I am going to try to contact each one of you personally before the Democratic Primary on May 7.

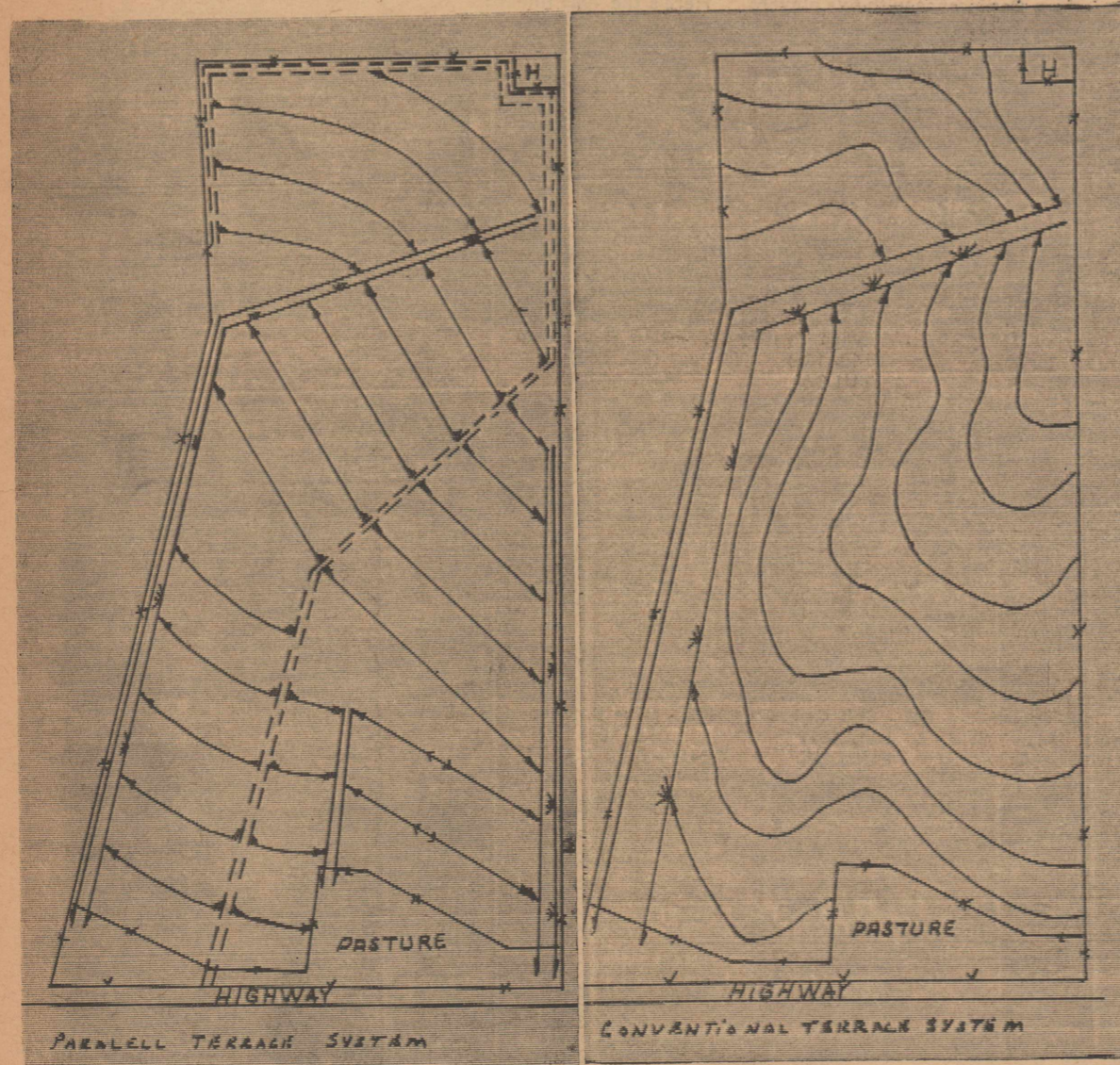
If there is ever a time that I can be of service to any one of you, please feel free to call on me. I will do my very best to serve. I have really enjoyed serving as your commissioner.

PARALLEL TERRACES OFFER SEVERAL ADVANTAGES



Terraces are still one of the most useful and most needed conservation practices. In past years, it is difficult to estimate the miles of terraces that were constructed within the county. However, with the increase in irrigation, terraces disappeared and were replaced with irrigation furrows, washing away the topsoil that had been held in place by the terraces that had been removed. Even on land that was not under irrigation, terraces began to disappear. The reason for the disappearance of the terraces was simple. It is impossible to irrigate properly in terraces when confronted by

point rows, and in most cases the terraces were constructed on a level grade and the water would not run. A problem for the dryland farmer is that you cannot use modern four and six row equipment on the terraced areas that are irregular in size and shape.

Today, the conventional terrace system is being replaced by a system of uniform parallel terraces that keep the soil in place while providing drainage to keep down wet spots that are prevalent with conventional terrace system. As can be seen in the pictures above, the parallel

terraces offer a uniform horizontal spacing that can be laid out to fit modern equipment, thereby making possible faster and easier cultivation without the inconvenience of point rows.

Cost share assistance for the construction of parallel terraces is available thru the Great Plains Conservation Program. If you are interested in the construction of terraces for your farm or desire more details about parallel terraces, contact your local Soil Conservation Service office. They will be happy to be of service.

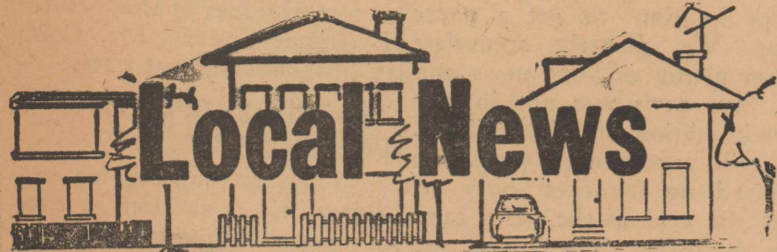

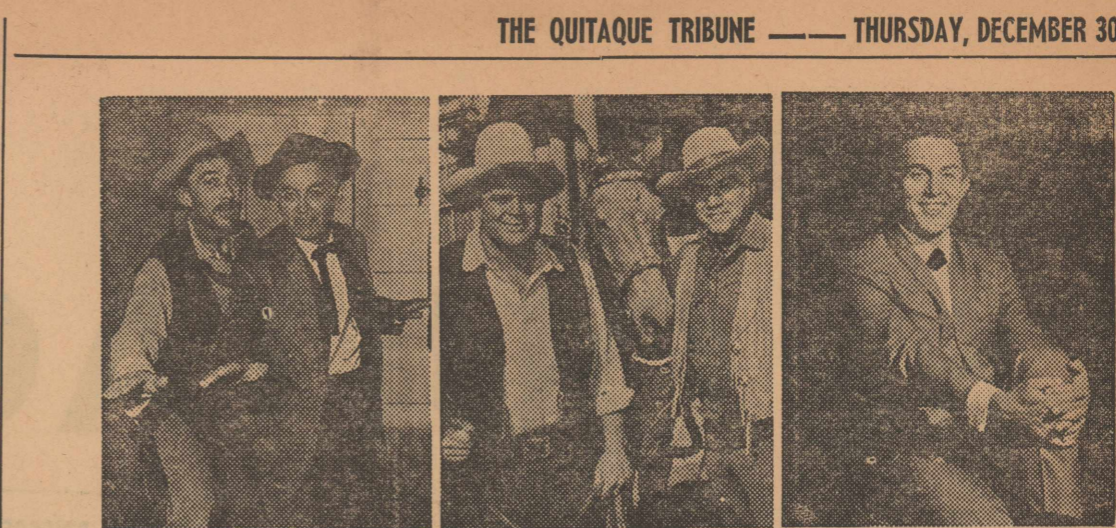

Joys of Golden Age . . .

After 65 Things Are Less Taxing

If you're one of the thousands of Americans who reached age 65 last year, you may have learned one of the fiscal joys of reaching that golden age—more liberal income tax allowances.

For the first time in your life, your drug and medicine bill, as well as your medical expenses, are completely and delightfully deductible. Samuel Boardman, director of Retirement Planning for Continental Casualty Company, reminds taxpayers that the 1964 Revenue Act dropped the limitation on medicine and drugs beginning with 1964's tax return.

Also, as an added incentive for people who reach 65, Uncle Sam permits an extra \$600 exemption, or \$1200, Boardman points out. On a separate return this additional exemption is also allowed for the spouse of the taxpayer, if the spouse has no gross income and is not claimed as a dependent by another taxpayer. And it is allowed on a joint return no matter how much income the spouse made, if the spouse is at least 65.

Actually, Boardman points out, a person who celebrated his 65th birthday on New Year's Day of this year is eligible as an "over-65" taxpayer for 1964. "An individual is assumed to have reached the age of 65 the

first moment of the day before his 65th birthday," Boardman stated.

Most people, regardless of age, are aware that where there is total blindness, an additional \$600 exemption is allowed. However, Boardman states, older people, whose eyesight is extremely weak to the point of their being "partially" blind, may not realize that they may also claim this additional exemption.

Where central visual acuity does not exceed 20/200 (20/20 is normal) in the better eye with correcting glasses, or where the widest diameter of the visual field "subtends an angle no greater than 20 degrees," for tax purposes, the taxpayer is considered partially blind. He is eligible to claim the additional \$600 exemption. A statement on the condition of the taxpayer's eyesight must be attached to the tax return, Boardman said.
