KEEP TO THE RIGHT, ESPECIALLY IN NARROW CHANNELS

Knowing the rules of the road is vital for safe and competent small boat handling. Since they are based on common sense, these rules are easy to learn and remember. Mercury boating authorities say the following are among the most important: keep to the right in narrow channels and when meeting another craft head on. And "commit" yourself early by turning off a collision course when there is still considerable distance between your boat and an oncoming one. Give way to any boat approaching in your danger zone—your right-hand side from dead ahead to slightly danger zone—your right-hand side from dead ahead to slightly danger zone. Sailboats have right away over powerboats. Craft being overtaken and boats leaving docks also have the right of way. Observing these rules will enable you to meet any water-borne traffic situation with confidence.

HIGHWAY PATROL REPORT FOR MONTH OF MAY

The Highway Patrol investigated four rural accidents during the month of May according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for 4 persons injured and property damage in the amount of \$2,750.00.

The rural accident summary of Briscoe County from January through May of 1963 shows a total of nine crashes resulting in no persons killed, five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,125.00.

It might well be said that many of our so called good citizens in their thinking do not associate good citizenship in a democracy with safety. The Patrol Supervisor reminds us that these two are so closely related that they cannot be separated.

The word safety as we understand it, implies everything that is good for the citizen. And citizenship also stands for every thing that is good. If a person lays a claim to being a good citizen, yet is careless in traffic or disregards simple traffic rules and regulations, then he cannot be considered a good citizen.

What we must learn to accept and to face is that we cannot be good citizens if we do not practice the principles of good citizenship in every area of our lives. If we continue to disregard and break traffic laws and continue to behave in a careless manner in traffic, then certainly we are not good citizens in the true sense of the word, even though we apparently are living within the letter of every other law. Good behavior in traffic — good behavior in our contacts with other citizens: strict regard for all laws — traffic laws included — these are some of the qualities expected in the good citizens of today. And, to be sure, if he has the interest of his country, he will practice safety along with good citizenship, the officer concluded.

LIGHTHOUSE ROCK — Sculptured by wind and water, this natural stone tower keeps its vigil near Palo Duro Canyon State Park, 35 miles southeast of Amarillo. Palo Duro Canyon cuts a spectacular 120-mile gash through the Texas Panhandle. Six miles wide and more than 700 feet deep, the canyon is considered one of the truly geological wonders of the State.

With vacation time with us, and the Fourth of July holiday especially, what better way to spend a part of it than exploring Palo Duro Canyon State Park, 35 miles southeast of Amarillo.

Interesting sight-seeing is provided for the park visitor thru the unique natural phenomena such as the "Lighthouse," a 270 foot sandstone formation that actually looks like a coastal lighthouse, and the "Spanish Skirts," a reddish exposure of the Permian Formation which is spread out over the side of Rustler's Draw and looks like the twirling skirts of a Spanish Dancer. Both formations are said to have been named by the explorer Coronado when he visited the canyon in 1541.

To add to the visitor's appreciation, the park has a ski-lift that takes the rider on a breath-taking ride high above the canyon floor to the rimrock cliff

walls more than 300 feet up.

A miniature train ride with lectures carries visitors into one of the park's side canyons bringing to view formations that would otherwise be hard to see.

Visitors may rent horses to explore the more inaccessible portions of the park. Many miles of cliffside trails hold in store endless breath-taking views of the canyon. Colors in the canyon change with ever new position of the sun. There usually is a gentle breeze blowing through the park.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park is comprised of more than 15,000 acres. The width of the canyon is about six miles at the southeastern boundary of Palo Duro Canyon State Park. The canyon walls are more than 700 feet high.

This is truly one of the geological wonders of the state of Texas. Visitors to the park are increasing each year, more than

160,000 having registered in 1962.

the 4th day of July or at such other time on that day as may be determined by local authority."

The tolling of the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall in Philadelphia at 2 o'clock on the 4th day of July, 1776, proclaimed the signing of the Declaration of Independence. We've had Fourth of July bell-ringing since

that time, and I'm glad Congress has provided through the new resolution further encouragement of that practice.

In the Panhandle, 2 o'clock, eastern daylight time will fall at noon. I hope everyone within reach of a bell goes forth to ring it proudly and that a great, if non-explosive, din will ensue.
