Medicare Forms Available At Local Post Office

Postmaster Jarrell Rice announced today that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the stamp window of the Quitaque Post Office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 4.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailing and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 per month and provides doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of the Quitaque Post Office.

Senior citizens who reach 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are preaddressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.

Cancer Crusade To Start April 1st

With the launching of its educational and fund-raising Crusade on April 1st, the American Cancer Society will begin a stepped-up program that could save thousands of lives each year from cancer.

The Rev. Clyde Cain of Silverton, President of the Briscoe County unit, said the Society's immediate goal is based on the fact that cancer of the uterus, colon and rectum, breast, oral cavity, lung and skin constitute over 60 per cent of all cancer deaths. He added that "early and adequate application of present-day medical knowledge in detection and treatment of cancer of these sites alone could save thousands of Americans." The Rev. Cain said plans for the 1966 Crusade are well underway and that additional volunteers "will be needed if we are to get a good start in reaching our objectives."

"Persons," he said, "who are anxious and willing to help wipe out cancer should contact Mary Pittman or Bill Griffin."

Announcement of the appointment of Mary Pittman as Chairman of the American Cancer Society's 1966 Crusade in Quitaque was made today by Rev. Cain.

The President said the Crusade Chairman's "long interest in the fight against cancer would add vigor and enthusiasm to the annual Crusade to help save lives from cancer and raise funds for research and education."

Rev. Cain said that the new Chairman's work ahead will be hard, but it is cut out for her. This is an auspicious year.

"We are pledged to step up our program to reduce deaths from cancer and to enlarge the Society's nationwide research effort."

Today there are 870,000 people in the United States under treatment for cancer. Taking into account population growth, the figure will be about 950,000 men, women and children by 1970 if present rates continue.

Also included in its stepped up program is more funds for research—on which so many lives depend in the future.

Mrs. Joe Brannon, chairman of the county crusade, said she is happy that Mary Pittman is willing to undertake such a challenging and humanitarian assignment. She said she was glad the Society was carrying out its tradition of "Tell Your Neighbor" the facts about cancer during the crusade—and in fact throughout the year. People must know about cancer to act properly and at the proper time.

"I am confident with an increased number of volunteers who want to serve in a great humanitarian effort, we will accomplish much," she said.

If you are willing and anxious to serve as a volunteer, contact Mary Pittman or Bill Griffin.

Last year the Society raised over \$700 in Briscoe County and distributed approximately 1000 leaflets.

"I know," the Chairman said, "that we can do better in 1966. We need the support of all."

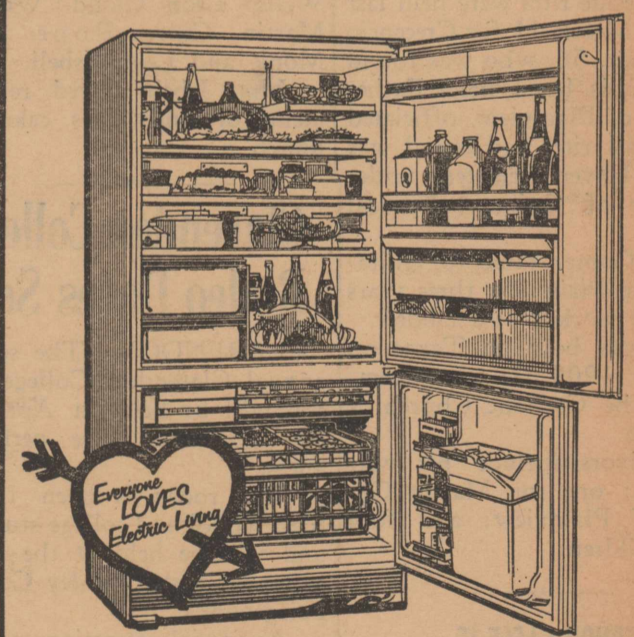
