## Cotton Referendum Set For December 10

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced a national marketing quota of 14,267,000 bales (standard bales of 500 pounds gross wt.) and a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres for the 1964 crop of upland cotton. In addition to the national acreage allotment, the Secretary also announced a national acreage reserve of 200,000 acres for the establishment of minimum farm

allotments as provided by law. December 10 has been set as the date for the referendum on 1964 upland cotton marketing quotas.

The 1964 national acreage allotment of 16 million acres is the smallest permitted under the present law in view of the supply-demand situation. A smaller national acreage allotment would be required for a better balance of supply with offtake.

Indicated production from the 1963 crop exceeds estimated disappearance for the 1963 - 64 season by 1.1 million bales. As a result, the carryover will increase to about 11.9 million bales as of August 1, 1964, as compared with about 10.7 million bales as of August 1, 1963.

It now appears that domestic consumption and exports for this year will be about 13.6 million bales and, unless new legislation is passed, this figure is not expected to change substantially for the next season.

Based on recent plantings, abandonment, and yield trends, the 1964 crop allotment of 16.2 million acres would produce more cotton than is expected to be used in the 1964-65 season. The prospects are for an increased carryover again on August 1, 1965.

The quota of 14,267,000 bales (standard bales of 500 pounds gross weight) is the result of converting the 16 million acre national allotment on the basis of a 4-year (1959-62) average yield of 428 pounds per acre.

The law provides that no State shall receive an allotment for upland cotton for 1964 which is less than the smaller of 4,000 acres or the highest acreage planted to cotton in the State in any of the years 1961, 1962, and 1963. The remainder of the national acreage allotment of 16 million acres is apportioned among other states on the basis of the acreages planted to cotton in the years 1958, 1959, 1960, 1961, and 1962, with adjustments in these acreages as required by law. ## Panthers Continue to Roll

Quitaque's High School basketball teams continue to break even in games played, with the Panthers rolling along with little opposition and the Pantherettes still having trouble finding the winning combination.

Last Friday night here in the local gym the Panthers took the measure of another mess of birds, the Price College Cardinals. 93-65, while the Pantherettes were losing to the St. Mary's Bluebirds 49-59.

Tuesday night in a doubleheader here the local teams entertained the Paducah High teams and split, with the Pantherettes falling 52-74 to a good team, while the Panthers flattened the Dragons 85-40 in a game that saw the starters play only a little over a quarter.

In Friday night's game the local lasses battled all the way before bowing to the Amarillo crew. Quitaque led 16-14 at the end of the first period of play, trailed by two, 25-27 at half time, and were behind 36-43 at the end of three quarters but rallied to trail only 46-49 early in the last quarter but could not hold the pace.

The Panthers found the going much easier after about half the first period was gone. The Cardinals stayed even the first minutes and knotted the count at 8-8 but from that point on it was not much of a contest. Quitaque led 20-12 at the first

quarter mark and 46-28 at the end of the half.

In Tuesday night's games the Pantherettes made a ballgame of it for more than a half but the Dragonettes started pulling away in the third period and were never slowed from there.

Once again the Panthers had easy pickings and it was evident from the opening whistle that the game would be no contest. The Quitaque lads built up a 23-8 first quarter lead, increased it to 37-17 and then Coach Gene King mercifully called off the cats and let the next year's team finish it out but they suddenly caught fire and went on a scoring spree of their own. The seven seniors on the squad outscored the Dragons 37-17 in about 12 minutes and the other five boys tallied 48 points and Paducah scored 23 against them in the remaining 20 minutes of the game.

The performance by the second team was heartening to local fans for it was the first time they had really had a chance to show their wares, although they did see action in the Price College game. The young Panthers, still unpolished of course, ran their play patterns well and, admittedly playing a weak team, nevertheless show that they will win a lot of ball games next year. Brightest spot of the evening's performance was that of

freshman Monte Stephens, who plays with the poise and coolness of a veteran. He must be considered one of the brightest prospects to come along in quite awhile. Monte took scoring honors for the evening with 17 points.

The Panthers now own a season record of 6 wins and 1 loss and the Pantherettes have won 1 and lost 6.

Friday night the local teams host the Hedley Owls and the Owlettes in a doubleheader in the local gym.

The Panthers took a close win over the Owls at Hedley two weeks ago but the Pantherettes tangled with probably the finest team they have met all season and they will have to be at their best to play with the Owlettes. The games will be good ones. Next Tuesday the local teams journey to Paducah to joust with the Dragons and Dragonettes again. The Friday night games will be the last home games until December 31.

M. L. Roberson accompanied O. R. to the Canadian affair.

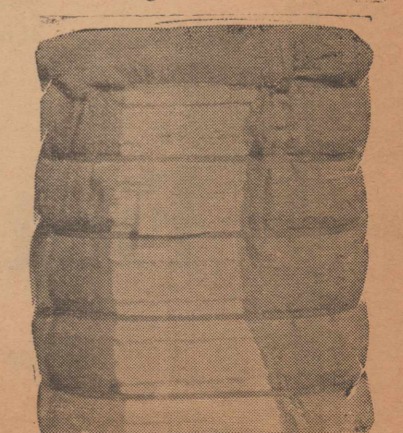

was apportioned for 1963. The 1964 upland cotton allotment for each state will be apportioned among counties and the county allotment among farms according to provisions of the law and regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. Notices of farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms prior to the referendum.

Farmers who were engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 will be eligible to vote in the national referendum on December 10, 1963, to determine whether marketing quotas — with marketing penalties on "excess" cotton produced — will be operative for the 1964 crop of upland cotton. At least two thirds of those voting must approve quotas if they are to continue in effect. (On the same day, a referendum on marketing


quotas for the 1964 crop of extra long staple cotton will be held in areas where this type is grown).

In 1964, if marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, price support will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments at such levels as is determined appropriate by the Secretary, after giving consideration to the various factors specified by law having to do with such things as supply and demand, availability of funds, the price levels for other commodities, etc. While no decision has as yet been made as to the level of the 1964-crop support price, it will, of course, be within the range provided by the law of between 65 and 90 percent of parity. The parity price of cotton is now 40.27 cents per pound.

If marketing quotas are not in effect for the 1964 upland cotton crop, the allotment program will remain in effect, and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

Under the 1964 quota program, growers who exceed their farm acreage allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 percent of the cotton parity as of June 15, 1964, on the farm's excess production of the crop. In addition, none of the upland cotton produced on the farm will be eligible for price support. In general, the farm marketing quota (which a farmer may market free of penalty) is the production from the farm's acreage allotment. Marketing quotas are in effect for the 1963 crop of upland cotton.
