## KELLY COCHRAN INJURED IN STREET ACCIDENT

Kelley Cochran, 7-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Cochran, is reported to be in good condition in Hall County Hospital at Memphis where she rushed after being struck by a pickup in front of the Federal Land Bank office Wednesday evening about 6:45.

According to witnesses who saw the accident, Kelley waited on the north side of the street for a couple of vehicles headed west to go by, then apparently failed to see the pickup that was headed in an easterly direction and darted in front of it. Fortunately, the vehicle was traveling slowly but the driver was unable to stop before hitting the child. The vehicle did not pass over her.

Kelley's father said early Thursday morning that she had a rather severe bruise behind her ear and a knot on her head, but they were not believed at that time to be serious. He hoped that Kelley would be able to come home today but it was not certain at that time that she would.

(Later word was that Kelley suffered a slight concussion and the doctor would keep her at least today for observation.)

## County Museum To Open January 23

The Briscoe County Museum opening has been set for Sunday, Jan. 23rd. The museum is part of the RAMPS (Recording, Appreciation, Marking, Preservation and Survey of History) of the Texas Historical Society.

The Briscoe County Historical Society will have its first meeting of the new year on January 13 instead of January 27, which is the regular meeting date. The meeting will be held in the County Courtroom at 7:00 p. m.

The meeting was changed to this earlier date in order that plans can be made to put the finishing touches to the Museum, which is to have its opening on Sunday, January 23.

The museum will be open from now until the 23rd from 1:30 to 4 in the afternoon to those who wish to bring anything to be put on exhibit or be used in the museum. If anyone has any of these things but is unable to have them at the museum at these hours, please call Mrs. C. O. Allard, Phone 2451, Silverton, and she will see that they are picked up.

All members and interested persons are urged to be at the meeting on Thursday, Jan. 13. Historical items are being recorded daily. On the "Condition of Deposit" articles are deposited with the following understanding:

1. The article remains the property of the lender and is subject to withdrawal at any time, except as hereinafter provided.

2. Any object received by the museum as a loan will be delivered within a period of one month upon a written request of the lender or his authorized representative, and upon presentation of the receipt.

3. In case of death of the lender, the legal representative of the deceased shall notify the director of the museum forthwith giving his full name and address in writing.

4. The museum reserves the privilege of exhibiting any object given or loaned to it in the manner, time and place which it considers most appropriate and useful to its program.

5. The museum will give to these articles while in its custody the same care they would receive if they were its property, but it assumes no responsibility in case of loss or damage from any cause.

6. The museum does not carry insurance, but special arrangements for insurance will be made on the written request of the lender and at his expense.

7. Should the museum at any time desire to terminate its obligation with reference to these articles or any of them, the owner may be notified that they must be withdrawn in thirty days, and if not so withdrawn, they shall become absolute property of the museum.

The Museum is located in the basement of the county courthouse in the old club-room.

Also being accepted are historical documents, old letters, photos, etc. A showing of older family items on short loan is planned for opening day.

## 1966 GREAT PLAINS CONSERVATION PROGRAM APPROVED

The 1966 Great Plains Conservation Program has been approved. Cost sharing will be based on local average costs that have been approved by the Board of Supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District and the Briscoe County Great Plains Conservation Program committee. Cost sharing will be offered on the following practices:

Irrigation Pipeline, 50 percent cost share.

Land Leveling, 50 percent cost share.

Standard and Parallel Terraces, 70 percent cost share.

Diversion Terrace, 70 percent cost share.

Waterway, 80 percent cost share.

Range Seeding, 80 percent cost share.

Pasture Planting, 80 percent cost share.

Erosion Control Dams and Structures, 70% cost share.

Ponds for Livestock Water, 50 percent cost share.

Wells for Livestock Water, 50 percent cost share.

Pipelines for Livestock Water, 50 percent cost share.

Water Storage Facilities, 50 percent cost share.

Cross Fences To Improve Grazing Distribution, 50 percent cost share.

Brush Control, 50 percent cost share.

Cost sharing under the Great Plains Conservation Program is based on a conservation plan for the entire farm or ranch. A Great Plains Conservation Program contract assists landowners to apply all needed conservation practices on his land.

G.P.C.P. participants who earn cost share on irrigation systems will not be eligible for A.C.P. assistance on the same irrigation systems until their Great Plains Conservation Programs are completed. Then G.P.C.P. participants who desire A.C.P. cost share on an irrigation system installed with G.P.C.P. cost share will be considered as any other applicant for A.C.P. cost share.

## Walter Rogers Blasts Freeman

Congressman Walter Rogers said Monday that if Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman isn't going to administer the new farm legislation according to the understanding Congress has of the Farm Bill, he should resign or be fired.

Mr. Rogers said "Congress, at the request of the Secretary of Agriculture and with his recommendations passed a bill that would, in my opinion, work very well if properly administered. But instead of administering it as we in Congress understood it would be, Freeman promptly adopted a lot of rules and regulations contrary to the bill." Rogers went on to say that it borders on dishonesty on Freeman's part and cited the skip-row cotton and micro-naire issues as examples. It was, according to Rogers, understood that he was going to leave those issues alone and instead adopted regulations contrary to the understanding.

Mr. Rogers said the micro-naire grading methods are a penalty to the cotton farmer and nothing in the world but a windfall for the textile mills. He added that it was unfair to the farmer and cuts his income just as the regulations concerning skip-row farming do.

Rogers said it was the hope that the Secretary of Agriculture would carry out his commitments to Congress and if the people working for him are putting new rules and regulations into effect, and Freeman isn't aware of them, he should fire them. If he does know about them, then he should resign himself, Rogers said.

Congressman Rogers stated that Freeman can look forward to a lot of trouble from Congress on these issues and added that Congress could introduce legislation that would do away with the present farm bill "if we have to."

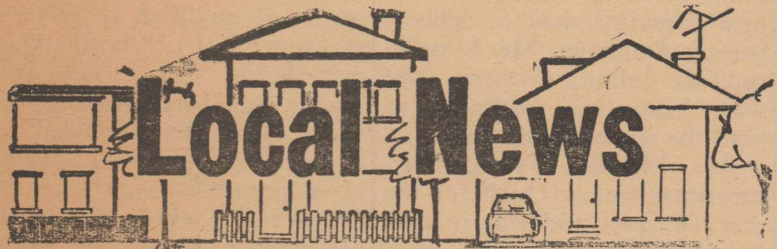

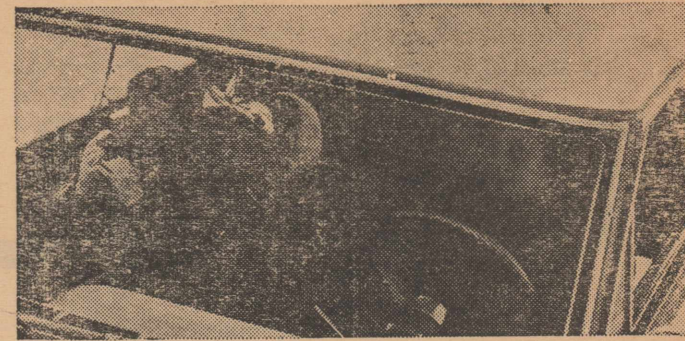

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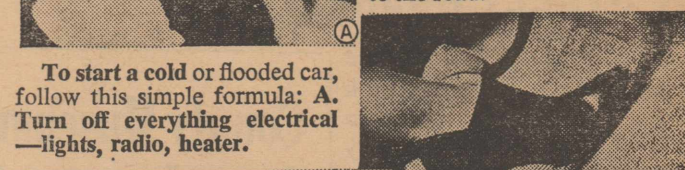
## KEEP ROLLING THIS WINTER



There are several cardinal rules for driving on ice and snow:

1. Keep moving so you won't spin or get stuck. 2. Use low gear sparingly. 3. Stay several extra car lengths behind the driver ahead. 4. Avoid abrupt stops. (Sudden braking can throw you into a serious skid.)

Train the children not to interfere with your driving. In the wintertime, particularly, you need to give all your attention to the road.



To start a cold or flooded car, follow this simple formula: A. Turn off everything electrical — lights, radio, heater.



B. With the car in neutral, push the accelerator to the floor, hold, count slowly to 10. C. Try the starter in bursts of two or three seconds.

If nothing happens, wait, then repeat A, B, and C. Once the car starts, press the accelerator hard till the motor roars and there's no danger it will die.

If your door lock freezes, just the warmth of your hand or breath on the lock may unfreeze it. Otherwise, warm the key with a cigarette lighter, a match, or hot water and work it around in the lock until ice melts.

Other winter problems, like stalling due to carburetor icing, can be avoided by using seasonally controlled gasoline and other automotive products made by companies like American Oil.

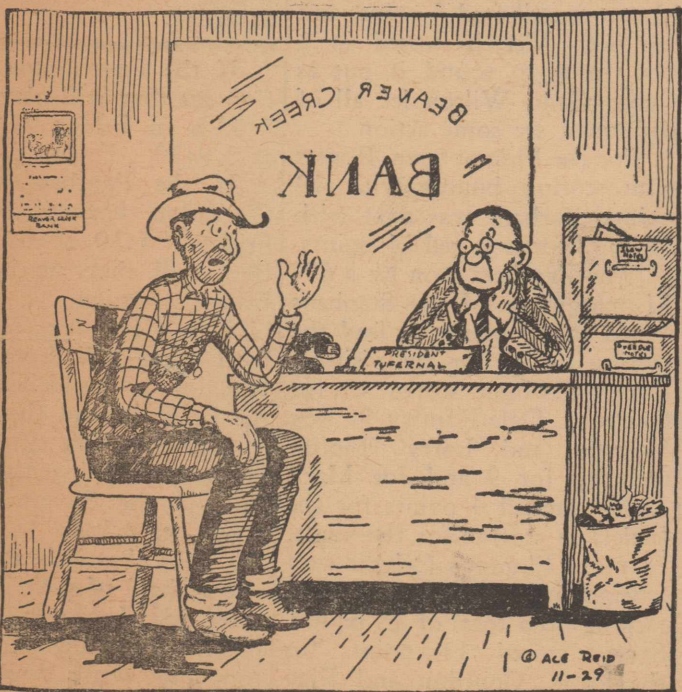

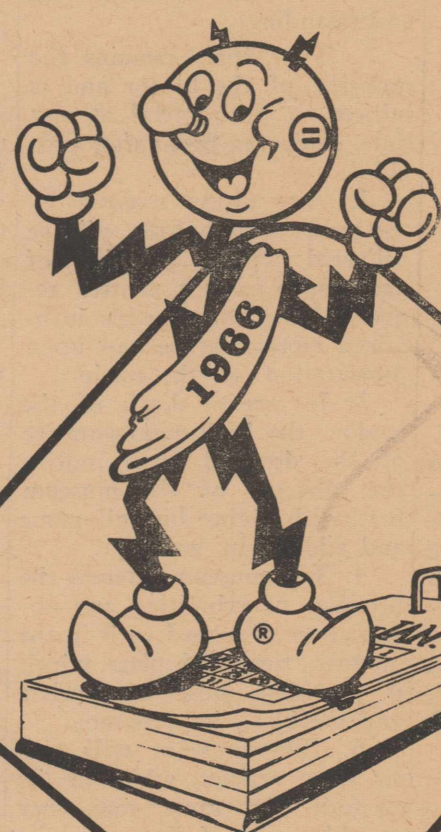

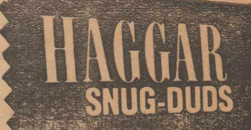

**Costs Are Regulated**

Mainly it's because they don't know that there's no such thing as a genuinely low bid on a long-distance move. You see, all interstate and most intrastate moving rates are regulated by federal and state commissions.

**Not Based On Estimate**  
In other words, if three van lines could move you at the same time, their bills to you would be virtually identical — no matter who gave the lowest bid. The thing to remember is that the cost of your move (what you'll actually pay when your belongings are delivered to your new home) is not based on the estimate. (Your mover is not bound by it.) The cost is based on the certified weight of your shipment and how many miles it is transported. Now that's the law. And there's no way of getting around it.
