Voting On 4 Proposed Constitutional Amendments In Texas Set Saturday

Below is a brief resume of the proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution, to be voted on August 25, 1945, Saturday and is given as each amendment will appear on your ballot:

Amendment No. 1.
This amendment provides that during the time that the United States is engaged in fighting a war or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated, no person, who at the time of holding any election in this State authorized by law, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the holding of any such election, was a member of the Armed Forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve or of the United States Maritime Service or of the United States or of the U. S. Merchant Marine, is required to pay a poll tax, or to hold a receipt for the payment of any poll tax assessed against him, in order to vote at any election.

The foregoing amendment, if adopted, does not give any person

the right to vote who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps.

Amendment No. 2.
This amendment provides that members of the Legislature shall receive \$10.00 per day during their tenure of office, and in addition each member shall receive not to exceed \$2.50 for each twenty five miles as mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government for sessions of the Legislature.

Amendment No. 3.
This amendment provides that the Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case.

Our present Court consists of three Justices and a Commissioner of Appeals, composed of six judges who now assist the Supreme Court without the power to vote and this amendment, if adopted, will make the six Commissioners full members of the Court with voting power on decisions.

Amendment No. 4.
This amendment, if adopted, will empower the Legislature to increase the amount for old age assistance from \$15 a month as now provided by the Constitution, to \$22 per mo. of State funds to be matched by the Federal Government, with a like amount, which in effect would be with both State and Federal money, the pensioner could be paid an amount up to \$40 per month.

This amendment further provides that a maximum of Thirty-Five Million Dollars can be raised by the State for its part in expenditures for the needy aged, the needy blind and needy children under 16 years of age.

Cpl. Ford Camp Died In France

The War Department's report of the death July 24 in France of Corporal Ford Camp, former Muleshoe boy, came as a surprise and shock to relatives here, who had believed him in good health and were unaware of it if he had been wounded.

This was reported by Mrs. Lacy Fried, Muleshoe, a sister, who said the surprise message arrived Saturday a week ago.

Mrs. Fried said the family had received a letter from him, written July 18 in which he talked about his early return home.

The soldier was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Camp, who moved from Muleshoe about five years ago. Cpl. Camp had been in service nearly three years and most of that time he had been overseas.

He took part in campaigns in Italy, France and Germany as a member of the 101st Engineers. He was 23. Among other close relatives are a sister, Mrs. J. C. Blackwell, Littlefield and a brother, Grady Camp, Amarillo.

Sgt. Clinton Powers Has Army Discharge

Sgt. Clinton K. Powers, son of Mrs. Nita Powers of Muleshoe, has been honorably discharged by the Army, after a term of service overseas.

Among medals and badges he earned were the Air Medal and the Good Conduct Medal.

Sgt. Powers was a gunner on a B-17, Flying Fortress, flying missions from a base in Italy. He had seven Battle Stars.

He had served in the AAF two years, nine months, and went overseas in December, 1944.

His wife and their two children have been making their home with her mother, in Seattle.

A Dahlia Show sponsored by the Bailey County Home Demonstration Council, will be held September 15 in the building of the Berry Electric Company according to Mrs. Harold Mardis, chairman of the Council Exhibit Committee.

The following cash awards will be given for the three best dahlias in the whole show: First place, \$10; Second place, \$7.50; Third place, \$5. Ribbons will be given for first, second and third place in each section.

Following are the rules and regulations for the Show:

1. Entries are open to anyone who wishes to exhibit. Exhibitors may compete in as many classes as desired.

2. All flowers must be grown and arranged by the exhibitor unless otherwise specified.

3. All exhibits must be entered not earlier than 12 noon and by 2 p. m. at which time judging will start.

No one will be allowed in the hall during judging.

Exhibits should be open to the public by 3 p. m.

4. No exhibit can compete in more than one class.

5. Exhibits not meeting the specifications of the schedule will be disqualified by judges. When the schedule calls for a definite number, a greater or less number disqualifies.

6. All entries must be turned over to the staging committee who will place them. No exhibit will be accepted unless entry ticket is attached.

7. No exhibit may be removed before 9 p. m.

8. The management will not be responsible for any loss.

Entries may be made in the following classes:

- SECTION A. Formal Decorative Dahlia: One large specimen bloom. Bloom more than seven inches in diameter. To be exhibited for quality only. Arrangement not considered. Stems must be not less than 12 nor more than 18 inches.
- Class 1. White.
- Class 2. Yellow.
- Class 3. Orange.
- Class 4. Red.
- Class 5. Pink.
- Class 6. Lavender.
- Class 7. Purple.
- Class 8. Bicolors.
- II. One medium bloom. Bloom three and one-half to seven inches in diameter. Stems must be not less than 12 inches nor more than 18 inches. Classes same as above.
- SECTION B. Informal Decorative Dahlia. Same as Section A.
- SECTION C. Cactus Dahlia. Same as Section A.
- SECTION D. Semi-Cactus Dahlia. Same as Section A.
- SECTION E. Miniature Dahlia: One specimen bloom. The bloom not more than 3 and one-half inches in diameter. To be exhibited for quality only. Arrangement not considered. Stems must be not less than 12 inches nor more than 18 inches. Classes same as Section A.
- SECTION F. Pompon Dahlia. Same as Section E.
- SECTION G. Specimen Flowers: Three individual blooms. To be exhibited for quality only. Exact count of flowers or stems essential. Classes same as Section A.
- SECTION H. Artistic Arrangement of Dahlia.
- Class 1. An arrangement in a glass container.
- Class 2. An arrangement in a metal container.
- Class 3. An arrangement in a pottery container.
- SECTION I. Artistic Arrangement of Any Flowers. Classes same as Section H.

The rodeo will start promptly at 8:15 o'clock each evening.

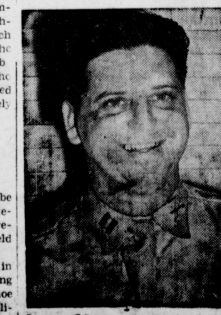
No rodeo would be complete without some comedy. This year, as in the past, clowns will be on hand to lend a hand in keeping the performance from growing dull.

Preparations are being made for the opening of Muleshoe schools for a new term on Monday, Sept. 3, says W. C. Cox, superintendent.

Supt. Cox announced a teachers meeting to be held Saturday, Sept. 1 at the high school. The entire faculty will attend.

He said juniors and seniors will register Monday, September 3, and freshmen and sophomores will register Wednesday.

Grade school pupils are to register Monday, the 3rd.

At this time only two vacancies exist on the faculty, Mr. Cox said. Miss Ursula Cobb, teacher of Spanish, has resigned because of ill health, and one more grade teacher is needed since the consolidation with Fairview. Consolidation was approved at an election held recently in the two districts.

Candidates for the football team likely will be called together next week to begin practice, and there will be more news later on this.

New School Site Being Improved

A well has been put down on the location for the Three Way school. The land has been surveyed and ground staked off for the school buildings and teachers.

Four teachers now in the old districts will be moved to the new site. The frame school building at Maple will be moved to the new location.

The moving and foundation contracts have already been let for these jobs.

The R. E. A. is now bringing the high line up to the new location.

Things are shaping up to let the contract for the new building.

Fairview Votes For Consolidation

Fairview school district will be consolidated with Muleshoe Independent School District as the result of the vote in an election held recently in the two districts.

Thirty-eight ballots were cast in Fairview district and all excepting two favored consolidation. Muleshoe district voters favored the consolidation proposal by 28 to 0.

Most of all pupils will be enrolled in Muleshoe schools, but a few, living on the east side of the district, are to enter the Sudan schools.

It Won't Be Long Now - Maybe

The first 1945 model civilian passenger car built in the East rolled from an assembly line of the Edgewater, N. J., plant of the Ford Motor Company August 14, according to word received here by Neil Rocky, Muleshoe Ford dealer.

Ford's Edgewater plant, which has been turning out war goods since 1942 - building and shipping trucks, jeeps and bomber service trucks - reverted from war to peace time production without resorting to mass layoff of employes.

Top employment before the war was 3,000 persons and more than 2,000 employes are still on the payroll at the branch plant. Many others, of course, are in the armed services.

In producing for war, Edgewater built, boxed and shipped more than 130,000 trucks, jeeps and other military vehicles, besides boxing and shipping more than an estimated 2,750,000 boxes of spare parts.

Before the war, the Edgewater plant produced approximately 400 passenger cars a day. Plans are underway to increase production over this figure once restrictions are removed.

Just Between Us

WITH the announcement that bake shops and grocers will have only half as many cakes, cookies and pies on their shelves from now on, many women will be baking desserts at home for the first time. And, of course, they will be looking for simple recipes - especially those that require little or no sugar.

Being as clever as she is talented, pretty Gertrude Warner, the popular actress starring in Mutual's "Brownstone Theatre" dramas, has been collecting such recipes ever since the first days of sugar rationing.

Here are a few that Gertrude recommends for both family and guests:



PEANUT DROP COOKIES

Ingredients—1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk, 1/2 cup peanut butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon almond extract, 1/2 cup crisp rice cereal or 1/2 cup rolled shredded wheat. Instructions—Thoroughly blend milk, peanut butter, salt, almond extract and rice cereal. Drop by heaping spoonfuls on greased or oiled baking sheet. Bake in 375 oven for 12-15 minutes. Makes 1 1/2 dozen.

GINGERBREAD

Ingredients—1/2 cup melted shortening, 1/2 cup New Orleans molasses, 1 egg beaten, 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon shortening with molasses and add dry ingredients, and add alternately with the

PUMPKIN PIE

Ingredients—2 cups steamed and strained pumpkin (strained pumpkin may be used), 1 cup New Orleans Molasses, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 1 cup milk. Instructions—Bake one large oyster shell in hot (425) oven about 10 minutes. Mix above ingredients in order given, adding the milk gradually to keep mixture smooth. Pour into partially baked party shell and sprinkle top of pie with 1/2 cup sugar, cinnamon and dots of butter. Bake in moderate oven (350) for 30 minutes, or until silver knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve warm, with whipped cream, if desired.

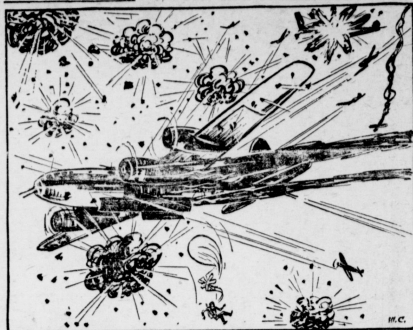

THIS year our domestic supply of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Right now, we are facing our worst fat shortage since the war began. To make up for this staggering loss, the government is depending on the women of America—and particularly women on farms and in smaller cities.

Every spoonful, every drop of fat is needed to help make battlefield and homefront essentials. So roll up your sleeves and do an all-out job, won't you? Clip this checklist and pin it up in your kitchen as a reminder.



- 1. FRIED SALT PORK**—with milk gravy. Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.
- 2. DEEP FAT FRYING**—use the fat over and over; but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it!
- 3. ROASTS AND CHOPS**—save all trimmings (scraps from plates, too.) Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.
- 4. SAUSAGES**—they're better if you parboil them first. Skim the fat off the cooking water—scrape the fat from the frying pan.
- 5. CHICKEN SOUP**—chill it before you use it. Scoop off the hardened grease (soup tastes better, too!)

When the salvage can is full, take it to your butcher promptly. He will give you 2 red points and up to 4c for every pound of used fat you turn in.
