## MANY HAVE LOOKED AT HALEY

The following article was written by Ben Ezzell, Editor of The Canadian Record, in his weekly column, "Spur of the Moment." Ben writes at length about J. Evetts Haley's book "A Texan Looks At Lyndon," a bit of writing that has been condemned by many who normally support and vote Republican. We were sent a copy of the book by a woman in Amarillo, of whom we have never heard. It is a dirty piece of writing, to say the least. We think Ben's column on the subject is worthwhile, regardless of the reader's party affiliation. It read as follows:

Since Evetts Haley dumped his load of garbage onto the press, and started his book-length libel of LBJ, "A Texan Looks at Lyndon," on the way to the political horizons, quite a few Texans . . . and some others . . . have been taking a long look at Haley.

What they have seen, and published, is by now getting at least as much coverage as Haley's own dark look . . . on a national scale . . . and the self-styled "historian" isn't looking so good.

A former Texas newsman, Jim Mathis, former Washington bureau chief for the Houston Post, took a long look at Haley the other day . . . and the results were published in the Tuesday afternoon edition of The Amarillo Globe-Times.

Mathis' look was comprehensive and unflattering . . . but sharply perceptive. He takes a long look backward at the series of defeats and frustrations which have made Evetts Haley the bitter man he has become, and concludes that Haley's book on President Johnson "is a logical outgrowth of what Haley has been and is."

"The deceitfulness of the writing can be readily understood and exposed," says Jim Mathis. "But the man who wrote the 254 pages, and those who circulate it with much gusto, represent the danger. Haley, the spare and sunburned rancher on a mustang, is the symbol sharpened arrow for the un-reasoning extremist as surely as President Johnson is a force and symbol for enlightened freedom and prudent government."

Life Magazine, taking a look at Haley, declared early this year that "In the category of crackpots, it would be difficult to outdo the destructive mischief of an organization called Texans for America. This is the invention of a wealthy West Texas rancher, who frankly advocates lynching Chief Justice Warren."

And Washington columnist Jack Anderson, taking a look at Haley's neighbor, Thornton Dewey, and declared that Dewey and his wife contributed substantially to the research and writing of the book . . . although no credit was given them. Using some of Haley's own tactics Anderson declares that Dewey "has contributed to the African Nazi party and has entertained its fucher, George Lincoln Rockwell, on the Dewey Ranch outside Canyon, Texas." Then he adds that "while Dewey was entertaining the Nazi leader, Haley brought Major General Edwin Walker to his ranch to urge him to run for governor in Texas. Anderson doesn't connect the two incidents any more closely than that . . . but then, Haley didn't connect Lyndon Johnson with the assassination of President John F. Kennedy any more closely than that, either."

Another who has been taking a close look at Haley has been Dr. E. S. James, editor of The Baptist Standard. Dr. James called Haley's book "political through and through" and said he saw "no reason to believe such a book makes any contribution to the spiritual welfare of readers." Southern Baptist bookstores have ordered the book removed from their shelves.

Another Texan who has looked at

Haley is A. C. Grene, editor of the Editorial Page of the conservative Dallas Times-Herald. Grene described Haley's book as "so outrageously, surreptitiously wrong that it is almost impossible to isolate the heavy sick aura of wrongness and define it . . . a book which will appall decent men of good will, even those who severely oppose Johnson the man and the president. The only fit word I can find for it is evil."

Tommy Thompson, editor of the Amarillo Globe-Times and a man of considerable acquaintance with Haley, has also taken a look at the historian, and describes him as a "disappointed, embittered and roughshod man with a talent for self-expression. Also he is a frustrated politician, a defeated candidate for governor, and a lost-cause man. The people of Texas can be grateful that they never had J. Evetts Haley for governor. We would be participating in the stone age, not the nuclear age."

So, since Haley took his much-publicized look at Johnson, quite a few people have been taking a look at Haley . . . and J. Evetts Haley hasn't come out looking any rosier in their views than LBJ did from Haley's peeking. There's a rough sort of frontier justice in that which Haley ought to appreciate but probably doesn't.

To Ben's story we add the following as reported in the LBJ - HHH Texas Campaigner this week: "The Chicago Tribune, one of the two large metropolitan dailies supporting Goldwater, briefly reviewed many of the political paperbacks last week in an article entitled 'Hatches With Soft Cover Sheaths.' The Trib said on the Haley book: 'A phantasmagoric diatribe in which President Johnson's name is linked with everything from vote theft to mysterious deaths. To the careful reader of either liberal or conservative persuasion, however, the author reveals far more about himself than about his subject.'"

The 1964-65 high school basketball season was opened here Tuesday night as the Panthers and Pantherettes took on the Owls and Owlettes of Hedley High School. The local teams dropped both games of the double header, the Pantherettes being nudged in the opener 36-30, and the brand-new Panthers went down 52-64.

Tuesday night's season opener games produced, at least for this reporter, a bit of disappointment and a pleasant surprise.

Most fans here sort of felt that the Pantherettes would win their season opener since they returned all but two from last year's team. However, the Pantherettes couldn't score consistently enough to pull the game out. Barbara Reagan kept the Quitaque team in the game with good free shooting, making 9 of 11 shots attempted.

Coach Gene King started the season's first game with Patricia Brunson, Devorah McKay and Barbara Reagan at forwards and Brenda Whittington, Donna Bedwell and Jill Johnson at guards. Freshmen Carol Meyers

and Shirley Dowd broke into the lineup during the first half and both youngsters performed very creditably and served notice on some of the older members of the squad that they intend to play this year and just might break into the starting lineup. The Pantherettes were jittery Tuesday night but they will settle down and will probably be pretty tough before the season is over. Barbara Reagan won scoring honors for the Pantherettes with 15 points; Patricia Brunson scored 6 points, Devorah McKay 5 and Carol Meyers made 4 points.

## All-Out Dessert With Fresh Bartletts



For that gala occasion when you want to go all-out on dessert, "Pear Melba Cheese Pie" is your ticket to culinary fame. It's a party-fancy dessert combining fresh California Bartlett pear halves, frozen raspberries and cream cheese in a well chilled treat for the eye and palate.

When buying fresh Bartletts this summer, look for yellow-skinned fruit if you want to use it in a recipe (or eat it out-of-hand) within a day or two. Green-skinned pears will turn yellow and become eating-ripe after a few days' storage in a paper bag at room temperature. Refrigerate them once they ripen.

### PEAR MELBA CHEESE PIE

3 fresh California Bartlett pears  
1 1/2 cups water  
2 1/2 cup sugar  
1 envelope plain gelatin  
1 package (10 oz.) frozen red raspberries

1 teaspoon lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese  
1/2 cup milk  
1 baked, cooled 9-inch pie shell

Pare, halve and core pears. In large shallow pan, combine water and 1/2 cup sugar; bring to boil. Add pears; cover and cook until fork-tender. Sprinkle gelatin over 1/4 cup syrup from raspberries to moisten. Remove pears from pan; cool. Stir 3/4 cup boiling pear liquid into gelatin. Add 1/4 cup sugar, lemon juice and salt; stir until dissolved. Blend in raspberries and their syrup. Chill until mixture mounds on spoon. Combine cheese and milk, reserving 1/4 cup; spread remainder into bottom of pie shell. Pour 2/3rds of gelatin mixture into shell. Top with pears cut-sides up. Cover with remaining gelatin mixture. Dollop reserved cheese into centers of pears. Chill until set. Makes 6 servings.

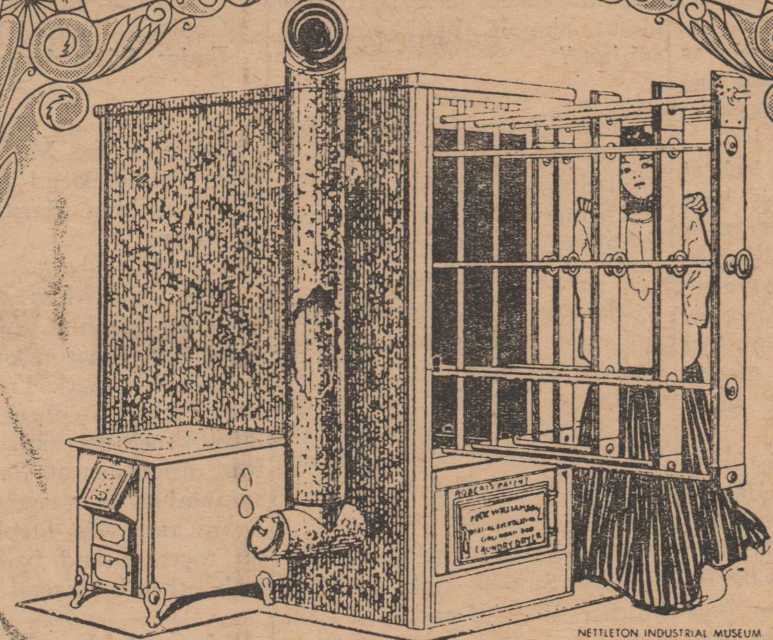

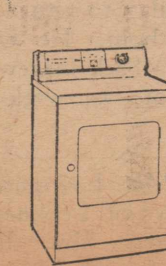
