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## FORMER QUITAQUE RESIDENT DIED THIS WEEK IN VERNON

Barney Douglas Martin, 73, a retired Lockett farmer and a former resident of Quitaque, died in a Vernon nursing home Saturday afternoon after a long illness. The Martins had lived in Vernon for the past several years.

Funeral services were conducted at 3:30 p. m. Monday at the Sullivan Funeral Home Chapel. Rev. Bill Austin, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Vernon, and Rev. C. B. Gooch, pastor of the Prairie View Baptist Church officiated. Interment was in East View Memorial Park at Vernon.

Mr. Martin was born in Fannin County September 1, 1892. He was married to Virginia Overstreet in Bowie, Dec. 24, 1912, after moving to Wilbarger County in 1906. The Martins lived here during the late 1920's and the 1930's. They moved from here during the 1930's.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Clyde D. Martin of Dallas; six brothers, Virgil of Lockney, H. L. of Hereford, Floyd of Portales, Ray of Roaring Springs, John L. of Lubbock, and Frank of Yuma, Ariz.; two sisters, Mrs. J. P. Smith of Clovis, and Mrs. H. H. ## NEW READING PROGRAM GETS UNDERWAY

The Program for the Improvement of Reading is underway in the Quitaque School. The teachers have attended workshops in Tulia and the Area Coordinator, Mr. C. Q. McCreary, has visited the local school and he has informed the superintendent that the program is progressing very well.

The rooms are occupied by the students and the rooms are being set up with the necessary equipment for the teaching of the reading and the public will be invited to visit the rooms as soon as the time can be arranged.

The student files are being prepared by the teachers, Mrs. Betty Wise and Mrs. Herman Moseley. The teachers are also preparing daily lesson plans for this program and gathering materials to use in the reading instructional program. Much of the materials will be assembled by the teachers until the materials that have been ordered arrives.

The teachers in the Special Reading Program are paid on the same schedule as the other teachers in the Quitaque School system. The only difference is the length of contract, which is for 11 months for the Special Reading Teachers and 9 months for the regular class room teachers, with the stipulation that the reading teacher must attend school this summer at West Texas State University or South Plains College at Levelland, for a six weeks term. The teachers in the reading program will be subject to regular school duties.

We feel that this program will be most helpful to our students and progress reports will be given as soon as they are available.

All funds for these four schools will come to the First National Bank and each school will have a separate account for their share of the funds. The expenditure of funds will be mainly under the following areas:

1. P.E.S.O., central office at Canyon, Texas;
2. Teachers of all special reading programs in the four schools;
3. Equipment and supplies.
4. Remodeling rooms for reading classes;
5. In-Service Training for teachers;
6. Guidance and psychological service.

# Pantherettes Upset Estelline, 61-59; Panthers Set New Scoring Records

The high school basketball teams won four of four games played since last report and two of those games were eye-popping affairs.

The Pantherettes started off a very fine evening for local fans by upsetting the Estelline girls' team 61-59 in a very exciting game.

In the second game of the evening, which figured to be nothing much more than another win for the Panthers with Estelline not putting up too much competition, and that game turned into a wild scoring spurge for the Panthers young players, during which Coach King's young men set a school scoring mark of 116 points and perhaps set a state scoring record for one quarter, for these young boys poured in 50 points during the final 9 minutes of play.

The final score in that game was 116-50!

Estelline's girls had won over the Pantherettes by a 30-point margin a couple of weeks ago and were resting at the top of the ladder with no defeats in district competition. The Pantherettes were still smarting from that defeat and they came to play, came from behind and earned the win.

The two teams battled on even terms for the first half of the first quarter of play with the Pantherettes ahead 13-12. Estelline rallied and went ahead but the locals could not get off the 13 on the scoreboard. At the end of the first period of play Estelline was ahead 21-13

and increased their lead to 25-13 before Quitaque finally tossed in free throw and moved the scoreboard off 13. From that point the Quitaque girls came battling back to trail only 32-34 at halftime.

After the intermission the locals kept firing away and shot themselves ahead 38-37 with 5:30 to go in the third period. The Pantherettes owned a 48-43 lead at the end of three periods and stayed ahead from 5 to 10 points the rest of the way until the closing minutes of the game when Cherri Rapp, one of the better girls basketball players to hit these parts in a long time, almost singlehandedly pulled the game out of the fire. However the locals refused to fold and won it by the 2-point margin.

Patricia Brunson, playing one of the better games of her career, fired in 31 points to top all scorers with 41 points. Carol Myers popped the nets for 15 points, Sherry Stark 11 and Jill Johnson added 3 points.

The Pantherette guards, Lynette Taylor, Barbara Reagan, Jo Beth Merrell, Billie Cheatham and Jill Johnson did a good job on the Estelline forwards, especially Jane Helm, who usually scores from 20 to 30 points. However, she has only one shot and one place from which she is able to score and the guards shut her off that spot and she made only 4 points. Cherri Rapp tallied 29 points, and her sister Ann hit for 26.

The win was a most satisf-

ying one for the locals, who now stand 5-2 in district play.

During the boys game things were rocking along just about as expected. The Panthers tossed in 22 points to 10 in the first period, added another 22 points in the second period to lead 44-23 at half time. Coach King let three of his starters start the second half but pulled them out the first time out and let his reserves take over.

There would have been lifting of eyebrows had the starters run up a big score but the starting five scored 44 points—the reserves hit 72 points in less than 16 minutes of playing time!

It was just one of those times when a team gets up a head of steam and are unstoppable. Of course, Coach Gene King had no idea of beating anyone that bad—but what can a coach do when he has already cleared the bench of all reserves.

Seven members of the winning team scored in double figures with Joe Lucero, the newest member of the squad, owning the hottest hands. Joe was stealing the ball and popping the net faster than the scorekeeper could mark them up and wound up with 18 points. Freshman Johnny Pointer was right on Joe's heels with 16 points; Lyn Payne, another freshman and Bobby Cochran, one of the starters, each contributed 13 points to the total; Larry Tipton, one of the starting five, hit for 16 points; Walter Wayne Taylor scored 12 points; Monte Stephens 10,

Dale Ramsey and Roland Hamilton tallied 8 points each and Joe Mack Jacobs rounded it out with 2 points. So, two new scoring records that are likely to be around for a long time to come — unless these same youngsters decide to go on another scoring spree for only three of the squad will not be back next year and several have three more years to play.

Tuesday night the locals drove over to joust with the Lakeview teams and in spite of an unheated gym, managed to pull off a pair of district wins, with the Pantherettes taking the opening game 52-33 and the Panthers won 75-58 over a real bunch of hustlers.

The Pantherettes had very little trouble with the Eagles, leading 25-14 at the first stop, 38-22 at halftime, 44-31 at the end of three periods. Patricia Brunson notched 20 points before Coach Gano Wilson took her out of the game in the 3rd quarter. Sherry Stark was runner-up in the scoring department with 16 points, Barbara Chandler scored 7 points, Carol Myers 6 and Lynette Taylor was switched from guard to forward for awhile and she made 3 points.

Coach Gene King started Roland Hamilton against the Eagles and that tall young man scored the first eight points for the Panthers. However, he got into early foul trouble and the coach pulled him after he had notched 10 points and made some nice plays on defense. The Eagles stayed within

striking distance of the Pantherettes for the first half and trailed 25-33 at halftime. The Panthers began to pull away after the intermission. Coach King played his reserves during the last quarter and those youngsters held their own in the closing minutes and even pulled some of the steals and scoring antics as they did in the game with Estelline.

Monte Stephens hit 16 points for the Panthers, Larry Tipton 14, Joe Lucero 11, Roland Hamilton 10, Rex Harmon 7, Walter W. Taylor 6, Jimmy Pointer 4, Dale Ramsey, Johnny Pointer and Joe Mack Jacobs 2 points each.

The locals entertain Matador here Friday night, play Flomot in a makeup game here Saturday night and on Monday night will journey to Turkey to wind up the season as far as the regular schedule is concerned. Fans are reminded that the games are Monday of next week instead of Tuesday night in order to leave Tuesday night open for playoff games if needed. Then, starting Thursday night of next week will be the Boys District Tournament, which will be played at Turkey this year.

At this writing no schedule has been turned in but it is customary for the team in first place in the round robin schedule to draw a bye thru the first night of play. If the Panthers win the remainder of the games on the regular schedule, they will not have to play Thursday night.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Attendance for the first half of the school year has been good. The ninth grades' first semester percentage of attendance is 99.61, while the Tenth grade has the low average with 96.77. The Eleventh Grade has a daily average attendance of 98.73, and the Senior Class average is 99.23. These figures do not give the complete story, however. One student is responsible for the major part of the Tenth grade's low percentage. That can't be helped, for it is an ill-health situation.

In the Senior Class, of the original students enrolled, there has been one-half a day's absence, which gives the seven students a percentage of attendance of 99.92. Six of the seven have perfect attendance for the first semester. A girl from downstate that was enrolled for 24½ days was responsible for the other absences.

We are now in the season of the year when we have the most absences. Perhaps some of them could be prevented if we could avoid fatigue and exposure and get plenty of rest; the best way to rest is plenty of sleep.

## PROTECTION AND COURTESY TO BASKETBALL OFFICIALS

When our school joins the University Interscholastic League and are assigned to a district, we accept the basketball code. The code states, "It means to accept decisions of officials without protest; to see that officials are extended protection and courtesy, by players, school personnel and laymen; to treat your opponent as your guests and to put clean play and real sportsmanship above victories."

During the years the State Executive Committee has had to inflict more penalties on member schools for misconduct relative to game officials than for any other rule violation. As an example the League disqualified Elysian Fields High School for district honors in 1966-67 and 1967-68 because of "mistreatment of game officials."

A fan approached the official after the game and said something to him in an abusive tone. The official turned to walk away and the fan struck him in the back. According to the committee report the fan said that he hit the official with his finger. The home team is held strictly responsible for the safety of officials, and anything contradictory means expulsion from the league.

It is recommended by the State Executive Committee that if an official is abused, then the school administration and the school board should take immediate steps to see that the person or persons making the attack on the official is arrested and prosecuted before the proper court.

This article is taken from a bulletin sent out by the League to all schools. We do not intend for it to imply that our fans in Quitaque in any way act hostile toward the officials. This is intended to show you what can happen to schools where misconduct is a part of every ball game.

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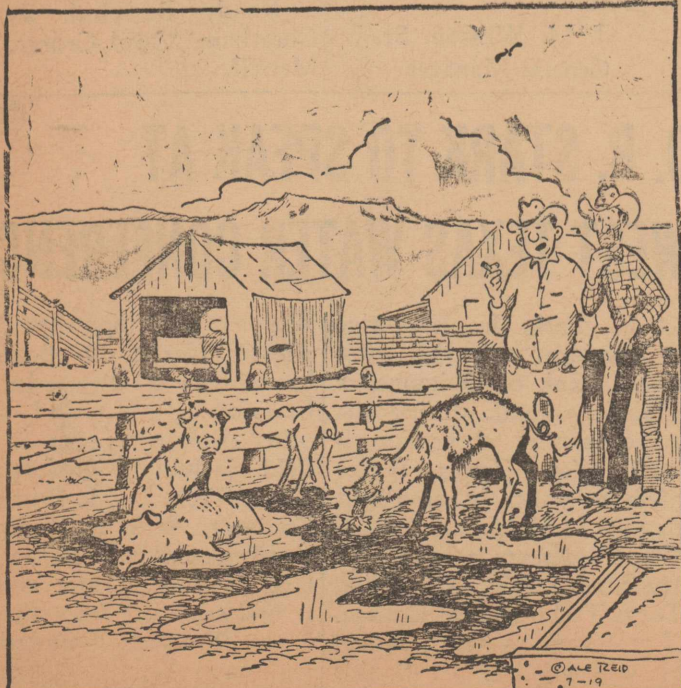

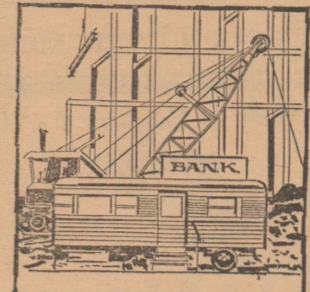

won't rush into an accident. Keep the bus schedule on time.

2. Don't wait on the Street or Road; Give the bus room to pull over. You'll be safer from traffic, too.

3. Use The Handrail of the Bus. It'll keep you from falling if you're slipping or tripping.

4. Take your seat quickly. If you're not sitting when the bus starts up, you could get thrown down.

5. Keep the aisle clear. Don't block it with books, musical instruments, lunch pails, feet, legs, or anything.

6. If you stand—Hold on. When there aren't enough seats stand where you can hold on to a seat grab-handle.

7. Get permission to open windows. Always ask the bus driver if it's all right. Never put your head, arms or hands out the window.

8. Don't throw things. Never throw things in a bus, at a bus or out of a bus. Save candy wrappers and other scraps for a waste basket.

9. Keep it quiet. The driver has to hear warning signals and other driver's horns. Be absolutely quiet at railroad crossings so the driver can hear if a train is coming.

10. No horseplay. Horsing around could distract the driver and cause an accident.

11. Be careful leaving the bus. Keep away from the side as it pulls away. Cross at least 10 feet in front of the bus so the driver can see you.

12. Obey the Bus Driver. Your school bus is like a classroom on wheels. Respect the driver as you respect your teachers.

**HOME NOTES**

**Briscoe County**

**Home Demonstration Agent**

Have you been having trouble in getting the correct fit in shoes? Rheba Boyles, Extension clothing specialist at Texas A & M University gives us some interesting and helpful hints on shopping for shoes.

When you shop for shoes, put your largest foot forward. It's the best foot for measuring, since this helps get a better fit. The difference between one shoe size and the next is a mere 1/16 of an inch, Miss Boyles states. A shoe should fit comfortably when bought.

Foot measurements frequently vary according to the time of day. During the afternoon the foot is about midpoint in size and this is the best time to shop, she says.

As the shoe style changes, so do sizes. Changing from a sedentary job to an active one can also cause a change in shoe size. When fitting shoes, try on both shoes and ask if you can walk on a hard-surfaced floor. Your walking will be chiefly on hard surfaces, and this helps judge comfort. Try a combination last if a snugger heel fit is needed.
