## To Receive Distinguished Service Award

College Station, Aug. 15 — (Spl.) Mrs. Bernice P. Thurman, Cooke county home demonstration agent, today was announced as one of four Texans selected to receive the Distinguished Service Award for 1963. It is the highest recognition given by the National Home Demonstration Agents Association.

Other award winners are Mrs. Mildred Pugh, Lipscomb county; Louise Brown Newman, Jim Wells county; and Mrs. Mildred Y. Martin, DeWitt county.

Announcement of the winners was made by Mrs. Nellie Nichols, assistant home demonstration agent in Nueces county and chairman of the state association's award committee. Mrs. Nichols won the award last year.

The Texas winners will be honored at the National County Home Demonstration Agents Association meeting at Salt Lake City, Utah, Sept. 29-Oct. 3. They also will be recognized during the meeting of the state association in San Antonio, Oct. 17-19.

Mrs. Nichols explained that Distinguished Service Awards are made annually to home demonstration agents throughout the nation who have rendered outstanding service to the people with whom they have worked for a period of ten years or more. Major factors considered in selecting the award winners are the ability to develop leadership and effective programs in adult and 4-H Club work, the chairman said.

Through the Lipscomb Co. program Building Committee, Mrs. Thurman has helped develop leadership in community and county programs. She has helped direct an educational radio program presented by home demonstration women of the county, and has influenced 4-H Club girls to continue their formal educational plans.

Mrs. Thurman has been presented the Farm Bureau Appreciation Award for her outstanding leadership work. She attended the National 4-H Club Congress as an official chaperon for the County Home Demonstration Agents Association for two years, and represented the state president at the national meeting in Seattle giving a report for the state official.

The home demonstration agent has conducted good nutrition and weight control workshops for special interest groups for both men and women. She has worked on meal planning for senior citizens, and has held individuals and groups with planning, selection of

clothing and clothing budgets.

Twenty-two 4-H Club members have received state and national recognition while under Mrs. Thurman's supervision during her 13 years as an Extension agent.

Mrs. Thurman and her co-workers served as advisors to the County Farm Bureau when it was organized 10 years ago, and the Extension agents are continuing to serve in that role. She also gives demonstrations or other assistance to the PTA, Garden Clubs, Federated Clubs, Farmers Home Administration, local utility companies and the agricultural committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

The home demonstration agent and her husband recently remodeled and redecored their family home. They applied all of the design principles to this project, making it into an attractive, convenient and comfortable home for themselves.

Mrs. Thurman will be remembered here as the former Miss Bernice Puckett.

Crop prospects for this area brightened considerably over the week-end when good rains fell over most of our immediate area.

The amounts varied considerably, even here in town, where rain gauges caught from an inch and a half to two and a half inches. Southwest of town the rain was lighter, measuring less than an inch, while northeast of town several reported that three inches of crop-saving fell. Flomot had already gotten a good rain several days earlier and they are pretty well set over there according to reports.

Monday night showers again fell over our vicinity, though they were mostly light with only about .20 being measured here in town. North of town the rain was reported to have been heavier.

Rainfall measurements here in town were as follows:  
August 8 — .05.  
August 9 — 1.50.  
August 12 — .10.

At the present time crops look very good here and farmers stand a good chance of coming up with another fine harvest. The cotton crop looks very good for the most part at the present time. There are reports of some worm and fleahoppers in the crops but there have been no reports of heavy infestations to date of boll weevils.

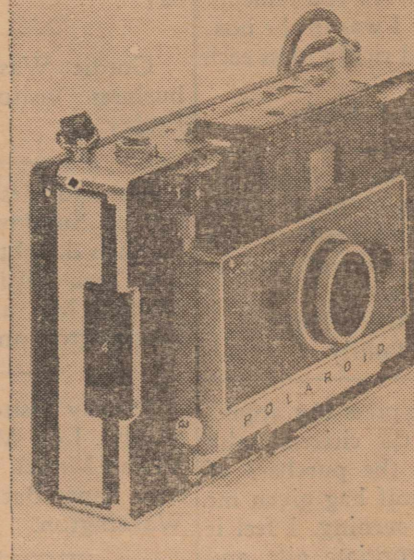
Slaton. Bro. Norris supplies churches in this area regularly.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
