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Grover Grundy Dies In Amarillo

Funeral services for I. G. Grundy, 78, of 211 W. 31st St. in Amarillo were held at 2 p. m. Monday in Griggs Pioneer Chapel in Amarillo.

Mr. Grundy died Saturday morning at his home in Amarillo. He had been in failing health for several years.

Officiating at the funeral service was the Rev. Lester Hill, associate pastor of the Polk Street Methodist Church. Burial was in Llano Cemetery. Pallbearers were Alton Johnson, James Brunson, James Davidson, Bert Grundy, Bill Woods and Clayton Johnson.

Isaac Grover Grundy was born in Stevenson County and came to Quitaque from Whitesboro with his family in 1928.

Mr. Grundy managed a gin here in Quitaque for a number of years. He became distributor for Gulf Oil Corp. during the middle 1930's. After retiring from that business, he and Mrs. Grundy bought and operated a variety store here until 1962, when they sold it and moved to Amarillo.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Jack of Houston; one daughter, Mrs. Willie Mae Witten, of Amarillo; one sister; four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

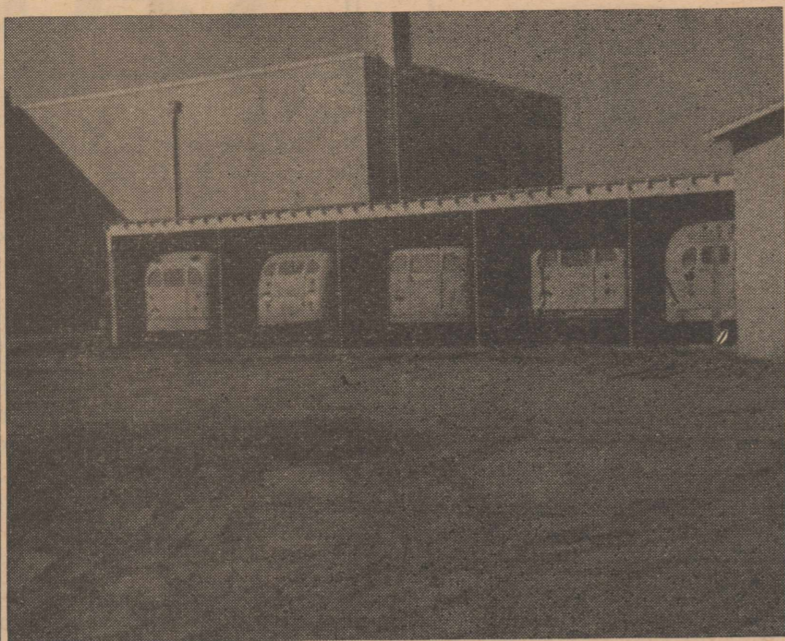

SMALL BUSINESS CENTER OKAYED FOR ASPERMONT

Aspermont Small Business Development Center, the first such office approved for Texas and the first rural project in the nation, will receive a grant of \$29,890 from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The grant went to the Small Business Development Corp. of Aspermont, headed by Afton Willingham of Paducah, Willingham, in cooperation with Stonewall County Chamber of Commerce, organized the development to serve a 15 county area.

The center will approve loans up to \$25,000 to private or small businesses, with an interest rate of between 4 and 5 1/2 percent.

First National Bank of Aspermont will act as depository for the office. Local banks will be able to participate in the loans from 10 to 100 per cent. They will be protected by a government guarantee.

Although the national average on such loans is \$8,000, the Aspermont center will be authorized to loan up to \$25,000.

Counties to be served from the center are Childress, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Fisher, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Hall, Stonewall, Motley and Briscoe.

Three board members from each county will screen applicants from their own county before the loans are presented to the entire board. The three board members from Briscoe County are C. E. Barrett, LeRoy Hamilton and L. B. Monk.

DRAMA HELPS SWELL PARKS ATTENDANCE

Canyon — While fishermen, campers, and water sports fans packed state parks in record numbers this year, persons interested in the state's cultural background likewise were making history.

This was reflected in the comparatively modest installation at the Palo Duro Canyon State Park Amphitheater near here.

Despite substantial enlargement of the theater's seating capacity — from 1,000 to 1,300 — standing-room-only crowds several times were present. This occurred twice on

the week-end of September 3-5, with a Friday night attendance of 1,418 and a Sunday night count of 1,501.

Total summer patronage was 35,938, including many visitors from Oklahoma and New Mexico as well as from places around the world.

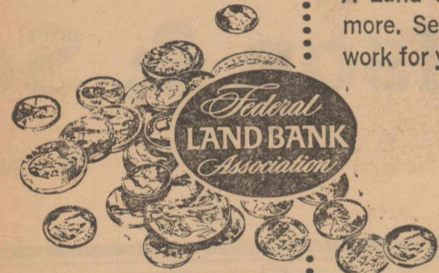

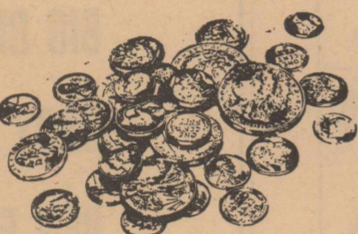

LOCKNEY GENERAL HOSPITAL SCHOOL OF VOCATIONAL NURSING TO OPEN JANUARY 3, 1966

Vocational nursing could be a rewarding and fulfilling career for you. The vocational nurse will be trained to work under the direction of the Physician or the supervision of the Registered Professional Nurse.

With the construction of two new nursing homes and proposed new hospital in our area, the shortage of nursing personnel could become acute.

The course offered is twelve months in length. At the end of the twelve-month period, the student is required by state law

to take and pass an examination given by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners before she may become a Licensed Vocational Nurse. The student will work and attend classes 8 hours a day for 5 days each week. All classes and instruction will be held in the hospital.

2 tablespoons fat.
Water.

Sift flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in fat. Add water to make dough stiff.

Roll out ¼-in. thick, 4-in. triangles or squares. Fry in hot fat.

SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

Widows may now qualify at age 60, instead of age 62

the deceased husband, according to monthly social security benefits based on the earnings of Hal Geldon District Manager of the Amarillo social security office.

The amount of the benefit is reduced if the widow is under 62 when benefits start, and the reduction continues after age 62. On the average, however, the widow who begins her benefits before 62 receives about the same total over the years, but in smaller payments made over a longer period of time, Geldon explained.

Widow's benefits are based on a percentage of the retirement benefit that her deceased husband would have received at 65. The benefit is 82½ percent at age 62, 71½ percent at age 60.

The widow must make her own decision as to whether or not she wants to begin her benefits before age 62. Geldon added, however, that social security representatives will be glad to give detailed information so the claimant may make an informed decision.

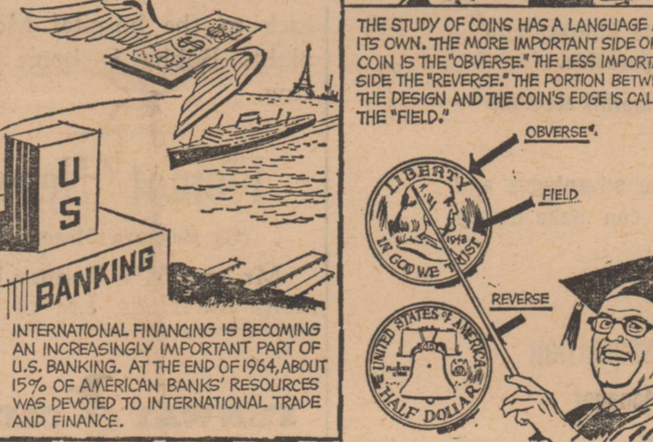
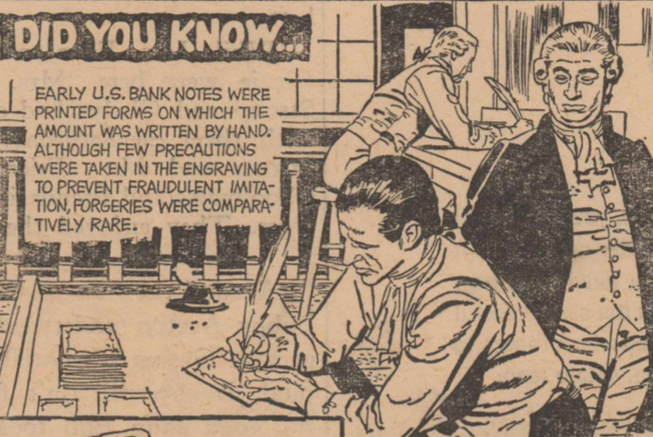

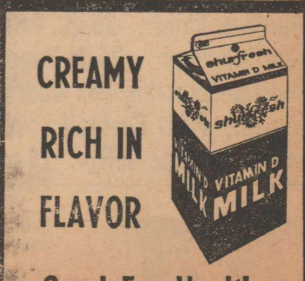
