### ROGERS URGES U. S. HALT AID TO NATIONS TRADING WITH OR RECOGNIZING NORTH VIET NAM

Washington, D. C. (Spl.)—Congressman Walter Rogers, long an opponent of U. S. foreign aid programs, said Saturday American assistance "should be suspended immediately to nations trading with or maintaining diplomatic relations with the Communist regime in North Viet Nam."

Congressman Rogers said he would introduce a resolution Monday in the House of Representatives "so that the sense of Congress may be expressed in this very important matter."

Noting that U. S. military forces are engaged in a war of "unforeseeable duration and proportions," the Congressman urged that "all steps be taken now to hasten victory." He added, "It is a disservice to our fighting forces to fail to support them by taking steps to curb commerce to North Viet Nam."

Congressman Rogers said also he is urging Department of Defense officials to study the feasibility of (1) a naval blockade of North Viet Nam sea-ports, and (2) creating a 5-to-10-mile-wide "defensible buffer zone between North and South Viet Nam—and extending across the so-called Ho Chi Minh Trail in neighboring Laos—to curtail the flow of men and equipment from the north."

"The major problem in the war is the aggression from North Viet Nam. By a combination of bombing and land and sea blockades, the United States can move toward a victory by halting North Vietnamese support," Congressman Rogers said.

Foreign assistance authorizations and appropriations acts passed by Congress for the current fiscal year permit the administration to halt foreign aid

# Turks Stop Win Streak

On January 24, 1961, the Turkey Turks defeated the Quitaque Panthers in a district basketball game. In addition, it would urge the suspension of assistance because diplomatic missions are maintained in Hanoi.

Congressman Rogers has consistently opposed foreign aid bills before the House of Representatives — both those to authorize foreign aid projects as well as those appropriating foreign aid funds. The Congressman said Saturday he would continue to oppose U. S. participation in foreign aid "because of its demonstrated, documented ineffectiveness in furthering U. S. efforts in the continuing Cold War and Hot War with Communism."

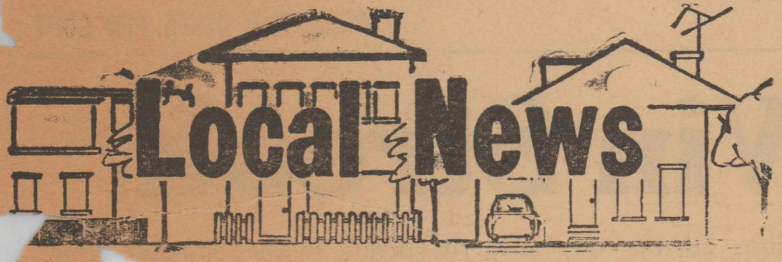

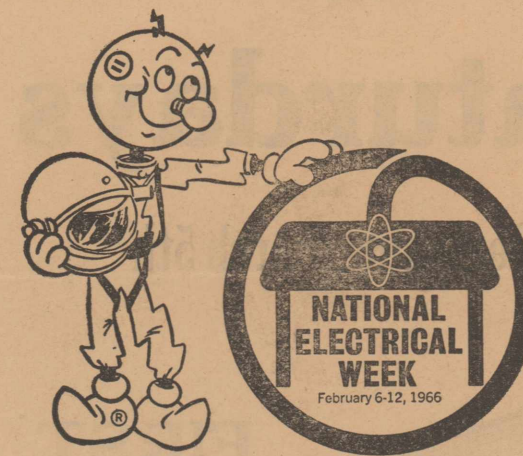

**HOME NOTES**

(By Becky Hall)

PREVENTION IS BETTER THAN REPAIR could be called a slogan of the Council on Dental Health. If our children have not been faced with the tooth decay problem they will confront it sometime in their lives. And most of us have already had realistic experiences with the problem many times. Tooth decay is probably the most prevalent disease in the United States today. There are few people who have a natural immunity to it. A very high percentage of tooth decay may be prevented by learning some facts about it and applying that knowledge in our daily lives.

First we need to realize what tooth decay is and what causes it. In nearly everyone's mouth there are germs that produce acid. Some mouths have immense numbers and usually lots of decay, and other mouths have few and a little decay. These germs collect in groups on undisturbed areas in a gelatin-like film, between teeth, close to the gum, on the cheek or tongue surfaces. Such germs thrive on sucrose, which is sugar, and can convert it to a particular acid in one and one-half minutes. This acid dissolves tooth enamel and makes the dentin beneath it soft and discolored. The action from the intake of more complex starches is slower, about twenty-five minutes.

In order to prevent the formation of new cavities in the teeth and to control decay already started, refined sugars and starches should be kept out of the diet. It sweets are restricted, the acid-producing germs do not have enough food upon which to live and reproduce in large numbers. They literally starve to death. The hours of acid action on teeth can be reduced to a minimum by eating only at meal time and

then brushing your teeth immediately afterwa unavoidable, sh fruits and vegetables than candies, Cokes and cookies.

Mrs. R. H. Frances, Silvertown school nurse, tells me that approximately 41 percent of the school students, grade one through eight, have tooth decay or have had decay and have had dental repairs. It's rather evident from this that it's a problem that about every family faces. Children are more prone to what we commonly call the sweet tooth, therefore, as homemakers we need to supply our children with adequate diets for body growth and repair. For further information on this call our office, 4271, and we'll send you the Extension bulletin "Food for Fitness—A Daily Food Guide," free.

I promised to share a butter cake recipe with Mrs. O. R. Stark, Jr. of Quitaque. You may like to try it too. It has very good keeping qualities and is very good served with coffee or tea.

Kentucky Butter Cake  
Sift together—3 cups flour; 1 teaspoon baking powder; 1 teaspoon salt; ½ teaspoon soda. Cream—1 cup butter, gradually add 2 cups sugar, cream well. Blend in—4 unbeaten eggs one at a time, beating well after each.

Combine—1 cup buttermilk; 2 teaspoons vanilla. Add alternately with dry ingredients to creamed mixture, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Blend well after each addition. (low speed with mixer.)

Turn—into 10 inch tube pan, greased on the bottom. Bake—at 325 degrees for 60 to 65 minutes.

Pour sauce over cake while still hot—before removing cake from pan. Perforate cake with toothpick if desired to help absorb sauce.

Sauce  
1 cup sugar in saucepan  
1/4 cup water  
2 tablespoons rum or brandy extract  
1 stick butter (or margarine) heat to melt butter but do not boil—use while hot

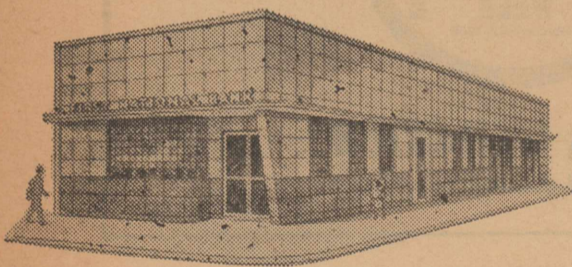
