 1963, a total of 683 arrests were made in the United States for violations of Postal obscenity statutes—141 more arrests than were made in the same period of the previous year. Convictions totaled 565 in the latest period, compared with 438 for the same period of the year before—an increase of 29 percent. I salute the responsible officials of the Post Office Department and of the Justice Department's Criminal Division for their fine cooperation and aggressiveness in handling these cases. All decent Americans can be proud of this campaign.

I'm not only interested in seeing a curtailment in the flow of mailed obscenity. I am doing what I can to bring a halt to the circulation of lewdness in motion pictures and in movie advertisements. I have introduced in this Session of the Congress H. Res 72, similar to measures I introduced in past Sessions, to bring about a "complete investigation and study of the problem of obscenity, lewdness, salaciousness, and immorality in connection with the production, distribution, and exhibition in the United States of motion pictures and in connection with advertising related thereto."

SILVERTON WOMAN BUYS HOTEL

Mrs. Kate Fowler of Silverton has bought the Hotel north of the bank in Quitaque, it was disclosed this week.

Mrs. Fowler plans to convert the entire downstairs into apartments and is busy redoing the hotel from top to bottom.

Claude Cantrell is reported to be planning on remodeling his apartments in the west part of town and Mrs. F. M. Sachse has already redone her apartment just west of her own residence.

A number of people will be coming into Quitaque in the near future needing places to live and anyone having apartments or houses to rent should let that fact be known.

This is the wording of the resolution, which has been referred to the Rules Committee of the House. If approved by the House, the resolution would provide for the appointment of a special sub-committee of the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce to hold hearings and make recommendations for corrective legislation. We must be on guard in this Nation against a laxity in morals that could, as happened in Great Britain with the Profumo scandal, shake the very foundations of the Republic.

Among other measures I've introduced this year in the House is H. Res 67 to investigate personnel and procedures in the Department of State. The investigation I propose would not be merely a "fishing expedition." It has very definite objectives spelled out in the resolution, which is among the many measures awaiting consideration by the House Rules Committee. Because the State Department's activities are so vital to the continued security of the Nation, I believe it is important that a check be made so that the Congress and the People can make an assessment of its effectiveness.

Specifically, my resolution asks for the creation of a nine-member select House committee to (1) investigate the personnel of the State Department (2) investigate the practices and procedures of choosing personnel for both routine and special work or assignments (4) investigate the background and capabilities of all personnel in relation to their duties and assignments (5) investigate personnel who may not be directly connected with the State Department but whose work is tied to State Department activities, and (6) formulate recommendations concerning changes in practices and policies related to State Department staffing or the staffing of other federal agencies associated with State Department activities.

A personal note — our second son, Walter Edward Rogers, Jr., was married June 22, 1963, the first of our six children to enter matrimony. The bride is the former Joan Durante, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Durante of Jersey City, N. J. The couple will live in Jersey City. Earlier this month, Walter received his B. S. Degree from Georgetown University.

The Kent Creek Watershed Board of Directors met in called meeting Wednesday, June 19, along with several visitors. Attending the meeting were Soil Conservation Service officials, construction engineers and other visitors connected with watershed work.

Present at the meeting were Board members E. J. Hamilton, Glynn Morrison, R. L. Brunson, Bert Grundy and F. C. Benson; Virgil Hinson, Guy Nutt, Ray Bodine and Glenn McKenzie from the SCS; O. R. Stark, Jr., representing the First National Bank; Engineers Joe Cooper and Beade Northcutt; and George W. Miller, consulting attorney for the W.C.I.D.

Mr. McKenzie reviewed the "Project Agreement For Construction of Structural Measures By Contract" with the Board and explained some things which will be required during the weeks and months ahead in connection with the letting of contracts.

Work is already underway toward the letting of contracts, with the first bid expected to be September 1st. At that time it is expected that bids will be taken on Sites 1, 2, and 3, the Mayfield, Weaver and Tate dams and 30 days later bids will be received on the remaining 4 structures. This will be followed in 30 days with the letting of contracts, on November 1, on the 8 miles of channel improvements.

If things go as planned, construction work should get under way in 60 to 90 days and it is hoped now that instead of the original completion date of 3 years, the work might be finished in 12 or 18 months.

Things are ready to go on the local level with the exception of a few legal aspects.

Nine families are scheduled to be moving to Quitaque around August 1 to begin work on the Watershed. These people will be an advance crew of engineers, according to a spokesman for the Board of Directors. They will be here in Quitaque at least a year, according to reports.

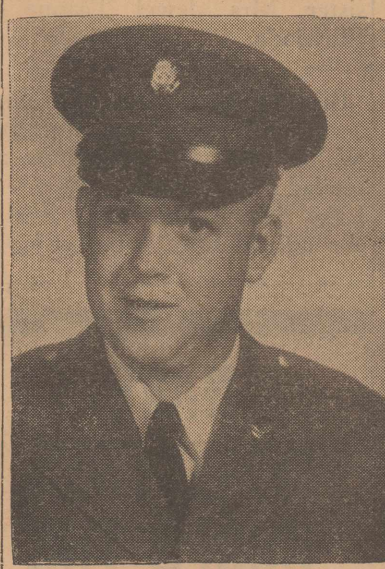

EXPECT OVER 10,000 AT BAPTIST CONFERENCE NEXT WEEK

Dallas (Spl.) — More than 10,000 people are expected to pack the Memorial Auditorium here July 2-4 during Southern Baptists' first Convention-wide Evangelistic Conference.

Some 100 leading personalities in evangelism will be in Dallas for the conference, said Vernon Yearby, associate in the Home Mission Board's Division of Evangelism here. The meeting, which has a theme of "Spiritual Conquest... Now," begins on Tuesday evening and goes through Thursday evening in the 10,500-seat Memorial Auditorium. Overflow crowds will be seated in a 1,700-seat theater building next door to the auditorium.

Speakers will include Dr. Baker James Cauthen, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board; Dr. C. E. Autrey, director of the Southern Baptist Evangelism Division; Dr. W. A. Criswell, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dallas; Dr. R. G. Lee, pastor emeritus of Bellevue Baptist Church, Memphis, Tenn.; and Dr. Ramsey Pollard, pastor of the Bellevue Church.

A city-wide visitation program that evangelism leaders hope may result in up to 5,000 professions of faith will be one of the conference highlights.

In tune with the meeting theme, "Spiritual Conquest... Now," teams of visitors will spread out to cover Dallas with a soul-winning effort of Pentecost proportions, evangelism leaders said.

The visitation effort will take place during the afternoon of the final day of the conference and will be followed that night by an evangelistic service.

A public invitation will be extended following the conference's closing message by Dr. Autrey. Counselors will be on hand to work with those who make decisions.

A total of 82 youngsters have enrolled to date in the swimming activities. Because of the large number of swimmers, it has been necessary for them to be divided into five groups, and each boy and girl is requested to be sure to remember to which group he is assigned and to remember the time his group is due to go to the pool. The Tribune will print a calendar of the time each group is due at the pool and each youngster is advised to clip this out of the Tribune and save it in order to know when he or she is to swim. The schedule for the first two weeks appears in this week's issue.

Many people have asked about the swimming fees. The first fee was \$1, the charge for each event in which the boy or girl takes part; The pool fee for each swimmer will be \$4.00 — for the entire summer, or a total of \$5.00 for the swimming event. Thus, if a child takes part in all

four events on the summer recreation program, the entire fee will only be \$8.00, which is a very reasonable sum for a summer of supervised recreation.

The biggest problem confronted Coach King is that of transportation of the youngsters to and from the swimming pool at Silverton. He will need autos as follows: On Mondays at 9 o'clock 3 cars will be needed; at 10 on Monday 4 cars will be needed; Wednesday at 9 he will need 6 cars; Wednesday at 10, 3 cars; Friday at 9, 6 cars and Friday at 10, 3 cars will be needed. This will be the weekly requirement all during the summer. Coach King has requested that anyone who can carry a car to please get in touch with him and let him know the date and hour that you can take your car or pickup. A person can plan to be gone from home about two hours when a car is taken.

Silverton pool rules are that all girls must wear bathing caps and all swimmers in the summer recreation program are asked to wear their bathing suits to the pool ready for swimming.
