Local Teams Are Playing In Silverton Tourney

Play begins today (Thurs.) in the Silverton Tournament and the Silverton Owls lead off against the Estelline Bearcubs to get the tournament rolling.

Quitauque's teams both get in today also, both teams to meet Flomot in first round action. The Pantherettes, who have some of their team members perhaps out of action due to illness, are scheduled to meet the Flomot lasses at 1:40 this afternoon. The Quitauque-Flomot boys game is scheduled for 3 o'clock this afternoon. Winners of the girls game will play at 7:40 Friday night and their opponent will be the winner of the Silverton-Estelline game.

Quitauque's High School basketball teams won opening round games in the Silverton tournament this afternoon.

The Pantherettes, winning their first game of the season, defeated Flomot 57-14.

The Panthers encountered a bit more opposition from the Longhorns, winning 60-47.

Both Quitauque teams play Silverton tomorrow night, the girls scheduled to begin firing at 7:40 and the boys game due to get underway at 9 o'clock.

The winner of the Panther-Longhorn contest will meet the winner of the Silverton-Estelline game, Friday night at 9 o'clock. Friday nights winners will be finalists Saturday night and will play upper bracket winners. Friday night losers will meet Saturday afternoon for third place. The girls game will be at 4:10 and the boys game at 6:30.

Upper bracket pairings in the girls division are Tula "B" and Dimmitt "B" and Turkey vs. Hedley. Quitauque, Flomot Estelline and Silverton make up the lower bracket.

The boys division of the tourney will lineup the same as the girls division with one exception. Upper bracket lineups are Plainview "B" vs. Dimmitt "B" and Turkey vs. Hedley. Lower brackets teams are Quitauque-Flomot and Silverton-Estelline. Thus, if the Panthers can make it to the finals they probably would get another crack at Hedley, one of the teams to beat the Panthers twice at the start of the season. The Panthers first must get by Flomot, which they will be favored to do, then probably Silverton in the semifinals. Although the Panthers own two victories over the Owls, Silverton won at home over Quitauque by 14 points, so the Panthers will find the Owls tough to beat.

Vice - Chairman Helms explained that every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allotment-quota program, so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all the voters. At issue in this year's vote also is the "domestic allotment" program provided by legislation last spring, under which growers may qualify for price-support payments—in addition to loans—by keeping their cotton acreage within the farm's domestic allotment.

Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those who engaged in the production of the upland cotton crop of 1964. Approval by at least two-thirds of the growers voting is necessary if the quotas and the domestic allotment program are to go into effect for the 1965 upland cotton crop.

Issues to be decided in the December 15 referendum are (1) quotas or no quotas, (2) the level of prices support to be available for the 1965 crop, and (3) whether the domestic allotment program is in effect for upland cotton.

If the vote is favorable, quotas will be in effect for the 1965 crop—with penalties on any excess cotton produced on a farm, price support to growers who do not exceed the farm's acreage allotment will be available at a level between 65 and 90 percent of parity, and extra price support in the form of payments may be earned by farmers who keep within the farm's domestic allotment.

If the vote is not favorable, there will be no quotas or penalties applicable to the 1965 upland cotton crop, no price-support payments, and the regular price support to growers who do not exceed their acreage allotments will be at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

Growers who have any question about any particular part of the cotton program are urged to get in touch with the ASC County Committee.

Panthers Take First At Kress Tournament

Quitauque's basketball teams had one of its finest week-ends ever, last Thursday Friday and Saturday as three first place prizes were won in tournament play.

Coach Ted Schwarz and his Junior High Pantherettes and Panthers created the biggest news by winning both the boys and girls championships in the Roaring Springs Tournament last week-end. Both of Coach Schwarz's teams are undefeated for the year. In fact the Junior High Panthers were also undefeated last season so their win streak goes way back.

No less satisfying to local fans, however, was the third championship won by local teams, that one being won by the QHS Panthers, first place in the Kress Tournament. Then Pantherettes continue to run in poor luck and were defeated in their first two games at Kress, and were eliminated.

The Panthers won over Olton 71-60 in the tourney finals Saturday night to capture first place. Saturday morning the Quitauque team had to down Silverton 74-67 to reach the finals.

Quitauque's first round foes, both boys and girls, were the Hale Center Owls and Owlettes.

The Pantherettes played the Owlettes a close game for the first half, trailing by only a three-point margin at the half-way point but fell victim to a 55-29 loss finally. The Pantherettes lost to Nazareth 57-28 in the second round of play to be eliminated from the tournament.

The Panthers fared better against Hale Center and won 68-58 with Warren Lee Merrell sparking the way with a 21 point barrage of the baskets, ably assisted by Eddie Monk, who dropped in 19 points.

The Saturday morning duel between the Panthers and Silverton Owls was a real donnybrook and was actually the championship game, we suppose, because as far as this reporter could tell, Quitauque and Silverton were the two best teams in the tourney.

The Panthers took an early lead over the Owls and maintained a small advantage until the second period was almost over. Silverton went ahead 31-30 here and they led until the end of the third quarter when the Panthers knotted the score at 54-54. Quitauque went ahead seconds after the beginning of the final period and were never headed thereafter. The Owls lost 4 players via fouls, although Quitauque was in foul trouble earlier and lost Jamie Johnson late in the fourth quarter, but not before he had scored in 29 points to win scoring honors for the game. Eddie Monk was playing with four fouls, as was Larry Tipton;

Warren Lee Merrell and Monte Stephens each were carrying 3 fouls and Dale Ramsey 1, so the Owls were not the only ones who were drawing fouls.

The 71-60 score in the finals against Olton was not a true indication of the game for it was not actually that close.

The Panthers, after their typical slow start, went ahead midway of the first quarter and were never in any trouble and at one time built a 19 point edge over the class-AA Musangs. Jamie Johnson almost matched his morning score in

the Silverton contest, popping the nets for 28 points. Monte Stephens had a very good night all around and scored 14 points.

Hart won the first place trophy in the girls division, defeating the Hale Center Owlettes in the finals. The Silverton Owls and Owlettes won both third place trophies. Girls Consolation was won by Nazareth and Boys Consolation was won by Hale Center.

Jr. High Teams Both Win First Place

Two first place trophies were brought back from Roaring Springs Dec. 5, one by the boys and one by the girls of Quitauque Junior High.

On Thursday, December 3, both teams met Crosbyton, the girls winning by a score of 27-11. Crosbyton girls made only two field goals, the rest being free throws. Sherry Stark led the scoring in this game with 13 points, Barbara Chandler made 10, and Jo Beth Merrell added 4.

The boys won 47-22. Roland Hamilton showed his stuff with 18 points, Lyn Payne added 13 points to that, Johnnie Pointer and David Brunson each had 6, Oliver Clark 2, and Clemente Leal tossed in 1.

The Pantherettes had an exciting game with Flomot Friday night, winning by a margin of 34-32. Sherry Stark again led in scoring with 24 points, Jo Beth Merrell was next with 7 and Barbara Chandler added 5 points.

On the same Friday, the Quitauque boys beat Guthrie in a 46-16 victory. Roland Hamilton and Johnny Pointer each contributed 12 points to the total, David Brunson added 7, Barry Johnson 6, Lyn Payne had 5 points and Jerry Merrell and Bruce McWilliams each tossed in 2.

The finalists were Roaring Springs girls and Paducah boys, each going against the team Quitauque.

The Junior Pantherettes won over the Roarings Springs girls by a score of 44-31. The Pantherette guards did a fine job on the Roaring Springs forwards. Once again Sherry Stark led the way in the scoring department with 23 points, followed by Barbara Chandler with 12 and Joe Beth Merrell, who chalked up 9 points.

Roland Hamilton tossed in 17 points in the boys finals of the tournament as the young Panthers won over Paducah 48-22. Johnnie Pointer and Lyn Payne each aided the cause with 11 points each, David Brunson scored 6 points, Roger Brunson 2, and Barry Johnson made

a free throw in the last second of play. Thus each team received a first place trophy.

After a bit of confusion on Monday night, December 7, with Estelline ending up in Quitauque and Quitauque in Estelline, the Jr. High teams took two games at Estelline.

The girls from Quitauque won 39-33 with Stark scoring 24, Merrell 8 and Chandler 7.

The Panthers took a win also, the B team playing most of the way. The boys racked up 62 points to Estelline's 6. The Estelline boys were only able to make two field goals.

Barry Johnson scored 26 big points to lead the Panthers. Oliver Clark was next with 8, Bruce McWilliams and Roland Hamilton each added 6, and Lyn Payne, Clemente Leal, Johnnie Pointer and David Brunson each tossed in 4 points.

The games with Silverton, scheduled for next Monday night, December 14, have been postponed until Monday, Jan. 25. The next Jr. High games will be our Jr. High Tournament on December 17, 18, 19.

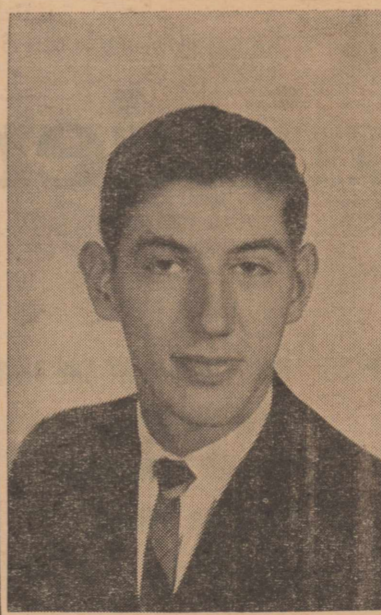
First game of the tournament will be between Tula and Lockney girls at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Congressman Walter Rogers' Newsletter

THE PRESIDENT'S PROGRAM

I thought you might be interested in a brief look at recommendations the President possibly will make to the 89th Congress when he delivers his State of the Union and other messages early next year.

SPENDING: President Johnson has announced he is determined to keep the budget below \$100 billion for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1965. The Bureau of the Budget is completing work on the budget he will submit, but, as you know, no funds may be spent unless

Congress grants the appropriations.

EDUCATION: The President is known to favor extending federal aid to education at all levels. One of his proposals may call for expanding Government grants for teacher training and school construction.

FARM PROGRAM: Several programs formulated by the Department of Agriculture are being reviewed by the Bureau of the Budget. It is likely that the President will urge a continuation of present commodity programs, although he has made it clear that he wants to search

our present feed grains, wheat, cotton and other programs for those elements which need to be strengthened and improved. President Johnson has said the Administration will emphasize the importance of the choice farmers have in regard to commodity programs, to continue and improve them or eliminate them altogether. He said he intends for the choice to rest with the farmers.

Defense: Continued strengthening of the Nation's defense posture will be urged by the President and certainly supported by the Congress. About the need for strong defense there is no argument. Our strength now is mighty; by mid-1965 it is expected the United States will hold a lead of more than 5 to 1 over the Soviet Union in the long-range missile race. Our military capability is designed to meet Communist aggressive challenges in whatever form

they develop. That is the way it will be maintained.

TAXES: President Johnson will urge Congress to repeal the excise taxes on cosmetics, furs, jewelry, luggage and handbags—with an estimated saving to consumers of approximately \$524 million per year. In addition, the President is expected to ask Congress to cut many of the excises on manufactured goods and the tax on theater and concert tickets. Being reviewed for possible repeal are taxes on such items as automobiles, cameras, radio and television sets, appliances, and sporting goods. Part of the purpose in revising excises is the same as that behind the 1964 reduction in personal and corporate income taxes: To return capital to the private sector of the economy to increase the rate of business investment and consumer spending.

"MEDICARE": President Johnson has said that he will recommend some form of tax-supported system to provide health care for retired persons. The form the proposal will take is not as yet clear.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS: President Johnson will advocate a "tough line" as the Cold War continues—strengthening the Western alliance, further isolating Cuba militarily and economically, continued support for South Viet Nam and possibly a step-up of our military involvement there, a review of foreign aid with the possibility that he will advocate dropping assistance to so-called "neutral" and "non-aligned" nations.

NATURAL RESOURCES: The President is expected to recommend expanded efforts to

desalt sea water and brackish water, several large multiple-purpose reclamation projects in Western States, stepped-up water resources planning with Federal-State cooperation, several new units in the National Park system, and, possibly, an expanded exploration program to determine the extent of mineral resources of all types in areas of the United States where exploration has been at a minimum.

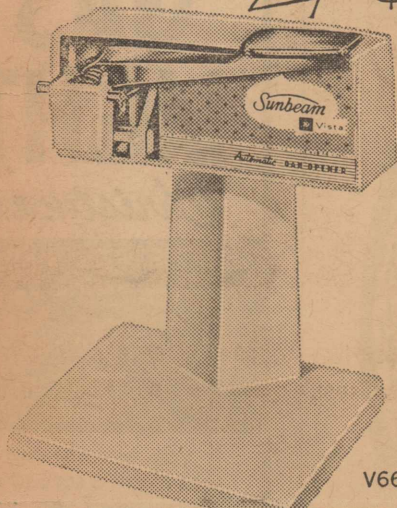

COTTON QUOTAS UP FOR VOTE DEC. 15
The cotton quota vote coming up on Dec. 15 will mark

the twelfth consecutive year in which growers have voted on marketing quotas for their upland cotton crop. W. E. Helms, Vice - Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation of the Briscoe County Committee said today.

"Beginning with the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1954 crop, growers have approved quotas for each year's cotton crop," he stated. "In the vote last year, on quotas for the 1964 upland cotton crop, 94 percent of the growers voting approved to quotas."

By law, quotas must be proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture in years when the cotton supply exceeds normal. The estimated 1964-65 total supply of upland cotton exceeds the normal supply by 41 percent.

The carryover of upland cotton on August 1 of this year was 12.1 million bales. With 1964-crop yields indicated at a record high of 522 pounds per acre, domestic usage plus exports during this marketing year is expected to be less than the 1964 crop, and the carryover is expected to increase to about 12.6 million bales by August 1, 1965. A carryover this size has been exceeded only once—in 1956.

For 1965, the Chairman explained, Briscoe County has a total of 25,441.2 acres available for allotment to growers on which to grow their upland cotton crop. This represents the County's share of the national acreage allotment of 16 million acres (the smallest permitted under law), plus 200,000 acres from the national acreage reserve to take care of minimum farm allotments. Notices of individual farm allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms in advance of the December 15 referendum.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum approve quotas for the 1965 upland cotton crop, price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to growers who keep their acreage within the farm's "domestic allotment," and marketing quota penalties will apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose quotas for the 1965 crop, the regular allotment program will remain in effect, and price support will be

available to growers who do not exceed their acreage allotments at 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

All farmers engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1964 are eligible to vote in the December 15 referendum.


