The Foundation feels that flame cultivation offers a great potential in reducing the loss due to moisture uptake of weeds. Weed control by the use of heat also is an aid in cutting the cost of production as a safe, economical, and effective method that will not lower the quality of the crops grown in the West-Texas area.

Jack Parks, Flame Cultivation Engineer for the Foundation, reports that flame can be used to control weeds and save the farmer money if used properly. Flame should not be used as a salvage too for crops.

"If the use of heat as a means of controlling weeds is a planned part of the farmers program, he can cut his cost of crop production." Parks further says, The use of heat is also being used late in the year as a harvest aid. The dessication of green foliage of grain sorghum at harvest time has proven to be a good practice to make more net return from a given crop.'





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
