COTTON PRICE SUPPORT ELIGIBILITY EXPLAINED

Cotton growers, especially those on the larger farms, who want to take part in the 1965 domestic allotment program should be careful this year to carry out all their program intentions. Chairman Louie Kitchens, of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Briscoe County Committee said today.

The program sign-up now under way in the Briscoe County ASCS County Office applies only to operators of farms where the domestic allotment is less than the effective allotment; generally, this means farms with effective allotments of more than 15 acres. Operators of arms with allotments of 15 acres or less where no acreage is released do not need to sign up; they will receive all benefits of the domestic allotment program if they just keep their cotton acreage within the farm's allotment. (For these smaller - allotment farms, the domestic allotment is the same as the effective allotment.)

Benefits of the domestic allotment program include price-support loans and payments. The loans will be based on 29 cents a pound for Middling 1-inch cotton, gross weight, at average location. The payments will be figured on 4.35 cents a pound on the normal yield of cotton established for the farm times the acreage planted for harvest.

According to the chairman, certain provisions of this year's domestic allotment program differ somewhat from last year's. In 1964, a domestic allotment program was available to upland cotton growers, but no sign-up was held. While the additional price support payment for 1964 was available only if the acreage was within the farm's effective allotment (which was somewhat larger than the domestic allotment for farms with effective allotments of more than 15 acres.)

This provision has been changed for 1965, and eligibility for both types of price-support—for growers who sign up to take part in the domestic allotment program — will depend on meetings all provisions of the program, including keeping the cotton acreage within the domestic allotment. Another program provision for such participating growers is staying within the farm's feed grain base.

The domestic allotment program sign-up will extend through March 26. Where requested, advance payments amounting to half of the estimated price-support payment will be made to operators signing up on the program.

Only growers on farms participating in the domestic allotment program will be eligible for additional price support in the form of payments; the price support loans will be available not only on cotton from these farms but also on cotton from farms which are not signed up in the domestic allotment program but where the acreage is kept within the farm's effective allotment.

Panthers Take Fourth

Quitaque's Panthers wound up in fourth place at the regional tournament held at Canyon last week-end, losing to Adrian, 44-80 in the tussle for the third place trophy.

Saturday morning the Panthers were trounced in the semi-finals by Meadow, the team that went on to defeat McAadoo in the finals and advance to the state tourney at Austin. The score in the Meadow-Quitaque game was 80-48.

Friday night the Panthers took a 72-62 win over a very fine Darrouzzett team, and in doing so stamped themselves as a very definite threat for the Region I title. However, this was not to be as Eddie Monk, one of the mainstays of the Panthers and also one of the top scorers, injured an ankle in the closing moments of Friday night's game and by Saturday morning the ankle was so sore he could barely walk and was out of action for the remainder of the tournament. This loss demoralized the Panthers to such an extent that they could never approach their Friday night's sharpness.

The Darrouzzett team was one of the better teams that the Panthers met all year and the game between the two teams was the most exciting game of the first round of play. The score was tied at the end of the first period, 14-14. At the halfway mark the Darrouzzett crew had taken a one-point margin to lead 32-31.

The Longhorns pushed their lead to five points early in the third quarter but Quitaque tied the count at 38-38, then Eddie Monk pulled one of his famous steals and put the Panthers out in front at the halfway point of the third quarter. The score was tied twice more before the Panthers went ahead to stay and led 53-47 at the end of the third quarter. The Longhorns were getting in foul trouble and Quitaque was taking advantage of their one-and-one opportunities. The Panthers played it cool during the fourth quarter, making the Longhorns press in trying to catch up and fouling in the process.

Warren Lee Merrell, playing probably the finest game of his career, had a perfect night at the free throw line, hitting 8 for 8, and adding 7 field goals for a 22 point total to lead the scoring parade for the Panthers. Jamie Johnson hit for 20 points, Eddie Monk 15, Larry Tipton 8, and Monte Stephens tallied 7 points.

Lonnie McDonald filled in for Eddie Monk in the Saturday games. In the game for third place honors Coach Gene King used all of his squad during last quarter with Dale Ramsey, Walter Taylor, Rex Harmon, Lupe Leal and Nestor Cavazos seeing action.

Jamie Johnson and Eddie Monk were selected on the 10-man all-regional team. Every one of the five starters were picked on a least one all-tournament team this year, which is something that doesn't happen often.

The Panthers thus, ended a very successful season with a 26-11 record. The entire community is proud of the record of the Panthers and Pantherettes and extend to Coach King and both teams the heartiest of congratulations.

EXAMINATION TO BE HELD FOR QUITAQUE POSTMASTER

An examination for Postmaster at Quitaque, Texas, \$6140 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until March 23, 1965, the Commission announced today. Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least 1½ years of experience (education above high school level may be substituted for 9 months of experience) showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, creed, color, or national origin. Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

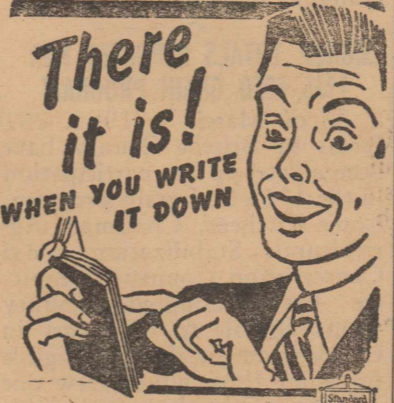

SIGNUP TOTALS REPORTED FOR 1965 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

As of March 1, 1965, 201 farms in Briscoe County have been signed up for participation in the 1965 feed grain program. Louie Kitchens, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee has announced. County farms eligible to take part in the program total 485. Eligible farms are those which grew one or more of the three feed grains—corn, sorghum or grain sorghum—during the program's base year, 1959 and 1960.

County feed grain acreage signed up for diversion through the program now totals 13,585 acres, including 35 acres of corn, 12,735.5 acres of grain sorghum and 815 acres of barley. The diversion will be from base acreages of 32,748.0 acres or 41.5 percent of the base, on the signed farms. Base acreage for all eligible feed grain farms in Briscoe County totals 61,667 acres.

The chairman explains that the 1965 feed grain program in general is similar to that for 1964. Growers may participate by diverting at least 20 percent of their feed grain base acreage and devoting it to conserving use (or they may plant specified substitute crops upon request, with a reduction in diversion payments). In return, they become eligible for acreage diversion payments, price - support payments, and loans on their entire 1965 production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley.

This year, for the first time, eligible feed grain and wheat cropland acreage may be substituted provided producers sign

TURKEY POST OFFICE TO MOVE TO NEW LOCATION

A contract has been awarded to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hedrick, P. O. Box 95, Estelline, Texas to lease a building to the Post Office Department at the north side of Main Street between Fourth & Fifth Streets, to improve postal operations in Turkey, Texas. Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced recently.

"This project is in accordance with our policy of building new post offices only where they are urgently needed," Mr. Gronouski said. "We are constantly re-assessing our construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of our expanding mail volume. We now have about 45,000 postal locations throughout the country handling an anticipated volume of 72.2 billion pieces of mail for the 1964-1965 fiscal year. By 1970 it is expected to rise to 90 billion. Our employees are doing a great job of processing mail. But it is clear that if we are to meet

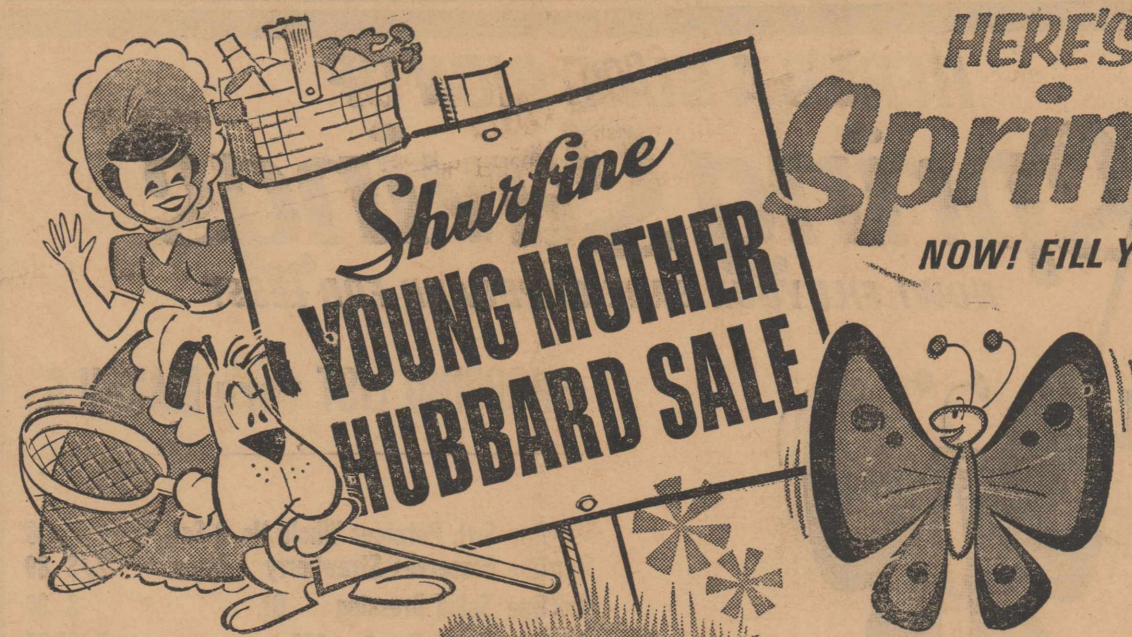
